JOHN DRYDEN

Great Agriculturist and Stock Breeder, Minister in Reform Cabinet, Baptist Church Leader, After Year's Illness Passes Away.

"Honest" John Dryden passed away at his residence, 9 Prince Arthur-avenue, yesterday evening. Very few outside his immediate circle were aware of his illness, tho he has been in failing health for about a year, and his death will be a mournful surprise to

death will be a mournful surprise to thousands who will remember the quiet, genial man of the blue-eyed smile and the pleasant, fresh-air, country atmosphere which he bore about.

The farmers of Canada, and especially the stock-breeders, and of these, more especially still, the Shorthorn men, lose in Hon. John Dryden, a wise and practical and experienced adviser and friend, and one who had their interests close at heart. Among varied business and political and educational and church interests Mr. Dryden never lost sight of his farmer comrades.

A service will be held at the residence to-morrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The late Mr. Dryden was educated at the local schools and adopted agriculture as his avocation. He became an enthusiastic leader in breeding high

class cattle and sheep.

He entered public life as a member of the municipal council in 1863 and served as deputy-reeve and reeve, voluntarily retiring after seven years. He became a member of the Ontario Legislature, representing South Ontario in 1879. In Sept. 1890, he became minister of agriculture, which portfolio he held intil the change of administration in 1905, when he was defeated by C.

Mr. Dryden's knowledge of agricultural affairs by appointing him in 1906 commissioner to Ireland which position he held about two years, but relinquished owing to falling health. Since that time he has been a resident of Toronto.

JEROME'S INQUISITION

Thaw showed even more confidence than yesterday; in fact, his self-satisfaction at one time almost cost him dear when he ventured into a heated passage-at-arms with the district at-torney. But he checked himself when he realized that he had nothing to gain and everything to lose by a show of

Yesterday Mr. Jerome devoted himself to the prisoner's life history. To-day he based his questions chiefly upon various documents, letters and memoranda which he produced in surprising numbers. 

EXPROPRIATION POWERS EXERCISED IN ENGLAND

Municipal Act Enables City Council to Acquire Total Single Property Affected.

Should the Riverdale Business Men's Association persist in their resolveand they have the reputation of persistence—it is just possible they will not meet much opposition when they go before the private bills committee of the legislature to ask that the city be given power to expropriate as much land as it wishes in the neighborhood of a public improvement scheme such as the Bloor-street viaduct.

By an added clause in the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903, the city was almost given such power, the it is explained by City Solicitor Chisholm that t was only intended to apply to individual cases where damage to the extent of practically the whole property affected resulted from any project. The new clause reads:

Whenever a municipal corporation is entitled to expropriate land in virtue of any power conferred upon it by this act, or the Municipal Waterworks and it appears to the council or the board of waterworks commission ers that it can acquire a larger quantity of land from any particular owner at a more reasonable price on the acreage, or on terms more advantageous than those upon which it could obtain the portion thereof immediately required by it for its purposes, it may take such larger quantity and may afterwards sell and dispose of the part of such land which is unnecessary for
