

Canadians Raid German Trenches

London, Jan. 14-German trenches north of Lens were raided last night by Canadian troops, who brought back prisoners, says the official statement from Field Marshal Haig today. Near Mericourt, southeast of Lens, British soldiers were victorious in patrol engagements. The statement reads:

"Canadian troops last night successfully raided the enemy's trenches north of Lens and brought back prisoners. We suffered no casualties. Patrol encounters took place during the night east of Mericourt, resulting in our favor. On the rest of the front the night was quiet." FRENCH REPORT.

"To Italy, Germany has sent in support of 45 Austrian divisions only seven divisions, or about 100,000 combatants. On the Balkan front, held chiefly by the Bulgars with 244 battalions, the Germans have only 30,000 fighting men, but certain indications point to reinforcements having been sent thither recently from the Russian front."

An estimate of Austria-Hungary's army strength, given in an Associated Press despatch from French army head-quarters, places it at 1,200,000. The total war strength of the Dual Empire before the war was 3,600,000.



FROZEN FISH FIND CHAMPION IN MRS.

Domestic Science Expert of Food Controller's Office Makes Some

Educational Department Food Controller's Office, Ottawa—That there is a prejudice against frozen fish in the minds of many Canadian housewives, and that this prejudice is utterly unwarranted and unjustifiable, were statements made by Mrs. Jean Muldrew, domestic science expert of the food controller's office in an address upon food conservation to the address upon food conservation to the Women's Auxiliary of Chalmer's church

Mrs. Muldrew urged her hearers to a better understanding of the proper method of defrosting fish so that the "Frozen fish," said the speaker, "possesses the same food value exactly as fresh fish, and is handled for distribution much more cheaply. Increased demand for frozen fish will bring an increased supply. Housewives should ask their dealers for frozen fish and use it

thon much more cheaply. Housewives should ask their dealers for frozen fish and use, it freely as a substitute for beef and badon. The prejudice that has arisen against it is due to the improper methods frequently followed in defrosting frozen fish. There is no necessity of pouring hot water on a frozen fish. Soak it in cold water, and only long enough to draw out the frost. On no account use hot water. A few minutes' immersion in a bowl of cold water is sufficient for a small fish. Larger one's take longer in proportion. But don't leave it soaking too long, and cook it immerdiately. If you boil it use the same water in which you defrosted it, and save all of the natural flavor thereby.

"A winter-caught fish in the northern or northwestern lakes is frozen a few minutes after it leaves the water and alazed over with ice. It is shipped that way, sold that way in the fish store and is consequently an absolutely fresh fish when it reaches the consumer's kitchen. 




