EXHIBITS AND ATTRACTIONS

At Toronto Exhibition Will Exceed Former Years in Every Particular.

ENTRIES WELL AHEAD OF RECORD.

Amusement Features Are Best and Most Costly Ever Secured—Railway Rates Away Down.

Mr. R. A. Burris, Canadian government agent for New Ontario, writes from Port Arthur: "Mr. Southworth informs me that you have kindly consented to let us have the building in which the exhibits from the West Indies are to be placed. It is our aim to bring at least 60 enlarged photographs of farm and other views, and we will have an unusual collection of grains from every portion of New Ontario. I would be pleased to have you make the New Ontario exhibit a prominent feature in your announcements. New Ontario has already contributed \$35,000.00 to the revenue of the province. We expect great things from her, and we are looking to Toronto as a strong staff upon which to lean for our prosperity will be yours."

Up to Tuesday the number of exhibitors received was as large as last year, and there were yet fruit and poultry and some dogs to hear from, which will swell the number from 1000—this is not the number of exhibits, remember, but of individual exhibitors—to 1800, which will be the record by several hundred. The territory covered by Canada's great Fair is proven by the fact that British Columbia, Manitoba, West Indies, Great Britain, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Ontario, Ontario proper, Missouri, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Massachusetts and the Northwest Territories will be represented.

The sale of 10-day season tickets at \$1 is large, but they will be recalled from the agents after Aug. 25.

The Ladies' Committee of the Industrial Exhibition held a meeting Tuesday to go over their entries, and they reported a good showing. People are warned that their entries will have to be made before the Fair opens.

Signor Paolo Giozza, who will conduct the special orchestra managed by Boltes Kiralyfi for his gorgeous production, "The Orient," arrived in town yesterday. He is a venerable, white-haired gentleman, who, being director of music at the Sydney, N.S.W., Exhibition in 1894, composed a cantata that he dedicated to the then Prince of Wales, now King Edward VII.

Exhibits must all be in place by 8 p.m. on Saturday, as the opening takes place on Monday, instead of Tuesday, as in former years.

Superintendent of Buildings Thirt has now taken up office on the grounds. Owing to the rush for permits on the ocean steamships, the Kiralyfi Company from Europe are coming out in divisions. Tuesday the Steamer, Ontario, from Florence, Emma and Nora, and Miss Cordelia Conway, fancy dances, arrived in Toronto.
