"The number of juvenile criminals who suffer from unhealthy conditions, malform-ations, and hereditary defects, all of which have a depressing effect upon their minds, is quite large. Many of these, if not all can be remedied by medical or surgical intervention, and it would be ,safe to say that future transgressions would be pre-vented. The insanity of youth, now so much in the ambient air, should not be overlooked, as it is of great importance in dealing with this class. "It has, therefore, been repeatedly ad-vanced, with much emphasis and consid-erable approval, that every youthful pris-oner should be examined in the juvenile court before trial. This is the advanced sociological method. There are some who are of the opinion that such an examina-tion might be made after the trial, as the examination body would then have the benefit of whatever would transpire at the trial, bearing on the mentality and physical condition of the youth.
