From the Metropolitan Philatelist. Washington Notes.

May 3, 1899.
The consignment of stamps for the Philippines, mentioned in last week's notes, left this city for its destination on Saturday, April 29th.

The new die for the 4c envelope is making progress. It was stated that it has been accepted by the department but this is not the case. The old head as previously mentioned, a die made some years ago but used will never be adopted as it is somewhat larger than the present bust, it may be found necessary to omit the first circle of notches in order to get it into the frame without looking crowded. The department has now on hand two interesting essays of envelopes, both of which are size 5 printed on '99 watermark paper. One of them is a modified design of the present 4c but this has been rejected. The old head, above mentioned, is a much better likeness of Lincoln. The balance of the design, in which the first proof of this head has been printed, is not acceptable. The figures are too crowded. This design is entirely different from anything ever issued, having a somewhat Greek appearance.

The new 4c envelope will not be printed in the same color as the present but will conform in color to the new 4c stamps.

Reports have appeared that there are more than one variety of the surcharged Cuban envelope. The department here stated that only size 5 was furnished to Havana and Mayor Rathbone writes that there was only one variety, white paper No. 5 surcharged. Wonder where that amber No. 13 came from.

The following plate plates have been made at Bureau, of which the 5c are now at press.

- 830 1c, 831 5c.
- 831 1c, 835 5c.
- 832 1c, 836 5c.
- 833 1c, 837 5c.

The Bureau of Engraving and Printing have just surcharged for use in Guan 10,000 1c, 30,000 2c and 5,000 5c postage stamps.

*The most important news of the week is the surcharging of a supply of postage stamps for use in the Philippines. The surcharge will probably be similar to the recent one of Porto Rico and will read simply "Philippines." The following quantities and denominations will be shipped at an early date:

New York Notes.

During the past week a gang of counterfeiters were arrested. Their plant was in Philadelphia where bogus cigar tax stamps were manufactured also plates for making high value currency bills such as \$50 and \$100 were found.

William M. Jacobs was the organizer of the gang. He owned a cigar factory in Lancaster, Pa., and thought there was a big profit if he could avoid paying the Government a tax of \$3.60 for every 1000 cigars manufactured.

This Jacobs had special paper manufactured with the U. S. I. R. watermark and was about to start a paper mill of his own to issue \$10,000,000 of counterfeit stamps and currency, when he and the gang were arrested by Secret Service Agents.

The following is clipped from the N. Y. Evening World, Saturday evening, April 29th, 1899, relating to the Great Barrier Island postal service:

Something quite unique in the way of postage stamps is that used in the pigeon post of Great Barrier Island, a specimen of which has been sent by Messrs. Whitfield King & Co., the well known postage stamp dealers of Ipswich.

There is no telegraph cable to Great Barrier Island, which is some distance from the New Zealand coast, and the ordinary mails for letters are infrequent and uncertain, so that a pigeon post has been established since November, 1897, and has been successfully worked ever since.

The J. W. Scott Co., formerly of 40 John street, has removed to new headquarters located at 36 John street, same block.

An auction sale is to be held at the Collectors' Club on Tuesday, May 8th, 1899, at 8 p.m. The sale contains 403 lots and is catalogued by W. F. Gregory.

Bogert & Durbin will also hold an auction sale in Philadelphia, Pa., on May 20th, 1899, at 2 p.m. The sale contains 544 lots, and the stamps are on exhibition here at present.
