

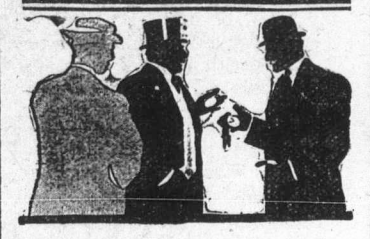

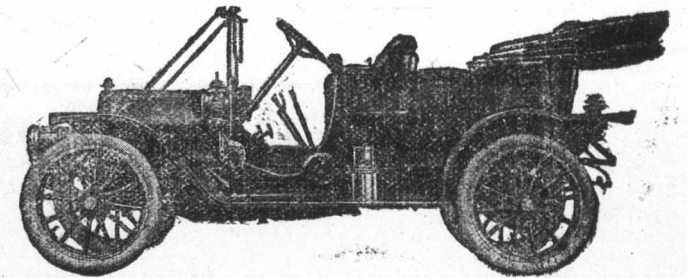

Toronto, Feb. 28.—Receipts were 85 cars, with 1,100 head of cattle, 400 sheep and lambs, 460 hogs and 140 calves.

The run was a little heavy for the demand and quite a few loads were held over for the later markets. It is probable, judging from the many complaints heard, that drovers have in many cases been paying too high prices in the country—a risky proceeding, in view of the fact that last week showed a steady decline, prices at the week-end being the lowest for this season.

This week's markets so far show very little power of recovery, prices barely holding steady at recent declines. Today's prices were about level with yesterday's for the ordinary run of medium light butcher cattle, but choice heavier butcher were 5c to 10c easier. The price to-day for choice butcher was \$5.50, as against \$6.00 yesterday. Good medium butcher ranged steady from \$5.25 to \$5.60.

Good butcher cows and bulls were the firmest features of to-day's market, choice cows quoting strong at \$5 to \$5.30 and bulls at the same figures.

Light common mixed butcher dull at \$3.60 to \$4.50 and canners at \$2 to \$3. No heavy export cattle offering.

Sheep firm at \$4.25 to \$4.75. Lambs dull at \$6 to \$6.40.

Hogs unchanged at the last decline to \$6.75, f. o. b. and \$7.05, fed and watered.



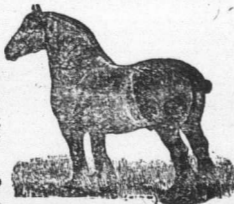
