# Trinity College School.

"Beati mundo corde."

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened May 1st, 1865. In consequence of the liberal offers of assistance made by the inhabitants of Port Hope, during the summer of 1868, the School was removed to that town, where it was established in buildings provided by the townspeople, free of rent for three years. Early in 1871, the property, consisting of ten acres of land, together with the buildings upon it, and situated on one of the. most picturesque sites in Canada, was purchased by the School. The erection of large permanent buildings, designed by H. Macdougall, Esquire, Architect, Toronto, was then proceeded with. They furnished ecommodation for about eighty boarders, with apartments for Masters, Matron, and Servants, and were occupied for the first time in January, 1872.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the Session of 1871-2, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor of the University of Trinity College, the Provost, and the Professors in Arts of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may from time to time be appointed by the Governing Body.

In the year 1873, a large and handsome Chapel, capable of containing more than three hundred worshippers, and a spacious Dining Hall, were erected at the east end of the new School building. The Chapel was opened for Divine Service by the Lord Bishop of Toronto, on Sunday, March 29th, 1874; the Dining Hall was formally opened on the 5th of November. 1873, by the Most Reverend A. Oxenden, D.C.L., Lord Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan. During the year 1877, the interior of the Chancel of the Chapel was beautifully decorated and completely furnished from designs by Frank Darling, Esquire, Architect, Toronto, as a memorial to the late Rev. Frederick Alexander Bethune, M.A., who died on the 20th of January, 1877, at Cannes, in France, and who had been for nine years an assistant master in the School. The Chancel was re-opened for Divine Service on the 18th of October.

At the western end of the original range of buildings there was added, during the year 1874, a large wing running north and south, with projecting towers on the west and south fronts. This addition contains spacious Class-rooms, School-hall, Dormitories for about seventy more Boys, and apartments for an increased staff of Masters and Servants. The completed buildings now present a south front of 300 feet in length, and a west front of 80 feet. They afford abundant room and every appliance for a School of at least 150 Boys.

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## Course of Instruction.

The Course of Instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Natural Sciences, Book-keeping, Drawing, Vocal Music, and Military Drill.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examination of the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, the Army, Navy, &c. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School System. Out-of-school government is, accordingly, to a large extent vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the Senior Boys by the Head Master.

## fees.

\$225 per annum, or \$75 per term for Board and Tuition.

\$60 per annum, or \$20 per term for Tuition only. The Piano-forte is taught as an extra. Fee, for tuition and use of instrument, \$10 per term.

Each new Boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance fee of \$4, which is devoted

to the maintenance and improvement of the Boys' Library, and a fee of \$12, in lieu of bedding, &c., which are now supplied by the School, instead of, as formerly, by the Pupils.

The above Fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, &c., and medical attendance.

The payments for Board and Tuition, which are apportioned between the School Terms, must be paid strictly in advance. All other School Accounts will be sent in the usual way.

A Half-term's Notice must be given in writing before the removal of a Pupil. If such notice is not given, a Half-term's Fees will be collected.

The following Rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870:

"The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for Books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a week after a Boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the Parent or Guardian for the amount (with Bank charges), at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishoneured, the Boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

Books and Stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

Boys over fourteen years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence as shall perfeetly : Body

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To secure admission a deposit of \$10 must be made on application, which will be accounted for when the Boy leaves the School.

# Exhibitions.

The Venerable John Wilson, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough, offers Two Exhibitions, of the annual value of \$50 each, to the Sons of the Clergy in the Province of Ontario, tenable from year to year, during the whole period of the recipient's residence at the School, provided that his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The Nomination to these Exhibitions rests in the hands of the Archdeacon, subject to the approval of the Head Master, to whom a letter testimonial of previous good conduct must be presented by the applicant.

The Rev. Henry Wilson, B.D., Kingston, offers an Exhibition (to be known as "The Montie Exhibition"), of the annual value of \$25, to the Son of a Clergyman of the Diocese of Ontario, upon the same terms, mutatis mutandis, as the "Wilson Exhibitions."

# Bursaries.

The Corporation offers to the Sons of the Clergy in the Dominion of Canada Twenty Bursaries of the

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School at

annual value of \$100 each, tenable from year to year, during the whole period of a Boy's residence at the School, so long as his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The Son of any Clergyman who is, or was at the time of his death, actually engaged in Parochial or Missionary work, or in a Church School or College, in the Dominion, shall be eligible for a Bursary. Written application must be made to the Corporation by the Parent or Guardian of the Boy, certifying that, without the aid thus afforded, the educational advantages of the School cannot be obtained for him. Ceteris paribus, preference will be given to the Sons of the Clergy in the Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario, Niagara, and Algoma.

# Lourding.

Boarders are received into the new School House, a building warmed and ventilated on the most approved modern system, and furnished with bath rooms and all other appliances which can promote the comfort and health of the Boys. It is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by five Resident Masters, who direct the Boys' evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by experienced Lady Matrons.

It is particularly requested that parents should send their Boys to School with all their clothing, linen, and other i

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d send n, and other requisites, carefully and clearly marked with the name in full.

It is desired that no catables should be sent to the Boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vacations at a charge of \$4 per week for board. No pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

It is recommended that pocket money should be supplied to the younger boys only through the Head Master, instead of directly from home. A small sum furnished weekly is more beneficial than an occasional larger amount.

During Term Prayers are said in the Chapel on Week-days at 8:45 in the Morning, and immediately

before study in the Evening. On Sundays there are full services at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. The Holy Comnunion is celebrated every alternate Sunday morning at 7:30.

# Terms,

The School Year is divided into three Terms, of about thirteen weeks each:—

Michaelmas Term, 1880: From September 9 to December 22.

Lent Term, 1881: January 13 to April 11. Trinity Term, 1881: April 25 to July 7.

## Vacations.

Two weeks at Easter; eight weeks at Midsummer: three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the holidays by the Grand Trunk, Great Western, Northern, St. Lawrence and Ottawa, Canada Central, and Midland Railways, for one fare and a third; and for the Midsummer holidays by the Ontario and Richelieu Company's steamboats, at greatly reduced rates.

## Examinations.

Examinations are held at the end of the Christmas and Summer half-years, the Midsummer Examination being conducted by the Professors of Trinity College.

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Christmas amination College. Removes are made only after these Examinations. General Proficiency Prizes are given at Christmas and Midsummer to the Head Boy of each Form. A report of the progress and general conduct of each Pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents or guardians, at the end of each half-term, and at the close of each Examination.

"The Lyttleton Prize," presented by a friend of the School, is awarded to the Boy in the Lower First Form who passes the best Examination in LatinGrammar.

A Special Prize is offered to the Second Form, by a Graduate of Trinity College, for Proficiency in Greek Grammar.

A Prize, offered by the Rev. Professor Boys for the best Collection in any department of Natural Science made by any Boy during the course of the School year, is awarded at the end of the Summer Vacation.

The Chancellor's Prize is awarded to the Head Boy of the School, according to the result of the Midsummer Examination.

A Prize offered by the Rev. W. E. Cooper, is awarded at Midsummer to the Boy who passes the best examination on the Book of Common Prayer.

A Bronze Medal, presented by Mrs. Perram and Mrs. Gaviller, is awarded annually, by vote of the Masters, to the Boy who has chiefly distinguished himself by "Steady Perseverance in Industry, Courtesy, and Integrity."
