DISCUSSED TRADE RELATIONS.

Sanquet to Visiting Agricultural Manufacturers a Pleasant Affair.
The banquet tendered the visiting members of the National Association of Agricultural and Vehicle Manufacturers at the King Edward last night had as its toastmaster President W. K. George of the C. M. A. The lieutenant-governor was also present and spoke words of welcome to the visitors, who have been holding their annual convention at Niagara Falls. There were about 400 in the party, including wives and families, who left early this morning for their homes.
Byron E. Walker, who proposed the toast "Our Commercial Relations," referred to the improvement in agricultural machinery as being largely responsible for the advanced industrial conditions. There was no hostility towards reciprocity with the United States, but Canada was not prepared to open a market of 6,000,000 people to one of 80,000,000 that was not open to Canada. He understood that the United States could not be expected to change its policy for a 6,000,000 market, but he thought the republic would soon have to look to Canada for raw material that would keep up its foreign trade.
The toast was responded to by H. E. Miles of Racine, Wis., who said he did not think there was any great recreation sentiment in either the United States or Canada, but they did need closer social and commercial relations.
C. F. Hulbert, Louisville, Ky., newly elected president of the association, also spoke.

NOT AFTER THE BOOZEMEN ECHOES FROM THE W.C.T.U.

Notions About Licenses Freely Exploited—Not Enamored With the Exhibition Midway.

At yesterday's meeting of the Toronto W. C. T. U. Mrs. Vance read a paper on Women's Suffrage. She hoped it would be granted to married women. Reports showing good work in the several branches were read during the forenoon.
Resolutions were passed during the afternoon. One was to the effect that the union stood unalterably firm for the prohibition of the liquor traffic and was opposed to the public-house trust scheme, and any other form of government control. They pledged themselves to do all in their power to bring the subject of local option prominently before the people. The government was commended for its attitude towards the licenses in New Ontario. The union requested that no licenses be approved adjacent to a public-house railway line under construction in that district. The Midway at the Toronto Exhibition was condemned as an unnecessary attraction and a disgrace to "our moral department," and a menace to the morals of the child and young people who attended. The union resolved to co-operate with the ministers of the lic. concourse in the direction.
It was resolved to revive activity in obtaining signatures for total abstinence.

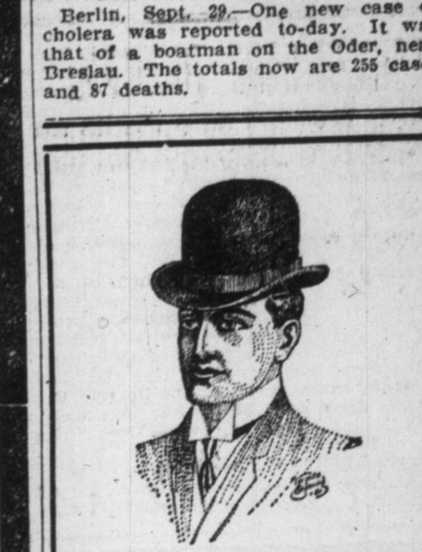
HEARD ASSESSMENT APPEALS.

Judgment Delivered in Several Cases Involving Large Amounts.

Judge Winchester, as county judge, yesterday received appeal cases against assessment which had sifted through the court of revision. In but a few instances judgment was given.
John Macdonald & Co., East Wellington-street, desired a cut in the total assessment levied upon their premises of \$104,000. It was claimed that the warehouse which was assessed for \$57,000 was only worth \$45,000. The appeal was dismissed.
The case of the one and two-fifths acres on Avondale-avenue, owned by Isaac Moody, was a rather complicated one. The original assessment was \$2000 an acre, but this the assessment department later sought to have increased to \$4000 for the whole property. The court of revision refused to tack the court of revision refused to tack the assessed amount, but Judge Winchester raised the levy to \$3000 per acre.
The property owned by the John Macdonald estate, on Avenue-road, valued by the city at \$23,000, was reduced to \$25,000.
The appeal of the assessment commission against the action of the court of revision in allowing exemption to the railway Y.M.C.A. building was sustained.
Judge Winchester gave judgment in a number of assessment appeals against their assessment for points, ties and rails in wards 2, 3, and 4, was dismissed. The W. C. T. U. home on Elm-street will be exempt from taxation on the ground that it is charitable institution. The Victoria Order of Nurses Home on Spadina-avenue comes under the same head and is assessed. St. Clement's Club on William-street is a club composed of the boys of St. Patrick's Church under the control of the clergy and so it is exempt.

NEW POST FOR PEACEMAKER**

Witte Will Be Decorated by Grateful Sovereign and Made First Subject of Realm.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 29.—M. Witte left St. Petersburg at noon by boat to meet Emperor Nicholas, who, with his family, is prolonging his yachting trip in the Finnish Gulf. The meeting will occur at Bjorko, where the interview between Emperor Nicholas and Emperor William took place just before the peace conference, and where the imperial yacht Polar Star is now lying.

M. Witte had not expected when he arrived here to be received in audience until the emperor's return to Peterhof, but yesterday evening he received the imperial command to come

to-day to Bjorko on board a vessel which was sent for him, his majesty desiring to hear immediately from his envoy's lips an account of his important and successful mission.

It has been reported that M. Witte will be made a count and receive the Order of St. Andrew, with which Presidents Faure and Loubet were decorated, but a more substantial honor may be his nomination to the post of chief of the cabinet of ministers, the details of which are now being elaborated, and which would make him the first subject in the realm, with the right of naming all the ministers except the court and war ministers.

WHAT KAISER SAID.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The National Zeitung's St. Petersburg correspondent has telegraphed to his paper as follows: "M. Witte told me to-day that Emperor William said to him: 'I accord you the same honor as I would to a crowned head. You have accomplished extraordinary things, and I can grant Russia the possession of such a man. If monarchs had many such true servants then, one would think better of monarchs.'

**LACK OF CARS TO BLAME
IF WHEAT BLOCKADE OCCURS**

Trouble Will Be at Lower Ports and Not Thru Freight Rates—The Situation.

Local grain men do not believe the yarns from Fort William that there is a probability of a blockade thru rates at the northern lake ports. Several boats are loading now, and as far as can be learned the bulk of the Canadian tonnage has been chartered by shippers for the month of October at rates which insure the grain shippers concerned to have very reasonable and open shippers are voluntarily now bidding over them. There is some discussion as to whether all round, but it will be caused by slowness of loading the boats at Lake Superior ports, and the inability of the railways and elevators at lower lake ports to keep the grain clear from the boats.

There are seven Georgian Bay ports at which the grain can be received: Depot Harbor (rarry Sound), Midland, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Huron, Point Edward and Owen Sound. Present indications are that conditions are generally favorable for shipping in good time from Fort William, but the danger of a blockade is at this end, and will be entirely owing to inability to get cars. There is 100,000,000 bushels to be handled, and 20,000,000 bushels of it must come this way this fall, so far only about a million bushels have been received. Some of this went on down to Kingston. The shortage of cars has commenced already and yesterday at the Union Station the district freight agents had a meeting to combine to get a hold on the situation. If the cars can't be got for handling the trade here it will be a great thing for Buffalo. There is a good demand for Canadian wheat for export. It looks like a big shortage in Russia, and European demands will be excessive.

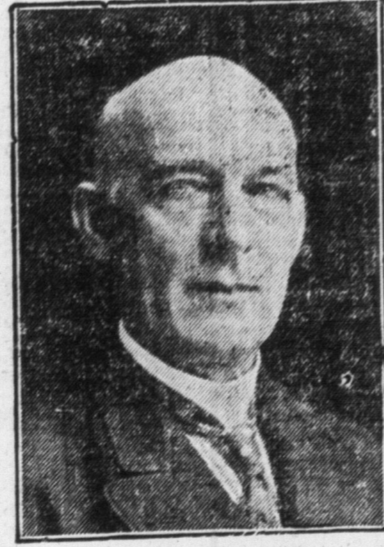
As far as getting the wheat down here from the north is concerned there is any quantity of time and apparently enough boats. The big trouble is the insufficiency of cars, which has been felt before and will be again.

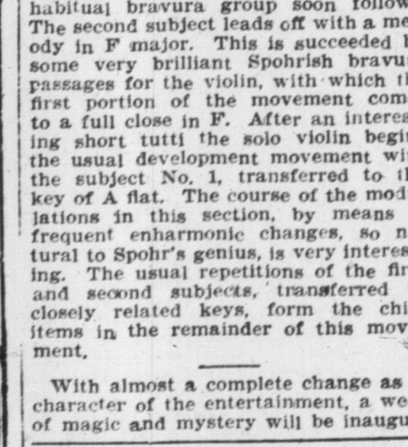

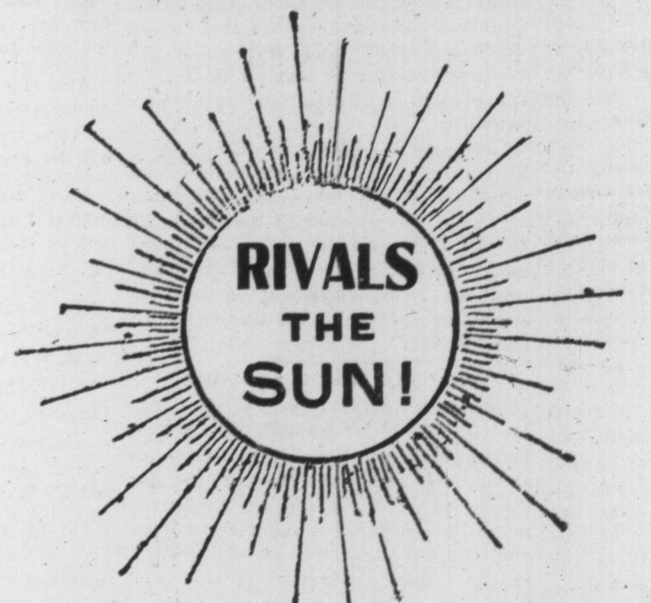

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE "Aurora" and "Viznaga" Mines, Alamo, L. C., Mexico.

In the year 1887 a young Mexican, son of a well-to-do family, escaped jail at Ensenada, Lower California, Mexico, and while fleeing from the interior of the peninsula, about 75 miles inland from Ensenada on the Pacific coast and near the present site of the Town of Alamo, while wandering over the mountains and through the gulches, he discovered a rich piece of gold deposits, and so plentiful was the gold discovered that he sent considerable amounts from time to time to his old father, who lived near Ensenada. The old man would take the gold into town and sell it, and the course of time neighbors noticed this man's prosperity and his peculiar optical exposition of a limited amount of gold dust, and set about to determine whence it came.

One of these gulches was called the "Aurora" and the other the "Mexican" gulch.

The young Mexican was again taken into custody, but was soon pardoned on account of being the son of a prominent man. There was an enormous amount of placer gold taken out of this period of time, much of the gold being coarse.

At the end of the year 1888, the mine was discovered. This mine they called the "Viznaga" mine, and at the head of the other gulch the "Aurora" mine was named up by some Mexicans.

It was in the spring of 1889 that Major Horace M. Russell, of Los Angeles, who had been a member of the district, decided to go down and investigate, and being a man of long experience and familiar with gold mining in California, he was able to determine the value of the mother lode from which the "Aurora" mine came.

Major Horace M. Russell purchased the Viznaga mine from an old Mexican for \$5000, Mexican money, sold it to a Los Angeles company for \$25,000 and later offered to repurchase for \$100,000. The company refused the offer and worked the mine successfully for several years, extracting several hundred tons of gold, and in the process of the mine was discovered that the ore was rich in silver, and that the mine was worth more than the gold it produced.

Consequently he entered into negotiations with the result that the mine, rich places discovered. Many interesting experiences could be related in connection with the development of this mine, but as this has been going on steadily for over 15 years.

The "Aurora" mine was opened up in 1888 by some Mexicans, and at that time consisted of not more than 200 or 300 feet of shaft, which was called the "Aurora Ledge," which extends over 500 feet in length and contains 6 distinct trunks of auriferous quartz.

The Mexicans opened up a hole in the "Aurora" and took out a few deep shafts when they found the ore. They thought they had found some persons to whom they could sell "patented" but failed to purchase Major Russell, being familiar with the "Aurora" mine, and offered them a share in the mine, and immediately accepted his proposition. He did not have sufficient money to claim his share, but took in a partner to help out with his half interest in the mine, the balance being held in Mexican shares in shares of one-twelfth interest. They put every man who owned an interest at work in the shaft, and kept them all there until they sold out. A hole was being sunk in a solid dyke, and a particle of ore in sight, not a thing to be seen in the mine in the few days, and these Mexicans became very discouraged, and offered their shares to Major Russell and his partner; in fact, rather forced them to buy. When the last Mexican sold out and they had the mine in their own hands, they decided it was useless to sink deeper, and feeling confident the ledge was somewhere not far from their present workings, concluded to cross-cut a little way and see what the prospects for striking the vein in this manner would be. Where about 12 or 14 feet on the cross-cut, a tremendous excitement in camp, and the ore taken out of the shaft was hailed as the richest ever found in any mine.

A little five-stamp mill was erected at a cost of about 15 months that will produce \$35,000 a month out of one little hole. The owners of the mine had decided to equip the property with electricity, and stopped the work for the purpose of putting the machinery in. Arrangements were made with an eastern firm to install the machinery, and while this was being done the partners decided that they would take a vacation. They divided up the property and made a trip to the east.

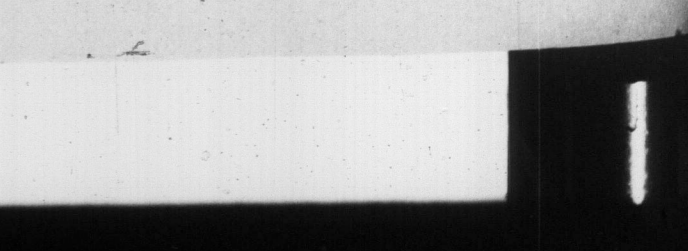

BEAT MESSAGE HOME.

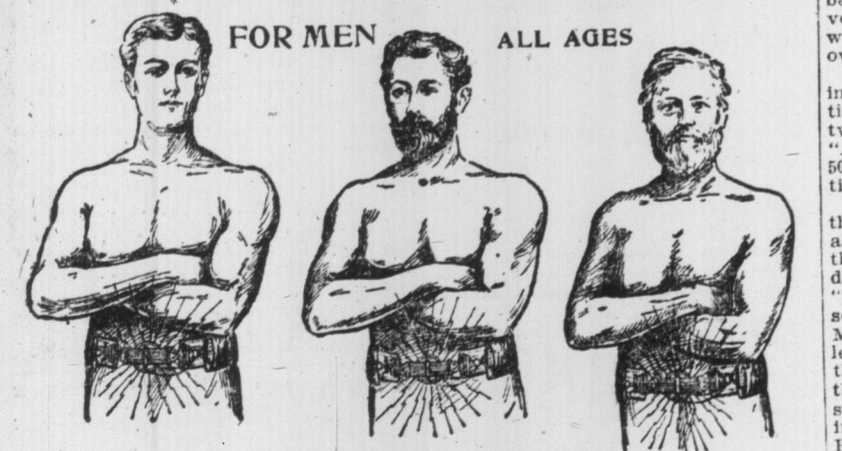

That as two distinct complaints have been made against the garage on Kingston road and on Yonge-street, in flagrant violation of the law and in flagrant violation of either the comfort or safety of other people, that the secretary of the club will advise the secretary of the police of the same.

That the garages be notified that complaints are being made against a number of chauffeurs, who by their reckless driving and continued violation of the law are putting the owners of garages who are requested to cease employing those who will not conform to the law.

That the president, vice-president and secretary shall address a circular letter to all members of the club, stating the different points of the Automobile Club and urging a strict compliance therewith.

DELIVERIES BY FARMERS CONTINUE TO BE SMALL. Says Modern Miller of the Wheat Situation—Grain Markets Are Slightly Easier.

World Office. Friday Evening, Sept. 29. Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day 3/4 lower than yesterday and corn futures 1/2 lower.

At Chicago, September wheat closed 1/2 lower than yesterday; Sept. corn 1/2 lower, and Sept. oats unchanged.

Canadian wheat shipments this week 284,000 bushels, corn 1,880,000 bushels, and flour 1,200,000 bushels.

Bradstreet's reports exports wheat and flour this week 2,000,000 bushels, last week 2,175,000; last year 1,182,000; this week 1,210,000; last week 1,274,000; last year 709,000.

Primary receipts wheat, 1,204,000 bushels, against 1,202,000 bushels, 450,000 against 445,000; receipts corn, 419,000, against 415,000; shipments 541,000, against 570,000.

Export clearances wheat and flour this week 376,000 bushels. Modern Miller, speaking of winter wheat as well advanced in the principal grain-growing states, says: "The soil is unusually good to receive the seed and start the growth of the new crop."

Where rains have fallen, the best progress has been made, yet in many localities farm work is still delayed by dry weather. There are no indications as yet of increased deliveries of wheat by farmers.

Modern Miller says: "The Minneapolis output last week was the largest of any single week for a year ago. The mills were grinding steadily and most of them were working on Sunday. This week the same number of mills are running, and the output will probably be as large as in the corresponding week a year ago."

St. Lawrence Market. Receipts of farm produce were 2000 bushels of grain, 350 bushels of potatoes, 100 bushels of apples, several loads of pumpkins and potatoes, with a liberal supply of live chickens and ducks.

Chicago Consols. Lower cables, less weather and heavy bullish sentiment were the chief factors in the market yesterday. The market was active and prices advanced.
