

BETTER FEELING IN INDUSTRY IS NOTED

Confidence in Coming Heavy Demand for Various Commodities.

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment in its Jan. 10 issue:

While the last week, with the effect of the holiday and year-end activities still in evidence, could not be taken as an indication of the future of business, there is evident in industry a feeling of confidence, and an apparent assurance that the coming weeks will bring a heavy demand for metal commodities of all kinds.

The iron sales of the week were in small lots for quick shipment and at unchanged prices. No. 1 and malleable iron is quoted at \$30.95 at Montreal and \$31.15 at Toronto.

Steel Corporation was blown in of Friday of last week. With the lighting of No. 4 furnace, there will be three blast furnaces in operation at the plant. No. 2 having been kept running during the black period. No. 4 furnace, which is now being relined, will be blown in about the middle of February. No. 1 open hearth shop will commence operations immediately, with No. 3 shop following. Rolling will commence on Monday, January 14.

Due in part to the effect of the new sales tax regulations and partly to the stronger tone of the metal markets, many commodities have registered advances in price during the week. The bar base in warehouse, both at Toronto and Montreal, advanced from 19c to 19c Canadian mills found it necessary to alter shuffling prices, quoting squares, hexagons and flats on a basis 25c higher than rounds.

CHURCH MEMBERS WORK FOR FUNDS

Seek to Raise Money to Rebuild Burned Needham Edifice.

Boston, Jan. 15.—Members of the Evangelical Congregational church of Needham have entered the employment bureau service business and are offering their services in capacities varying from nursemaids to cooks who will make a special batch of doughnuts or a lemon pie. The cause of it all is the desire of women church members to raise sufficient funds to rebuild their church, which was destroyed by fire recently.

Mrs. Frank V. Gordon of 48 Linden street, Needham, who is running the bureau from her own home, announced that she had already had several calls for someone to act as nursemaid while the parson came in town to go to a show.

For a long time, she explained, residents of Needham have been unable to find anyone who would mind their children for an afternoon or evening and the temporary bureau has filled a long felt need in that particular community.

The younger members of the Evangelical Congregational Church have volunteered to give up their spare time during the afternoons and evenings to which they have subscribed they will actually earn in raising the funds for the new church.

Others, who admit they can make the fanciest of cakes and pies, have also offered their services as well as the active congregation has pledged herself to place her name on the rolls of the temporary employment bureau in the capacity which she would like to work in order to have \$5 paid for her services. About 30 members are enrolled and their services will vary.

One of the most novel of occupations offered with Mrs. Gordon is that of "teacher of Math Jong" in this capacity, Mrs. Gordon said last evening, the bureau has women and men teachers. Many who have not been initiated into the intricacies of this game are provided with the opportunity of learning now and also helping rebuild the church.

EXPECT 10,000 DOCTORS AT THIS CONVENTION

Chicago, Jan. 14.—(United Press)—More than 10,000 physicians and surgeons are expected to attend the annual convention of the American Medical Association here June 9 to 15, 1924. The convention will occupy the second tier of the municipal pier. It will be subdivided into lecture halls, exhibition rooms and an auditorium.

Most recent discoveries in medicine, newly developed apparatus, instruments and other devices used in medical practice, will be exhibited.

Motion pictures will illustrate advanced medical methods.

Convention plans were made at a meeting attended by Drs. J. Sheldon Horsley, chairman, Richmond, Va.; E. J. Todd, Mayo Clinic; F. Gengenbach, Denver; John E. Lane, professor of diseases of the skin, Yale University, and Roger Morris, professor of medicine, University of Cincinnati.

CHURCH MATTER MAY GET TO COURT

Dispute at McAdam and a Conference of Factions is Called.

Unless there can be an amicable settlement reached at a conference between the old board of trustees, who have been carrying on the management of the church, and a new board of trustees, who were elected at a meeting held last week, the affairs of the Union Church at McAdam will apparently go to the chancery court for a settlement, says a report in the Fredericton Gleaser.

The old board still retain the keys and records of the church, which the new board were ordered by the meeting as which they were elected to demand, and Rev. Hugh Hatfield preached at an arrangement with the old board, while Rev. Hugh Hatfield preached at a service which was held at the hall, where he and his supporters have been holding services since he ceased to be pastor of the Union Church as the result of a disagreement with the old board of trustees.

Keys of the church were demanded on behalf of the new board of trustees, it was said, but the demand was refused, and the old board thus remains in control of the church property and records. There is a disposition upon the part of those involved in the dispute to avoid publicity in connection with the matter to so far as possible. One of the members of the old board expressed the view that it was most advisable that the matter should be privately adjusted at the proposed conference, for, he said, the church had been carried on for more than forty years without a rupture.

It is understood that the old board have discussed the matter with a lawyer and that they have been advised by their legal counsel that the statement which had been given out that the old board was elected in June was incorrect, that they were elected in the fall and that the incorporation act does not specify any time when the trustees shall be elected.

SAYS LOG DRIVING CO. WILL CARRY ON

Fredericton Has Reports That Two St. John Firms Drop Out.

The St. John River Log Driving Company, regarding the future of which there has been considerable uncertainty, will probably continue its existence and the operation of the present booms on the river above and below Fredericton, including the rafting grounds at Lincoln, Sunbury county, says the Fredericton Gleaser.

Two of the principal firms in the organization in the past have, it is learned, definitely determined to withdraw. These firms are Murray & Gregory, Limited, and Randolph and Baker, Limited, of St. John, but it is expected that other firms will come in and that the remaining ones, with their cooperation, will carry on and maintain booms and rafting operations.

At the present time, says the Gleaser, the negotiations are held up because of the illness of J. Fraser Gregory, president of the St. John River Log Driving Company and head of the Murray & Gregory business. Meanwhile the directors of the Log Driving Company have placed the situation before a general meeting of the lumbering interests and their decision is now awaiting the return of President Gregory to active business again.

AN AUTO NOVELTY.

The cleverest automobile accessory shown at the New York automobile show, is a cigarette case which is attached to the instrument board of the car within reach of the driver's hand. It holds 15 cigarettes. When a cigarette is wanted a button is pressed and the cigarette drops out of the case to a holder below. As it drops, one end falls against an electric lighter which lights the tip and also sets in motion a vacuum connection which gives the cigarette one "puff" to get it going. Then it can be picked up and used.

SAUERKRAUT AND DUMPLINGS.

Two pounds of kraut, 8 wieners, 1 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon baking powder, milk to make a soft dough.

Put kraut in a tightly covered kettle with water to cover. Cook slowly for two hours, adding water as necessary. Wash wieners and cut a tiny slice from each end. Add to kraut and cook an hour longer. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in milk to make a soft dough. Drop by teaspoonfuls into the kraut, cover tightly and cook 20 minutes. Serve at once.

This dish provides starch in the dumplings, mineral salts in the kraut, protein and fat in the meat and adds bulk to the meal. A nourishing cream soup and a substantial dessert round out the menu. Brown or entire wheat bread should be used.

PLAIN COOKED KRAUT.

One pound kraut, 4 potatoes, butter, salt and pepper, 1/4 cup cracker crumbs.

Boil and mash potatoes. Season with salt, pepper and butter. Cook kraut for 30 minutes and drain. Put a layer of kraut in a buttered baking dish. Dot with bits of butter and cover with a layer of potatoes. Continue alternating layers of kraut and potatoes until all is used. There should be equal parts of kraut and potato. Cover with cracker crumbs and bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

SAUERKRAUT DISHES.

Many people enjoy a dinner of sauerkraut once in a while. If the dish is cooked in the oven the unpleasant odor is somewhat curtailed.

While raw cabbage is more easily digested and of greater food value than cooked cabbage, cabbage in any form is a wholesome hearty food.

These recipes may be a bit out of the ordinary, and may help solve the eternal problem of what to eat.

If wieners are not liked, spare-ribs can be substituted.

PARLIAMEN WILL BE CONVENED ON THURSDAY, FEB. 28

Date Almost Month Later Than Last Year, When It Was Jan. 31

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Ottawa, Jan. 14.—Parliament will open on Thursday, Feb. 28. Announcement of the date of the opening was made by Premier King at the close of a cabinet meeting this evening.

The session this year will be momentous. Not only will important questions, such as redistribution and the banking system, be again before the House, but the proceedings of Parliament will be of special importance in their bearing on the political situation.

Since the Government took office two years ago—having in that time an effective majority over all parties combined—it has always received sufficient Progressive and Independent support to enable it to carry its measures through the House.

Conversations last week between Premier King and Hon. T. A. Crerar, formerly Progressive leader, give rise to reports that Mr. Crerar might enter the cabinet and bring with him across the floor of the House some Progressive support, but that he had not been invited to join the Government.

Speculation now runs on how far, if at all, the Government will modify its legislative proposals in order to secure Progressive support. There is talk of possible reductions in the tariff especially on agricultural implements and fertilizers.

In the work of the session, the banking situation bids fair to be to the forefront. Since then, the failure of the Home Bank and successive amalgamations of banking institutions have given added point to demands for further investigation of the banking system.

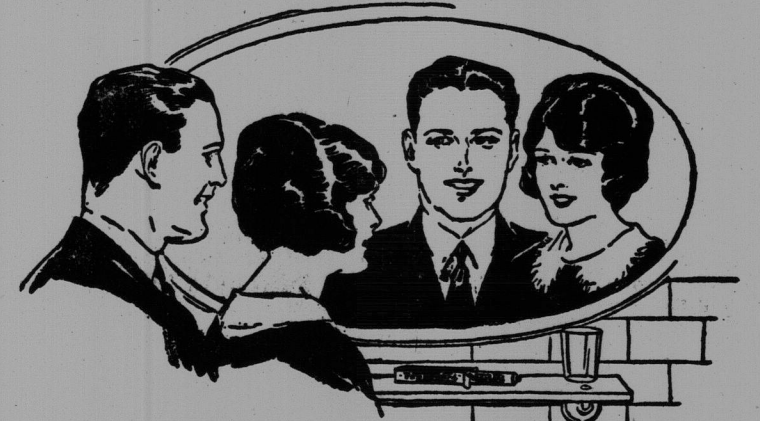
TOOK A FIT AFTER HE HIT CONDUCTOR

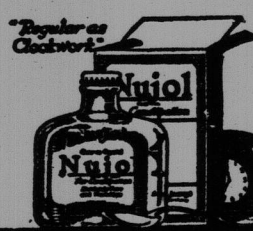

DRYS WILL MEET TO PLAN A CAMPAIGN

Getting Ready to Meet Movers of the Anti-Saloon League.

Washington, Jan. 14.—(United Press)—The part to be played by the Anti-Saloon League in the coming congressional elections and plans for combating wet moves in the present congress will be decided on at the league's 21st annual convention, which convened here today.

Meeting in the First Congregational Church, where President Coolidge worshipped, the league also will agree upon methods for completing the elimination of lawless liquor traffic throughout the country and enter into a general discussion of law enforcement and world prohibition.

An observance of the fourth anniversary of the day when national prohibition became effective, Jan. 16, will climax the convention. The principal speakers at that meeting will be Wm. J. Bryan and Governor Gifford Pinchot, Pennsylvania.

Speakers announced for the convention include three of the joint presidents of the World League Against Alcohol—Dr. Robert Renold, Lausanne, Switzerland, director of the International Temperance Bureau; Miss Anna A. Gordon, president of the National and World's W. C. T. U.; and Dr. Howard H. Russell, associate general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of America.

Other speakers scheduled are: Prohibition Commissioner Roy A. Haynes; P. A. Baker, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League; Senators Papp, Pennsylvania; Jones, Washington; Ferris, Michigan; Sterling, South Dakota; Wills and Peas, Ohio; Sheppard, Texas; Day, South Carolina; Congressmen Temple, Pennsylvania; Cramton, Michigan; Baker, Illinois; Eberhard, Hill, Alabama; Governor Patrick J. Neff, Texas; U. S. District Attorney Hayward of New York; Mrs. Mabel Walker Wilbur, Assistant Attorney General of the U. S.; Fred B. Smith, New York secretary of the Federal Council Churches; C. B. Griffith, Attorney General, Kansas; William Tyler Page, Clerk, U. S. House of Representatives and author of the American Creed.

PLAN LIQUIDATING SINN FEIN BONDS

Irish Government Gives Finance Minister Authority to Borrow \$6,250,000.

Dublin, Jan. 14.—Arrangements are now complete for liquidating the republican bonds that were floated to support the Sinn Fein movement in the Free State. The minister of finance is authorized to borrow the sum up to \$6,250,000 for the purpose. It may create and issue interest bearing securities subject to such conditions as to repayment and redemption as he thinks fit.

The minister may at any time issue to every subscriber to the external loans, mostly in the United States, a stock certificate for the sum subscribed by him, but the issue of these certificates may be postponed till the minister is satisfied that all moneys subscribed and not duly accounted for have been paid over to the exchequer, and the minister may at any time redeem the stock certificates by paying their nominal amount with five per cent. interest or purchase the certificate at such price as the minister thinks proper.

Traveling Man Covers Route For 53 Years

Expect to Continue for Five Years More at Least.

New Lexington, Ohio, Jan. 14.—(United Press)—He is 76 and gray of hair, but the spring of youth is in his steps as he continues to travel his route—the same he has traversed for 53 years.

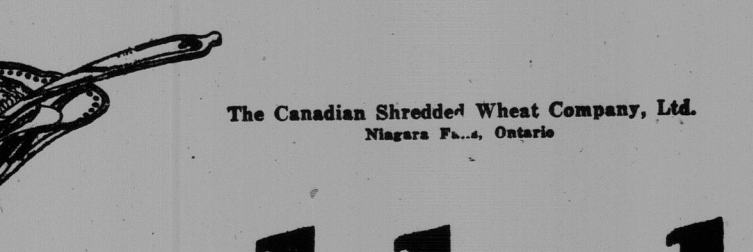

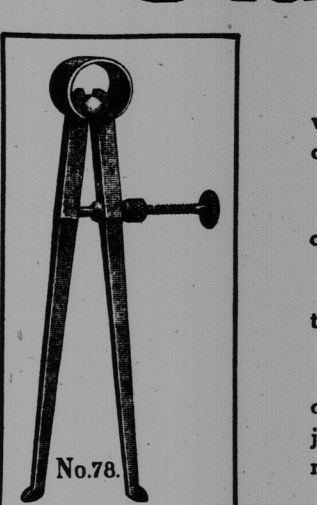

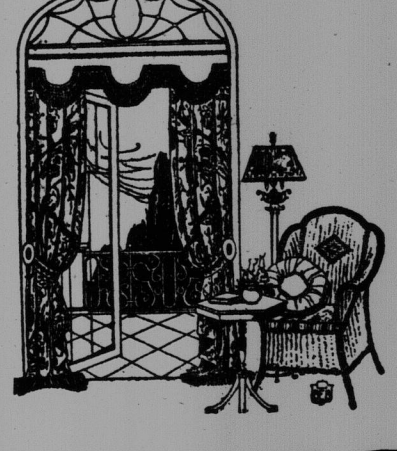
