

The former said that the war had become a test of endurance, paid a fine tribute to the splendid endurance and gallantry of the Russians, referred to Italy's steady and sure advance, expressed confidence in the outcome of the struggle at the Pardanelles, and in the ability of the French and English to hold the western front. 




