TEMPERANCE LEGISLATION IN THE WEST.
The temperance men in some of the
Western States have fairly outstripped
the authors of the Maine law in the
stringency of their provisions in regard
to the sale of intoxicating drinks, and
while granting licenses under certain
conditions, so long as the same are
used for medicinal purposes, they
prohibit a dealer selling under a
license runs a greater risk than dealers
selling without license in most of the
States where the sale of liquor is entirely

prohibited. A bill has passed the Lower
House of the Indiana Legislature, and is
likely to become a law which affords
a fair example of the extreme
measures suggested in some of the
Western States for checking the spread
of intemperance. This bill provides that
the sale or giving away of liquor to be
drank on the premises without a license
shall be considered illegal, and that no
person shall obtain a license until he has
deposited a security signed by a majority
of the voters in the petitioner's ward, town,
or township. It declares that any person
who shall sell or give away liquor to
any person, or to any person who is
intoxicated, shall be liable for a fine
not less than \$10, nor more than \$50,
and for costs. It provides that any husband,
wife, child, parent, guardian, employer,
or other person who shall be injured in
person, or property, or means of support,
by any intoxicated person, shall have a
right of action in his or her own name,
severally or jointly, against the person or
persons who have been instrumental in
causing such intoxication by giving or
selling liquor, and hold the owner of
the building in which the liquor was
sold equally liable with the vendor for
any damages, provided that execution
shall first be levied on the property
of the vendor. A person who supplies
liquor to any person who is drunk, or
in the habit of becoming drunk, is made
liable to fine and imprisonment, and other
provisions of great stringency are included
in the bill. Under such a law strictly
enforced, a man would be obliged to
behave with great caution in the sale
of liquor, and even if urged thereby by
well-wishers, would be obliged to
refuse to sell, or to sell only to a
responsible party.

This question, and also who gave Mur-
phy & Co. the privilege of using the
bells in the city, were discussed at the
Common Council meeting yesterday.
A number of the members answered by
saying they had signed a request to allow
Mr. Murphy to have the use of the bells,
in order that the 300 hands employed in
the building might be forced to be
looked after, he making visits frequently
to the engine room to see that all was
right. We don't see that any blame can
attach to him for allowing a piece of
machinery, at the time not in use, to be
used in helping one of our branches of
industry.

St. John Building Society.
At a meeting of this society held last
evening it was resolved to proceed with
the erection of a terrace on their Pitt St.
property. D. B. Dunham, Esq., has sup-
plied plans and estimates of the buildings
which are to cost \$23,000. The President
believed that at the rate business
was continuing during the past year, the
society would be able to build those
houses without curtailing other opera-
tions in any way. The buildings will be
called Welles Terrace.

Common Council.
The conflict met yesterday at 8 p. m.,
His Worship Mayor Reed presiding.
The Harbor Committee reported in favor
of allowing the Hon. John Robertson to
erect sheds on his wharf, as he had re-
quested, leaving a thoroughfare 15 feet
wide along the western side. Ald. Rowan
wanted the sheds to extend 80 feet further
to the south than had been agreed to by
the committee. A discussion arose, one
or two motions were made, and finally
the report was handed back to the com-
mittee for further consideration. Several
police and fire accounts were ordered to
be paid.

The Street Committee recommended
that the Chamberlain be authorized to
borrow \$5,000 for scavenger work in the
spring. Ald. Rowan opposed borrowing
any more money, and presented a state-
ment showing that there was already a
deficit of \$11,774, he therefore moved
that the section be struck out of the re-
port. This section was referred back to
the committee.

The report of the Deverage and Water
Commissioners of the West-Indies, that
the \$40,000 of their disposal had all been
used, and they asked that a bill be pre-
pared for a further issue of debentures.
Mr. E. H. Burpee's offer to purchase at
par the stock of the city in the Carleton
Branch Railway, with No. 1 of the
Corporation property, was rejected.
Mr. James Reid asked that he be granted
an examination for branch pilot for this
port. The matter was referred to the
Board of Examiners.

A communication was read from Mr.
Peterson, Secretary of the Committee,
to prepare a new bill restricting the sale
of liquor, asking that a Committee be ap-
pointed from the Council to confer with
the gentlemen who had the matter in
hand. Granted, and Aldermen Peters,
McCordell, Duffell, Kerr, Ferguson, and
Councillors Cassidy and Clark were ap-
pointed as such committee.

Messrs. John Sandall and H. A. Glas-
gow were appointed Auditors of the
School reports and accounts.
The report of the Chief of Police for
1872 was read. The members of the
Council did not want to have anything to
do with it, and sent it to the Police Com-
mittee.

Alderman Ferguson moved that a bill
be prepared to extend the right of fran-
chise in Civic elections. This was ac-
cused by Ald. Kerr. Ald. Rowan thought
this was doing too much at once and
moved it was referred to the Bill Com-
mittee, which was carried.
Several Bills and accounts were read,
and after the West side members had
discussed the Ferry grievances the Council
adjourned.

Request on the Victims of the Fatal
Hotter Explosion at Murphy's Brass
Factory.
The inquest on the bodies of Holden B.
Borden and Thomas Murphy, engineer
and fireman, was commenced yesterday
afternoon. The jury were duly sworn at
the residence of the deceased in Peters
street. The jurymen are:
W. K. Dincock, Foreman, Thos. Young-
classe, Ed. Farren, John B. Smith, A. E.
Mundee, A. McEvoy, Colos Carpenter.
The jury viewed the body of Borden in
Peters street and then proceeded to Erin
street and viewed the body of Thomas
Murphy, after which they adjourned to
the Court House.
Gray the watchman was the first wit-
ness called. He was present at the time
of the explosion. Borden was sitting on
the wheel of the engine regulating the
steam. He was told by a young man
named Smith that the water was very
low in the boiler. The boiler had a glass
water gauge. He suddenly felt the floor
rising under his feet and heard the noise
of the explosion and immediately he
heard Smith calling him to help him out;
they did so and afterwards lights were
produced and they found Borden and
Murphy's bodies.
Thomas G. Ralston, shoe manufacturer
or Murphy's building, went into the
factory at twenty-five minutes past nine;
went into the engine room; examined
the steam gauge which indicated about
80 lbs. and was ordinarily pressure.
He had some conversation with the en-
gineer as to how she had been run-
ning. The engineer (Borden) said
she was running very well and using
very little coal. He then went up
stairs into the room over Mr. Murphy's
store. He was talking to one of the
men when the explosion took place
which threw him off his seat, enveloped
him in steam; at the same time the
lights went out. He went to the win-
dow and broke some panes of glass to
get fresh air, after which he went away.
Borden was not a regular engine driver,
but had been placed in charge by Mr.
Murphy, and had driven the engine ten
days and ran very steady. The boiler
was always considered good and
strong and was owned by the Corpora-
tion, but no examination had ever been
made of the engine.
Joseph Andrews, M. D., was the next
witness: He was first called to see a
young man who had been injured at the
explosion. He was then called to see
Murphy, the fireman. He had a wound
over his right eye; on examination with
a probe it was found to have been done
by some instrument that had penetrated
the brain and was sufficient to produce
death. Afterwards went to see Borden;
he was so mangled that death must have
been instantaneous.
Samuel Perry, a steam fire engine
driver, was then called. He ran the
engine last fall for the Corporation and
this was being too much at once and
moved it was referred to the Bill Com-
mittee, which was carried.
Several Bills and accounts were read,
and after the West side members had
discussed the Ferry grievances the Council
adjourned.
