## Managers' Report.

January 10th, 1887.

In submitting the foregoing Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the past year, the Managers have pleasure in drawing attention to the fact that the ordinary income of the Congregation, that is to say, the income from Weekly Offerings, considerably exceeds that of any previous year. Omitting other items, the Weekly Offerings alone amount to, say, \$4640, or \$268 more than in 1883, which was the best previous year. It must not be forgotten, however, that this increase is partly owing to the special services held by Mr. Schiverea, early in the year, and therefore should not be counted upon too much in our estimates for the future. The weekly average for the whole year was \$87.30; for 1885 it \$79.58; for 1884 (the year of the fire) it was \$74.54; for 1883 it was \$82.15.

It will be seen that our outlay keeps pace with our increased income. This seems to be inevitable, and the Managers are sure that the Congregation will approve of the new items on that side of the account. The value of Mr. Schiverea's services cannot be estimated in money; but even from that standpoint, the extra receipts during his services were quite equal to the extra expense. The aid given to the William Street Mission, so heartily entered upon a year ago, and the expense of which has been met chiefly by special subscriptions and donations, no one can grudge. Inside windows for the Sunday School Room were an absolute necessity for the health, not to speak of the comfort, of our children during the cold winter months. These are the chief unusual items, and need no defence; yet notwithstanding all these, there is a larger available balance than usual to transfer to the Building Fund.

This meeting will be asked to decide whether renewed subscriptions for the further reduction of debt on the Building should be called for this year, or not. The funded debt is now \$16,000, the interest upon which at present rates amounts to \$1,040 per annum. The Managers would like to see the debt reduced to \$15,000 this year, and they recommend that four quarterly collections, duly announced from the pulpit, be taken up for that purpose. They hope that this will attain the same end as a subscription list, and at the same time be less burdensome by being more equally distributed over the whole membership.

It has also been suggested, and it will be for this meeting to decide, whether the William Street Mission should not in future be supported from our ordinary funds, instead of by special subscriptions. This would call for about \$400 annually, besides what is raised in the Mission itself. If this course is decided upon, our needs for 1887 (not including the special quarterly collections for reduction of debt) will be, approximately, as follows:

This is about \$150 more than the income from Weekly Offerings in 1886, and will require an average weekly income of \$90, which amount, considering the large increase of membership, should not be difficult to obtain. The number of members at present contributing is nearly 200, who give sums varying from 10 cents to \$2 each, weekly, and the Managers are convinced that many of these could increase their offerings with very little effort, and thus produce the required amount.

Your Treasurer begs to report that during the year 1886 he paid off the sum of \$565, being the balance of the third Mortgage against the Church property. This was the only part of the principal debt he was able to discharge. In the year 1885 he was able to pay the sum of \$942.18 on account of Church debt, exclusive of interest. At the commencement of that year he had a balance on hand of \$338.97, to apply on the payment of \$187.50 for interest due on the 25th January, 1886. At the commencement of this year, 1887, he has

a balance on hand of \$466.36. During the year 1885, there was paid him on account of Building Fund Subscriptions, a sum of \$1,194.10. In the year 1886, there has been paid him on account of Building Fund Subscriptions, the sum of \$987.94.

We have been hitherto paying 8 per cent. interest upon a mortgage of \$1,000, which was third in point of priority. The second mortgage having been discharged, the third has now become the second, and it having become due, arrangements have been made to extend it for a year, at 6½% interest. Your Treasurer would recommend that a scheme should be set on foot to secure the payment of this \$1,000 mortgage during the present year. Your Treasurer would add, that out of the sum subscribed two and a-half years ago, there remains unpaid arrears of \$482.52.

Several boys, feeling the need of more time for Bible study, met in the vestry with their Sabbath School teacher, on the last Saturday of September, and formed into a society for the systematic study of the Bible, agreeing to meet every Friday evening, and to devote the first Friday in each month to foreign missions. They took for their motto "Boys for Christ," and as a rule for their guidance our Saviour's words, "Search the Scriptures," with the one condition of membership, that each consents to take whatever part the leader of the meeting asks of him. In all, twenty-two have joined what is now termed the Boys' Own Missionary Society, of whom more than half are decided Christians, and have agreed every day at noon to pray for a blessing on the Society, and especially for the unconverted members. They have subscribed for a monthly missionary paper, and take up a collection once a month for foreign missions. We would say to all the boys in Erskine Church over twelve years of age, "Come thou with us and we will do thee good."

Another year has passed swiftly over our heads and we stand as it were on a narrow bridge connecting '86 with '87. We look back with thankfulness for what God has permitted us to do, with sadness and regret upon failure in

duty and wasted opportunities, while, filled with hope and zeal, we look forward with gratitude that we are permitted to enter upon another term of service for our Master.

During the past year we took a step upward; we turned our attention from the carpets, cushions and organ of our church, to the spiritual welfare of our less privileged brothers and sisters belonging to the William St. Mission. There is plenty of this work for us all to do, and if we wish to be awake or even live Christians, we must all work, carrying out our Saviour's injunction, to "begin at Jerusalem." But we must not stay there, or we shall merit the reproof, "This ought ye to have done, and not left the other undone."

As a proof that the interest in this Mission was quite general, it may be stated that the money thus given was mostly raised by mite boxes obtained for that purpose. We have only had six meetings during the year, as we have given place to a W. F. M. Auxiliary, although practically we exist for the purpose of continuing our pecuniary assistance to the William St. Mission.

Our Society will not be complete till every woman in the Church feels she has a work to do in it, giving either of her means or time, or both, to benefit this home mission, remembering that "he which converteth a sinner from the error of his ways shall save a soul from death and shall cover a multitude of sins," and our Saviour's own words, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto me."

It is with feelings of hearty congratulation that your Secretary submits the Ninth Annual Report. In compiling a summary of the occurrences of our meetings, we can but note with feelings of pleasure that our Father in Heaven has been kind to us. That the year has been marked with progress in many

ways, mentally, religiously, socially, and also financially and numerically. While, as an Association, we have been endeavoring to further the interests of the Society and the Church with which we are connected, we have not been unmindful of others. A grant of \$50 to the William Street Mission and a similar donation of \$30 to the Sabbath School, are tangible evidence of the interest your Society takes in these laudable objects. With sincere thanks to the officers and members who have so kindly aided me in the discharge of my duties, and presaging a most successful season for 1886 and '87, with God's blessing.

In submitting a report of the William Street Mission for the year ending 31st of December, 1886, we have reason for profound gratitude to God for the measure of success which has crowned the efforts put forth, and for the general interest which has been created on behalf of a class heretofore comparatively unknown to us as a congregation. We have practical mission work at our door; the cry which came from Macedonia, to "come over and help," rings in our ears, and it behooves us to accept the commission laid down by our Master, and preach the Gospel to every creature. Though the field is in a sense limited, the population being largely Roman Catholic, yet the necessity for such a mission must be apparent to the most casual observer. great evil we have to contend with, and until this hindrance can be removed, there is little hope of reaching the people's hearts. So far we have been honored and blessed in the work, and a measure of success may fairly be claimed, which should encourage us to be more energetic and more in earnest.

There are five meetings being held weekly, viz., the Sabbath evening service, Prayer meeting Thursday evening, the Band of Hope Friday evening, Mothers' meeting Friday afternoon, and the Sabbath School on Sabbath afternoon. The Sabbath evening service, when we took charge, numbered about 30, now runs from 60 to 75 each evening; the Sabbath School, which started with 27, has now 104 on the roll, and has averaged for the last three months 60 scholars; the Band of Hope runs from 60 to 90, while the Prayer meeting and Mothers' meeting have not only increased in number, but have proved healthful and helpful to many. Numbers however prove but little, and were it not that the spiritual life had been touched and quickened, it would mean but little. But we have this assurance, that the practical and Christian sympathy which has been exercised by many of this congregation (notably the Ladies), and the earnest efforts of Mr. Nicol, who has labored so assiduously for its success, have had their effect, and not only have the workers received a blessing, but they have communicated blessing to others. Upwards of a dozen names are enrolled as members of this Church, who date their new birth from the Mission; they join us hand in hand in Christian work, and in our warfare against the opposing hosts of evil will prove faithful soldiers.

The financial report will be submitted by Mr. Gregg, our efficient Treasurer, and it must be gratifying to observe, that of the large outlay necessary in assuming the Mission, every claim has been promptly and honorably met. For this state of affairs, special thanks are due those who aided by subscription, the Managers, Ladies' Aid, Mr. Blackley's Bible Class, and the Young People's Association.

The Mission itself has contributed \$150 towards its support, a sum creditable indeed. A move has been made by the Young People's Association to hand over the entire Tract distributing work to Mission workers. While a very great deal of this work has been accomplished by those who have rendered valuable services to the Mission, yet it has been done unofficially, and if this step be deemed advisable, it will be necessary for steps to be taken to this end.

In connection with the William Street Mission work there is a branch which is considered by many a very important one,—this is the “Mothers’ Meeting.” The design is to meet the mothers of the district every Friday afternoon from 3 to 5. The meeting is opened with a Bible reading and exposition, singing and prayer, thus occupying three-quarters of an hour. Then the sewing is handed round, and one of the workers reads an interesting article, it may be a story of a religious and temperance character, or some simple essay or sermon. The women thus unconsciously imbibe good thoughts, and the pleasing variety of our meetings, we trust, brightens what in some cases among them are dreary lives. The great aim at the same time is to invite their confidence, and make them feel that we are anxious for their spiritual and temporal prosperity, and that they may always depend on us for advice and counsel when desired.

At 5 o’clock we pass to each a cup of tea and a piece of cake, thus endeavoring to follow—although afar off—in the footsteps of our Saviour, who, in feeding the soul, did not neglect to feed the body also. No one has engaged in this work without feeling her own spiritual life strengthened, thus exemplifying the promise, that in watering others, our own souls will be refreshed.

Our finances at the beginning of the year amounted to \$11, of which \$5.50 was expended in flannel, and the remaining \$5.50 we held as a reserve for an emergency. The emergency occurred in the form of the Christmas tree, and our reserve having been increased by a donation, we presented seventeen women with Christmas gifts. Our average attendance is eleven.

We buy flannel, cotton, yarn, etc., and the mothers according to their necessities, or rather according to the state of their finances, buy from us. Garments, if wished, are cut out for them and help is given in the sewing. \$50 have passed through our hands in this way during the year. We are very much indebted to the kindness of one of our church members, who gives us these materials at reduced rates. We also distribute any cast-off clothing we may receive to the most needy, in many cases thus enabling the children to attend the Sabbath School. Will friends kindly remember the Mission when they have any cast-off clothing?

The aim of this organization is principally the advancement of young men in spiritual life, and looking after strangers who may visit the Church from time to time. Mission work will be actively engaged in. It is gratifying to note the interest taken by all the young men in the work, and the Elders have cordially associated themselves with the society. Meetings are held every fortnight in the Lecture Room.

## The Young Men's Bible Class.

The interest in this Class continues to increase and the average attendance is remarkable, considering the many inducements held out to young men on Sabbath afternoons. The number on the roll is 45 and the average attendance 30. During the past year 8 have resigned, to take up Christian work : one has taken a class in our Sabbath School, and three have joined other churches in the city and are teaching in Sabbath Schools ; four have left for the country and are engaged in Sabbath School work, and interesting letters have been received from them, expressing their thankfulness to God for guiding them to the Class.

A deep interest is manifested by the young men, and a great many take an active part in the Class. During the past year over twenty have accepted Christ as a personal Saviour, and these are all true and faithful to their trust. This is the most encouraging part, and great things may be expected from our young men ; many of them take part in the various meetings and show encouraging signs of Christian development.
