



Hall is a lover of dogs, but he believes in keeping them in their place, and he loes not consider that the neighborhood of business houses is such place. When the by-law was reached Ald. Hall asked City Solicitor Mann if it was now in the form the city barrister

Mr. Mann replied that as Mr. Taylor had asked for a copy of the by-law as now drafted he would rather have that

'We want to know whether the city barrister is too busy to attend to this, or does not want to attend to it," said Ald. Hall. "Perhaps because there is a large number of men who wish to feed their vanity by bringing dogs into the commercial section, and who resent this by-law, he is willing to please them. If that is the case then it is for the commercial element to petition this council, expressing themselves in favor of this by-law; that they want dogs kept out. If the many who want a restricted zone cannot get it otherwise they must come here and demand the passage of this by-law. We want to know the facts about this delay."


The mayor interrupted to say that there was no desire on the part of the city barrister to delay the matter. He romised to see Mr. Taylor.


