LIVING COST HAS FALLEN 22 PER CENT. SINCE JUNE, 1920

Washington, April 25.—Changes an the cost of living in twenty-eight of the principal cities from June, 1920, to March, 1922, and from December, 1921, to March, 1922, are made public by the department of labor. They show that for the first named period Detroit led the list with a drop of 26.6 per cent.; Savannah, Ga., was next with 26.1 per cent., and Mobile, Ala., third with 24.7 per cent. New York City showed a decrease of 22.5 per cent.

cent. For the period from December, 1921, to March, 1922, a decrease of 4.6 per cent. in living costs was shown for New York. Kansas City, Mo., showed the biggest decrease for that period, with 5.9 per cent., and Cleveland was next in line with 5.8 per cent. All the cities showed decreases for both periods.
