SUBMARINE TRIALS

Submarine Boats Lake and Octopus Put Through Their Paces Yesterday.

NEWPORT, R. I., May 23—The torpedo tests of the submarine Lake were the most interesting features of the official tests of the submarine Lake were the most interesting features of the official competitive trials under government auspices yesterday. Two boats anchored 300 yards apart, represented a battleship target, the range being 800 yards. The first shot fired left the starboard tube all right, but, in naval parlance, the torpedo did not function. The second shot fired from the port tube, was a complete success, the torpedo hitting the line squarely between the two anchored boats. Then the Lake started to turn in order to fire a torpedo from the stern tube, but the torpedo was discharged prematurely and made only a short run through the water. All these torpedoes were later picked up, but there was no-reloading on board. In addition to the torpedo trials, the Lake executed some manoeuvres at a depth of ten feet, completing a circle in three minutes and thirty-five seconds.

The trial board had intended to have a speed trial along the measured mile course by the Berger sub-service boat, but on account of the rough conditions outside this test had to be postponed.



India is never quite free of the plague. Ivery year it carries off the natives by housands. In some years it is more vir-India is never quite free of the plague. Every year it carries off the natives by thousands. In some years it is more virulently epidemic than in others, and, in certain places regarded as holy, it is always present. The city of Benares, whither pilgrims in vast numbers travel from all parts of India at appointed periods, is a great plague centre. The government has done everything possible in the way of sanitation, but as many of the pilgrims are suffering from disease and go to the shrines with the hope of cure, they spread the plague by contagion, in spite of precautions, hampered as they are by native prejudices and sensitiveness to interference by authorities of a foreign race and religion. Strange as it may seem, the very beneficence of British rule tends to the creation of conditions which produce and extend the ravages of the plague. The masses in the enjoyment of peace and security multiply at an extraordinary rate and, though it takes little in the way of food to support them, population is always pressing on the means of subsistence. With almost mathematical regularity, periods of scarcity occur; even the few handfuls of rice fall short, then comes famine followed by the plague. Government returns, quoted in the depatches, give an idea of how fearful the plague in India is. For the six weeks ending May 11, the number of deaths reached the appalling total of 451,892. In the Punjab alone, from which reports have lately come of political unrest and rioting, 286,777 deaths occurred. One would think that people so terribly afficted would have enough to occupy them and give practical scope to their energies without indulging in political agitation. It may be, however, that they regard the ravages of disetase with Oriental fatal ism, though, like people supposed to be more enlightened, they probably blame the government for everything that goes wrong with them.




