In a sparring tournament given last year in Providence, he won the second prize. Both were in splendid condition.

The match originated in the fortnightly boxing match between the two men. McCartney was allowed for real. The men were in ring costume. They were stripped to the waist, and their hair was cut short. Each wore white flannel trunks, white stockings, and fighting shoes, no gloves.

McCartney was seconded by Dan Docherty and Eddy Hanly, well known sportsmen. Murphy was seconded by Johnny Saunders and Johnny Riley. The ring was about 40 by 20 feet in size. The spectators were all seated on benches and settees on a level with the floor at the start, but before the fight was over every man was on his feet, and to get a good view of the lively work that the combatants put in.
