Another thing we can do in regard to railway transportation is to stand for the principle that Canada is to take a stand for the nationalization of her railways.

That may be a hopeless program to some, but I know of no identical higher field of politics that is growing with more force than the idea of a nationalization of railways in Australia. They have nationalized their railways, and it has proved a great success. In several of the countries of Europe they have nationalized their railways and they have better transportation, they have better rates, and they have better service.

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NEWS OF THE RAILWAYS.

Dr. Sproule, M. P., on the Government's Action Re North Bay.

Minister of Railways Has Suggested Arbitration of Differences Between the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Companies—Course of the Government Not Clear—Other Railway Notes.

The Mayor's secretary, having communicated with Dr. Sproule, M. P., who has interested himself in the solution of difficulties between the G. T. R. and C. P. R., received the following letter yesterday: "In reply to yours of the 11th inst., enclosing: 'What action has been taken by the Government in the matter of the quarrel between the Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk Railway Companies, regarding the traffic between Toronto and North Bay, and what limitation there was to the right of the Government to take over the line from Gravelhurst to Callander, or North Bay; also enclosing the report of the Government will take immediate action to bring the parties to a settlement of their differences. I beg to say the Minister of Railways has written the two companies asking for an explanation why they do not exchange traffic, as provided for in the statute under which the line from North Bay to North Bay was built, and also, I understood him to say, in the event of their being unable to adjust their differences, they do not have recourse to arbitration. This has not been done and yesterday, received a reply that portion of the line from Gravelhurst to North Bay in the event of operating arrangements not being satisfactorily carried out, he would be glad to see them. I am to be informed from time to time what is being done, and when any agreement is entered into, new developments arise, I will communicate it to the Toronto World, and will send you a copy of Hansard, containing what was said in the House about it, which you will find in the Toronto World, M. P."

RAILWAY NEWS.

The Grand Trunk are doing an increased business in the handling of freight through Port Huron Tunnel. Last month they attained their highest record for the number of cars handled in 24 hours. On Sunday, the 8th inst., 41 trains, consisting of 1300 cars, were sent through the tunnel, and the car carries were in use, it was considered a record. It is reported that the Grand Trunk will handle 5000 cars in 24 hours.

Mr. J. O'Hara, city ticket agent for the Grand Trunk at Trenton, has been appointed traveling passenger agent over the route between Trenton and Toronto.

Canadian Pacific earnings for the week ending March 8 amounted to \$454,000, or \$100,000 more than the same period last year, which was \$354,000.

The rate war was a dead issue in rail road circles yesterday, and the only subject that caused any excitement was the whole trouble would end.

The Toronto Shipbuilders' Association, consisting of 30 shipbuilders from the Port of Toronto, met yesterday for the purpose of discussing the proposed new flat-bottomed boats built by the Police and shipped to the east last week.

Reason herself leaves us no alternative. We cannot, in the nature of things, conceive of the Supreme Being, Himself the embodiment of all moral perfections, doing or sanctioning any act or procedure which in itself involves a departure from the straight, uncompromising line of absolute right. There is nothing that appeals so strongly to the natural intuitions of men, even had men sometimes, as the sentiments of morality. Anything, therefore, which appears to contradict this sentiment, when found in a book professing to be a revelation of the mind of God, becomes a necessary stumbling block, and prolific source of perplexity."



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AS WAR SCARE SUBSIDES

General Stocks Sharply Recover Recent Marked Losses.
