

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

Hominy.

GD LEASE give some ways of serving hominy. It is one of the cheapest, nourishing foods, but I only serve it as a cereal, with sugar and cream. I should also like to know if hominy can be made at home?" Hominy is Indian corn with the hull removed and the grain broken.

It is prepared for use by boiling, and the process is so difficult that if "Alexandra" can buy it ready boiled and ready to use, she will save much

time and patience.

'In the first place, the hulls must be removed from the corn with a lye made from wood ashes, after which the hominy is steeped for twelve hours and boiled for five hours. But after this preliminary process is complete. and boiled for five hours. But after this preliminary process is complete the cereal is excellent for a breakfast dish, a dessert or to zerve in place of a vegetable. Fried hominy is almost identical with fried mush, for both are made

from corn, one being the entire or half grain, and the other the crushed or ground meal. The hominy remaining from breakfast should be packed into a loaf pan or a mold, and when cold sliced in half-inch pieces. These slices may be rolled in flour and fried in butter or dipped in egg and crumbs and fried in deep fat. As hominy is never salted when boiling, it must be seasoned when the final cooking is being done. Fried hominy is served with honey, with maple syrup or with jelly.

Hominy croquettes: These are very similar to rice croquettes, but are prepared with less difficulty. Mix two cups of cold boiled hominy with the well-beaten yolk of one egg and a little milk. Season the mixture and shape it into small flat cakes or cones. Flat cakes may be fried in an omelette pan, but the cones must be breaded and finished in deep fat. Tomatoes are excellent with hominy and any sauce suitable to serve with meat may be used on these croquettes.

A hominy cake, better known to families of a generation ago than those of today, but extremely good at any time, is made in this way. Into a cup of hot, boiled hominy stir one tablespoon of butter, one-half teaspoon of salt and the well-beaten yolks of two eggs. Beat this and add slowly of salt and the well-beaten yolks of two eggs. Beat this and add slowly a cup of milk, a half a cup of cornmeal and a cup of sugar; lastly fold in the beaten whites of two eggs. Bake in a sheet in a hot oven for about twenty minutes. Serve while hot and do not cut this dainty, but break it apart. Creamed hominy is similar to creamed, canned corn, but seems much richer. Fried hominy is usually boiled hominy cooked until quite dry and fried in plenty of hot butter. Each separate grain breaks apart and browns nicely and when seasoned with salt and pepper is a splendid garnish for meat or fowl.

### More Garden Planning

Where privacy from the service part of the house is required in large gardens, rows of shrubs will hide entrances to kitchens, will shield kitchen gardens from close observers and provide the necessary privacy.

Old wooden kitchens that cannot be removed may form back grounds for tall hollyhocks, masses of English larkspurs, flowering shrubs, grape vines and such like.

Gloomy corners under tall trees or between buildings or in angles of buildings may be transformed by building corner rockeries, and when planted with some of the bright rock plants described in our talks about rock gardens, real beauty spots may

Porches should have some greenery growing over them. Individual tastes hold here. But do plant a three-yearold Wisteria, if possible, You may expect bloom in a year. You will not regret the dollar spent for this grand vine. A honeysuckle should be somewhere around your grounds, and how you can ever expect any sort of a garden without a white lilac passes

my understanding.

Awkward flights of steps leading to high verandahs might be made less ugly in appearance if a few rocks were piled in the angles and some alpines planted thereon. Shrubs are not so suitable for these situations.

Do not build a rockery in the middle

of your yard. And when you do build that rockery, do not use large fat white stones or shells or bits of leftover sewer pipes or bits of polished granite and all such. Nature does not do so. Follow her





Canadian Press Despatch. OTTAWA, April 17. -- Regulations hav been issued under the adulteration of food act, providing that harmless coloring matter may be used in the manufacture of cheese, confectionery, ice cream and butter, without declaration on the label to the effect that coloring has been used, provided that "the color does not conceal damage or make the article appear better or of greater value than it really is." It is also permissible to use copper salts in the greening of peas, provided the amount of copper does not exceed 80 parts per million in the drained peas or 10 parts per million in the embed-ding liquid

Aikins Lines Up With Opposition on Issue of Importance to West.

(Continued From Page 1.)

apply to the proposal that we remove the duties on wheat and wheat products from the United States. ant to the west the boon of free wheat would not be to sacrifice our fiscal independence, because we would be free at any time if we saw fit to reimpose the duties.

Mr. Aikins did not see how free wheat could injure the Canadian miler, whose market was largely an export market. As to the railways they had only to make reasonable freight rates to carry not only Canadian wheat from the west to the seaboard, but also to carry American wheat from the Western States to the Eastern States

States.

"If the interests of the west," Mr. Aikins continued, "are to be sacrificed to the interests of the eastern millers and the railways, then it is the duty of the government to bonus the flour milling industry in the western provinces. For this purpose milling machinery should be admitted free of duty, and power be furnished the millers at reduced rates by the Dominion government. It might also be the duty of the government in some way to reduce freight rates even if it had to bear part of the transportation charges which western Canadian millers had to pay in order to export their product."

Flax Fibre Bounty.

Mr. Aikins also favored the imposition of a duty upon Indian corn, believing that such a step would create a demand in eastern Canada for the barley grown in the west. He also advocated a bounty for the flax fibre in-

vocated a bounty for the flax fibre industry.

The Laurier government, the member from Brandon contended, had neglected the west, while endeavoring to
make the eastern people believe that
they were making great sacrifices for
the benefit of the country west of Lake
Superior. That government had only
expended about \$7,000,000 all told in
railway construction in western Canada, including the few miles of the National Transcontinental which ran thru
the Province of Manitoba. True, it
had loaned ten million dollars to the
Grand Trunk Pacific, but that money
would be repaid. It had guaranteed
the bonds of the Grand Trunk Pacific
and the Canadian Northern, but those
guarantees had not involved the government in one dollar of actual exguarantees had not involved the government in one dollar of actual expense. The Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta had been left to finance their own railway con-

struction.

Mr. Aikins then compared the cost of the National Transcontinental with the cost of the C. P. R. The National Transcontinental had cost \$234,000,000, while the C. P. 

A VENERABLE BIBLE

Rosedale Resident Has File of Newspapers Published in Muddy York Days.

Two old books are among the heirlooms of the Gooch family, and are
now in the possession of F. H. Gooch,
120 Crescent road. The volumes are
a Book of Common Prayer, bearing
the date 1629, and a Bible of the date
1653. The first book is much worn
and apparently has never been rebound. The cover, which was of
some dark leather is much worn. On
the fiy leaf can be traced in faint letters the name Gooch. The second old
book is a Bible of the date 1653, and
the place of publication marked as
London. This volume is about the
size of an ordinary abridged dictionary and has been rebound. The paper
of both these books is yellow with age
and the printing is in old characters,
which are hard to decipher.

Mr. Gooch is also the possessor of
a large Book of Common Prayer of
the date 1732, as well as many other
books of the 18th century. In addition there is an old-fashioned snuff
box, engraved with the name of Robert Gooch, Norwich, and dated 1756.
This box was made of charred wood,
preserved from the great fire of London of 1666, in the reign of Charles II.
Two other heirlooms consist of oldfashioned cut wine-glasses engraved
with the thistle, rose and shamrock,
and were said to be identical with
those used at the wedding of the Princess Charlotte, with the exception that
those of the princess bore the crown
as well. These have been in the family since 1832.

Mr. Gooch has also a file of old
Toronto, then York, newspapers, published in 1832 and 1833. These include the "Courier of Upper Canada,"
the "Patriot and Farmers' Monitor,"
the "Colonial Advocate," and also
some copies of the following Hamilton
papers: "The Western Mercury, 1832,"
and the "Hamilton Free Press."





# **TUMBLE IN CORN** WAS CONTINUED

Huge Stock Available in Chicago Shows No Sign of Diminishing.

CHICAGO, April 17. — Dashing of hopes that a way has been found to get rid of the unwieldy stock of carn in Chicago today sent prices tumbling again. # **FILTRATION PLANT** AS RECOMMENDED

Description of Plant for Island -ls to Be Finished This Year.

The recommendation of Commissioner Harris that the tender of the John Ver Mehr Engineering Company for an additional filtration plant be accepted was approved by the board of control yesterday. As it is essential to make an immediate start if the work is to be completed this year it is expected that the council will pass the recommendation on Monday, and that by the fall Toronto's water suply will be beyond question. Following is a description of the plant, which will prove interesting to those who regard a pure water supply as one of the first essentials of a successful community.

The tender for the design and construction of this plant has been submitted by two firms—the John Ver Mehr Engineering Company, Limited, of Toronto, as engineers, and Wm. 
