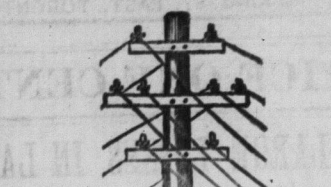

TWO DROWNING ACCIDENTS.

A Young Englishman Takes Cramps in the Hamper and Goes Down—A Baby Boy Drowns in a Tub.

Yesterday morning between 12 and half past, a distressing fatality occurred on the Hamper river about half a mile from Hicks' boat house. Two young men, not long out from England, came up the river, and one of them stripped and plunged into the water. After swimming across, and on his return, he was suddenly seized with cramps. His companion on the bank, not being able to swim, gave the alarm. Several people hastened to the scene, one young lad succeeded in handing a stick to the poor fellow, who, making a desperate fight for life, but unfortunately it was of no avail as he sank immediately after. The moment he had gone down two boats, each manned by four gentlemen, arrived on the scene. One of the crew from the first boat stripped at once and gallantly plunged in at the spot indicated by the excited spectators on shore. Owing to the great depth at this spot—some 20 feet—he was unable to reach the body. Much credit is due to a gentleman who to him for his praiseworthy effort. The news was at once carried to Charlie Nurse, a man who was in the river. Nurse immediately rowed to the place with a grappling hook and the usual appliances necessary on these occasions. After an hour's search the corpse was secured, but, on reaching the surface, slipped from the hook, and the work had to be recommenced. A second venture was more successful and brought up the corpse of a young man, aged about 20, dark hair, and height about 5 feet 6 inches. The clothes on the bank consisted of a round felt hat, blue boots, black coat and vest and dark grey trousers. It is said that the drowned man is the son of a shoemaker on Queen street west named Apood. The father arrived on the scene about 5 o'clock and took the remains home in an express wagon.

Another accident quite as pathetic resulted in the death of a bright little child of two years old, the son of Mr. T. Eaton, the dry goods merchant of this city. The groom had filled a tub with water for the horse, and while some of the members of the family were engaged in croquet on the lawn the little fellow was sailing a toy boat. When the groom returned the child was drowned, lying face downward in the tub. Much sympathy was expressed throughout the city yesterday for the bereaved parents.

THE WORLD AT LARGE.

Prince Napoleon's son is being educated at Cheltenham college. His late imperial cousin was at Woolwich, the Duke of Genoa at Harrow, and the son of Don Carlos is at London. The Duke of Windsor is at Rome. The recipients of honorary degrees at Oxford university this year will be the arch-bishop of Canterbury, Lord Rayleigh and Alcester, Lord Justice Bowen, Dr. Schuman, Sirs. C. Wilson and F. Abel, and Prof. Fraser. The latest fancy of the London mashers is to have a cab painted a delicate primrose color, and drawn by a chestnut horse. The Junior Army and Navy club appear to be the headquarters of these brilliant equipages. The czar seems inconceivably a happy man in one respect—his domestic relations. Had an unequal marriage been added to his miseries at Constantinople for the past eighteen months his life would have been miserable.

At a place called Glanfor Brig in England it is the practice to insure the lives of children directly they are born, and the health inspector of the district draws attention to the exceptionally high death rate prevalent there in the past year. A fine cargo of 325 bales of hops reached England from Malabar lately. There is said to have been a large emigration of Kentish hop growers of late years to the Australian colonies. New Zealand hop fields are found almost entirely to the best Kentish, and as yet entirely free from the ravages of insects.

Wellington spoke of Abel-el-Kader as "a captain, who, with more power and better arms, would have made Algeria unconquerable." Marshal St. Armand is alleged to have said maliciously to Napoleon III., "Abel, if Abel were a Frenchman, we should have another Napoleon." The London Chess Tournament. LONDON, June 17.—In the chess tournament today Mason and Blackburne beat Sellman and Bird respectively. Blackburne played a drawn game with Mackenzie. The scores in the tournament stand, Zaker 22 gains, Stein 17, Blackburne 15, Teichgrin 15, Mason 14, Mackenzie 14, Rosenthal 13, England 13, Bird 12, and Winslow 11.
