Interesting news has come from Lodz, where a large number of troops drawn from various parts of the front are being sent in the direction of Thorn. The inhabitants of Lodz were forbidden to stand on the streets while the itsops were passing, or to watch the movements of troops from the windows. The importation of provisions from Germany has almost ceased. Civilians are not permitted to use the trams. All the stores of wool have been removed from the Lodz factories to Germany.

The conduct of the Germans suggests that they are nervous and excited. It is reported that they intend shortly to evacuate Lodz.





"I would not call this financing at all. It is more like stealing," answered Magistrate Denison.

Russell Snow, K.C., persisted in arguing that there had not been sufficient evidence produced to warrant his clients being committed for trial. In answer the magistrate said: "What is the use of listening to arguments?







Mr. Justice Lennox Orders Winding-Up of Mutual Stationery Co.

and has not been able to ascertain the amount due to him. The agreement of February I. 1913. fixed his share in the capital at \$2,482.

He held that the assets of the company on April 5, 1914, were sufficient to pay the late Mr. Newsome his share of \$2,580 and his own of \$2,482.

Defendants denied possession of any assets or that they refused access to the partnership books; also that the assets would at any time pay the share of plaintiff and Mr. Newsome. His lordship held the partnership was dissolved on the death of William Barker Newsome and ordered a reference to the master-in-ordinary to take an account of the partnership assets, including any profits made out of the business since April 5, 1914, and for a winding up of the partnership. In the case of Rex v. Parrish the second appellate court confirmed the sentence of 6 months passed on J. W. Parrish for perjury arising out of his action against the Toronto Street Railway Company; also the conviction of his wite Rena, who was let go on suspended sentence.

CANADIAN RUBBER FOR LOCAL MARKET

Company Starts Manufacturing Waterproof Coats From Material Made in Canada.

The Canadian Rubber Company has produced its first samples of water-proof clothing manufactured from canadian cloth, which had been made waterproof by Canadian workmen.
