MISSIONS FOR MISSIONS

Desire of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions as Expressed at Philadelphia. A SYSTEMATIC EFFORT URGED.

The trouble in China referred to in General Assembly-Missionaries Defended. Philadelphia, Pa., May 22.—The commissioners of the Presbyterian General Assembly found much business awaiting them to-day, and the rapidly with which various matters were disposed of evidenced the assembly's intention to have for consideration as little unfinished business as possible after the settlement of the creed revision question.

Report on Overseas. Rev. Dr. W. H. Roberts, stated clerk, reported the vote of the various presbyteries upon overseas referred to them by the assembly of 1900. Among these presbyteries was one defining the ministerial membership in presbyteries, which was rejected.

Report on Foreign Missions. Rev. Dr. James D. Moffat, president of the Board of Foreign Missions, presented the report of the Committee on Foreign Missions, which recommended: "That pastors be urged to adopt some systematic plan whereby every church member may be induced to make at least an annual contribution; that the effort be augmented to secure a martyr's memorial fund, the annual interest of which shall be employed in supporting the successors of the noble men and women who laid down their lives in the cause of Christ; that every member of the church be earnestly exhorted to contribute to the various organizations and to individuals contributing to our foreign missions; that the civil authorities, and particularly the President of the United States, be urged to make earnest efforts to secure the success of China that kind of religious liberty we enjoy in our own land; that we urge the raising of \$2,000,000 for the ordinary work of the board."

Sorrow for Dr. Babcock's Death. The following minute was incorporated in the report: "We record our profound sorrow upon the intelligence which reached us of the death of the Rev. Matthew D. Babcock, D.D., a member of the board, and express to his bereaved family and church our sympathy and our prayers for the sustaining power of the Holy Spirit."

The Boxer Uprising. Robert E. Spear of New York, secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions, in addressing the assembly on the committee's report, denounced the critics who placed the blame for the Boxer uprising on the shoulders of the missionaries. In this connection he said: "Since the trouble in China the church has been the subject of malignant and venomous criticism. It is true that some of this criticism is the result of ignorance, and we could afford to pass it by and not be affected by it for the fact that even here, in the highest court of the church, it had its effect. Our missionaries have been characterized personally by persons ignorant of existing conditions in China, to the extent of being charged as responsible for the Boxer uprising."

A PRESIDENT PARALYZED. Santiago, Chile, May 22.—President Errazuriz has had another severe attack of paralysis. His case is considered to be very serious.

Liverpool, May 22.—The steamer Lake Champlain, the first trans-Atlantic vessel to be equipped with the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy, has sailed from this port for Montreal. She will try to communicate with the shore two days after leaving the Mersey, and two days before she reaches Quebec.

Mr. Charles D. Cramp, president of the Cramp Ontario Steel Company, Limited, was in the city attending a meeting of the Board of Directors yesterday, and from what Mr. Cramp says, the Cramp Ontario Steel Co. will soon be a large producer of iron and of coke and coal. This will be the third company of this class to be established in Canada, the other two being the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. and the Dominion Iron and Steel Co., both of Nova Scotia. Mr. Cramp stated that the company are now negotiating for the purchase of the plant at Collingwood, and expect to begin work shortly.

Macdonald, commanding 48th Highlanders, for a regular weekly parade for the evening of the same date, and a general parade as usual in drill order, etc., on Friday, May 31, at 8 o'clock. Arrangements have been made for the parade on the morning of the 24th inst.; in addition to the parade on the afternoon of that day, announced in the previous issue. The train leaving the Union Station at 7 a.m. will stop at the ranges.

School Cadets to Have Uniforms. A meeting of the principals of the Public Schools was held yesterday afternoon with Inspector McLean in the chair. It was announced that the regulations which have been purchased with the proceeds of the last Great Meeting, and which were distributed yesterday among the various schools. Bank of Hamilton Wins. Judgment has been given by the Supreme Court in the case of the Banker cheque which was raised from \$500 to \$600. The cheque was cashed by the Imperial Bank, which, through the clearing house, got its face value back from the Bank of Hamilton. The Bank of Hamilton has sued the Imperial Bank for a refund, and has now gained its suit in all the courts.

Rev. Dr. German Appreciated. A resolution of appreciation of Rev. Dr. German was passed at the meeting of the Church on the occasion of Dr. German being removed, according to the discipline of the Methodist Church. The good work done by Mr. German is not overlooked, and the diligence and fidelity of the faithful couple are highly commended.

CITY NEWS.

Central Methodist. The Central District Methodists held a business conference yesterday morning in St. Paul's Church, Avenue Road, 925, at 11:30 o'clock. The meeting was presided over by Rev. Dr. Chown as chairman. At 11:30 o'clock the meeting adjourned for lunch, resuming again at 1:30. Rev. G. O. Johnston moved that a mission be established at Hamilton's Point this summer. The ministerial voice and future services would be attended to by him. This was carried unanimously.

Results of the election to the various committees were as follows: Stationing Committee, Rev. A. Brown; Sunday School Committee, Rev. W. Dean and D. Hill; Epworth League Committee, Rev. A. S. Hudson, H.A. and Fred Dones; Missionary Committee, Warring Keasbey, with George Jackson as substitute. In the stationing, it was resolved to request the Stationing Committee to appoint a minister to attend to the work, rather than to the Toronto Ministerial Association. Thirty-eight lay members were elected to the annual conference to be held in Elm-street Church early in June. Business reports were read, and showed the district to be in good condition, especially and otherwise. There were 288 new members reported.

Police Court Record. Mrs. G. D. Watson of Florida presided at yesterday morning's meeting of the Christian Workers' Convention. Mrs. E. Watson presided at the meeting of the missionary work, which was held at the gathering. She described "the ravages wrought by the late influenza epidemic, but believed that the relief sent by the Christian nations on that occasion had paved the way for a more general acceptance of Christianity by the natives, over the world." Smallpox Ambulance Fired. Man With the Disease Rescued by Driver of Vehicle, Who Horribly Ran Away. Cleveland, May 22.—Ever since the city authorities built an additional smallpox ambulance, the city, two weeks ago, the neighbors have been threatening to burn it. An ambulance, with a smallpox patient in it, was this noon being driven to the post house, when it broke down over obstacles placed in the road. In an instant the ambulance was surrounded by a mob of men. The driver shouted "Smallpox!" and warned them to stand back. When they did, however, the crowd accented when they saw the man had smallpox, and it was necessary to place the patient in a teanear to take the patient to the hospital in an open wagon, which was afterwards destroyed. The driver hastily helped the patient out, after trying in vain to extinguish the fire by celebrating high mass for the souls of the dead. The ambulance was destroyed by a fire which was started by the crowd. The driver was rescued by the police.
