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

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

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Rules of the Association.

I. That the Association be called the DOMINION OF CANADA ARTILLERY Association, and have for its object the development of gunnery skill, and the dissemination of Artillery knowledge throughout the Dominion of Canada.

2. That the annual subscription for individual members be *two dollars*, which will give the right of voting at any regular organized meeting, other than a meeting of Council. The donor of *twenty dollars* in cash, at any one time, or a prize of not less value than *forty dollars*, to be competed for at a general prize meeting, may be elected a life member.

3. That any Canadian Artillery or Engineer Corps, the Royal Military College Cadets, and the Artillery detachment of the North-West Mounted Police Force, subscribing not less than *ten dollars* per Field and *six dollars* per Garrison Battery, per annum, may become affiliated to this Association, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships in the proportion of one for each two dollars thus subscribed, the officers of each subscribing battery to select from amongst themselves the person to hold such memberships and return their names and addresses, when selected, to the Secretary, to be registered by him previous to the Annual General meeting.

4. The affairs of the Association to be managed by a Council to consist of *ex officio* members and such others as may be elected annually at a General Meeting. The Hon. the Minister of Militia and Defence; The Deputy Minister of Militia and Defence; The Major General Commanding; The Adjutant General; The Inspector and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery; The Deputy Adjutant Generals of Districts and Brigade Majors; All Officers Commanding and Regimental Field Officers of Artillery Brigades; Officers Commanding Affiliated Batteries and Engineer Corps; The Director of Stores; The Commandant and Professors (being officers), Royal Military College; Military Secretary to the Governor General and President Dominion Rifle Association, shall, if members of the Dominion Artillery Association, be *exofficio* members of Council. The Secretary and Treasurer shall likewise be *exofficio*, a member of the Council.

5. The Governor of the Dominion and the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces shall be respectfully requested to become Patron and Vice Patrons, respectively, of the Association; and at any General Meeting of the Association other names may be added to the list of Vice-Patrons.

6. A General Meeting of the Association shall be held annually, on the third Thursday after the meeting of Parliament, to receive the Annual Report of the Secretary and Treasurer, and to transact general business. No alteration of the Rules of the Association shall be made, excepting at such meeting, twenty-one days notice of any motion involving such alteration shall be given in writing, by the member intending to propose it at the General Meeting, to the Secretary, who shall forward it immediately to every member of the Association.

7. The office-bearers shall consist of a President and four Vice-Presidents of the Association, to be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, and a President and four Vice-Presidents of Council and a Secretary-Treasurer to be elected annually at the first meeting of Council next after the Annual General Meeting. The Council shall have power to fill up vacancies occurring subsequently. That there be also an Executive Committee to consist of the Inspector and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery with two officers to be elected by the Council from among its members at the first Meeting of Council after the Annual General Meeting, of which the Inspector of Artillery shall be chairman, to the charge of which committee shall be intrusted all technical artillery matters and carrying out of annual competitions, appointment of umpires and the arrangement of details in connection therewith, three to form a quorum. The members of the Executive Committee to be eligible to any office and to report to the Council. (See Rule 21.)

8. At all General Meetings of the Association the chair shall be taken by the President, in his absence by the senior Vice-President present, and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents by the President of Council, and so on.

9. At all Meetings of Council, five shall form a quorum, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority, and the chairman shall have a casting vote when the members are equal.

10. Ordinary Meetings of Council shall be held on the day previous to, and immediately after the Annual General Meeting.

The Minutes of all Meetings of Council shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary, and open to the inspection of any member of Council.

11. Extraordinary Meetings of Council shall be summoned by the Secretary when required by the President of Council, at such places as the President may direct, either at his own discretion, or upon the request, in writing, of six members of Council, of at least three different Corps, duly entitled to vote at such Meeting, one of whom shall be a Vice-President, notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fourteen days previous to such meeting, and the requisition for the meeting and the notices to the members must state the object, or objects, of such meetings, Members of Council shall be permitted to send a written vote to the Secretary upon subjects to be discussed at such meetings. 12. All subscriptions, other than through affiliation, to the Association shall become due on or before the 1st May for the current Association year, and the Treasurer shall be required to deposit all sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Association, in a Savings' Bank.

13. Two auditors shall be appointed annually to examine the Treasurer's accounts previous to the Annual Meeting.

14. The payment of money for current expenses must be authorized by the President of Council or in his absence by one of the Vice-Presidents, other payments to be made only on authority of Council.

15. The Council shall have the power of establishing such competitions as they may deem advisable. All technical details to be referred to the Executive Committee.

16. An annual report from the Secretary and Treasurer to be submitted to the Council before publication. The Council shall also make a report of the proceedings of the year to the General Association Meeting.

17. All competitions to be closed by the 31st December of each year, and all returns thereof, with list of men entitled to badges, must be sent to the Secretary by the 15th January ensuing the year for which the claim is made.

18. That members of Council, not being life members, must pay the annual subscription to remain as such.

19. That any Commanding Officer of a corps, being a member of Council, unable to attend any meeting of the same, may nominate in writing, an officer of his own command to attend in his stead, and upon such officer delivering to the Secretary such nomination, he shall be entitled to speak and vote at such Meeting of Council, but any motion made or seconded by him shall be made by him in the name of the member of Council for whom he acts.

20. Whenever an Artillery Association is formed for any of the Provinces of the Dominion, such Association shall be entitled to affiliate with this Association on payment annually of \$2.50 for each battery comprising such Provincial Association.

21. The Provincial Association shall, in addition to its Council membership, be entitled to be represented on the Executive Committee of this Association, in matters connected with the Province, by one of the existing members of Council.

22. All Provincial competitions, other than those which already are, or may be established by this Association, shall be subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of this Association, but shall be arranged for, adjudged and prizes awarded by the Council of the Provincial Association.

23. The Secretary of this Association shall be required to furnish such information from the records of the Dominion Association as may be required for the distribution of additional Provincial prizes.

Report of the Council.

The Council herewith presents the reports of the Executive Committee and of the Secretary Treasurer, with the accounts duly audited for the year 1888.

It is a matter of congratulation that while the number of batteries which have joined the Association during the past year remains the same as for 1887, the number of competitors has increased by about $20^{\circ}/_{\circ}$ and the prize list $15^{\circ}/_{\circ}$ exclusive of the prizes presented by His Excellency the Governor General for efficiency.

While there has been much improvement in former years, the Council are of opinion, that it would be to the advantage of the force generally if it could be arranged to have a central competition, say at Quebec, or some more convenient point, for not less than two officers and eight or ten men from each Field Battery, when they could all fire over the same range and under the same conditions, being satisfied that such a competition would be the means of much improvement in drill, discipline and practice.

The Council would suggest that a deputation be appointed to wait on the Major General Commanding and request him to recommend the issue of a suit of canvas clothing to the gunners and drivers of Field Batteries for wear while cleaning guns, harness, grooming, etc.

The Council would strongly recommend that the Department of Militia and Defence be asked to increase the time allowed Non-Com. Officers and Gunners of Field Batteries by say (4) four days for preliminary drill before going into camp, to be devoted to gun drill, foot drill, aiming drill, position and duties, lectures on ammunition, etc., thus allowing the whole of the time in camp to be employed in field movements, taking up positions, obtaining some tactical knowledge, performance of camp duties and details and other necessary work, much of which is now left undone for want of time.

The Council would again press upon the Artillery in the different Provinces the advisability of their forming Provincial Associations.

By united action and help alone can further success of the Association be assured, it is hoped therefore that the Commanding Officer of each Battery will urge his subalterns to become members of the Association.

The Association is still under many obligations to the Inspector and the assistant Inspectors of artillery and the Officers of "A" and "B" Batteries R. C. A., for their continued kindness in carrying out their arduous duties as umpires, Range Officers, etc.; and also to Major Lindsay, Quebec Field Battery, for his services as Camp Quarter Master and Transport Officer at the competition at Island of Orleans, Quebec.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, 1888.

FIELD BATTERY PRACTICE.

A radical change has been effected this year in the system of scoring, the alterations being made with the view of adapting the scoring limits to the known rectangle of error of the 9-pr. gun. Thus for example, it having been determined by experiment that, if properly laid, at a range of 1,500 yards, all the shots will fall within a rectangle of about 200 feet by 25 feet, and 50 per cent. within a rectangle of 80 feet by 10 feet, the limit of 80 feet by 8 feet (the width of the target), has been fixed as that for which full marks for elevation and direction will be given, &c. The main differences between this system of scoring and that which has been in use formerly are as follows, viz : Range above 1,000 yards.

- a. Common shell effective rectangle, increased from 26 ft. x 320 ft. to 26 ft. x 360 ft.
- b. Target 8 ft. x 6 ft. instead of 6 ft. x 6 ft.
- c. Value of direct hit reduced from 6 to 2 points.
- d. Points for Shrapnel fuze eliminated-also points for ricochet.
- e. Blind Shrapnel to count half instead of whole marks as for common shell.

Scott's Sights — Owing to the inability of the Department of Militia to supply more than two additional sights, and it having been shewn that their efficiency depends in a great measure upon previous instruction and practice in their use, it was decided not to employ them this year for other than "A" and "B" Batteries, Canadian Artillery Regiment and the Royal Military College, to whom they have been issued.

The annual gun practice of the Ontario Field Batteries was carried out at three ranges—Niagara, Gananoque and Toronto—and with the exception of the three Batteries which sent detachments to the latter, was performed during annual drill, and, in so far as regards the arrangements at the firing point, much more nearly under service conditions, than could possibly be attained by the assembly of the competitors only.

A similar plan was adopted in the case of the Newcastle and Woodstock Batteries during their annual drill at local headquarters, but the Quebec and Montreal Batteries, in common with those at Stratford Camp, were obliged to send detachments only to subsequent practice, in consequence of their being no artillery range in the vicinity of their camps. As a consequence of the above arrangements for practice during camps, many important lessons with regard to "Fire Discipline," have been, it is hoped, brought forcibly to the notice of those concerned. Amongst the defects noticed in a greater or less degree may be mentioned the following, viz :—

- a. Want of promptiude and celerity in bringing the Batteries into position and action.
- b. Confusion and delay in the supply of ammunition to each gun from its own limber.
- c. Want of careful observation as to the effects of fire, and consequent necessary corrections, on the part of commanding and divisional officers, both during instructional and competitive practice.

Although not necessarily consequent upon this system of annual practice the Committee have strongly in view the necessity of more thorough preliminary practice and instruction in laying guns, and, for this purpose, recommend that instructional targets be provided by the Association, and issued to each Battery for use during voluntary drills, and in accordance with instructions to be subsequently promulgated.

The practical difficulties attendant upon the necessarily partial adoption of this system of carrying out practice during annual drill, and the impossibility of so obtaining an accurate comparison of the marksmanship of each Battery, owing to the differences in range, etc., etc., together with the very limited time which can under existing regulations be actually devoted to instruction, render the continuous adoption of this system practically undesirable, and the Committee suggest for consideration the advisability of dividing the Annual Practice into two stages, viz., instructional practice for Battery competition only, for those Batteries which have the advantage of a suitable range in the vicinity of their camp of instruction; and a general competition at one central range (Quebec), for not more than two officers and eight selected non-commissioned officers or gunners from each Battery.

The former practice would include coming into action under service conditions; actual range finding by common shell fire by each sub-division and instructional practice with Shrapnel, and would not necessarily require the use of banrols; the competitive practice would be as at present conducted, each detachment, however, having to prepare its own ammunition.

This scheme presents some difficulties in consequence of there being certain Batteries which cannot perform their practice at the places to which they are allotted for drill, and should it, therefore, not be deemed advisable to carry out the practice in this way it will be better to concentrate all the marksmen of the batteries at a central point for the performance of practice.

The competition for the Gzowski cup was well and closely contested, the distances between the several pickets were increased by ten yards, and as so arranged, the competition appears to be quite satisfactory.

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GARRISON ARTILLERY PRACTICE.

The practice at local head quarters was confined to three Batteries of the Halifax Bde. and two of the New Brunswick Bde. The rules for marking at sea ranges have been considerably modified, an increased effective limit being given for Shrapnel shell. The value of a direct hit reduced and values for fuze and ricochet eliminated.

The meeting for gun practice and shifting ordnance at the Island of Orleans, Quebec, was attended by representative detachments from twenty-two Batteries and 32 officers—a military camp was formed at the Island and the practice conducted with great regularity—the shooting generally was very good, and the necessity for most careful preliminary instruction in laying, and subsequent corrections to counteract the variable forces acting on the projectile, was so forcibly illustrated by actual results, as to render the practice most instructive.

The number of actual competitors was reduced from seven to four with each nature of gun, firing each five rounds from the 64-pr. R.M.L., and four from the 40-pr. R.B. L,

Owing to frequent delays in the 40-pr. practice, caused by jamming of the tin cups, and other causes incidental to the construction of this gun, the time limit was not enforced in this case, but with both guns marks were forfeited for mistakes at drill, happily not very frequent.

As very considerable delay was again caused by the impossibility of replacing the targets at certain stages of tide, the Committee are of opinion that in future the targets should consist of large barrels securely moored, and that arrangements should be made in each marker's butt, by which the necessity for the actual replacement of the banrols may be almost entirely obviated.

The arrangements made by the Executive Committee for the general conduct of the meeting, were ably seconded by the officers, non-commissioned officers and men detailed by the Commandant, R. S. A., Quebec, as working parties, &c., and special recognition is due to the very valuable services rendered by Major Lindsay, Quebec Field Battery, as Camp Quartermaster and Transport Officer.

The Committee also desire to express their acknowledgments to the Militia Store Department for the promptitude and regularity with which all the ammunition and camp stores, &c., were delivered at the practice ground at Quebec and elsewhere.

SHIFTING ORDNANCE COMPETITION.

This competition was limited to detachments present at the Quebec meeting and was very well and closely contested by detachments from the Halifax, Montreal, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick Brigades. The A shift was so arranged as to involve only the simplest movements, combined with the accurate performance of an operation detailed in the Manual of Artillery Exercises. The "Go-as-you-please," or B shift competition was exactly the reverse operation to the A shift, and in both, the victory was gained rather by the skilful adaptation of means to the end in view than by any exercise of superior physical strength.

GENERAL EFFICENCY COMPETITION.

The Committee having decided that the farewell gift of \$75.00 to the Association made by Lord Lansdowne, should with \$25.00 added money, be devoted to the purchase of two silver cups, to be held annually by the Field and Garrison Batteries obtaining the second places in this competition, have subsequently decided that these trophies should be supplemented by a cash prize of \$25.00 to these Batteries, with which amount it is hoped some permanent memento of the event may be obtained.

With reference to the varying conditions under which the gun practice was necessarily held, the following protest with the reply sent thereto is submitted for information of Council.

THE GUN SHEDS, Hamilton, Oct., 31st, 1888.

SIR,—I have the honor to advise you that I am instructed by Major Van Wagner, commanding the Hamilton Field Battery, to enter a protest to the effect that the scores of the Batteries which fired at Toronto be not allowed for on the aggregate marks in the competition for the General Efficiency prize. This protest is made on the ground that the regulations laid down by the Inspector of Artillery were not complied with, and especially on the ground that the Batteries which fired at Toronto made use of range telephones which were not allowed at the firing on other ranges.

It is not clear that any advantage, whatever, was obtained by the Batteries practicing at Toronto through the aid of telephonic communication, over that received by those at Niagara and other places through the use of flags. Higher aggregate scores than those made at Toronto were made by Batteries firing without the aid of telephones, notably the Gananoque and Winnipeg, the former firing at a range of 2,200 yards. On the other hand the London Battery score at Toronto shows that low scores may be made under presumably the most favorable conditions. Moreover the Welland Canal Field Battery, firing man for man alternately with the Hamilton Field Battery, under exactly the same conditions, made 41 points more in the aggregate score. This difference would have given the latter eight points more for General Efficiency.

The regulations for practice were complied with by these batteries as far as it was possible to do so. The locality at which they were encamped for instruction did not afford the facilities necessary for actual compliance, nor was practice carried out by any set of Batteries, practicing at different localities, under exactly similar conditions, but so far, in each and every case, as in the opinion of the Umpire it was possible to do so.

The Committee do not, therefore, concur with the protest.

I may add that Lieut.-Col. Macdonald, as officer commanding the 1st Brigade, two of the Batteries concerned, declined to give an opinion.

SIR,—I have the honor, in accordance with Rule 16, to forward the Annual Report of the Secretary-Treasurer for the year 1888—the thirteenth of the Association.

The total number of competitors was 546, representing a force of over 2,500, exclusive of officers.

The total receipts for the year, from all sources, amounted to \$3,431.50, and the expenditure to \$2,840.89, of which \$1,047 was paid out in cash prizes, \$400in purchase of cups, badges, and other prizes (exclusive of those presented by His Excellency the Governor Generai for Efficiency), and \$613.50 as subsistence allowance to detachments. The accounts in detail, duly audited, showing a credit balance of \$916.59, will be found at end of Report.

There has been a considerable falling off in the list of Annual Subscribers. I have not dropped any of the names from the list of members of Council, as I believe the non-payment has been caused through misapprehension, the Ontario members supposing that their payments to the Provincial covered membership fees with the Dominion Association. Instructions on this point are requested for future guidance.

His Excellency Lord Stanley of Preston, Governor-General, graciously consented to accept the office of Patron of the Association and generously notified his intention of continuing the prizes donated by his predecessors, the Marquis of Lorne and the Marquis of Lansdowne, during their tenure of office. An address, expressing the thanks and appreciation of this Association for the constant support and deep interest so frequently evinced in its welfare, was presented to His Excellency the Marquis of Lansdowne at Quebec, previous to his departure for England. Rules for Practice.

I. Competition limited to 16 N. C. Officers and Men from each Field, and 8 from each Garrison Battery.

2. At the discretion of the Officer superintending the Practice, two trial shots, common shell with percussion fuze, or solid shot, may be allowed at the commencement of each Battery competition, or when two or more Batteries are firing together, or when target has been moved to a different locality during a competition.—Trial shots to be laid by the umpire, on the target, without any deflection and the results signalled.

3. Before commencing, guns to be in action, time fuzes not bored, percussion fuzes may be screwed in, detachment in post at the guns or under cover.

4. Each competitor to prepare and fix his own time fuzes, and to lay his gun without verbal assistance except from the officer in command, who may advise the competitor as to length of fuze, elevation, deflection. &c., but who must not look over or correct the laying of the gun.

5. Lots to be drawn for the order of competitive firing, and not divulged until the competitor is called out by the umpire.

6. The Range Officer is alone responsible for points given for elevation. No appeal.

7. The danger flag will be *hoisted* and "cease firing" sounded by the Range Officer when it is necessary to visit the target. When these signals are *repeated* from the Battery and the firing flag lowered, he can visit the target, lowering the danger flag and sounding "commence firing" when he has returned to a place of safety.

8. The Officer in charge of the marking at the Battery is alone responsible for points given for direction. No appeal.

9. On all other matters the decision of the Officer superintending the practice is final. No appeal.

10. Each competitor may be told the points given for direction and may also select one of his Battery to judge the effects of his shot and inform him of it, but such assistant must not take up any position in front of that occupied by the guns. 11. Ties *a.* 1 *b.* 0 Tie: *a.* 7 *b.* 1 *c.* 0

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



Umpire's Report.

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From Major R. A. Rigg, R. A.

R. M. COLLEGE, 22nd October, 1888.

TO OFFICER COMDG. REG. C. A.

SIR,—I have the honor to make the following report of the "Shifting Ordnance Competition," between "A" and "B" Batteries, R. C. A., at which I acted as Umpire, agreeably to a request made through Col. Cotton, R. C. A.:—

Both teams did the work exceedingly well and in strict accordance with the conditions of the competition. "A" Battery performed the shift at twelve o'clock on the 13th inst., on the Barrack Square at Kingston, in six minutes forty-eight and one-fifth seconds, (6' 48 &'') "B" Battery performed the shift at eleven o'clock, on the Barrack Square at Quebec, on the 15th inst., in six minutes twenty-two and two-fifth seconds, (6' 22 &''), without counting a penalty of 3" inflicted for a man returning for a store without passing through the barrier.

Both teams lost some time in lowering the gun into the trunnion holes. "A" Battery from the gun slipping back after being in good position; "B" Battery from the gun being parbuckled too far and being too far back. The only difference in the methods employed was in mounting, when "A" Battery slewed the carriage on the platform and then moved it into line of fire, whereas "B" Battery parbuckled the gun on to the carriage in its final position.

I may remark the two following points in the conditions :---

Ist. The imaginary platform at Kingston had the hurter in line with the front wall of the passage, whereas at Quebec the centre of the platform was in line with the centre of the passage.

2nd. The state of the ground at Kingston was very unfavorable and soft, the rollers barely rolling, while at Quebec the ground was by nature firm and hard.

Garrison Batteries.

Two competitions, "A" and "B" were carried out on the Island of Orleans, during the general firing competition for garrison batteries, in the month of September. Four detachments entered--one each from the following brigades : Montreal, New Brunswick, Halifax and P. E. Island.

Competition A.

Conditions: Open to one Officer or N. C. Officer as No. 1, and 18 N. C. Officers or Gunners, selected from competing detachments of brigades. Independent Batteries wishing to enter for this competition will be required to include their firing detachment in that for Shifting Ordnance, but no camp allowance can be paid to other than the firing detachments.

RULES: A 32-pounder 58 cwt. Gun on the ground, about 15 yards from the platform, to be mounted on a garrison standing carriage on the latter by parbuckling over the side, gun and carriage to be left in line of fire, run back, stores clear of platform.

The operation of mounting must be conducted in strict accordance with the Manual.

Stores as detailed in Manual, parbuckling, page 669. From two to five seconds may be added to the time, at the discretion of the umpire, for each mistake at drill or other irregularity.

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Umpire's decision to be final.

Prizes will be awarded to the detachments performing the above operations in the shortest total time.

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Competition B.

Was the reverse of the foregoing. Same detachment dismounted the gun and placed it in the same position from which it was originally taken for competittion A. Operation of dismounting and transporting, "Go as you please."

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
