THE FIRST SESSION of the MANITOBA CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church was opened in the Methodist Church, Brandon, on Thursday, June 12th, 1884, at 2 o'clock p.m.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE REPORT.

Your Committee find that there are 3,006 rateable members within the bounds of this Conference, which, at 30 cents per member, would produce \$901.80, and as there are 83 claimants, \$10.86 would be the amount due each claimant. In view of this state of affairs the following resolution was passed:—

That whereas the small sum of \$10, or perhaps even less, per claimant only can be secured by imposing an assessment of 30 cents per member; and whereas so much difference of opinion exists as to the finding of an equitable basis of assessment: therefore resolved that this Committee recommend the Conference that for the ensuing year each claimant shall receive one cent, and that this amount be raid by the Children's Fund Committee.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We find, in viewing the Reports, that the increase in the number of Schools furnishes ground for gratitude, fifteen having been reported over the number of last year.

The army of workers, officers and teachers has been increased from 263 to 355, and there has also been a very gratifying increase of 390 in the number of scholars.

We have in all 63 schools, 355 officers and teachers, and 2,900 scholars. We would also point out another pleasing feature of our Report, and that is the very large number of conversions during the year, 141 being reported

We rejoice in the fact that the subject of temperance receives so much attention. Over 200 total abstinence pledges have been taken, and we would recommend that temperence pledges be circulated in all our schools.

We are sorry to find that our excellent Sunday-school publications are not more generally used, and would urge that efforts be made to have them introduced into all our schools.

We find, however, that on many missions having six or eight appointments, only one school is reported, and would therefore urge that the Ministers do all they possibly can to organize schools, as far as practicable, at every appointment, and that they give as much of their time as they can to Sunday-school work, by visiting the schools regularly, if possible,

once a quarter, reviewing the work done in the schools, giving encouragement and suggestions to both teachers and scholars in their noble work, and preaching, in their regular Sunday work, special sermons to the young.

2nd. We recommend that the Board of Wesley College, at Winnipeg, be requested to establish a Theological School at Winnipeg, to be opened on the first day of November next, and on that date in each following year, and to be closed on the fifteenth day of April, in each year, in order to enable the Conference to supply the means of education to the Probationers for the ministry within its bounds.

3rd. That the President of the Conference, Revs. J. Woodsworth and B. Franklin, and Mr. A. Monkman be appointed a Committee to prepare in detail a plan for submission to the Board of Wesley College for the commencement of Educational work in this Conference.

4th. That the Rev. B. Franklin be appointed Treasurer, and Mr. A. Monkman, Secretary of this Committee.

5th. That the following persons be appointed as the Examining Board: Revs. E. A. Stafford, M.A., LL.B., W. L. Rutledge, James Woodsworth, J. W. Bell, B.D., A. Stewart, B.D., J. F. Betts, B. Franklin, B.A., T. B. Beynon, B.A., Thomas Argue, T. E. Morden, B.A., and W. J. Hewitt.

6th. That the name of the Rev. W. H. Andrews be allowed to stand in connection with the Cobourg District of the Toronto Conference; and that the Revs. R. H. Craig, Daniel McGregor, D. S. Houck, George H. Long, and W. M. Buckler be allowed to go to the Theological School at Winnipeg, for its first term, in the event of its being established.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee having carefully considered the position of the Temperance question in the Province of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, beg leave to present the following Report:—

Your Commmittee desires to express its great gratification at the prospect of the submission of the Canada Temperance Act for popular vote simultaneously throughout the Province of Manitoba, where not already adopted, during the coming year.

Your Committee, realizing that when such contest comes there will be hard practical work to be done in order to reach a successful issue, earnestly recommends this Conference to adopt such measures as in its judgment may seem best, by which the whole force of the Methodist Church may be thrown forward unitedly in favor of the Act, and in direct support of the work of the Dominion Alliance, in securing prohibitory legislation and the carrying out of the same.

To this end your Committee respectfully recommends the following scheme:—

This Conference to organize immediately the Methodist Church Temperance Society of the Manitoba Conference, said organization to be in the following manner:—

The Conference to appoint a Standing Central Committee of ten members, ministers and laymen in equal numbers, who shall direct the action

of the Church in temperance work—the President of the Conference to be, ex-officio, one of this Committee.

The President of the Conference shall be Chairman of the Committee.

The Committee shall elect at its first meeting each year a Secretary-Treasurer.

PLEDGE.

The Committee shall provide pledge-books, to be forwarded to all the Superintendents of Circuits, Stations, and Missions for the obtaining of signatures.

The Conference to instruct all Superintendents to hold Gospel Temperance Meetings once per quarter at each preaching station appointment, if possible, at which meetings the pledge shall be circulated for signatures, and at one of which during the year a collection shall be taken for the funds of the Society.

The Committee shall prepare a schedule to be forwarded to all Superintendents to be filled up and returned to its Secretary, who shall make a complete return to the Statistical Committee of this Conference, said schedule to contain columns showing number of persons who have taken the pledge—members and non-members to be reported in separate columns—the number of appointments, number of meetings held, and amount raised for the funds of the Society.

The Central Committee shall make arrangements for the Annual Conference Temperance Meeting, at which meeting the Secretary of the Committee shall present a full report of the work of the Society during the year.

On the nomination of the Central Committee, the Conference shall appoint two of its members, a minister and a layman, to represent it on the Executive of the Manitoba Branch of the Dominion Alliance.

Your Committee desire to record their strong conviction of the excellences of the "North-West Territories Act," and of the advantages accruing to the people wherever it has been enforced; and that even where it has been only partially enforced, the benefits have been incalculable. But it is a matter of very deep regret that the present system has been greatly abused.

Your Committee therefore recommend the following course of action:

That this Conference appoint a Committee to wait on Lieutenant-Governor Dewdney and lay before him the facts of the case, at the same time praying him to enforce the Act in its spirit within his jurisdiction.

In case the abuse continues, that the Conference instruct the Central Committee to prepare an humble Address to the Governor-General in Council, setting forth the facts, and praying that steps be taken to secure the enforcement of the Act; and that the President of the Conference be instructed to sign such petition on behalf of the Conference.

We also recommend the following persons to wait on Lieutenant-Governor Dewdney: — Rev. W. J. Hewitt, John McDougall, John McLean, and Thomas W. Wright, Esq.; and that this Committee be instructed to report to the Conference Central Committee.

STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee desires to express devout gratitude to the Father of mercies for grace and health vouchsafed to the labourers on their various fields of toil, and for renewed tokens of Divine goodness in the removal of physical disability and the bestowal of intellectual and spiritual vigor. The retrospect of the past year is full of encouragement. The spiritual songs and sermons of the intrepid missionary have been heard on mountain, prairie, and vale. The sick have been visited, the children catechized, the ignorant instructed, and all kinds and classes guided toward a true development of the religious life. The influences and labours of noble womanhood have exerted an ennobling tendency resulting in true spiritual culture, manifested by increased devotion to home life, stronger attachments to religious services, and greatly enlarged congregations.

The intelligent piety, love of discipline, and holy enthusiasm that has filled the minds and hearts of the toilers in the sphere of religious thought and life, has resulted in such an organization, extension and development of our work as to ensure present stability and hope of future

The passing of the North-West Sabbath law has been productive of good results.

Your Committee deplores the prevalent scepticism existing relative to the success of our Indian work. Impartial and thorough investigation reveals abundant proofs of the progress of our mission work among the Indians. The demoralizing influences of the immoral white man have been especially injurious. Many of the Indian tribes are in the transition state, and nothing but the quickening power of the gospel is able to elevate and save them. It is impossible in one or two generations to secure such development as will enable them to occupy the same social and intellectual position as their favoured white brethren, but we have been successful in leading them to become pious and devoted Indians.

The communistic system of farming, adopted by the Government amongst the Indians, has failed in promoting that independence which is

a necessity in training a people. The influence of missionary labour is seen in the fact that the Government has considered the Stoney Indians sufficiently advanced to withdraw their regular supplies, causing them to rely upon personal toil for The McDougall Orphanage, though only partially equipped, is doing a noble work in caring for and educating Indian children. Small bands of Indians, destitute of religious instruction, are to be found adjoining some of our important missions. Lacking the time and talent necessary to engage in the work of imparting spiritual truths to these, we would earnestly urge that means be employed to secure voluntary lay agency in leading them to seek mental and social improvement and to trust in Christ as their Saviour and God. The depression of trade during the past year has had a tendency to throw over our work a gloomy aspect, but we hope that this will be overruled for good, in renewed consecration The abuse of the permit system and increased devotion to God and man has induced a disregard for morality.

Your Committee would draw attention to the dangers connected with

We cannot be too careful in guarding the morality of our young people, and to ensure such protection it is incumbent upon each Minister that the discipline be duly enforced. We would urge that the accustomed letters of removal be given to all our members on leaving, and that special attention be paid to the Methodist immigrant on his arrival on our fields of labor.

Your Committee would point out the necessity of spreading our denominational literature amongst our people. We rejoice in the enthusiasm manifested by our Church in educational matters.

The labours of the past year have been crowned with success, the present condition of our Church is full of promise, and the prospects of consecrated learning and enthusiasm, sanctified manhood and devotion to all our interests in the salvation of souls are bright and true.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

DEAR BRETHREN, -Assembled in our Annual Conference, enjoying the privilege of association with each other, after the labours and discouragements of another year, and favoured with the conscious presence of the Holy Spirit, our thoughts and sympathies turn toward you, the flock over whom the Chief Shepherd hath made us overseers. "Grace be unto you and peace from God the Father and from our Lord Jesus Christ." As you are aware, we are met together for the purpose of reviewing the work of the past year, and devising such plans as will enable us to prosecute that work more successfully during the year upon which we are now entering. The task before us is not an easy one, but in its accomplishment we rejoice that we have for the first time the sympathy and help of the lay brethren whom you have sent to join in our deliberations. We therefore gratefully acknowledge the hand of God in directing the union movement to a successful issue. God in His good providence has thus led us on to this point, so that, as a Church, we may be prepared to meet the demands of the present and the requirements of the future in this great North-West land.

Then, in Conference assembled, and with the presence of the great Head of the Church, we are reminded of our duty to read again our marching orders. Our Captain calls to us: "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth. Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We are reminded, too, of our duty to renew our inspiration in this campaign by catching the spirit of heroism from the great Apostle to the Gentiles, who, with Divine authority, calls back to us: "If any man have not the spirit of Christ he is none of his." We learn what that means from the Son of Man, who declared that He "came not to be ministered unto but to minister, and give His life a ransom for many."

Now, dear brethren, suffer us to lay before you a few thoughts in relation to the great duties that lie before us as a Church, in this new land, at this hour.

We commend to your hearty sympathy and support the missionary work of the Church. Let us first weigh well the argument of Paul, who realizes that the world needs Christ, and says, "Whosover shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How, then, shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?" Brethren, it is ours to study events, that we may see the hand of God therein, and learn whither He would have us go and what He would have us do. We honour God as much by trusting His providence as by trusting His words. We have been praying Him that He would unite and rally the forces of Methodism,

in order that we might be enabled to establish the means of grace in every civilized settlement, and amongst every pagan tribe throughout all this great North-West. He has heard—He has answered our prayers—Methodism is united—her forces are rallied—her men are ready to go forth, but "how can they preach except they be sent?"

In God's government opportunity always implies obligation. He never opens a door that he does not expect us to enter. In a critical period of national life a door opens, and some Oliver Cromwell or Abraham Lincoln, not distinguished above his fellows, steps forward into the breach. Events rally to his support. His boldness kindles the enthusiasm of his followers, and thus he steps up into everlasting dominion. If we enter not those doors as they open before us, what may we expect but confusion and disaster?

We look at our present position as a Church, occupying as it does the foremost place in this great Dominion. We begin to recount the labours, the sacrifices, the discouragements, the privations, that were necessary to make our beloved Methodism what it is to-day. As we do so, there comes to our mind the solemn responsibility under which we are placed by God to provide for the declining years of those who, by reason of age or as a result of failing health, have been compelled to retire from the active duties of Circuit work. It is our duty, brethren, to smooth the pathway to the tomb of those venerable men who, by the toils of their prime, have made not only Methodism but Canada what they are to-day. The General Conference of your Church has devised a scheme for the sustaining of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund. It provides that "the principle of assessment shall be applied in an equitable manner to all the Circuits, in order so to augument the annual income of the Fund as to make it equal to the annual claims thereon. Each Circuit or Mission is required to raise its proportion of the amount requisite to pay the Superannuated Ministers and Ministers' Widows their full disciplinary claim." it is our desire that you aid us in carrying out these instructions.

We would affectionately urge upon your serious attention the religious interests of the children of all our families. Childhood is the fort that commands the future as regards the work of God in any Church or country. This fort we must take and hold at all cost. The means we would suggest for its attainment are—1. A proper conception of family life. Every household should have its altar of prayer, and every father should be priest in his own household. On the purity and simplicity of the family depend the stability of our whole social fabric. It is the model of government which God gave the world in the time of its infancy, and its character will most surely determined to the stability of the surely determined to the surely determined t

will most surely determine that of both the Church and the nation.

2. Gather the children into the Sunday schools. Let them there be faithfully instructed in the "principles of the doctrine of Christ." Provide the schools plentifully with the publications of your own Church. You cannot overestimate the influence of this work on the Church of the future. These little ones are to be the men and women of the Church of to-morrow. "When Bonaparte desolated Germany, the Hohenzollern family began the work of repair and revenge in the very cradles of Germany. Mothers bore and trained their sons for the army and glory of Germany." Thus the old Emperor lives to humiliate his great enemy, and

to bring back from Paris the sword of the great Frederick. What William did for Germany, you can do for Christ and Methodism.

Brethren, to you the character of the rising ministry is of vital importance. God puts no premium upon ignorance. The advanced learning of the times in which we live demands a broader and more comprehensive theological training than has been possible in the past. Our candidates and probationers are demanding from the Church this more complete preparation for their work. We regard it as the work of God upon their hearts and minds. We trust that whatever measures are taken for the commencement of theological training in this Conference will receive your hearty sympathy and support.

As a Conference, we view with satisfaction the movement that has been set on foot for the submission of the Scott Act in the various counties of the Province in which it has not been already carried; and would affectionately urge upon you the importance of going promptly to the polls at the appropriate time and recording your vote for the cause of temperance, which we believe to be the cause of God.

And now, dear brethren, we observe in closing that no educational requirements, no forms of religious culture, no accumulation of wealth can atone for the lack of deep personal piety. The attempt to carry on the work of God with any or with all these combined will prove but a miserable failure. We therefore call upon you to join with us, your pastors, in one act of entire, unreserved consecration to God. The command comes to us and you—and all God's commands are possibilities—
"Be ye perfect." Our devotion will always determine the measure of our success. "Be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord."
