



O.L.A. DEBATE PROBLEM

Formation of Committees Recommended by Inspector Nursey To Deal With Institutions.

The problems of the small library were discussed at considerable length Library Association, which commenced its tenth annual meeting in the physics building of the University of Toronto yesterday. Several suggestions of comboting the apathy which prevalled thruout many rural districts in regard to the upkeep of a public library were adduced by the various speakers, the general trend of the speeches indicating that insufficient financial support and leck of competent librarians were at the

root of the trouble.

In his address on the library situation, W. R. Nursey, inspector of public libraries, dealt with the struggling institutions which received neither legislative nor municipal grants. He recommended the formation of commit-tees to investigate the cases of these smaller libraries, whose annual receipts in many instances were less than \$1. His recommendation that inancial assistance, graded to meet individual cases, be extended by the government, met with warm approval from his hearers.

in conclusion he paid a tribute to the traveling libraries inaugurated by the Ontario Government.

Miss Aherne, editor of The Public Library, Chicago, in a brief speech expressed the opinion that the smaller institutions twhich found difficulty in supporting htemselves should amaigamate with the other libraries. "Time was when the public library movement was looked upon with a cer-

tain amount of skepticism," said Judge Hardy, speaking on "Our Library Sit uation," in his annual address, "bu Carnegie's advent in the field had given the movement a great impetus, and the Ontario Government had also assisted in a practical manner.' emphasized the need of good li-

wintered over by means of an imrompto frame, the plants are much better than if sown in spring, but as this is out of the question for this year we will make a point to get them nto the ground as early as possible. Plant the seed just as soon as frost is out of the ground. Sow in trenches six inches deep, in which some good manure has been turned under, and as the seeds sprout and grow keen them covered with soil until by spring the trench is level with the surrounding ground. In filling the trench do not throw in the soil with the spede, but take a handful and rib it between the hands to therely pulverize it .- Gar-


