## GUARANTORS OF CHAUTAUQUA MEET

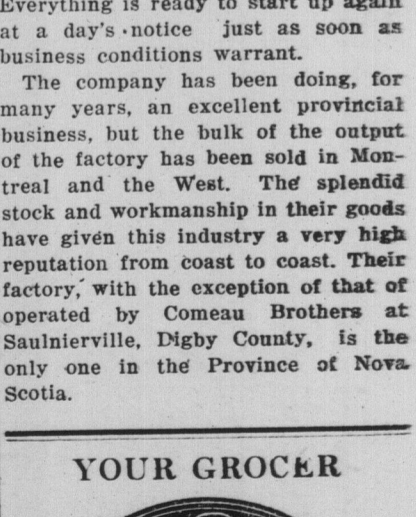
### Efforts to be Made to Induce Pro Gov't to Relieve Organization of Amusement Tax

"All shipments of potatoes from the United States of America shall be accompanied by a certificate duly signed by the consignor stating the name of the State in which the potatoes were grown."

## IMPROVED HEALTH

Official figures show that the death rate of the Province of Nova Scotia for the past year was 12.55 per cent., which, as Dr. W. H. Hattie, Provincial Health Officer, points out is the lowest on record and shows an improvement of nearly 11 per cent. on the next lowest rate, that of the previous year.

These results, not the best that can be secured, nor the best that will be secured in future years, still contain in themselves elements of satisfaction to all who are interested in conserving the health of our people and preserving lives that would have otherwise been terminated.

In 1918 "flu" was more or less prevalent, and the death rate was 17.8 in Nova Scotia as against 13.8 in England and Wales, 12.39 in New York City with its teeming East Side slums. In Ontario the rate was 11.9.

Dr. Hattie points out that with the present population of the Province, a proximately 525,000, last year's death rate indicates a saving of 1,300 lives, as compared with previous normal years and if the death rate can be kept at 12.55 for another ten years the Province will have saved and added to its population more than 40 per cent. as many people as it gained during the past inter-censal.

Statistics published indicate great variations in death rates in different parts of the Province. While climatic conditions have considerable influence, ignorance and lack of sufficient intelligent effort to combat conditions have more. The fact that the Province of Nova Scotia should have a higher death rate than the city of New York is distinctly discreditable. We are, however, to all appearance, at the dawn of better things. During the past year the amounts expended by the Provincial Government for public institutions, hospitals, sanatoriums, public health and relief measures, generally total up roundly \$870,000. This amount, to some, may seem large for a small Province, but no one who has studied conditions would say that it is too large.

The value of human life and the preservation of public health cannot be measured in dollars and cents, and the educational campaign being opened in these matters is not failing and cannot fail to react in arousing people generally to such a sense of the situation as to cause a still further decrease in the death rate, which, in some parts of our Province, is needlessly and disgracefully large.



**HISTORIC NOTES OF BRIDGETOWN**  
Interesting Side Lights on the Early Days With Modern References.

The following notes on early history of Bridgetown will, we believe, be found of interest to many readers: Bridgetown was founded by Captain John Crosskill, an officer of the British Navy, in 1821-1822. Previous to the year 1800 he had come into possession of three farm lots reaching from their river bank to the Bay of Fundy and for twenty years he had farmed and with his family occupied the property more or less, but in 1821 he laid out a town on the north side of the river, in the vicinity of the bridge, which was first built in 1803. This town plan was quite extensive and the streets then surveyed and decided to the county have been ample for the growth of the town for one hundred years; in other words the gallant old captain in his town plans made provision for one hundred years' growth.

Captain Crosskill married a daughter of John Mills, merchant, of Halifax, and it was through his wife, Charlotte, that he secured the fifteen hundred acres or more of fine lands in the vicinity.

Immediately after the laying-off into town lots, in 1821, there was quite a boom and the lots sold rapidly, and the following summer, 1822, building operations began. That summer Beamish Murdoch, the historian, paid a visit to this locality, and says he could only see one or two houses as he stood by the bridge, but two years later he came back and found that quite a town had sprung up, due to the enterprise of Captain Crosskill. While the town began to build in 1822, it was not named until 1824, when at a meeting called for the purpose, the name Bridgetown was chosen. It is said, in deference to the wishes of Captain Crosskill, who, while in the British navy, had for some time resided at Bridgetown, Barbados, W. I.

While Bridgetown has had one hundred years of interesting growth and history since the days of its founding, this portion of the Annapolis River had an interesting and eventful one hundred years or more previous to 1822, as during the French occupancy of this country the Acadians occupied both sides of the river and had flourishing settlements and neat farms and farm-houses hereabouts, and a few years after their expulsion, in 1755, the first New England settlers came and occupied the partly developed farms.

Prominent amongst the first English residents here was Christopher Prince, of Boston, who, in what is part of the town, had quite an extensive farm, keeping twenty-five cows and other stock. Near him lived John Hicks, a pioneer settler here, who was of Quaker stock, and came from Rhode Island, and was a J. P. in that colony previous to coming to Nova Scotia. A third of early settlers was Col. Henry Munro, an English army officer, who had seen service in the French wars of that period and was now retired on a small pension. These three pioneer settlers in this locality, each in turn represented the old township of Granville in the House of Assembly between 1760 and 1780.

John Hicks and his sons conducted a ferry across the river there, previous to the erection of the first bridge; and previous to the naming of the town in 1824 the locality was known as Hicks' Ferry. The descendants of this first old Quaker pioneer, Messrs. J. H. Hicks & Sons, who now conduct large business interests here, and part of their main front on Queen St., where one hundred and fifty years ago the first J. H. Hicks & Sons tied their ferry boat in the creek long since filled in, and on which now stands the Hicks business block.

Bridgetown is noted to-day as the great vinegar and cider manufacturing centre of the Valley. This was an early industry here for in 1764 there was a cider mill not far from where the large plant of M. W. Graves & Sons now stands, and the proprietor of that early day had among his stock in his cellar ten barrels of "cyder" from apples grown in the orchard he found on the place, the apple trees had been planted and grown by his French predecessors.

In connection with the centennial celebration in September, a historical pageant is proposed showing the Micmac period followed by the French occupants, then the early New England settlers, then the Loyalists and Crosskills and their more recent historic events in the life of the town.


The Nova Scotia and Annapolis Royal Historical Societies are to be invited to participate in the week's events, and to hold a session of the N. S. Historical Society here the first week in September.

At the same time it is proposed to have a memorial tablet placed at the scene of the Bloody Creek massacre, which was near Bridgetown, but is a historical spot that up to the present time has received very little attention, although this battle in 1711 was the scene of more blood shed than most of the captures of Port Royal during its long history.



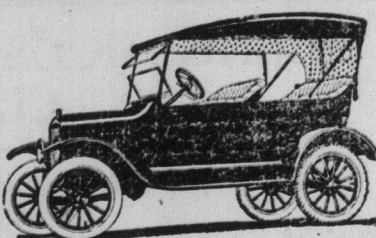

### HIGHWAYS HEAD

#### PROV. EXPENDITURES

Hospitals and Sanatorium Total \$738,000, Education \$650,000.

Highways lead the estimated expenditures for Nova Scotia for the year 1922, according to the budget which Hon. J. C. Torey presented to the House of Assembly Tuesday afternoon. The amount placed in the estimates for roads is \$1,287,804. The next item is that for public institutions, and it is a remarkable fact that one quarter of the public expenditure of Nova Scotia is for such purposes as hospitals, sanatoriums, asylums, public health and other charities. As Mr. Torey said in his address, no province in Canada, in proportion to the wealth of the people, made such provision for the relief of suffering. Education comes in for \$667,305.00. Immigration, the important matter of getting people to help make up the revenue, is relegated near the bottom of the list and is given the sum of \$18,150.00, but the Agent General's department in London is given a further amount of \$19,789, which actually places the immigration item at \$37,939.00.

Among the items of highway ex-

pensitures is maintenance, \$775,000. For the public institutions the following amounts are estimated:

The outlook for the Newfoundland lobster fishery this coming season is very bright. At this time last year there were 2,800 cases of the previous year's catch held in Newfoundland, and about 1,000 cases additional of the 1920 catch in hands of consignees, in the United States. At the present time there is a complete reversal of these conditions and in all Newfoundland to-day it would be difficult to gather up fifty cases of the 1921 pack. The entire pack was about 8,000 cases. The present price is \$21.50 per case.

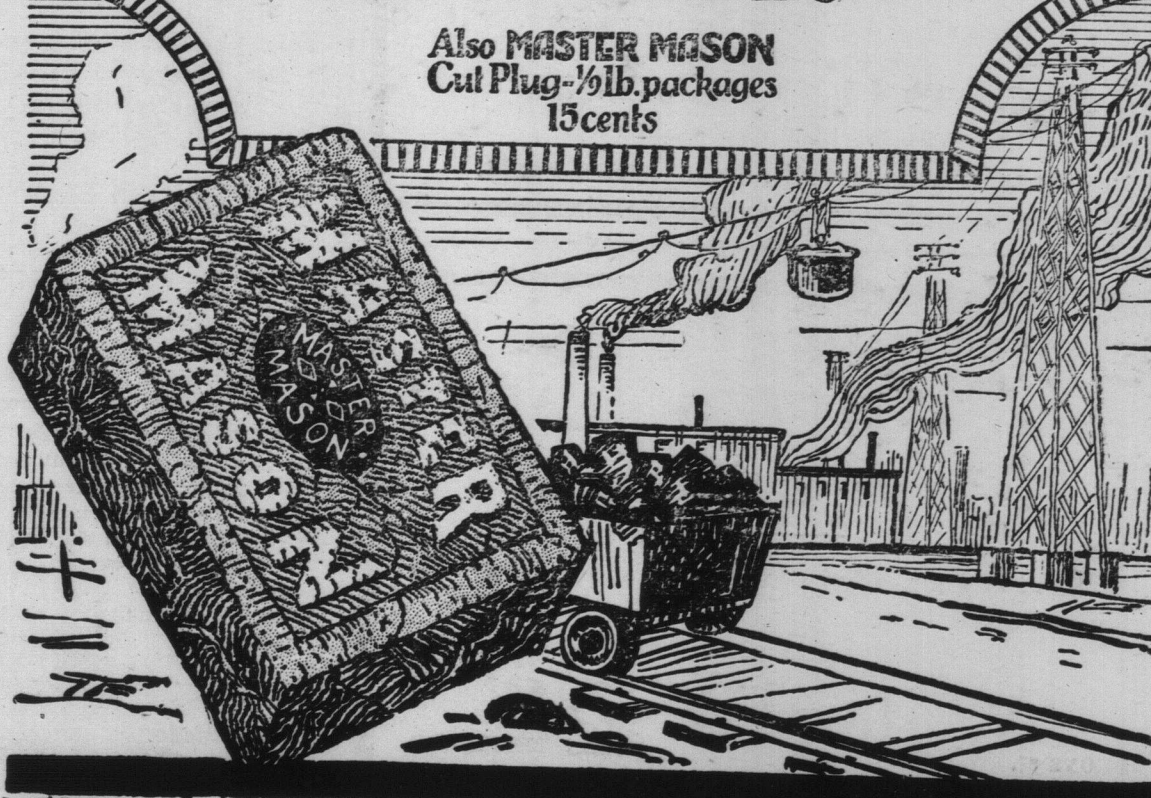

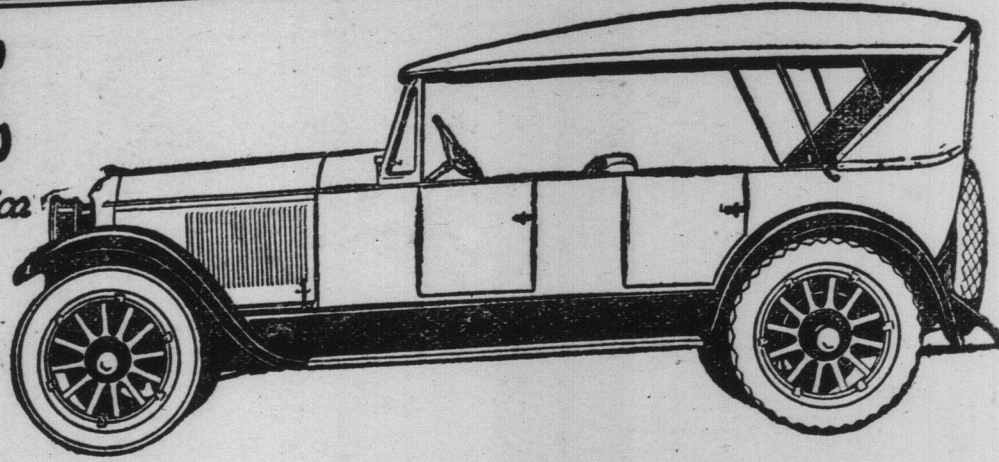

## 103 ANNIVERSARY OF ODDFELLOWSHIP

Dr. Boyle Addresses Crescent Lodge At The St. James Church Sunday Afternoon

Crescent Lodge, No. 63, I.O.O.F. celebrated the 103rd anniversary of Oddfellowship by attending div service in St. James' Church on Sunday afternoon. The speaker for the occasion was Rev. Dr. Boyle, President of Kings College.

The officers and members to number of about sixty, paraded to church and the concourse of people gathered filled the edifice to capacity. The Reverend speaker chose as text Zechariah Ch. 2 portion vers 4 and 5 "Jerusalem shall be inhabited as towns without walls. For I, saith the Lord, will be with her a wall round about and will be the glory in the midst of her".

Dr. Boyle referred briefly to the historic setting and in the course of his remarks did not go into statistical regarding the work of Oddfellowship its good deeds and many beneficent well known arrangements of the Order but rather took general line of discourse suggested by this text chosen. Reference was made in the early part of the discourse to the scattering of the Jews into exile and out which the race would never have given Premiers to Great Britain and financiers to the world.

A powerful and eloquent plea was made for the highest degree of concord and good feeling between the various denominations and the breaking down of any of the "walls" which effected this was a function and a noble field of work for the efforts of Oddfellowship.
