CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Anniversary Meeting of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes by the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no Member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

(Officers.)

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors or Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

(Executive Committee.)

1. There shall be also an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting, provided that no annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each Meeting, have paid his subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

VIII.

(Objects.)

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships at King's College, Fredericton; and assistance, where necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially Sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIII.

(The General Committee.)

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following Members, viz. : The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; but in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman, the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hoc vice* a Member of the General Committee,) and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee, to be the Certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriation of the funds of the Society; and a Report of the proceedings of such Meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

3. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly. Production of Certificate of Lay Deputies.

Secondly. Secretary's Report to be read, and also a Report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

XIV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion for the General Purposes of the Society.

RESOLUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

That all future Grants, by this Society, for any purpose, may be re-appropriated as the Society shall think fit, if not claimed within three years from the date of the respective grants. (5th Report, page 8.)

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That the title to all Churches, towards the erection or completion of which any grant is made from the funds of this Society, be vested either in the Church Corporation of the Parish in which such Church is situated, or in some party or parties in trust to convey the site, as soon as practicable, of such Church to the Church Corporation as soon as the same may be legally constituted. (14th Report, page 24.)

That no grants from this Committee, subject to conditions, be paid until an order is issued from the Executive Committee, who will previously ascertain that the conditions of the grants have been fulfilled. (17th Report, page 21.)

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which are not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That each Missionary receiving a salary from this Society, be requested to make an annual return to the Secretary, to be handed in by him at the first meeting of the General Committee, as follows, viz.:

The number of Churches under his charge.

The number of weekly or other stated services held in such Churches or stations.

The number of Communicants.

The average number of attendants.

The amount contributed in each Parish towards the support of such Missionary. (19th Report, page 24.)

Whereas the attention of the General Committee has been called to the necessity of legal proceedings being taken against those parties from whom interest on Loans is due. *Resolved*, That the Chairman of the Loan Committee be called upon to take the necessary proceedings in all such cases, and that the securities belonging to the Society, be placed in the custody of the said Chairman. (22nd Report, page 34.)

That the Treasurer be requested to close his yearly accounts on the first day of May, in each year.

That he be requested to transmit his accounts, when made up, to the Auditors, for their audit, and to do so with all practicable dispatch.

That the Auditors be requested, as soon as they have completed their audit, to have their report printed, together with all the accounts in detail, under their respective headings of A, B, C, &c.; and

That they be requested to lay before the General Committee, at their first meeting, a sufficient number of copies of their report and accounts printed, as may be required.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized, in his discretion, to pay to him the whole, or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (23rd Report, page 33.)

That if any alterations shall be found necessary in the Schedule of Missionary salaries, granted by this Committee, by reason of the death, absence, or removal of any Missionary named therein, the same shall be made by the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it. (23rd Report, page 30.)

That all vouchers for the payment of any sums of money whatever, must bear upon the face of them, the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed

REPORT.

The blessing of Almighty God, which has been continued to this Society during the year that has passed, calls, first of all, for devout thankfulness. Turning to the accounts of the Treasurer, closed on the 1st of May, it will be seen that the payment of the contributions reported at the last meeting, exceeded by a large amount, any heretofore made. It will also be observed, that after a somewhat larger expenditure than usual for the various objects of the Society, the Loan Committee has been enabled to add the sum of £500 to the vested funds, including however, the sum of £120 paid in on one of the securities.

The Treasurer's accounts have been arranged in the clearest and most satisfactory manner that could be devised. Any one now, at all interested in the welfare of the Society, can readily investigate its receipts and expenditure. This investigation, both with regard to its finances, and also all its objects and operations, is especially invited. By this means, the Society must, ere long, secure the cordial and the constant support of every thoughtful member of the Church. It cannot be disputed but that the objects of the Society are such as every Churchman should endeavour to carry out, while by its liberal constitution any one of the members of the Society has the yearly opportunity of expressing his opinions, acting upon his own judgment, and of suggesting any improvements or changes that may be thought desirable.

It will be seen by the Report from one of the Local Committees, that the Society has received two legacies during the past year. The amount indeed is small, but the fact is of great interest and importance. It shows that the Society is gradually gaining its true position. That its holy purposes are beginning to be solemnly considered, at the time when the account of his stewardship, which each must give, is about to be called for. This is a matter which should weigh deeply on the mind of every Churchman when about to make a last disposition of that substance with which he has for a while been entrusted.

The Society will be rejoiced to learn that the Lord Bishop has, during the past year, been enabled to supply the Missions noticed as vacant in the last Report. The services of

no less than four additional Missionaries have been secured by his Lordship since the last Meeting of the Society.

The following Abstracts from the Missionaries, Reports and the Returns of the Local Committees contain matter of more than usual interest :—

ANDOVER, GRAND FALLS, &c—Rev. W. H. Street writes that the general depression in the business of this County has slightly effected the contributions, which are £20 15s. He is yet happy to report a growing interest in the welfare of the Society among his people.

With reference to the Church at the Grand Falls, Mr. Street writes as follows :—

"I wish much to call the attention of the Society to the Church at the Grand Falls, which stills remains in an unfinished state. This Church has been removed, at a considerable expense, to a more convenient situation. It has also been well floored and counter-plastered, so that we can use it during the summer. But unless there is something further done, we shall be compelled to leave it during the winter, which I trust may not be the case, as the holding of divine service in different places, is not only an inconvenience, but a serious drawback to the Church. The members of the Church at the Falls are few and unable to do a great deal. I earnestly hope therefore the Society will consider the necessity of the case, and make a grant to assist us in the work."

BATHURST, &c.—Rev. C. F. Street writes as follows : "The annual statistical return and report of Missionary operations concerning the Bathurst Mission, which I now send, I trust will show to the Society that the Church in which it is so deeply interested, is progressing here as it is elsewhere.

"Both the Restigouche and Gloucester Missions have received my ministrations during the year. I have visited them both so often as my various stations and numerous calls would permit. The Restigouche Mission has been visited five times during the year, and these visits required me to travel eighty miles above Bathurst, and preach in seven different stations.

"The whole of the Gloucester Mission has been visited four times, and these visits obliged me to travel eighty or ninety miles below Bathurst, and officiate in six stations.

"All those to whom my services were acceptable, are so separated, the one from the other, or are so divided into little settlements, that the visiting them occupies much time and labour. There are two or three families in one place, and three or four in another part, and these few families gathered together sometimes constitute my congregation in remote places.

"The Islands of Miscoo and Shippegan deeply interest me, not on account of the number residing there, but on account of their exclusion from the religious advantages and privileges which many have on the mainland. I only find eight families who are Protestants on these Islands, and they most gladly receive my ministrations, especially as no other ministrations are afforded to them, and great exertions are required in order to visit them.

"I find great advantage in understanding the French language, being able to read it correctly and gradually acquiring fluency in speaking it, as two or three French families, although Roman Catholics, requested me the other day to hold divine service for them. Although this was but a small beginning, and apparently an unimportant circumstance, yet we know not but by the blessing of God, and by perseverance on the part of the Missionary, this might finally lead us to great things, so far as the French are concerned in this County.

"The amount of the contributions to be sent from this Mission, I cannot yet inform you, as my numerous ministerial duties have delayed me in the collecting for the Diocesan Church Society. I will forward you soon, a list of subscribers, and will send the money to the Treasurer. The Mission, although very extensive, is yet very poor. I wish much the Society would afford a separate grant for books for Shippegan, on mainland, and Shippegan and Miscoo Islands."

BLACKVILLE AND NELSON.—Rev. W. Cruden has not yet completed the Collections. He thinks he will be able to forward £10.

BUCAROUCHÉ.—Rev. A. H. Weeks has forwarded a return which will be found in the tabular statement. He writes as follows: "The extreme boisterousness of the weather, during a great part of the past winter, interfered with my duty; from the drifts and storms, I frequently found it impossible to reach the place of service until a long time after the appointed time was passed, travelling mostly on foot. The number of services is therefore not so large as it would otherwise have been."

CAMPOBELLO.—Rev. J. S. Williams reports that at the annual meeting of the Local Committee the following resolutions were unanimously agreed to.

1. The Committee desires to record, with expressions of regret and sympathy for his bereaved family, the death of an old and constant supporter of the Society, whose name will be found on this year's subscription list, Capt. Thomas Moses, late of Her Majesty's 7th Regiment of Fusiliers.

2. The Committee desires to renew its grateful acknowledgments of the continued support accorded to this Mission by the Society; and its assurances of unabated interest in the great work which the Society is engaged in carrying on throughout the Diocese.

3. The Committee desires further to renew the application made unsuccessfully last year for an increase in the amount granted to this Mission for Books.

4. The Committee bearing in mind that one of the objects avowed and embraced by the Society is "Aid to Schools in which Church principles are taught, and encouraging of Schoolmasters;" and moreover that the Society has declared it "competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the Funds of the Society," would beg respectfully to call the attention of the General Committee to the following facts, viz: (1). A Day School has been established on the Island of Campobello in which Church principles are taught, and which is now attended by forty-seven scholars.

(2). In the contributions forwarded to the Society from this Mission last year, the sum of £10 was appropriated by the Local Committee to Object 3; and that a like sum is this year limited to the same object, so far as it is in the power of the Local Committee to do so.

The Committee considers that these facts constitute a claim on the Society for some assistance to the above mentioned School; and earnestly requests the attentive consideration of the General Committee to a matter of such grave importance, not only to this particular Mission, but to the Church and Province generally.

The contributions amount to £18 15s. 10jd.

CAMBRIDGE.—Rev. A. Wood reports £3 7s. 0d. as the contributions from this Parish, and requests a grant to aid in building a new Church.

CANTERNURY.—Rev. T. Hartin has inclosed a list of subscribers amounting to £7 12s. 4jd.

CARLETON.—Rev. F. Coster writes as follows: "For the last four months I have been so painfully lame that it has not been in my power to give that personal attention to the collection for the Diocesan Church Society which I have always been accustomed to give: it is therefore as yet not completed, as soon as I can I shall resume the work, and immediately remit what I succeed in collecting.

"I have to solicit a small grant, say \$30, in aid of the Sunday School belonging to St. George's Church, Carleton."

CHATHAM.—At the Annual Meeting of this Local Committee, held the 10th May, 1861,

The following resolutions were passed:—

1. That this Committee desire to express their deep sense of gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, for the increased and increasing prosperity

of the Diocesan Church Society (which can alone be ascribed to the Divine blessing,) and their firm and unaltered conviction, that by augmenting their contributions and annual subscriptions, the Diocesan Church Society promises greater facilities for the establishment of an Endowment Fund than any other which could be devised.

2.—That this Committee return their best thanks for grants of books annually made to the Chatham Parochial and Sunday-School Lending Library, and hope that they will not overlook them this year, when making their respective appropriations.

The contributions amount to £28 9s. 3d.

Douglas.—Rev. C. S. Medley has forwarded the following report from his Mission:—

“Having had the charge of this Mission for eight months only, it is difficult to say much with regard to the progress of our Church in it. At Ten Creek, however, where a neat little Church was consecrated, in August 1860, I observe a rapidly increasing interest in the services of the Church. I regret that owing to the great depth of snow during the last winter, I was prevented from visiting this part of the Mission for two months. A Sunday-School has been established there, and many of the parents as well as their children have shown much interest in the good work. The books of the Society are fully appreciated by the settlers.

“An increasing congregation is regular in attendance at Divine Services which I have held at a small School-House at the Cross Roads, near the Maetwaquack Stream, once a month. The people are very anxious to build a Church, and to have Sunday Services; and though few in number, they have contributed liberally towards the building, the foundation of which has just been begun. It is respectfully hoped that some support will be granted from the Diocesan Church Society for this object. The number of communicants appears to have decreased since the last Report of the late Missionary. This, I think, is chiefly caused by the death of some older members of the Church, and the removal of others from this Parish. It is no small satisfaction to know that out of sixty-six, there are only ten who are not regular in presenting themselves at the Lord's Table once in each month. I trust that shortly, with God's blessing, this little band will be increased by some of those who were confirmed by the Bishop in August last.

“My adult baptisms have only numbered two, although I fear there are too many who have neglected the commandment of Christ. These were both young persons, who were in the last stage of consumption, before I heard of their sickness. The earnestness of one, a young woman, I was particularly impressed with. Although she lived quite in the back-woods at the extremity of all settlements, and therefore, I should presume, had little opportunity of gaining much religious knowledge or instruction: yet on my first visit to her she firmly confessed (as far as her weakness of body would permit) her belief in Christ crucified, risen and ascended; and though desirous of being baptized, wished the time to be postponed, until I had spoken to her about baptism, and instructed her in the important duties attending it. I am thankful to say I was enabled to administer the holy Sacrament to her a few days before her death, in which she rejoiced with heartfelt joy. This I mention only as an instance of that encouragement which the Missionary receives in the most arduous part of his labors, and as a proof of the blessing which God mercifully grants to him as the servant of Jesus Christ.”

The contributions amount to £24 6s. 5d.

FREDERICTON.—Rev. Charles Lee reports that the amount of contributions from the Parish of Fredericton will be about £160. He regrets the several causes, among which he may mention his late illness, have prevented the completion of the subscription list before this Anniversary Meeting.

GAGETOWN.--Rev. J. Neales has inclosed a subscription list which, together with the collections in Church, amounts to £23 4s. 9d.

GLENELG, NEWCASTLE, &c.--Rev. J. Hudson reports that the Annual Meeting of this Committee was held on the 27th May, when a resolution was passed expressive of the Committee's good will towards the great object of the Diocesan Church Society.

Mr. Hudson adds, that he has not been able to complete the collections in his Mission, chiefly owing to ill health, and the destruction of two large Bridges, which occurred during the tremendous gale of the 6th of October last, which has rendered the flock of the field of Glenelg rather difficult of access. He now transmits £10, and hopes shortly to send nearly as much more, if the Church people in his district will be prevailed upon to do their duty.

GRAND MANAN.--Rev. G. T. Carcy has inclosed £5 as the contributions from this Parish.

HAMPTON.--Rev. W. Walker reports subscriptions and collections to the amount of £24 to the funds of the Society.

HARVEY, HOPEWELL, ALMA, &c.--Rev. H. B. Nichols reports the amount of contributions to be £9 11s. 0d. The people of Alma and New Ireland unable to give only a small sum for the support of their clergyman, are not called upon to contribute to the Diocesan Church Society.

"I have attended," Mr. Nichols writes, "regularly to my accustomed duties since my last report, with the exception of omitting the service in New Ireland, owing to the excessive snow storms in that quarter last winter. I have held service at Hopewell every Sunday but one during the winter months, when I omitted one Sunday, and held the service that day in a different place in the Parish of Alma, twenty or twenty-five miles distant. I have held service also at Alma once a month, New Ireland, distant ten miles, once a month, Harvey, distant seven miles, once a fortnight. I now hold services at Hillsboro' once a month, distant fifteen miles.

"I have enjoyed much satisfaction from having a Church at Hopewell. The congregations at Hillsboro', when we have service in the Temperance Hall, are quite large. I think there is good ground for encouragement with regard to this Mission, considering the small number in it who belong to our branch of the Church of Christ."

In a subsequent letter Mr. Nichols writes, that the Bishop had visited the Mission, and consecrated the Church at Hopewell. Five were confirmed at the same place, one at New Ireland, and seven at Salmon River, besides one sick person in Hopewell, and one in Harvey, who were both baptized and confirmed.

KINGSCLEAR.--Rev. J. Black reports contributions to the amount of £15 2s. 6d.

KINGSTON.--Rev. W. E. Scovil writes as follows:--"I regret that I do not feel well enough to take part in our Society's Meetings this week: the experience of the past winter warning me that a bad cough, such as I now have, may by a little neglect make a lengthened cessation from parochial duties unavoidable. The lay delegates, Justus S. Wetmore and Samuel Foster, Esquires, will, I believe, both be in attendance. The contributions to the general purposes of the Society which I have forwarded to the Treasurer from Kingston for the past year are \$121. I shall have shortly to draw the £5 granted for a Catechist at Long-Island, and if the state of the funds will admit, I hope the grant will be continued another year. The people of Wickham, where he is employed, have, as you are aware, no resident clergyman, and their Church is therefore seldom or never opened for divine service on the Lord's day. I have endeavoured for two or three years past to supply as well as may be the deficiency, by officiating there once a month on a week day; and the Rev. Mr. Neales has likewise given on several occasions the benefit of a Missionary visit, and by these gratuitous labours helped to keep alive some regard for the Church in that long

neglected parish. The Catechist has this last year assembled every Sunday at the Church a considerable number of children, and assisted by some of his neighbours, has taught the Catechism with other elementary religious exercises."

LANCASTER.—Rev. W. S. Covert reports that the contributions from this Parish are not large, but the local expenses this year are greater than usual. The Society may expect half as much more next year. The amount is £22 15s. 0d.

MONCTON.—Rev. W. N. Boyer reports £7 13s. 1½d. as the contributions from this Mission.

NEW MARYLAND.—Rev. John Bacon Medley writes as follows:—"On September 30th, 1860, the Bishop went out with the Rev. Charles Medley and myself to the Maryland Church, and confirmed twenty persons, but I am sorry to say not one of them has as yet communicated. This is to be accounted for, in some degree, by many of them being away during the lumbering season, and they have not returned home as yet. There were one hundred and three persons at the service on that day, in fact too many for the Church to hold, and the burial ground was also consecrated then."

"On four Sundays, in January and February, I was prevented by the very deep snow from reaching the Church, having on each occasion to turn back, and on three other Sundays was prevented by illness. On one of these Sundays, February 24th, the Rev. Mr. Rodgers, now Curate of Woodstock, undertook the duty for me, but was unable to reach the Church in time on account of the depth of snow."

"A Collection has been established at Maryland on every Sunday, and is devoted to Church purposes. This has not only paid for a new fence put round the Church yard last fall, but there is now a considerable balance on hand."

"I held a Missionary Lecture in the Church at Maryland after service one day in the week last fall, for the purpose of shewing the people the reason why the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in England is withdrawing grants to New Brunswick, and the need for every small Parish exerting itself, and also to give some account of the different Christian Missions throughout the world. Unhappily on account of other services going on at the time, the attendance was small, but I hope soon to hold another meeting of the same description, which promises to be much better attended."

Contributions amount to £7 11s. 8d.

PRINCE WILLIAM, DUMFRIES, &c.—Rev. Philip Wood Loosemore has inclosed returns showing the amount of contributions to be £25 3s. 3d. He also writes as follows:—

"We forward to the Society this year an amount equal to that for the past year. The only circumstance which varied the ordinary work for the Church in this Mission during the past twelve months, was the unusual quantity of snow, which increased the labour at least threefold."

"It may be recorded here, that by the use of snow shoes, only two services of the whole list were omitted, at which times it was impossible to reach the back settlements, notwithstanding every exertion by this mode of travelling. On Christmas day eighteen miles were travelled on snow shoes, eight more with horses, and three services held."

"In September the Bishop confirmed forty-seven candidates in the Mission. His Lordship was pleased to express gratification at the number confirmed, and the orderly behaviour of the candidates, remarking, in the course of a most acceptable and appropriate address, as a matter of importance and interest, that the majority of the candidates at Magundy consisted of young men, expressing also great satisfaction at the progress of the Church in that place."

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. H. W. Tippett writes as follows:—"I hand you annexed, a list of subscriptions and collections, and regret to say that it does not reach to the amount of the last year. The depressed state of the lumber market seems to be the cause; and indeed much of the amount subscribed from this cause, is as yet but a promise to pay, for the fulfilment of which to the Society, I am I know responsible. I have nothing of any special interest to report from this Mission. The past year has had its usual amount of light and shade, encouragement and the reverse.

"The great quantity of snow during the winter made travelling very tedious and laborious, and obliged me, with much regret, to suspend for a time the public services at one of my stations, but in other respects my ministerial duties were performed as usual. The Sunday School at Station 4, which was very promising last summer, was altogether broken up by the winter. I have however begun it again, though with diminished numbers. The Parsonage Sunday School was regularly held during that season, though lately suspended through the absence of my only assistant.

"I have baptized eight, married two, and buried four persons during the year; and amongst the last, I may add there was one person who through a long and painful affliction, bore such a remarkably beautiful testimony to the power of Christian faith, in imparting peace and resignation and patience to the soul, in a long hopeless illness, that I felt it to be a great privilege to minister to him on holy things.

"During the season of Lent, I held weekly services in a School House near the parsonage, but I cannot say that the attendance was very encouraging. I put it down however, in a great measure, to the miserable state of our roads during that period.

I am endeavouring conscientiously to discharge every duty of my responsible calling, but under a continual sense of personal insufficiency. May God in due time give the encouraging increase both spiritually and numerically."

Contributions amount to £11 6s. 9d.

RICHMOND.—Rev. N. A. Coster has enclosed the sum of £37 9s. as the contributions from this Parish, and writes as follows:—"It affords me pleasure to send a larger contribution than has ever gone from this Parish before. I have only lost one subscriber on the former list, but it is amply compensated by additional subscribers and increased amounts from a number of smaller contributions, which fairly indicates that the Society has gained favour with many of my flock. Comparing my list with those of other Parishes, I feel a little pride in the liberality of my people, and yet I shall be pleased if we are surpassed by many others this present year.

"I hope yet to receive a little for the Society at Welford, but it cannot be done in time for the meeting."

SACKVILLE AND DORCHESTER.—Rev. G. G. Roberts reports contributions greatly exceeding those formerly sent; they amount to £33 9s. 11d. Mr. Roberts has lately been appointed to this Parish, of which he writes as follows:—

"I am much pleased with my new parishioners, and since my arrival among them have had everything to encourage my labours. The number confirmed a month ago was quite large in proportion to the number of Church people in Sackville and Dorchester. Thirty-six came forward on that occasion to renew their baptismal vows, and receive the laying on of hands, several of whom have since become partakers of the Supper of the Lord. May that blessed Saviour of whom they therein spiritually and by faith partake, enable them to "fight the good fight of faith, and lay hold on eternal life, whereunto they are also called, and have professed a good profession before many witnesses." Five of those who were then confirmed had received adult baptism only a short time before. The Sunday

Schools at Dorehester and at Westcock, which have been long established, still continue to flourish under the care of their zealous and efficient teachers. We have lately started one also in the new Church at Sackville, which already contains between thirty and forty pupils, and which I trust will be a great blessing to the young people of that place. At second Westcock also arrangements have been made to begin a Sunday School next Sunday, and I sincerely trust that God's blessing may rest upon the undertaking. If we can succeed in training up the young and bringing them to Christ along the good old paths of our beloved Church, it will indeed be a blessed thing both for her and for them."

ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK.—George D. Street, Esq., Secretary of the Local Committee, reports contributions amounting to £41 4s. To this further sum will, it is hoped be added, before the Report is ready for the press. There is, it is deeply regretted, a diminution in the amount compared with that of last year. In the latter, however, there was a life member's subscription included, and at the present time there is very great difficulty in collecting money, arising from every thing but want of interest in the Society or a desire to promote its objects.

The Rector of the Parish begs to report that the Rev. Ranald E. Smith, to whom the Society last year granted a small stipend, has for some time past rendered great assistance in the duties of this extensive Parish; engaged a great portion of his time in another employment, he has not taken any distinct portion of the work, and is therefore unable to make any regular return.

It may be stated that there are two Services every Sunday at the Parish Church, and one at Chamcook, a distance of about five miles, with an average attendance at the latter place of between 50 and 60. There are also two Services during the week and one Lecture. The communicants in the Parish number over 170, and the Holy Communion is administered monthly at Saint Andrews, and one every quarter at Chamcook. There are large Sunday Schools at both places, and the children are catechised by the Clergyman frequently, and at stated periods. In these duties which one person could not perform, Mr. Smith renders the kindest and most valuable assistance, which is highly appreciated by the people among whom he ministers.

SAINT GEORGE, PENNFIELD, &c.—Rev. J. McGivern reports contributions as follows: Saint George, £18 1s.; the Rourke Settlement, £1 8s 9d.; Pennfield and Pope Logan, £7 1s. 6d.; total, £25 11s. 3d.; and that at the meeting of the Local Committee the following resolutions were adopted:—

"That at the close of another year we desire to renew our grateful thanksgiving to Almighty God for his continual blessings upon the labours of this Society, and that we consider it our duty as well as high privilege to cooperate to the utmost of our power in a cause which has for its *first object* the employment of a Christian Ministry to preach to the poor of our scattered settlements 'the glad tidings of the Kingdom of God.'

"That we tender the Society our best thanks for the last year's grants to the Church Libraries of the Mission, and that we desire to be remembered to the same amount, £5, in the appropriations for the present year."

SAINT JAMES—SAINT JOHN.—Hurd Peters, Esq., Secretary to the Local Committee, writes that the contributions of the Diocesan Church Society, will, it is hoped, not be less than \$100. Owing to some subscribers having removed from the parish, the amount will not equal that of last year; this with the collection in Church, \$32.25 makes in all £108 1s. 6d.

SAINT DAVID AND SAINT PATRICK.—Rev. J. S. Thomson, reports contributions to the amount of £12 10s., and writes as follows:—

"My people are not wealthy but they have a proper estimate of the value of the Society, and of their limited means cheerfully and freely give.

"The new Church at Saint Patrick has been completely finished, and is now regularly used for service on every alternate Sunday. It is a neat and commodious building having a good chancel with vestry and library on either side; there are sittings for nearly 200 persons, and is capable of containing a greater number; it is well attended with a numerous and attentive congregation.

"I must here bear testimony to the kindness and liberality of that noble branch of our beloved Church in the United States, and record my lasting gratitude to her clergy and laity, without whose aid I never could have accomplished this arduous, yet most necessary work.

"A debt yet remains for which I am responsible. This would all have been paid had I been able to collect all my subscriptions. I was not however so fortunate. I respectfully request the Committee to grant me the small sum of £10, to enable me to liquidate all claims. It is the first time I have ever asked for anything to pay off a debt after a Church was finished, and I trust my present request may meet with a favorable consideration.

"I may (if spared) be compelled to build another small Church at my station at Tower Hill, ten miles from this; the congregation has increased at this point to such a degree, that the school-house in which Divine service is held, is quite too small to contain the people, and application has already been made to me to move in the matter. Some considerable subscriptions to the object have also been guaranteed.

"The condition of my Mission appears to be flourishing. May God grant that this may continue to be the case not only here, but throughout the Diocese."

SAINT MARY'S, STANLEY, &c.—Rev. Wm. Jaffrey has much pleasure in reporting a larger number of baptisms than usual, and also an increase in the amount of subscriptions over that of former years. The amount is £18 15s. 9d.

SAINT PAUL'S—PORTLAND.—Rev. W. H. DeVeber, writes that at the annual meeting of the Local Committee the following resolution was passed:—

"That this Committee fully approves of the course pursued by our Delegates at the last meeting in requiring all vouchers to be rendered in strict conformity with the resolution passed at the General Committee as stated in the 24th Report, page 20."

Contributions amount to £82.

SHERIDAN.—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D D. reports contributions to the amount of £13 1s., which he states is the largest sum heretofore subscribed. In a subsequent letter, Dr. Jarvis writes, "I forwarded to the Treasurer last October the sum of £10, being a bequest of the late John Bell to general objects of the Diocesan Church Society. This day (May 22), I forward a similar sum of £10, a bequest of the late Sarah Bell, both of this Parish. I trust the example thus set may be followed in other country Parishes."

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield has inclosed £11, on account of the contributions from this Parish, and hopes soon to remit a further sum.

A further sum of £1 7s. 2d. has been forwarded, making the whole amount £12 7s. 2d., of which £5 is limited to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

SPRINGFIELD.—Rev. C. P. Bliss writes that, "At a meeting of our Local Committee, a resolution was passed thanking the Society for the liberal grants towards the Mission, and requesting a continuation of the same.

"My return shews a less amount of duty performed than last year. This is owing to sickness in my family and the violent and frequent storms of last winter, which made it utterly impossible to serve the out-stations with any degree of regularity. The contributions this year will, I hope, exceed those of last. I have been trying to organise a branch society in the neighboring parish of Johnston. My list will shew the result. The Bishop held Confirmation in this Parish July 18th, 1860, when 24 persons ratified the promises made for them at Baptism.

"I can with safety say that the Mission is in a prosperous state. The average attendance at the Services and the increased additions to the list of communicants shew that the people in a measure appreciate the blessings within their reach."

TRINITY.—St. JOHN.—Rev. I. W. D. Gray, D. D., writes as follows:—

"The subscriptions and collections for the Diocesan Church Society, which have been made in my Parish this year, will amount, I think, to about £105. This, as you will see, is about £12 less than those of the previous year. It would be wrong to infer from this fact that the interest in the cause of the Society is at all diminished. Circumstances which are purely incidental and temporary, would have led me to have anticipated a reduction of £30 instead of £12. My Sunday School scholars, I am happy to state, have more than doubled their previous subscriptions, and are likely, I think, to augment them still further, in years to come."

UPHAM.—Rev. S. Jones Hanford thanks the Society for the grant of Books made last year, and "I beg," he says, "most respectfully to say that similar appropriations in fullest measure will be always most gratefully welcomed. For while the shepherd cannot be constantly in all parts of his wide spread field, the written Word, and its varied expositions and applications may be of the greatest assistance in supplying in his absence the necessary spiritual and nourishing food to the hungering and thirsting of his flock." "I am not," Mr. Hanford continues, "in favor of pressing much upon the friends of the Society for means to rear the material fabric of our Churches, yet, as this is among the objects of the Society, and not a dead letter, I am induced to ask for a grant to aid in paying off a debt due on the Church building at Quaco.

"It is a cause for thankfulness to Him from whom cometh every good and perfect gift, that our contributions this year will, notwithstanding the severely depressed state of business, exceed those of the last year. They amount to \$141.62, about £37 0s. 10d., of which £2 is limited to the 2nd object of the Society."

VICTORIA.—St. JUDE'S.—Rev. J. Armstrong writes as follows:—

"The Church in the newly erected Parish of Victoria, St. John, has only been opened for Divine Service about three months; and, consequently, only a slender contribution can be expected from it this year: besides the people have had to raise such considerable sums for Church purposes at home, that I could do no more than urge them to give some small token of good will to a Society on which the Church in this Diocese so greatly depends, in the hope that we may do more another year.

"The present amount enclosed is Twenty-Eight Dollars."

WESTFIELD, GREENWICH AND PETERSVILLE.—Rev. E. S. Woodman writes, "I have pleasure in stating that the subscriptions from the Parishes under my charge exhibit a slight increase in the amount over last year, which is encouraging considering the present depression in the timber trade, which materially affects my parishioners resident on the River. The sums for the general purposes of the Society are as follows:—Westfield, £15 17s. 7½d.; Petersville, £11 11s. 10½d.; Greenwich, £10 2s. 6d.; total, £37 12s.

Greenwich, in July of last year, 19 were confirmed, several of whom have since become attendants at the Lord's table.

"The Petersville people are making strenuous efforts for securing the services of a Clergyman independently of Greenwich. The extent of the parish of Petersville with its two Churches render it highly necessary there should be a resident minister for the good of both Church and people, and I trust their laudable efforts will meet with success.

"In the event of the severance of Petersville and Greenwich, the parishioners of the latter Parish contemplate being united with Wickham. This arrangement I should be rejoiced to see carried out, and the energy and zeal of the Wickham people rewarded by their having their Church opened for Divine Service on Sundays."

WESTMORLAND.—Rev. D. M. Bliss reports that the contributions when completed will, he thinks, equal if not exceed those of the past year.

WOODSTOCK.—Rev. S. D. Lee Street has inclosed the following resolutions passed at a late meeting of this Local Committee.

"1. That this Committee return sincere thanks for the books appropriated to the Mission at the last Anniversary Meeting of the Society, and trust that the wants of this extensive Mission may again be remembered in a similar manner.

"2. That this Committee would desire again to express their humble and heartfelt thankfulness to the Almighty Father of the Universe in that He hath been pleased to bless and prosper the operations of the Church Society, and this Committee would earnestly pray that He may continue His blessing, and open the hearts of its members to the necessity of adding to its means of usefulness.

"3. That the Committee being aware of the contemplated withdrawal of the Parent Society's aid from the Churches in this Diocese, and regarding the Church Society as the only legitimate means by which, with the blessing of God, the Church can for the future be maintained and extended among us, consider it the paramount duty as well as the privilege of all Churchmen, by their united efforts, to sustain and promote to the utmost of their ability the good and holy work in which the Society is now engaged."

"That this Committee would again call the attention of the Society to the spiritual destitution prevailing in many of the extensive and populous settlements throughout the county of Carleton as well as other portions of this Diocese, and would urge upon the Society the importance of providing for the services of travelling missionaries, whose occasional pastoral visits would in some degree, supply the existing need, and prepare the way for resident Clergymen."

Mr. Street also writes as follows:—

"The work of this extensive Mission is progressing, and I hope, with the blessing of God, to the eternal welfare of those committed to my pastoral care. And though the progress is slow, and but little fruit apparent, yet I fondly trust that the good seed has not been sown in vain, but that it may, in God's own time, take deeper root and yield an abundant harvest.

"But while two Missionaries are left to perform the work in this extensive portion of the Lord's vineyard which would give full employment to three; it cannot but be, that some portions are neglected, and others but partially attended to. Indeed, with all the labour that can be bestowed, it is grievous to behold how much is still left undone. In the Parish of Richmond alone, there is enough, and more than enough, to engage the whole attention of one Missionary; and the members of the Church there are naturally anxious that Richmond should be made a separate Mission, and they would, I believe, contribute largely towards the attainment of this object. But this, however desirable, cannot be effected until another clergyman can be provided to aid in the work of the other parts of the Mission, which is now attended to by the Curate. The present Curate, Mr. Rogers, who supplied the place of Rev. W. S. Covert, some few months

since, has entered upon his work with spirit and energy, and bids fair to be a useful and efficient laborer in the Lord's vineyard. Our Sunday work continues the same as heretofore, five full services, with the same distances to travel. In addition to this, I have commenced a Wednesday evening service at the Union Hall, near the Court House, which has given much satisfaction; the congregation during the winter averaged from seventy to eighty, but at this season it is not so large. I have also prayers at Saint Luke's Church on every Friday evening. The Curate's time is also fully engaged during the week. He has seven monthly stations which he regularly attends: these with the other calls upon him, fully occupy his time.

"I regret that the contributions to the Society from this Mission, will not equal those of last year, but this arises from no failure of interest in the welfare of the Society, but chiefly from the fact, that many whose names were on the last year's list, are scattered in remote districts, and during the winter the inclemency of the weather made it almost impossible to obtain their contributions in produce, and since then there has not been time to do so."

Contributions amount to £61 8s. 9d.

It appears then that the amount reported for the various objects of the Society is as follows:—Divinity Scholarship, £2; Schools, £10; Widows' and Orphans' Fund, £5; General Purposes, £1248 17s. 1d.; Total, £1355 17s. 1d.; to which contribution, it is hoped, will be added from returns not yet received,* so as to make up the amount to £1,500.

This we must sadly admit is a falling off compared with last year. It could however, hardly have been anticipated that the amount would have reached the usual sum unless by more than usual exertion. Many causes, it is well known, have combined to make this season one of unprecedented difficulty in raising money. It ought nevertheless to be deeply impressed upon the mind of every member of the Society that the engagements it has already undertaken in the Missions on its list, require a considerable annual outlay. From the very small stipends which are thus provided it would be, beyond measure, wrong to make the least reduction. Other objects too, only of secondary importance, ought not to be abandoned. Every subscriber therefore should continue (if possible) his yearly contribution. In few cases would this require more than a little self-denial.

But can any thoughtful Churchman remain satisfied with our present position; either to go back or stand still, or to make progress so very slowly? The position of the Church in this Province calls for the attention and zealous exertion of all her members. The question of any thing like a permanent and settled provision for the maintenance of the Clergy as the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel

Meanwhile too, year by year, there are other Missions opening up, and extensive Parishes the wants of which no one Clergyman can attend to. Surely then the work we have undertaken is not completed, it may be said to only have just begun. This great work affords no room for strife and contention, least of all, for party feeling. To allay such evils is one of its blessed effects. It calls for generous, self-denying hearts, for earnest, steadfast faith in Him who so loves every soul for whom he suffered death; it calls for united action, brotherly love and zeal and industry, and prayer, and it looks for no reward till He Himself, the "Great Shepherd shall appear."

Several Parishes have paid in more than the amounts reported, among which are Blackville, Douglas, Kingston, St. Paul's, (Portland,) St. George, St. James, (in the City of St. John,) St. Stephens, Simonds, Upham and Woodstock.

The last Audit shewed the sum of £15 to be due the Parish of Moncton, for half a year's salary to Mr. Boyer, but withdrawn by him in consequence of his absence from the Province since November, 1859. This sum has been paid under Voucher 18, to Rev. Mr. Nicholls, £10, and Voucher 31, to Rev. Mr. Jarvis, £5, and is set down in the present year's account against the above named sum of £15, due the Parish of Moncton. The Auditors cannot find any authority for the payment of these amounts out of the Grant to the Parish of Moncton, although such authority may have been granted and not entered in the Report, or the amount may be charged against the sum at the disposal of the Lord Bishop.

The Auditors recommend that such of the above sums as have lapsed through inadvertence or neglect of the grantee, be re-granted, and that all beneficiaries of the Society be requested to draw the stipends promptly at the time limited by the Society, in order to avoid confusion in the Accounts.

Voucher No. 44 for a Quarter's Salary of the Missionary at Buctouche is not in order, not having been drawn in accordance with the form required by resolution on page 28 of 25th Report.

Many of the Vouchers for Missionaries Salaries are not indorsed or receipted by the party in whose favour they are drawn, thus leaving them incomplete as Vouchers. It is recommended that the receipt of the party receiving the amount of any draft, or a proper endorsement, be taken on every Voucher that may be paid by the Treasurer.

The Vouchers for the payment of Grants to Church and Parsonage house at Hopewell and Harvey, and Church at St. Patrick's, do not contain Certificates of the conditions of the Grants having been complied with, such certificates, however, may have been lodged in the hands of the Secretary or Treasurer.

The Auditors have found the Accounts, made up as per printed form, and the Vouchers accompanying the same, correct and satisfactory, with the foregoing exceptions. They exhibit the affairs of the Society in a healthy and prosperous condition.

The Auditors have only to add that they recommend the Accounts of the Society for the future to be kept in decimal currency.

Supplementary Report of the Auditors upon the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society, for the year ending May 1st, 1861.

The apparent discrepancies between the amounts reported in the 25th Report of the Society, as subscriptions and collections for the year 1860, and the amounts credited by the Treasurer in the present account, have been accounted for as follows:—

Fredericton.—The Collections in the Cathedral and Christ's Church, which form part of the amount reported in 25th Report, were paid to the Treasurer and credited in his account for the year 1860, leaving a balance of about \$9, which has been paid and will appear on next year's account.

Saint John, Trinity Parish.—In this Parish the sum of £15 18s. 1d., being one of the half-yearly Collections, was paid to the Treasurer and credited in his account for 1860. The remainder of the deficiency reported has been paid in, with the exception of a small amount, which is promised.

Norton, Margerville and Burton, New Maryland, Queensbury, St. George.—In these Parishes part of the deficiency reported in the first audit also arose from a portion of the Collections of 1860 having been paid and credited in the Treasurer's account for that year.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY FOR THE PAST YEAR.

The Minutes of the Meeting held at Saint John on the 6th of July last, will be found in the 25th Report, (p. 35).

The next Meeting of the Committee was held at Fredericton on the 3rd of October, when the Secretary reported that the Committee appointed to assist him in publishing the Report had accepted the lowest tender, that of Barnes & Co., at £7 5s. per sheet, and that the work would be completed in a short time.

It was resolved that the Committee be authorized to draw on the Treasurer for the amount of the Account of Barnes & Co. when the Report is finished, and that the said Account be laid before the Executive Committee at its next Meeting.

The Lord Bishop reported that he proposed to place the Rev. C. S. Medley as Missionary at Douglas, in the room of Mr. Roberts, who was removed to Sackville, and the Rev. J. B. Medley, at New Maryland, in the room of the Rev. C. S. Medley, the amount of salary in both these Missions to remain as before, in which proposition the Committee did concur.

It was resolved that the grant of £10 towards the Tay Creek Church should be paid, satisfactory certificates having been laid before the Committee.

The Committee met at St. John on the 2d January, 1861. The Account of Barnes & Co., for printing the Report, amounting to £45 6s. 3d., was laid before the Meeting; Also a statement of the Treasurer's Account up to 31st December, ult., which was received and ordered to be filed.

The following resolution was passed: That the Chairman of the Loan Committee be requested to take prompt measures to collect the interest due on the Securities of the Society.

A letter was read from Rev. S. Bacon on the subject of a grant made in 1859 in aid of building a Church at Dalhousie. It was resolved that, there being no certificates referring to a compliance with the conditions on which the grant was made, the Committee cannot authorize the Treasurer to pay it.

An Account of the Secretary for postages, incidental and travelling expenses from 6th July to this date, amounting to £4 15s. 7d., was read, and ordered to be paid.

Rev. F. Coster, from the Committee appointed at the July Meeting of the Executive Committee, to prepare Rules of Order for Meetings of the General Committee of the Society, presented a Report, which, on motion, was received and ordered to be entered upon the Minutes, and it was resolved that the Rules of Order prepared by the Committee be recommended to the General Committee for their adoption.

1. When the Bishop, or other person presiding, has taken the Chair, no member shall continue standing.
2. When any member is about to speak, he shall rise and address the Chair.
3. No motion or amendment of a motion shall be considered as before the Committee, unless it be reduced to writing and seconded.
4. No Member shall speak more than once on the same question unless he ask and receive permission from the Chair.
5. When a question is under consideration no other motion shall be received, unless to adjourn, to lay it on the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to amend it, or to divide it: and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order here named.
6. Motions to adjourn, or to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.
7. No member shall speak unless it be to some motion.
8. When a motion has been read it shall not be withdrawn unless with the consent of the Chair.
9. Any member may require, at any period of the debate, that the motion under discussion may be read.
10. A member called to order while speaking shall sit down, unless permitted by the Chair to explain.
11. All questions of order shall be decided by the Chair; but if the decisions of the Chair should be disputed, they shall be decided by the Committee without debate.
12. All amendments to a motion shall be considered in the reverse order in which they are moved.
13. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be considered: but no after amendment to such amendment shall be in order.
14. All amendments to any question or amendment shall be decided before the original question or motion is proposed for decision.
15. While the question is being put from the Chair, the members shall continue in their seats and be silent.
16. In voting those who vote in the affirmative shall rise first, and then those who vote in the negative.
17. A question once determined shall not be discussed again without the permission of the Chair, unless after a motion for reconsideration of the subject shall have been proposed, seconded and carried by a majority of the Committee.
18. No protest or dissent shall be entered on the minutes of the proceedings, but any member may require the number of affirmative and negative votes to be recorded; and any two members may require the names to be taken down.

TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

The Loan Committee beg leave to report that during the past year they have invested the sum of five hundred pounds in a mortgage on very valuable freehold property, situate in Prince William Street, and extending through to Water Street, in the City of Saint John, belonging to Robert Douglas, Esquire, and now in the occupation of William L. Avery, taking the bond of Mr. Douglas as collateral security. The bond and mortgage bear date 1st September, 1860, and one half-year's interest fell due on the 1st March last.

By reference to the Treasurer's account it will be seen that the interest on outstanding loans has been paid with general punctuality, and that none of the debtors are more than six months in arrears for interest on their loans, except the estate of the late J. F. W. Winslow, and William M'Kean, who each owe one year's interest, (£6.) E. W. Miller, who since last year has paid £26, but still owes £17 14s. for interest, and William Lawrence & Sons, and William Plant, who each owe £15 16s. for arrears of interest. To all these parties letters have been written by the Chairman of this Committee, demanding payment, and in the case of Lawrence and Plant, threatening prosecution before the end of the ensuing Trinity term, if the demand be not complied with.

Your Committee respectfully submit that distinct resolutions should be passed authorizing your Committee to institute legal proceedings accordingly.

APPENDIX.

THE Secretary of the Society begs to say that he was unable to procure a full and correct report of the Speeches delivered at the last Anniversary Meeting. They are therefore omitted in this place. The Honourable Mr. Justice Parker has kindly complied with the general wish expressed at the Meeting with regard to his address on the subject of the Endowment Fund. "I have" the learned Judge remarks, "done as well as I could from memory. If I have not observed exactly the same order, or have occasionally enlarged a little, I trust I shall be excused, if no material deviation from the sentiments then expressed is apparent."

MY LORD BISHOP, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN—The attention of the meeting has already been drawn by your Lordship in your opening address, by the Secretary in his Report, and by my Reverend friend, Dr. Gray, in his speech to the subject, on which, without any formal resolution, I have been requested to make a few remarks, namely, the formation of an Endowment Fund, to aid in support of the clergy in this Diocese—a subject most important and interesting to all who desire to maintain and extend the public worship of God, according to the rites of the Church of England, of which we all profess to be members. The unanimous resolution passed by the General Committee, composed of the clergy and lay delegates of the several Parishes, to which Committee a large portion of the business of the Society, and the distribution of its funds, is entrusted, has been read by the Secretary, and will give you some idea of what has already been done, and to what, in humble reliance on the Divine blessing, our efforts are as soon as possible to be directed: as a more particular detail may be useful, you will, I trust, pardon me for occupying the meeting for some time longer in giving it to you.

At the last anniversary meeting of the Society, your lordship brought distinctly under our notice that the time had now arrived for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel—not at once to stop its grants on which we so much depended—but to commence the gradual reduction of its annual allowance on such a scale as, by all reasonable calculations, would fulfil to the letter the pledges given to the present missionaries, while it would enable us to come up, without any sudden embarrassment, or any very extraordinary self-sacrificing efforts, to the discharge of our duties as Churchmen.

Nearly eighty years have now passed since, mainly by the assistance of that venerable Society, the foundation of the Church was laid in this Province, as it has been done in the older Colonies. On the severance of those Colonies from the mother country, a large portion of the loyal inhabitants, who adhered to their old allegiance, and removed in 1783 to this new wilderness, were members of the Church of England; and our first Clergy became missionaries of the Society P. G. F. here, as they had already been in New York, New Jersey and New England. For the extension of missions from time to time, as well as the maintenance of those first formed, our principal reliance has been on that Society, and its annual grants to this Diocese, even at this day, amount to about four thousand

pounds. But the weight of our obligation to this Society, and to the mother country in general, cannot be properly felt without considering a few circumstances of its past history, to which I shall now advert.

For a considerable period (whether from its commencement or not, I am unable to say, but I believe not,) the Society was assisted by an annual Parliamentary grant. Its ordinary funds were derived from contributions, not so much of the wealthy and the great, as by annual subscriptions of men of moderate means, a large portion by clergymen in England of small incomes, and others not better able than many of ourselves. Let any one who doubts this examine the list of subscribers annexed to the Reports of the Society. The grants by Parliament were not made out of the surplus revenue of England, but during the period when, year after year, it was necessary to resort to large loans, and money was obtained only on most disadvantageous terms. True it was, that while to many of our clergy the Society granted two hundred pounds sterling, per annum, the course of exchange reduced the sum actually obtained, at one time, to about the same amount in currency; while each £100 of the Parliamentary grant added to the national debt of Great Britain over £120 or £130 sterling, and that debt remains a burthen on the mother country to this day. At that very period, no part of the public revenue in England was applied to roads or popular education, while a large portion of our Provincial revenue was yearly appropriated to such improvements. This state of things could not always continue; and it should excite no surprise or complaint that, when at the termination of the wars in Europe, it became necessary to equalize the expenditure with the revenue, and even reduce a little the enormous burthen of the national debt, the Parliamentary aid to the Society should have been withdrawn; but it is a cause for surprise as well as deep gratitude, that the Society should have made so small a diminution in the missionary grants to these Colonies, and should have continued them so long on the present scale, considering the various calls on its bounty from the settlement of new Colonies, and those arising out of the peculiar circumstances of the East and West Indies.

Your lordship has stated the proposal now made by the Society—to commence the withdrawal of its annual grant, amounting to about £4000, by the small instalment of £100 per annum—so as, in fact, to give us forty years more before the whole shall cease; and upon our engaging to assume existing liabilities, to pay to us, in a yearly block sum, the amount of the year's contribution, for us to make use of. Now I really think if we ourselves had been allowed to dictate the terms, we could not in conscience have asked for a more convenient, a more generous arrangement; and though the pledge required of us might be fulfilled in its letter by discharging the Society's obligation to existing missionaries and their widows, the true spirit of it would induce us to resolve that no mission in the Province, which has hitherto received aid from the Society, should be left without support.

As population increases, we may well expect that the clergy will derive a larger portion of their income from parochial sources than they now do; but it must proceed from voluntary, not compulsory contribution; and in order to draw out this, the establishment of a permanent fund, from the income of which such grants may be made, as the circumstances of each mission may require, and which shall be contingent on the Parish doing its part, at least so far as can be effected with due regard to the position of the clergyman, becomes so desirable. We should not conceal from ourselves that the burthen to be assumed is a growing one—hardly to be felt for the first year or two, and easy to be borne for five or even ten years; but after that, in order to keep up even what the S. P. G. is now doing, the yearly demand will be considerable. This makes it so important to provide in time against the consequences which may follow in many of the rural Parishes, if left to their unaided resources. If we have the means in our power to provide against this, we ought to supply them. With all we can expect to do by means of an Endowment Fund, enough will remain to be done by the parishioners in the several parishes, to call forth the energies.

Let me now state as briefly as I can what steps have been taken in furtherance of the object. Upon the resolution, passed unanimously by the General Committee last year at Saint John, that a Committee should be appointed to consider the subject of an Endowment Fund for the clergy, to confer with the Lord Bishop, and to report at a special meeting of the Diocesan Church Society to be called for that purpose--it being then supposed that the Committee would be able to report before the present annual meeting--a large number of gentlemen were named in the Committee, eleven clergymen and twenty laymen residing in different parts of the Province (nine to be a quorum), not in the expectation, I imagine, that all could be got together at once, but that many might attend, and that others could advise or be consulted as occasion required. On the day following the anniversary meeting, the Committee assembled and fifteen members attended, with the Bishop. I was not myself present, but was nominated Chairman, with the Hon. J. W. Weldon as Vice-Chairman.

The next meeting was on July 7th, at which it was unanimously resolved that the amount of the Endowment Fund should be TWENTY THOUSAND POUNDS currency, and that, in the opinion of the Committee, a vigorous effort should be made to raise the Fund for the maintenance of the clergy in this Diocese, in order to meet the gradual withdrawal of the allowances of the Society P. G. F.

A sub-Committee was appointed to consider and report on the two questions: 1. What organization shall be set on foot to raise the Fund? 2. When raised, where shall it be placed, and who shall be trustees? No formal Report was made by this Sub Committee, but at the next meeting of the Endowment Committee, after some discussion, it was determined that the monies collected for the Endowment Fund shall be held in trust by the Diocesan Church Society, in accordance with a prospectus to be prepared and reported to the Society; and a sub-committee was appointed to prepare such scheme, to be submitted at the next meeting of the Committee. Several meetings of the sub-committee were held, and the matter fully discussed. The result was a cordial agreement on all points but one, and a unanimous Report was signed, to which was appended a recommendation of the majority, the substance of which was that the law of Nova Scotia, giving the presentation to Rectories to the several Parishes, should be introduced here, in order to secure a general and liberal contribution to the Endowment Fund.

The report of the sub-Committee, together with the recommendation of the majority, was laid before the Endowment Committee, at a meeting held on the 28th of January, at which your lordship was also present, when it was resolved that the Report, with the recommendation, should be received;--a motion having been first made, and negatived by a large majority, that the question should be taken on the Report without the recommendation. It was then resolved that the Committee would meet again on the last Tuesday in May; and in the mean time the Report and recommendation were printed, and Copies sent to each member of the Committee, in order to afford an opportunity for considering the whole and objecting to any part before the matter came before the Society. At the day appointed for the meeting, however, there were only seven members attended, not constituting a quorum, and nothing further was done; so it became my duty, I conceived, as Chairman, of the Committee, to submit the Report with the recommendation annexed, and the resolution of the 28th January thereupon, to the General Committee; and in so doing, I stated particularly what had been done by the Endowment Committee, what the respective laws of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had been and were at the present time, and the reason for seeking to withdraw the patronage from the Governor and giving it to the Parishes. I may here observe, that this was not a change which I was so very desirous of making as many others were, being under the impression that there was little risk of any appointment being made against the general wishes of the parishioners; but I felt quite satisfied that without some better security than our present laws afforded on this point, a great obstacle would be encountered

at the very outset of our applying for contributions, which might be removed by our adopting the Nova Scotia enactment; I could suggest no better or simpler mode of proceeding, and we have no reason to suppose that any objection will be made here on the ground of an interference with the Royal instructions, which was not made in Nova Scotia where the law is in full force.

Could we be sure that our Governors would always be members of the Church of England, disposed to take the same interest in the welfare of the Church as has been done by our present Governor, and several of his predecessors, a change in the laws might not be so earnestly sought for, but we have no assurance on that head; and as to the patronage, Her Majesty's Representative will not be likely to complain of the loss of it. He will feel the surrender of it rather a relief than a spoliation.

It should be fully understood that the proposed change in the presentation will in no manner interfere with the exercise of the functions and duties of the Bishop. The laity are, I believe, as anxious as the clergy to preserve these entire, and would in no manner desire to derogate from them.

An additional reason for adopting the Nova Scotia law is afforded by the success which has already attended the effort to raise a clergy endowment Fund in that Diocese. I understand that eighteen thousand pounds are already subscribed to the Fund, with a fair prospect of its reaching £20,000 at least.

What is there now for us to consider? Are not the members of the Church of England in this Province able, by a united and general effort, to raise the contemplated sum, and if they are, how shall we set about it? The members of other denominations have done probably fully as much, if not more, considering their means, and seem none the worse for it. We think the sum may be raised, and that a commencement should be made without delay in the cities of Fredericton and St. John, by select Committees of the Church Society, and carried through the Province by suitable agent or agents. We invite both donations and annual subscriptions such as the occasion requires, and such as the means of our people will admit.

To what I have already said as to the liberality of the mother country towards us, I might add that while other Colonies have had principally to provide among themselves for the endowment of the Bishopric—that is permanently settled in this Province, by far the largest part of our Episcopal Fund having been contributed in England. Now when we regard the progress made in this Province in its material prosperity, and compare its present state with that of fifty years ago, at which time our revenues were hardly the twentieth part of what it now is; when we had scarcely any roads or bridges, the postal communications few and far between, and very costly, no steamboat, no railroad, no gas, no electric telegraph, scarcely a piano or other musical instrument, where they are now so numerous as almost to deserve a column in the census; without a Church or clergyman in the whole North-eastern part of the Province, from the Nova Scotia to the Canada line.

Deeply impressed with the reflection that the future existence of the Church in many parts of the Province may depend much on the success of our present effort, I think this is not an ordinary call which may be met by a sum such as can be spared from the year's income, but is fairly entitled to a contribution from the capital of those who have inherited or accumulated property; while others not so favored may give of their incomes or devote a portion of their labor to so good a cause, and all may help. Many a poor sinner, left almost, if not entirely, without the benefit of religious ordinances, would, I believe, gladly give a few days' produce of his labour, yearly, to obtain even an occasional administration of them; and we who have from our infancy, through the care and bounty of the Society for Propagating the Gospel, enjoyed them, should do us we have been done by. It is not for me to say what portion any man should give—that must be left to his own conscience—but there are few, I believe, who could not devote to the Lord at least a fiftieth part of their capital, or the income, or

the profits, or the great sacrifice.

But, my Lord, may I not urge on all to remember from whom we have received all we have, and all our ability to give or offer? Are not the words of David as true now as when he uttered them, "Who am I, and what is my people, that we should be able to offer so willingly after this sort? For all things come of Thee, and out of thine own have we given thee?" And again.—"O Lord our God, all this store that we have prepared to build thee an house for thine holy name, cometh of thine hand, and is all thine own." Do not let us be overmuch apprehensive of being too liberal on such an occasion. It may be said to us as the prophet said to Amaziah, when called on to give up the appointed aid for Israel, he exclaimed, "What shall we do for the hundred talents which I have given to the army of Israel?" "The Lord is able to give thee much more than this." But he that is greater than any prophet has emphatically said, "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth. Beware of covetousness." Let us not delay, then; let us heartily unite, and try to influence others by our example as well as our words. "While we have time let us do good unto all men, especially them of the household of faith."

Just before the close of the meeting, Judge Parker said it might be advisable to have a special meeting of the Society before the next session of the Legislature, and if so, an application would be made to the Bishop to call one.
