



The Dumping Grounds in the East.
Editor World: Since my letter of the 10th
inst. I have been looking further into the
nuisance in the East End. It is surprising that the people have remained quiet so long on the south side of Eastern-avenue. On the west side of the Don there is a long on the south side of Eastern-avenue. On the west side of the Don there is a plece of land which was set apart for citizens as a dump for horse manure. It appears now that one of our far-seeing citizens has got control of this plece of land and all that is dumped there, and he is no doubt making a good thing out of the same at the cost of many citizens and the disadvantage of many property owners in the neighborhood. He has a dump of about 300 feet long by about 60 feet wide, and about 15 feet high, where the excavators of the city dump all night soil. However, not at night do they dump it, but at any time through the day, to the extent of about 200 barrels a week. It is needless for me to say that quite a percentage of this leaks through into our classic river. In fact, during the summer months the cream can be seen floating on the water. On the west side of the dump this delicious fiuld lies in a hollow alongside of the railway track. Is not this a most disgraceful state of affairs? 


