
The steamer City of Topeka has been raised. Steamer Danube, which arrived Friday, passed her early on the morn ing of January 4, being towed towards



McPhillips & Williams give notice that they will apply at the next session of the legislature for a private bill to incorporate a company to build a railway from the coal mines at Micheli; thence by way of Micheli creek and the most feasible and practicable route east or west of Elk river and Upper Koot-enay river in a southerly direction to the international boundary, or to a point at or near the international boundary; also with power to build, equip, maintain and operate a line or lines of railway, of standard gauge, from Michell creek northerly along the valley of the Elk river, and from thence to a point on the main line of the Canadian Pacific ran-way; also from a point on the proposed line of railway, thence northeasterly by the North Kootenay Pass to Alberta, to connect with the Crow's Nest Pass rail-way or the British Columbia Southern railway.



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


