THE QUEEN'S SPEECH

In the queen's speech to the imperial parliament a hopeful view is taken of foreign relations generally, also of the situation in India and South Africa. Announcement is made of the approaching marriage of Prince Leopold, and the interesting subject of the treaty negotiations with France is touched upon, though not apparently in a very encouraging strain.

A CURIOSITY of the time is the large importation of potatoes from Great Britain and Ireland into the United States. A ship that arrived at New York a few days ago brought 1127 tons of potatoes from Scotland, and many more large shipments are expected to follow.

THE ANTI-BOT-TAIL CAR ASSOCIATION of New York and Brooklyn are having an interesting time with the companies that use the "bot-tail" cars in those cities. The association has grown to large proportions, and its members have passed resolutions not to deposit their fares in the box, but demand that a conductor or the driver shall come and collect them.

GENTLE OSCAR WILDE is in a terrible state of mind over the newspapers. He is dead in love with the men and women of America, but he thinks the newspapers are too contemptuously and persistently "out-rageous" to him.

THE FACT that the electoral system of scrutin de liste, recently rejected in the French chamber of deputies, should have been adopted the 20th day by a large majority—385 to 124—in the Italian chamber, suggests a thing or two.

IT IS NOT greatly to Toronto's credit that the city's moneyed men should be so far behind those of Montreal in taking hold of manufacturing enterprises.

THE NUMBER of suicides among the victims of the union general is reduced to three. Had the original rumors of a much greater number proved correct, it might have been suspected that many victims had been influenced by a public-spirited sense of obligation to do their share in rendering the affair fitly sensational and French, as well as by a feeling of inability to survive their misfortunes.

THE WINNING MEN says that if Premier Norquay is satisfied with the disallowance of the Manitoba and Southwestern charter, the people of Manitoba are not. The Sun takes occasion to go for the syndicate and its action towards the victims of its exorbitant and unscrupulous action.

IT DECLARES that the disallowance of the charter is the deathblow of the only hope

them on a very large scale, besides a third which is only a little one. That shows how promptly Hamilton men took advantage of the "boom" in cotton factories, while the Toronto first cotton factory is still to come. Let us hope that the novelty of a large cotton factory actually running in Toronto may refresh the eyes of our citizens, and much longer time shall have passed. It shows the confidence felt by Montreal business men in the future of the cotton manufacture that, at the meeting above referred to, it was decided to double the capacity of the company's mill, which is situated at Valleyfield, on the Beauharnois canal. The mill has now 35,000 spindles; it will have 70,000 when the new extension has been completed, making it equal to the Hochelaga mill, at present the largest in Canada. It would certainly be for Toronto's benefit were our moneyed men more inclined to invest in sound manufacturing enterprises, rather than in mortgages and real estate speculation.

MR. LANGMUIR. Mr. J. W. Langmuir, who has proved himself a competent inspector of the asylums, prisons, jails and charities of the province, resigns that post to take the management of the trust company. Mr. Langmuir had a most difficult task to fill, he had to act as mediator between the law and the municipalities in the matter of prisons and jails, and a large number of public or municipal officers came under his eye. In the discharge of these varied duties he gained the respect of all without any sacrifice of the public interests. The government will have some trouble to choose a suitable successor. Perhaps the duties of the office will be divided. Mr. Langmuir will remain in office till a new arrangement is made.

STREET PROJECTIONS.

Tenders for Sewers, Stone and Pavement—Other Notes of the Works Committee.

The board of works sat from four to six yesterday afternoon, there being a full attendance of members. The business transacted was of a very miscellaneous character.

On recommendation of chairman, it was decided to receive the Don river deputations at a special meeting Saturday afternoon next.

It was ordered that steps be taken to remedy the nuisance arising from the defective sewer on Catherine street, as frequently complained of by Thomas Maclean.

A reserved foot of land on the west side of Shaw, running 50 feet north from Queen, was recommended for purchase at a cost of \$80, as it will give a frontage assessment to the property abutting. The strip will be added to the street.

Mr. Lennox, architect, appeared in reference to the projecting bay window in the new building opposite Lawrence street. The city commissioner had prohibited the erection of the window because it projected out over the street.

Six contractors sent in tenders for the following being the lowest, were accepted: 1. Trenching and filling, 2. Paving, 3. Sewer, 4. Stone, 5. Pavement, 6. Drainage.

A letter from George West for payment of the drawback on the George street pavement was referred to the engineer for a report.

Mr. Ald. Irwin appeared in reference to the block paving of George street. He thought that it was a public thoroughfare and should be paved at the expense of the city and not out of the walks and gardens fund.

Mr. Ald. Irwin suggested that the committee should get an understanding from the street railway that its fellow members and they adopted it.

Mr. Ald. Irwin complained that the lane in front of his block was in a very bad condition. He would like to get a petition to have it paved.

COUNTY ORANGE LODGE.

Large and Enthusiastic Annual Meeting—Financial Statement—Officers—Presentation.

Mr. Ryan accused Mr. Kennedy of not being present at the meeting of the office before a J. P., previous to the 10th of Jan. Mr. Kennedy replied in a rather belittling manner that he was not obliged to keep a diary for the benefit of the board. A short intermission followed to allow the striking committee to meet.

Mr. Burns moved that provision should be made for the payment of caretakers' salaries, as many of them were dependent upon that for their support. Referral to finance committee.

Mr. Tobias asked that an additional clerk be employed for clerical at the De Salle institute. The motion was carried. The motion was carried that many Catholic young men desired to further their education in classics, and if assistance was not procured they would be forced to go to the Toronto high school. After several motions being put and withdrawn the matter was referred to the committee of management.
