LABOR CONGRESS MAY BE HERE IN 1913

President Watters, in St. John Today, Talks of Labor Condi-

J. C. Watters, president of the Trades nd Labor Congress, who arrived in the mes reporter today said that the contion of the laboring people of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia was far worse than in other portions of Canada. The wages are was much lower and hours longer than elsewhere. This, he says, is due entirely to lack of organization. In Nova Scotia the conditions are even worse than in New Brunswick. One of the largest factories in Nova Scotia, he continued, well known throughout Canada, may be termed a little Russia. Never did he meet with such oppression of the laboring people. They are not allowed to organize openly Whatever is done he said, was done in secret and secret organization was a menace rather than a help.

In British Columbia the labor organization was better than in any other part of Canada. The wages rate there was from sixty do a hundred per cent higher than in the maritime provinces, and the day from one to two hours shorter, while the cost of living was not more than ten per unswick and Nova Scotia was far worse

Quebec, Mr. Watters said, had the greatest number of organization workers, but n proportion British Columbia was far n the lead.

When asked as to the result of the invitation of the local Trades and Labor Council to hold the annual convention in St. John, he said that it had already been decided to hold it in Guelph. It is most likely, though, that the 1913 convention will be held here. This will be a great divertisement for the city, Mr. Watters asys, as more than 200 delegates will assemble from all parts of Canada.

Everywhere that the convention has been neld, he said, grants have been given by the civic and local governments to enterain the delegates. These grants have amounted to from \$500 to \$1500, and in some cases to \$2,000.



Cover plate with crust. Peel and cut rhubarb in inch pieces and place on plate as you would apples. Do not heap in the centre, but have even with outer edge. Sprinkle one cup of sugar and scant one-half cup flour over rhubarb and cover with top crust. Bake in quite a hot oven. BAKED TOMATOES STUFFED WITH MACARONI,

This dish is prepared from left-over macaroni which has been baked with theese in a white sauce. Remove pulp from five large, smooth tomatoes, chop macaroni. Season well with sait and pepper. Fill the tomatoes' cases, cover with buttered bread crumbs or grated cheese and bake until browned.

One cup sugar, half cup butter, half cup sweet milk, three cups flour, two eggs, one teaspoon soda dissolved in hot water. Put on the stove one cup milk, half cup unsweetened chocolate, grated; stir until dissolved; then stir into it one cup sugar and the yolk of one egg stirred together; when cool flavor with vanilla. While this is cooking beat up the first part of the cake and add the chocolate custard. Bake in layers. Ice on top and between the layers.


