INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF HURON.

TWENTY-NINTH SESSION.

Being the Twelfth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874.

FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London on Tuesday, June 15, 1886.

Divine service was held at St. Paul's Church, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was administered to the Clergy and Lay Representatives by the Lord Bishop, assisted by Ven. W. C. Pinkham, B.D., Archdeacon of Manitoba; Ven. F. W. Sandys, D.D., Archdeacon of Kent; Ven. E. L. Ellwood, A.M., Archdeacon of Huron, and Rev. Canon Innes, M.A.

The sermon was preached by Rev. John Gemley, R. D., Rector of Simcoe, from Col. i, 26-28.

The Synod assembled at 2:30 o'clock, p.m., in the Chapter House, for business.

The Lord Bishop in the chair.

The appointed prayers were said by Ven. Archdeacon Sandys, D.D.

The rolls of the Clergy and Lay Representatives were then called by their respective Secretaries, when 79 Clergymen and 75 Lay Representatives answered to their names.

The ballot papers were, in accordance with the Canon, distributed to the members of the Synod as their names were called.

Report of Committee on Certificates and Assessments.

The report of the committee appointed by the Bishop to examine the certificates of Lay Representatives, and the assessments of congregations, was presented by the Honorary Lay Secretary, as follows :

The committee appointed to examine the certificates of the Lay Representatives beg leave to report the number of certificates to be 198, and the number of Representatives elected to be 246.

The committee find the certificates to be correct, with the following exceptions :—Ingersoll, St. James ; Goderich, St. George ; Seaforth, St. Thomas ; Brantford, St. Jude ; Walpole Island, St. John Baptist ; number of registered votes not given.

Places where no election was held, and last year's delegates claim seats :—Perche, St. John ; Port Burwell, Trinity ; London Township, St. John.

The committee recommend that the following new congregations be assessed at \$2 :—Mount Brydges, Henfryn, Staffa, Charing Cross, Wanstead, Johnston's, Strangfield, 4th Line Warwick, Attwood.

Report of Same Committee on the Representation of Christ Church, Listowel.

The Report was read as follows :

In the matter of Christ Church, Listowel, the regular meeting was called on April 26th, 1886, for the election of Lay Representatives to Synod, when the names of Messrs. R. Martin and A. J. Collins were moved and seconded as Lay Representatives. No vote was taken at that session, and the meeting adjourned to April 30th. At the said adjourned meeting the names of Messrs. Martin and Collins, as Lay Representatives, were introduced, and the names of Messrs. George Draper and George H. Richardson were also moved and seconded.

The chairman declared the motion to elect Messrs. Martin and Collins Lay Representatives, out of order, upon the grounds that they refused to be bound by a certain resolution, passed at the Easter Vestry meeting, pledging them to a certain course of action in Synod. A motion was then passed declaring Messrs. Draper and Richardson duly elected. The chairman thereupon forwarded to the Secretaries of Synod his certificate of such election.

On 2nd June, 1886, Mr. Martin forwarded to the secretaries a protest against the said election, on the ground, amongst others, of the chairman's refusal to allow the congregation the privilege of voting upon all the names submitted to the meeting. Subsequently, Messrs. Draper and Richardson resigned all claims to the position of Lay Representatives, on the ground of admitted illegality of their election, as above set forth.

A special meeting was held on June 10th, when Messrs. George Draper and George Richardson's names were again submitted as Lay Representatives, and they were declared duly elected, and the incumbent's certificate forwarded to the Secretaries.

The above statement is made from the official papers sent to the Bishop and the Secretaries of Synod.

Your committee are of opinion—

1st—That the election of Messrs. Draper and Richardson, at the meeting held on April 30th, was illegal, for the reasons stated in the protest.

2nd—That there having been no legal election, there could be no resignation of Messrs. Draper and Richardson as Lay Representatives, and their subsequent re-election, on June 10th, we also deem illegal, on the ground of not having been held in Easter week, as required by Section 3 of the Constitution.

3rd—That in accordance with the provisions of the same section of the Constitution, your committee are of the opinion that Messrs. Martin and Collins are entitled to represent the parish of Christ Church, Listowel, in this Synod, as the last Lay Delegates duly elected.

The Bishop's Address.

His Lordship then delivered his annual charge to the Synod, as follows :

REVEREND BRETHREN AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY :—

In assembling once more, our first and paramount duty is to render thanks to God for all the manifold mercies of the past. Some of us, indeed, may have been led through the deep waters of affliction, and all of us, to a greater or less extent, must have seen some transient cloud throw its shadow across our path ; but, as all things work together for good to those who love God, therefore for all the shadows, as well as for the sunlight of the past year—for its bitter as well as for its sweet—for its deep valleys of trial as well as for its mountains of prosperity, we render thanks to God.

With humble gratitude to Him from whom all blessings flow, as well as with the greatest pleasure to myself, I now announce that which will give unalloyed satisfaction to many, namely : that the past year has been to the Diocese one of expansion and visible prosperity. In saying this I mean : First—That the capacity and willingness of certain parishes, formerly receiving aid, to support their own ministers, are being clearly demonstrated, giving us reason to believe that in a comparatively short time our Mission Fund may be devoted exclusively to those places whose recent origin and exceptional poverty constitute them the only proper recipients of Diocesan help.

Secondly—I am happy also to observe a very material increase in the general receipts for Diocesan missionary work : the increase amounting to \$1,561, 87 over those of last year. I rejoice at this, not only on account of the fact itself, but as affording indubitable evidence of increasing interest and self-sacrificing devotion on the part of our people.

Thirdly—The development of our mission work itself, and the immense possibilities of future usefulness opening up to us by the redistribution of old stations, and the creation of new centres of spiritual life, is one of the most encouraging features of the present year. Believing as I do that in the majority of instances parishes are enervated as they are helped, and strengthened as they are left wholly to themselves, I cannot but endorse the principle which was enunciated by our last Synod, namely, that the services of an especial Commissioner should be secured to kindly visit the various parishes and outlying stations of the Diocese and institute enquiry as to whether new life and activity might not be evolved from them all.

The work which the Bishop's Commissioner, the Rev. W. A.

Young, has so far been able to effect, is most excellent in character and extent, and not only encourages us in the present, but affords an earnest of what may be accomplished in the immediate future, should the Lord spare him to complete his labors.

In the pursuit of this plan I am well aware that there may be a certain amount of abrasion and distress, that in disturbing ancient arrangements there may be hardships, if not apparent wrong; but the general welfare of the body politic must be our first and dearest consideration, and therefore our sympathies should be bestowed upon a plan whose ultimate, if not immediate effect, will be to regenerate many an old and non-progressive parish and to create in districts long and shamefully neglected many a new centre of spiritual life and power.

Situated as we are in the fairest portion of Canada, with a population rapidly increasing and with every stimulus about us to exertion and self-sacrifice, it becomes essentially necessary for our Diocese, if it is at all to fulfil its mission, that it must do far more than hold its own—it must be like the young and vigorous country in which by Divine Providence it has been planted, growing with its growth and expanding with its rapidly developing life.

Therefore, just because there are about us these necessary signs of awakening vitality—just because we can see, through the good spirit of our God, the evidences of a deepening spiritual life *within*, and as a result a stronger life without—I thankfully record the fact, and sound the note of praise for progress effected in the past; for life, deeper and more spiritual in the present; for hope, more real and better founded with reference to the future.

Before proceeding, particularly to discuss any features of Diocesan life, permit me to call your attention to the extraordinary and critical character of the times in which we are now living. Now, if ever, do we need a strong and vigorous Christianity to meet and to convert that wild and lawless spirit which the State may bind, but is impotent to destroy. The principles of anarchy and strife, now asserting themselves in various parts of Europe and America, will not down at the bidding of human authority, however strong, or even resistless, it may appear to be. That capital too often exacts a pitiless service, and refuses to compensate for labor done, is a fact admitted by all. The redress of such grievances, both justice and sympathy demand. But, after every wrong has been adjusted, and every reasonable complaint forever put to rest, there will still be found upon the earth a wild and restless spirit, which, call it by what name we please, means revolution, anarchy and wrong. It is the spirit of the cyclone and the storm—it comes neither from the north, nor from

the south, from the east nor from the west. It is the fierce, unregenerate heart of fallen man unrestrained by the Spirit's power and swept over by Satan, the prince and god of this world. Its existence and development in our day incontestably proves that we are now entering the last stages of this present dispensation, and that already forces are gathering which can only be overthrown by the glorious Epiphany of the Son of God.

The Church of Christ has, however, her part to perform in the present emergency; she has to arouse herself from the negligence and apathy of the past, and confront the revolutionary and anarchic principles of the day by bringing to the masses, with fresh consecration and redoubled energy, the blessed gospel of Jesus Christ. Only He who died for the world can save the world. Cavalry, artillery and infantry may suppress all outward violence, and enforce the conditions of peace; but only He who has beckoned the whole world of sorrow and of sin to come unto Himself can allay its stormy passions or hush its angry waves to rest.

Men are crying out for greater *freedom*; and Christ says: "If the Son shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed;" for a universal *brotherhood*; and Christ says: "That they all may be one, as Thou, Father, art in me, and I in Thee;" for universal *wealth*; and St. Paul says: "That Christ became poor that we, through His poverty might become rich." The world does not believe—does not even know this, and the Church must, like the monk Telemachus, throw itself into the very midst of the arena and die, if need be, that her Lord may live.

There are two ways in which we may convince the world: one, by the personal exaltation of Jesus Christ; the other, by the reproduction of His character in our daily walk and conversation. It was Adolphe Monod who said: "The most convincing proof of a divine revelation is a divine life." If, therefore, we wish the world to believe in the Christ of the Bible, we must show them the Christ dwelling in our lives: for the Bible is a book which many do not read; our lives are a volume open to the world. When the world sees a church that in its outer and inner life is exactly like Christ, it will believe in Christ. It sees our manifold divisions, our incessant strifes, our likeness to itself, our apathy, our selfishness and our sins, and is unconvinced by arguments concerning Christ *above* because it does not see this living Christ *below*. Amidst the disturbing elements of the day—the threatened upheaval of society, and the dislocation of barriers necessary to the maintenance of peace, if the church would really do her part, and stem the torrent and the tide, then must she not only by the word of her mouth witness a good confession for Christ, but she must put on her beautiful garments and so shine with the glory of the Redeemer's

Presence that she shall herself look like the very image of her Lord. She must convince the world that there is a Christ in heaven because there is a Christ on earth. She must be herself a living sermon; herself the miracle by which her sermon is to be enforced.

Preach, therefore, I would say, especially to you of the clergy, the absolute necessity of all believers reproducing, in their daily life, the holy character of the Lord Jesus Christ—that is, if they wish to fulfil the mind of Christ—if they wish to save the lost.

Rejoicing as we do in the infinite value of the substitutional work of Christ, and jealous as we are to guard the doctrine that only by His merits are we justified and saved, we too often fail to notice the stupendous design God had in saving us, and which this very sacrifice was to enable us to fulfil. In the counsels of eternity it was designed by God that every believer, whether prince or beggar, barbarian, Scythian, bond or free, should be conformed to the image of His dear Son. Like Him, in His awful death unto sin, and in His perpetual life unto righteousness; like Him, in His holy walk, in His entire consecration to the will of the Father, and His devotion to the cause of man; to this end were we born, and for this cause were we brought into the world. Practically, how often is this blessed truth lost sight of. Christians shrink back and say, the model is too glorious; it is too high; they cannot attain unto it. Satisfied on this point, Christians take some inferior model; they take some faltering disciple instead of the faultless Lord, and society is confirmed in its unbelief by the fatal mistake. The church can not remove the awful gloom of moral midnight by powdering the sky with fifth-rate stars of uncertain light; she must fire the firmament with the sun itself; she must *preach* Christ; she must *live* Christ; she must be *like* Christ.

In this connection let me indicate two truths of vital moment: First—The motive power by which this glorious similitude is to be effected, is not any mental resolution or fervent emotion within us. Neither gratitude to God for mercies past, nor yearning desire in reference to the future will furnish the requisite power. Christ in us, is the only and all-sufficient means to this blessed end. God dwelling within our hearts will make us like God in our daily lives.

Secondly—Our sanctification, like our justification, is effected by faith. A modern writer says, with great point, "Christians have great faith in the power of indwelling sin, but sometimes little faith in the power of God's grace to overcome that sin."

To reproduce, therefore, the character of Christ, and to witness a good confession before the world, we need implicit faith in God's *word*, which distinctly avers, that it was the design of God from all

eternity that His people should be conformed to the image of His dear Son; implicit *faith* in *Christ Himself* that, as we abide in Him and He in us, He will effect the design and *purpose of God*; implicit *faith* in *God's love*, that the world for which Christ lived and for which He died is still the object of His solicitude and care. For its eternal welfare He would now have us labor; and, therefore, here, amid all its sorrows and its sins, its revolutionary storms and anarchic principles, He would have us witness a good confession for Christ; and, in order that we may do so with the unction of the Holy Ghost and with power, He would have us in our daily life conformed to the image of His dear Son.

THE MISSION FUND.

In reference to this most important Fund, so essentially necessary to the proper development of our Diocesan work, while repeating my unfeigned satisfaction at its present improved tone, and at the reasonable prospect now existing, that in a short time it will be largely increased, yet I cannot but draw your attention to the following facts relating to the Fund which demand our serious consideration:—

First—That, notwithstanding all that has been said on previous occasions as to the vital necessity of maintaining this Fund in a state of efficiency, and, indeed, of increasing its resources as much as possible, over two hundred of the regular Synodical and parochial collections have been omitted throughout the past year, constituting thereby a very serious loss to the financial prosperity of the Diocese. This number is given after all reasonable deductions have been made for places where there were no resident ministers, and, consequently, no one present on whom the duty of making the collections immediately devolved. Such wholesale omissions call, I think, for serious remonstrance, as thereby not only are our energies crippled to a greater or less extent every year, but the example which such neglect exhibits to the Diocese becomes increasingly more and more vicious.

Secondly—The difficulty which some parishes encounter in making the quarterly collections, together with the local calls on their generosity, suggests the advisability of reconsidering the whole question of our stated collections and placing them on a different footing. I do not wish to dogmatize on so difficult and important a matter, but I incline to the belief that if stated sums were assigned to our various parishes, and the parishes allowed to raise them at their own time, and in the manner most suited to their own exigencies, the machinery would not only be greatly simplified, but the results would be far more satisfactory to the Diocese at large. I may say, however, that no such substantive change should be made until the whole subject had received the closest consideration.

Thirdly—I desire to call your attention to the propriety of making the Mission Fund the recipient of the various thank-offerings of our people. We have received \$50 from one member of our church, \$100 from a second and \$1,000 from a third, as the generous expression of their good will and laudable desire to make a sacrifice for the cause of Christ. I thank them, not only for what they have done, but for the wholesome example they have set to others to follow in their paths, and I am confident that many thankful hearts in this vast Diocese, if they had only their attention drawn to this Fund, would gladly make it in like manner the recipient of their generous gifts.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

I am thankful to say that not only is this most useful auxiliary in a sound and healthy state—equal to all the various demands made upon it, but the Secretary-Treasurer has been enabled throughout the past year to add \$2,500 to its capital account, thereby increasing the general efficiency of the Fund.

MATTERS IN LITIGATION.

I received in October last a petition somewhat numerously signed, to the following effect:—

To the Rt. Rev. M. S. Baldwin, D.D., Lord Bishop of Huron.

THE FOLLOWING PETITION SHOWETH:—

That the cases of litigation, which have been existing in the Diocese of Huron for some years, are materially interfering with the Church's work, and are necessarily a source of vexation and trouble to your Lordship, as well as to the members of the Church desiring her welfare. The plaintiffs in both cases have officially communicated with your Lordship, and from the tenor of their communications, there is every reason to suppose that a settlement of the existing difficulties can be reached through a calm and dispassionate consideration thereof, by the representatives of the Church in Synod assembled. By the Constitution, the convening of a Special Synod rests with your Lordship. The following reasons are submitted as sufficient for requesting the calling of an early Special Synod to take into consideration all matters arising out of the present contentions, with a view to such a solution of them as will restore harmony and peace to the Church throughout the Diocese.

1. The plaintiffs, in necessary self-defence, have respectively given notice of appealing their case to a higher court.

2. Whether the Synod is eventually successful or not, there will be law costs which must be borne by the contributors to Church work, and therefore take from her Mission Fund.

3. That so long as the strife continues, sympathy is so weakened that attachment to the Church is endangered, and her energies crippled.

4. That the moral power of God's law should be sufficient to guide and direct the Church in reaching an amicable and equitable arrangement thereof.

5. The Commutation Fund is held in trust by the Synod.

6. That the Synod should have an opportunity of declaring its mind as the representative body of the Diocese, thereby exercising the right which responsibility sanctions, and determining future procedure.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

To which I gave the following reply :

"After, I trust, a careful consideration of the subject, I have come to the conclusion that the interests of the Diocese will be best maintained by leaving untouched the ordinary process of Synodical law.

As regards the clergymen in question, I have no doubt that the great Head of the Church will, by His Holy Spirit, lead us to do that which is best for the promotion of His glory and the individual welfare of all our members.

Looking, through God's grace, to a speedy solution of all our difficulties,

I remain, yours in Christ,

MAURICE S. HURON."

And now that we are in due form assembled, I can only add I sincerely trust all our deliberations will be conducted in the spirit of mutual forbearance and love, and that a final and peaceful settlement may this session be arranged. I do not indeed indicate the process by which such a happy result may be effected, but I would say that if it is possible by any plan whatever, compatible with justice, to reach a peaceful settlement, by all means let us adopt it, and thus establish on a strong and permanent basis the blessings of harmony and peace.

CLERICAL APPOINTMENTS.

On so difficult and, I may say, delicate a subject as that of clerical exchanges, it is perhaps best to speak with diffidence, but

at the same time experience leads me to the conclusion that in appointing new men to our various parishes it would be most judicious in all cases to make the appointments only for a fixed term of years (say three at the farthest), and then, should there have been any abrasion or unpleasantness between the pastor and his flock, a separation could be made without any expression of opinion on either side. The appointment would lapse from the term being fulfilled, and both clergyman and people would be free to make other arrangements more suitable to themselves. This would not of course prevent a clergyman having his term indefinitely prolonged, or even rendered permanent if such an arrangement were mutually desired. It would only render it unlikely that either party would complain if there were about to be a separation, and, on the other hand, it would almost necessitate an expression of good will if a prolongation of the term were earnestly desired. If I am correctly informed, the average duration of a pastorate is extremely short; and, as matters are at present, changes are too often effected under the most distressing and painful circumstances. I cannot, therefore, but think that some such alteration as this proposed, even if it did not meet all the exigencies of the case, would at least be productive of immediate and permanent good.

WOMEN'S AUXILIARY MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

As many of you already know, through the circular lately addressed to the clergy, I am anxious to have formed in every parish in this Diocese a vigorous branch of the above mentioned Society. In the great Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States—an example to us in so many ways of all that is great and good—the Women's Auxiliary has become one of the most powerful organizations for the advancement of the truth and the relief of destitute and necessitous parishes. The power, indeed, and utility of such associations have been demonstrated in too clear and convincing a manner to need any arguments from me to prove their efficiency; all that remains is to establish, with as little delay as possible, a kindred society among ourselves, and endeavor hereafter to support it with all our influence and prayers. I may define its objects under three heads:—

First—The advancement of pure missionary work among the heathen. As the cause of missions is the cause of Christ, I cannot too strongly uphold obedience to the Redeemer's command as to the dissemination of His blessed word, or too earnestly combat the utterly faithless, but still prevalent idea, that Home Missions should absorb all our means. In the church, Christ, not man, must reign; and the pathway of obedience is the pathway of power. It is extremely probable that the Association, while helping on every department of missionary labor, will seek chiefly to sustain a work

which is preeminently within its sphere, namely: that of the Zenana. This essentially modern phase of missionary work simply signifies the mission of the Christian women of England and America to their unconverted sisters in India and the East.

Secondly—The rendering assistance to our Northwest Missions—those now called "Domestic," by which are meant the Dioceses of Algoma, Rupert's Land, Saskatchewan, Athabasca, Moosonee and others situated in the North and West. With reference to this department of our work, I may say that I have received the most urgent appeal from the Bishop of Algoma entreating further contributions for the sustenance of his Diocese. Indeed, so cramped and impeded is he from the want of means, that unless some immediate help is given he will have to reduce his already scanty clerical staff, and retrograde instead of making an advance. It seems that the Mission Board, which ought in the last two years to have given Algoma \$16,000, has contributed actually less than \$8,000, and this is the reason of his distress. His words are:—"I regret very much being under the necessity of calling your special attention, in common with that of the other Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, to this grave fact, feeling and fearing, as I do, that I must weary you by my often coming, but dire necessity compels me to make it known in the hope that each Bishop may perhaps see his way to giving it such an emphasis in his address to his clergy and laity at the coming Synod as will lead to the devising of more liberal things." My dear friends, this state of things ought not so to be. There is an abundance of wealth in Canada to supply the needs of Algoma and to establish it on a better basis, and if we only had more of a missionary spirit, more knowledge and more organization, we should soon be able to reach it. May I ask you, in your semi-annual appeal to advance the claims of this noble Bishop, who, while entitled to the support of all the Dioceses, may not unfairly expect the especial sympathy of the Diocese of Huron.

Thirdly—The furtherance of our Home or purely Diocesan work.

For all details as to the mode and manner in which the Association is to be carried on, I must refer you to a paper of instructions, which, God willing, will shortly be issued to the clergy, and will merely add that for the cause of *Christ*, whose glory is concerned therein; for the cause of *perishing millions* who may be forever saved; for the cause of *our church*, on which a reflex blessing is sure to come, I intreat your cordial support and hearty co-operation in establishing and sustaining this much-needed and beneficent work

DIOCESAN EVANGELIST.

Permit me to draw your attention to the self-sacrificing, and

tireless labors of our devoted Evangelist, the Rev. Pierre B. de Lom. Anything to exceed his earnestness and zeal could hardly be imagined. While his report, which, God willing, I shall call upon him to read, will give the details of his work, and exhibit the number of places which employed his services, I may myself add that only those who know the fervor of his nature, and his intense anxiety to win souls to Christ, can accord him his due mead of praise for devotion to the work he has espoused.

Before concluding, permit me to draw your attention to some of the changes that have taken place in our clerical staff.

The Rev. Andrew Jamieson, late missionary to the Indians of Walpole Island, has fallen asleep in Christ. I may say of this saintly missionary that he was one whose self sacrificing devotion to the cause of Christ among the Indians won for him not only the deep affection of his people, but also the admiration of all those who were privileged to know him. I trust that, though he himself has gone, his example will ever be fresh and living to stimulate all other workers in the field.

CONFIRMATIONS.

I have held 21 confirmation services, at which 528 candidates have been confirmed.

CONSECRATIONS.

I have held two consecration services—St. Paul's Church, Duart, and a cemetery at Stratford.

And now, trusting that God, by His Holy Spirit, will guide us into a right judgment in all things, and give us grace to advance His glory and to edify His church, I commend you all to Him, who is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we can ask or think.

Receiving Reports.

The Honorary Lay Secretary presented the annual report of the Executive Committee. The printed audited accounts having been previously distributed to members of the Synod.

The Annual Report.

The Executive Committee, in presenting their Annual Report for another year, would gratefully acknowledge the good hand of the Lord upon us; His faithfulness to His Church, and the continued presence of the Holy Spirit in our Councils.

DIOCESAN INCOME.

The Committee are able to report an increase of \$1,463.03 over the total receipts of the previous year.

The action taken last year by the Synod with regard to the large number of collections omitted to be made has been productive of some change for the better, but not to the extent required and which is desirable. There still remains much to be done to ensure promptness and regularity in making the required collections and forwarding them to the Synod office.

A larger number than usual of the annual subscriptions have been omitted this year, owing partly to the many changes of incumbencies that have taken place, and it is a matter for due consideration whether these annual subscriptions should continue to be made at the very end of the financial year, and at a time when changes of clergymen almost invariably take place, because experience shows that in the natural confusion of removal these collections are very apt to be overlooked. From one cause or another, which might have been avoided with reasonable care, fully \$1,000 has been lost to the General Income from these annual subscriptions.

THE MISSION FUND.

The debt of this Fund is \$4,916.48, a very slight increase during the year. Were it not for the provisions of the new Canon on reorganization and assessment, passed at the Synod of 1885, and the very successful results of the work of

the Rev. W. A. Young, Bishop's Commissioner, the debt would most assuredly have been very largely increased. The Committee feel confident that the result of the next year's effort will almost, if not altogether, extinguish the existing debt of this Fund.

The total receipts for Diocesan missionary work exceed by \$1,561.87 those of last year. While this is mainly owing to generous donations that have been made to the Mission Fund, it is cheering to know that the quarterly collections also have slightly increased.

THE BISHOP'S COMMISSIONER.

Under the powers contained in the Canons relating to the reorganization and assessment of parishes and missions, the Bishop, at the unanimous request of the Executive Committee, appointed the Rev. W. A. Young as his Commissioner for the purposes of the Canons.

The appointment commenced from the 1st Nov., 1885, although some small part of the work had been done previously under a provisional commission.

The extent and importance of this much-needed work will be best appreciated by a careful consideration of the following statistics: During the period of about eight months some 105 stations have been visited, inspected and reported on; a list of these is appended. It will thus appear that fourteen new stations have been opened; four new mission parishes have been organized, and eight parishes formerly receiving grants from the Mission Fund became self-supporting.

(The parish of Kingsville and Colchester had been constituted a self-supporting parish after a visit of Rev. W. A. Young and Ven. F. W. Sandys immediately previous to the date of the above returns.)

The Committee from their experience of the results of this work already in full operation, feel justified in the opinion that a very large annual saving must be effected when the whole of the Diocese shall have been thoroughly inspected by the Commissioner.

The gratifying evidence of this will be seen in the printed accounts of the stipend assessments already paid into the Synod office.

The results so far obtained shew that an approximate reduction of the annual grants from the Mission Fund, hitherto required for the places already visited, will amount to about \$3,500.

If this important work can be carried out to an equally successful issue throughout the whole Diocese, it will enable the Synod to provide the means of spiritual ministrations to many necessitous places; to relieve the Mission Fund of its present burden of debt, and eventually, and at no distant date, render it possible that the available funds of the Synod may be applied to the much needed augmentation of the stipends of the senior clergy, who shall be deemed entitled to the same.

In view of the above considerations, the Executive Committee would urgently appeal to the loyal co-operation and support of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese to bring the work of re-organization and assessment to a successful completion.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The receipts of this Fund are \$106.66 less than those of the previous year. This decrease may be partly accounted for by the fact that Good Friday falling at so late a date, very few of the collections made on that day for the Jews were paid into the Synod before the closing of the books.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Under the provisions of the Constitution it will become the duty of the Synod to nominate Diocesan Delegates, two clerical and two lay, to attend the meetings of the Provincial Board.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Pensions amounting to \$5,054.00 were paid to twenty-eight widows. There are now twenty-six on the list.

The Fund continues to be in a most prosperous condition. A legacy of \$2000 was received from the Estate of the late Francis Byfield, of Mt. Pleasant, County Brant and added to the capital. From the surplus of the General Fund, after paying all the claims on it, \$500 was also transferred to the Capital Account. The total Capital is now \$60,215.30.

THE SEE HOUSE.

The house has been completed and is now occupied by the Bishop and the residence will be known henceforth as "Bishopstowe." The sum of \$12,000 had been expended up to the close of the financial year; but the whole amount of the estimated expenditure will be required, and an additional sum of \$500 is asked for by the Building Committee in order to complete the necessary improvements on the grounds. This amount the Executive Committee recommend the Synod to grant. This will bring the total expenditure to \$15,000.

The subscriptions are coming in slowly, but it is hoped that this year the parishes will begin to send in their assessments in a more systematic manner.

SUPERANNUATION.

Pensions amounting to \$4,863.40 were paid during the year. There are now thirteen clergymen on the list.

ACCOUNTS.

The printed audited accounts show as usual the position of the various Funds.

LITIGATION.

The present position of the two suits, Wright vs. Huron and Stinson vs. Huron, will be seen on reference to the Convening Circular, where a statement has been prepared by the Solicitor in accordance with instructions from this Committee.

4. Petition from Durham Vestry respecting Synod assessments. The Executive Committee, considering the peculiar position of the parish, complied with the request of the petitioners and remitted the arrears. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Receiving Memorials.

The Honorary Clerical Secretary read a memorial from Mrs. H. L. Dillon asserting her right to be a participant on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

To His Lordship the Bishop, and the Synod of the Diocese of Huron.

The memorial of Harriett L. Dillon widow of the late Rev. M. M. Dillon, humbly sheweth :

1. That she is the widow of the Reverend M. M. Dillon, who, for some years, was a regular beneficed clergyman of the Diocese, having charge of a parish, and a member of the Synod of the Diocese ; and for one year an elected member of the Standing Committee.
2. That her deceased husband regularly performed all the official requirements under the Widows' and Orphans' Fund By-law, and paid annually the sum of five dollars as required by said By-law, whereby to entitle his widow to become a beneficiary upon the fund.
3. That her husband died on the fifth day of August, 1884, from which time her claim has been before the Executive Committee, and at a meeting of said committee held December 10th, 1885, it was moved by Mr. R. Bayly, seconded by Mr. A. C. Clarke, "that the committee regrets that it cannot, under the circumstances, recommend that the name of Mrs. Dillon be placed on the list of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund," and this motion was carried by seventeen yeas against twelve nays.
4. That your memorialist was unwillingly compelled, in support of her lawful claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, to place the same in the hands of Messrs. Fraser & Fraser, who wrote to the Secretary of the Synod, and their letter was laid before the Executive Committee at its meeting in March last, but the Committee refused to place your memorialist on the said Fund.
5. That your memorialist believes the statements made, that Bishop Hellmuth had entered into an agreement with her husband, upon his re-entering the Diocese of Huron, that he should forego all claims upon the beneficiary funds of the Diocese, to be utterly untenable, inasmuch as there was at that time no canonical law of the church recognizing such prohibition, and Bishop Hellmuth had no such jurisdiction over the funds as to enable him to enter into such an agreement, and had such an agreement been made her husband could only have been compelled to yield by virtue of submission to a superior force, and your memorialist does not believe any such agreement is to be found among the documents of the Synod office, or ever was in existence.
6. Your memorialist believes her claim to be both legal and moral, and, should the governing body of the church reject it, she will be driven to have recourse to the civil courts for the relief of her complaint.
7. Your memorialist has used every means to avoid litigation in the matter, and has purposely and intentionally delayed the prosecution of her claim until the meeting of your honorable body, hoping to avoid further trouble.
9. Your memorialist has reason to believe that when her case is properly investigated, and understood by the Church in Synod, assembled, she will be recognized as having a just claim upon the fund.

Your memorialist will ever pray.

B. Reed, the Secretary of the Synod, and circulated by you among members of the Synod with the view of influencing their judgment when the subject of that litigation is brought up for consideration. (Signed), A. H. DYMOND.

Wright has given notice of a motion to bring before the Synod, at this session, the question involved in the suit before referred to; and whereas, the recent circulation of statements affecting Mr. Reed's conduct, by the Rev. Wright, among members of the Synod is evidently designed to affect the judgment and votes of the members; and whereas, the circulation of any partial or untrue statements to that end is gravely disrespectful to and a breach of the privileges of the Synod—a committee be appointed to inquire into the truth of any such statements and allegations, with power to procure any evidence, oral or documentary, the committee may deem necessary to a full investigation; the committee to consist of the Rev. Wm. Craig, Rev. Thos. Davis, Mr. Nathaniel Currie, *convener*; Mr. Wm. Gray and Mr. R. S. Gurd, and that the committee be directed to report the result of their inquiries to the Synod at the earliest practicable moment.

Clause 16 of the Constitution as Amended.

There shall be an Executive Committee, presided over by the Bishop, ten of whom shall form a quorum, consisting of 30 Clergymen and 30 Laymen, who shall be elected annually by ballot out of the members of the Synod, by each order respectively.

In the absence of the Bishop, he may appoint, in writing, a member of the Executive Committee to act as his Deputy in the chair, and, failing such appointment, the Committee shall elect a chairman, for the sitting, from the members present.

All Lay Representatives of the Synod, duly elected as members of the Executive Committee and Provincial Synod, shall remain members as aforesaid, until their successors on the said Executive Committee and Provincial Synod shall have been elected by the Synod. Immediately after the election of the Executive Committee the Bishop shall appoint a time, during the Session of Synod, at which a meeting of the Committee shall be held for the purpose of organizing and appointing any necessary sub-committees that may be required to take action, before the first regular quarterly meeting in September.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to manage and administer all the funds, lands and property of the Synod, of what kind or nature soever, and generally to exercise all the powers and functions of the Synod, except those of a legislative character, in accordance with the Constitution and Canons thereof, without further or other authority from the Synod than is herein contained, as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as the Synod can or may do.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to prepare in due form all such matters as the Bishop may desire to have brought before the Synod, and all such other matters as may be forwarded to them, through the Secretary, by any member of the Synod, previous to the first day of May in each year, and to have such portions printed as may appear to them expedient; and a circular containing a statement of such business to be submitted to the Synod shall be forwarded to each Clergyman and Representative two weeks before the meeting of the Synod, which business shall stand first in the order of the day.

Fraternal Greetings.

That in view of the judgment of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, in the suit of Wright vs. Huron, fully sustaining the unanimous judgment of the Court of Appeal of Ontario in favor of the Synod, it is the duty of this Synod to maintain and recognize the validity of the Canon of 1876, providing for disposition of the surplus Commutation Fund, until that Canon is, by Constitutional action, amended or repealed.

2. That this Synod regrets that the Rev. Joel T. Wright should have unadvisedly entered into litigation with the Synod rather than by Constitutional action, seeking such changes in the aforesaid Canon as would have, in his opinion been desirable.

3. That by such litigation a loss is entailed, in the Mission Fund of the Diocese, of the sum of \$549.27 over and above the costs taxable against the plaintiff.

4. That the amount of the costs taxed against the plaintiff, under the judgment of the Court, and in which he now stands indebted to the Synod, is \$985.19.

5. That justice to the funds, of which the Synod is the trustee, the duty of upholding the standard of moral integrity in regard to the payment of just obligations, and the necessity for protecting the Synod against unnecessary and vexatious litigation, make it absolutely necessary that the amount of said taxed costs should be collected; but the Synod at the same time directs that in the collection of the said costs such forbearance be shown as will make the payment as little burdensome as possible to the plaintiff and his sureties.

6. That, whereas the judgment of the Courts declaring that the Synod has power from time to time, by Canon, to dispose of the surplus Commutation Fund, renders it more than ever incumbent upon the Synod to consider what, under the varying circumstances of the Diocese, may be the best disposition of the said Fund; and, whereas the present Canon has now been in force for over ten years, the Synod hereby directs the Executive Committee to take the whole question of the disposition of the surplus Commutation Fund into full consideration and to report thereon to the next meeting of the Synod, such report to be inserted in the Convening Circular.

Receiving Reports of Committees.

Rev. Canon Innes presented the Report of the Sunday School Committee.

Your committee beg leave to present the following report, and recommend :
First—The establishment of a Diocesan Sunday School Association. This, they would recommend, should be of very simple organization, no fees being necessary for membership, except such as may be required for each school desiring to participate in any special advantages the Association may be able to offer. *Second*—The establishment of a permanent depository for library books, and also for selected and approved appliances, such as reward cards, roll books,

maps, &c. *Third*—The establishment of a Sunday School conference, biennial or triennial. *Fourth*—The establishment of local associations to meet in non-conference years. These should, as far as possible, combine children's as well as teachers meetings. *Fifth*—The observance of Sunday School Institute days of intercession. *Sixth*—The authoritative localization of a cheap paper, such as *The Dawn of Day*; *Church Work*, etc. *Seventh*—The recommendation of a cheap hymnal. Your committee have thus endeavored to sketch out a simple plan towards the full realization of which the whole Diocese could gradually work; and which, when accomplished, would in the opinion of your committee, make the Diocesan Sunday School system tolerably complete.

And your committee recommend that this report be referred to the Executive Committee, for action.

Dominion in the suit of Wright vs. Huron, fully sustaining the unanimous judgment of the Court of Appeal of Ontario in favor of the Synod, it is the duty of the Synod to maintain and recognize the validity of the Canon of 1876, providing for the disposition of the Surplus Commutation Fund until that Canon is, by Constitutional action, amended or repealed.

That whereas, the judgment of the Courts, declaring that the Synod has power from time to time, by Canon, to dispose of the Surplus Commutation Fund, renders it more than ever incumbent upon the Synod to consider what, under the varying circumstances of the Diocese, may be the best disposition of the said fund; and whereas, the present Canon has now been in force for over ten years, the Synod hereby directs the Executive Committee to take the whole question of the disposition of the surplus Commutation Fund into full consideration, and to report thereon to the next meeting of the Synod, such report to be inserted in the Convening Circular.

Report of Diocesan Evangelist.

The Rev. P. E. DeLom presented the following report :

My Lord, and Gentlemen of the Synod :

It would not be proper that I should occupy the valuable time of this Synod with a lengthy account of my work as Diocesan Evangelist. I shall, therefore, confine myself to *facts* and *figures*, which, I believe, will prove of interest to you.

1. I have conducted no "mission" services except upon the invitation of the clergyman of the parish.

2. Since my appointment in the beginning of January, 1885, to the present time, I have conducted twenty-one "Parochial Missions," varying in length from

eight to twenty-three days each, only one of which, in Emmanuel Church, Detroit, of thirteen days, lay outside of our own Diocese.

3. During these special efforts (very careful preparation for which had invariably been made for many weeks, or even months, beforehand by the pastors of the various parishes, to which the *remarkable blessing*—God in His mercy has always given—may be largely attributed) I have, with the Rector or Incumbent, conducted from two to five (and in a few cases and places six) services a day of one kind and another, the attendance always steadily increasing to the end.

4. I desire to record my grateful praise to Almighty God for the strength He has granted me all through this period of the heaviest and most anxious work of my life, as also for the great interest shown in my work, and help afforded me whilst carrying it on, by the clergy who have invited me and their respective congregations; and not less than for these am I grateful for the ready hospitality and lovingly-given, spontaneous thank offerings of God's people, the farmers by no means excepted.

5. The following is a classified list of my work. I have conducted in part or in whole, *i. e.*, with or without help:

a. 101 short special morning services, with addresses, on week-days, and sometimes Sundays.

b. 187 afternoon Bible readings, and sometimes Sundays.

c. 206 week day evening services.

d. 106 Sunday services.

e. 65 celebrations of the Holy Communion, the communicants varying in number, according to size of congregation and duration of the evangelistic services, from 23 to 147 for the day.

f. 60 children's services, attendance varying from two or three score to between 800 and 1,000—the last an extraordinary case.

g. 67 "after meetings" and "services of prayer" for those under deep impression; attendance from a few to 300.

h. 15 services for men and boys (over 15) only, in which I could speak specially and plainly upon the subjects of Purity and Temperance. Attendance at these services, which have been always held on Sunday afternoons, has run from 38 to nearly 400.

i. 8 meetings for organization of Parochial or Local Branches of the C. E. T. S., at which meetings I have obtained several hundred signatures—nearly all to the total abstinence pledge.

j. I have labored 28 days, which give, beside the above, 79 extra services of various kinds not counted with the said "Parochial Missions."

6. The twenty "Parochial Missions" I have been asked to conduct within our Diocese afford particulars as follows, *viz.*:

7. In carrying on the above work I have been all along conscious of my own weakness, shortsightedness and lack of the experience which would have proved more valuable in special cases of personal dealing with anxious souls. It is often easier (under God) to win the careless than to build up professing but weak Christians. But, knowing that by the Lord "it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not," I have endeavored to consecrate what powers He gave me to His service in a work, which, at the first, I took up as a venture of faith, but which God so evidently owns and blesses, and which, therefore, is growing in importance daily. It is a matter of the utmost importance, and worthy of our most earnest prayers that God will raise up in the Canadian Church a "House" or "Association" of experienced ordained and lay evangelists, similar to those at home, and of late in our sister Church in the United States, who might be ready to assist clergymen in such a blessed work. The people are waiting, yes, hungry for this work, and will fill and throng and pack our churches wherever such work is done. All of which I respectfully submit as the humble servant of your Lordship and this Synod.

Church of England Temperance Society.

The Rev. P. B. DeLom presented the following report of the Huron Diocesan Branch C. E. T. S.:

Report of the Organizing Secretary of the Huron Diocesan Branch of the C. E. T. S. for the Year 1885 to 1886.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Huron (President) and the Diocesan Synod:

MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN OF THE SYNOD,—

In compliance with your request, I submit to yourself and the Synod a brief report (unfortunately too brief) of the work and present standing of the "Church of England Temperance Society" in this Diocese.

Previous to the year 1882 some seven clergymen and four laymen endeavored to awaken interest in our Synod for the formation of a Diocesan Branch of the C. E. T. S., and signed the pledges of the Society, and raised a small sum, by subscriptions of \$1 each, to purchase specimen material from the head office. This material was given away, and then interest flagged—almost died out—till in the Synod of 1884 (see Journal of that year, pages 38 and 52) a resolution was adopted, one clause of which authorized the calling of a public meeting in the Cronyn Hall. The meeting was held, your Lordship in the chair.

The pledges of the Society were signed by a large number of the Clerical and Lay Delegates, your present Organizing Secretary elected and a fresh impetus given to the work, which has been slowly, though steadily, gaining in importance ever since.

Last May twelvemonth, and this year, there was sent out a circular letter and form for the gathering of statistical information regarding the work of the Society in the various parishes of the Diocese, and appealing for funds to aid in the work and in the establishment of a limited Diocesan repository for C. E. T. S. material and literature. But this appeal only succeeded in calling in seven

reports in form and five gathered by myself in personal organization, and subscriptions and fees to the amount of \$54. Other parishes either ignored the appeal or had no report to make. I regret, therefore, to say that it is beyond my power to furnish a report for the Diocese at present, and, there being no funds appropriated at present to aid the Organizing Secretary in his work, he has not the means to obtain the requisite information for such report.

The following is a fairly accurate report of the Diocesan and twelve Parochial Associations from which returns have been made :

Diocesan Association—Clerical members, 35 ; Lay members, 19.

Parochial Association—Adult Section—Men, 379 ; women, 376. Juvenile Section—Boys, 259 ; girls, 262.

Total from twelve local branches (or parochial)—Adults, 755 ; children, 521 ; grand total, 1,276

The above will show an average of say 106 persons to each existing local branch. How magnificent the result would prove if we could only organize one such average branch in each of the 250 parishes and mission stations in the Diocese.

To build up a "Diocesan Church Temperance Organization" with a membership of 26,500 souls is worthy our best efforts and most earnest prayers.

Many Parochial and Local Associations (both adult and juvenile) have existence in the Diocese, of the strength of which no estimation can be given, as no reports have been received by the Secretaries.

In almost every parish or mission where I have labored as Diocesan Evangelist, I have urged more or less strongly, as I thought it advisable, the importance of the work and the claims of the C. E. T. S., sometimes, I am thankful to report, with much success and blessing.

Within a few weeks it is hoped that the annual returns from such Branch Associations as are in existence will have been made, and later on I trust to be able to report a fairly satisfactory progress.

I would respectfully submit that the value of an annual evening and public meeting of the Diocesan Association, during session of Synod, cannot be sufficiently estimated. If your Lordship could, as President, order such meeting and take the chair, great impetus would be annually given to the work.

If the annual "Temperance Sunday," asked for by resolution of the Synod of 1884, were appointed by your Lordship to be observed soon after the session of the Synod and the annual meeting of the Diocesan Association, it is more than likely that a warmth and enthusiasm would be imparted by these annual meetings to the united effort of the Diocese on that day which we could scarcely hope to gain at any other season.

I would also respectfully suggest that if your Lordship would call for special offerings to be put upon the plates on that day to aid in this important branch of Christian work, sufficient means would probably be forthcoming to warrant the more systematic and continuous work of a Secretary, who could devote more, or his whole time, to this work only.

I may add, in closing this report, that our Diocesan Association is now in affiliation with the Parent Society, 9 Bridge Street, Westminster, London, England, and is entitled to all privileges arising therefrom (amongst these, 25 per cent. discount on all purchases but badges.)

I have a limited supply of requisite materials for organization on hand, which can be seen in a show case in the Chapter House during this Synod week, and at all other times.

Adjournment of the Synod.

The Bishop rose to dismiss the Synod, and addressed them as follows :

He thanked the Synod for their attendance, and also for the kindly spirit and earnestness which they had shown in the prosecution of their duty. For the results of this session of the Synod he thanked God. Although they had not sat long, a great work had been accomplished. Through His blessing, and the fulfilment of the assurance "that all things work together for the good of those who love God," and by increased earnestness on their part, the Diocese, he said, will grow in grace and numbers. Difficulties had been overcome at this session that for long have hindered and retarded its action as a body enlisted in the services of Him who has fought the fight for us, and simply asks our feeble support. He hoped the voice of the Synod on the various questions had satisfied all, and expressing the hope for future advancement, he called the Synod to rise. The Synod rose, and the proceedings closed with the singing of the Doxology and prayer.

The Bishop pronounced the Benediction, and at 6:45 o'clock the Synod adjourned.
