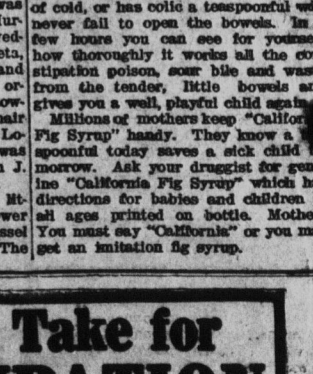

A Little Talk About Field Folk

FIVE MINUTES WITH THE FAMOUS

Major P. Molesworth Sykes, who has been employed on Government service for some years in Persia and Balauchistan, has had some exciting and interesting experience during his travels. He has hunted down bandits, organized caravans of Oriental carpets and silks, and explored the old routes of Alexander the Great. He scaled a mountain 18,000 feet high, which was covered with ice until the summer was nearly reached, and there the ground became so hot that it burnt the boots of the explorers, and from great holes in the ground steam and sulphur were blown out with terrific noise. In another mountain he found a cave, winding for miles, and filled with skeletons ranged in perfect preservation. A dwarf was the guardian of these curious cat-comb.

The late Sir James Laing, the great Sunderland shipbuilder, started as an ordinary workman in his father's shipyard when he was quite a youth. In 1856 he had the keel of the first vessel turned out by his firm, which has since built ships for many of the most influential lines in the world.

The Prince of Wales was much struck on a visit to Australia and New Zealand with the camel movement. On several occasions he saw the march past of thousands of camels, armed and equipped at the expense of their respective governments, able to go through these military exercises, and provided, in some cases, with a grant of practice ammunition.

Sir William MacCormac, the great surgeon, was the son of a doctor, and was born in Belfast the year before Queen Victoria came to the throne. He was educated at Queen's College, Belfast, and began to take an interest in medical matters at a very early age. During the Franco-German war Sir William MacCormac acted as surgeon-in-chief to the Anglo-American ambulance, and was present at the battle of Sedan.

The late Sir Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett was born at Brooklyn, New York State; but his grandparents on both sides were British subjects. He was very proud of the fact that he was descended from a Robert Bartlett who sailed to New England in the ship Ann, in 1623, and married Mary Warren, who sailed with the Pilgrim Fathers in the Mayflower, in 1620. Sir Ellis was given the name of "Ellis," or the "Councillor," by the Queen of Swaziland, in recognition of some services he did her people. He saw fighting in Thessaly between the Turks and Greeks, and was taken prisoner by the captain of a Greek warship, who accused him of being a spy.

Prince Arthur of Connaught, his sisters, and their cousins were frequently allowed to invite their friends to Oshana. As one of these parties the children of an admiral living at Portmouth were present. They were accompanied by an Irish nurse who, to Queen Victoria's intense amusement, fell over her knees directly she saw her Majesty, and addressed her constantly, while she was giving intimate particulars of her home and relatives in Ireland, as "Oh, Queen!"

Common Council Special Meeting

Issue of Bonds of \$463,500 Authorized—Will Negotiate for Sale of \$820,900 of Bonds.

At the special meeting of the common council held yesterday afternoon the issue of bonds to the extent of \$463,500 was authorized and the Mayor, chamberlain and comptroller were authorized to negotiate for the sale of \$820,900 bonds, running from five to forty years, all bearing six per cent interest.

Commissioner Frink took the chair and the Mayor moved for the issue of the following bonds: \$4,000 five years for the new police patrol and ambulance; \$5,000 ten years for Douglas Avenue sewers; \$19,500 fifteen years for heating plant for west side sheds; two engines for the public works department and paving of Lansdowne Avenue, North Wharf and Gormail Street; \$12,000 twenty years for water services to Douglas Avenue lots and workshop for the harbor department on west side; \$264,000, ten years renewable for forty years for retaining walls, Adelaide Road work, sewers and Newnam Brook work.

There was some little discussion as to advisability of making some of the bonds for \$100 each but this was decided against as there would have been no legislation obtained and a former attempt at selling small bonds had not proven successful.

The issue of these bonds amounting to \$463,500 was authorized and on motion the Mayor, chamberlain and comptroller were given authority to open negotiations for the sale of these bonds for \$820,900 already passed for the Spruce Lake water extension, a grant of \$20,000 to be made to the city engineer as the representative of the Turnbull Elevator Company wished to be heard.
