Report to be read by the Secretary.

Moved by Rev. R. Robb, seconded by Rev. Wm. Crosscombe—

I. That the Report now read be adopted.

Moved by Rev. Richard Knight, seconded by L. Shannon,
Esq. Supported by Hon. Hugh Bell—

II. That as the provisions of grace are commensurate to the necessities of the world, and the Scripture repeatedly asserts the Will of God, that the glad tidings of Salvation should be made known to every creature under heaven: we lament the comparatively limited sphere of present Missionary operations, and in the name of the Lord, resolve upon its enlargement.

REPORT.

In obedience to the call of duty, we address ourselves to our annual task of furnishing a report, so far as our means will admit, of the proceedings, circumstances, and prospects of the Wesleyan Missionary Society.

With no ordinary feelings of gratitude to God the giver of all good, we record the pleasing fact, that the last annual Report from home, announces a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of £766 14s. 10d. How different is this from what we have been accustomed to hear! How gratifying the prospect which opens before us! The Committee freed from a debt of no ordinary magnitude, and which severely taxed the income of the Society in the shape of interest, threatening us with a Bankrupt Treasurer, and dissolved Committee, and deserted Missions; and which in various ways really operated as an incubus upon the Committee, crippling their energies,—compelling them to turn a deaf ear to many urgent solicitations to enter upon new and promising fields of labour, and to afford but comparatively limited supplies to long established missions—the Committee we repeat, free from this onerous, wasting debt, feel themselves much encouraged to conclude that the great cause in which they are engaged, has an abiding interest in the best feelings of the christian community, while the success, with which in very many instances, the great Head of the church has crowned the labours of his servants, affords the high sanction of his approbation to this lofty enterprise.

It must indeed be admitted, that the unavoidable curtailment of the number of Missionaries on some very valuable fields of labour, and these in circumstances which demanded an augmented, instead of diminished supply, has had the effect of considerably reducing the number annually reported as added members. But this though much to be lamented, cannot, candidly considered, be conclusive of any other cause than the one assigned. Let us for example, consider the case of a Missionary in a foreign land, engaged in cultivating an enclosure lately re-

claimed from the moral wilderness; among a people sincere but comparatively ignorant, and unsuspecting and consequently an easy prey for designing men. Suppose him alone, devoid of the assistance which mutual counsel and concentrated effort can afford, with his authority denied by men of lofty pretensions and sanctimonious bearing, who seek to convert the simplicity of the people to the furtherance of their ambitious views. Suppose further the wasting influence of a tropical climate, upon an European constitution and can we marvel if under such circumstances the cause shall decline! Why no. It is morally impossible for any man when oppressed by the languor of disease, to attend to the absorbing duties of the ministry, and at the same time meet the enemy in the field, and fortify his people against the seductions of error. Nehemiah could build the temple of the Lord, with the sword girt by his side, but he was sustained by his co-patriots, otherwise little of his labour could have remained to work confusion among the adherents of Sanballat and Tobiah.

Sustained and strengthened by these brethren, the missionaries, trusting in God, and in the goodness of their cause, can build the walls and shout for joy upon the ramparts, and boldly meet the enemies in the gates, and lead the chosen band to victory; but they cannot work miracles—they cannot do the work of effective men, when consumed by fever—they cannot singly accomplish what united efforts alone can perform.

We now proceed agreeably to our proposal to report the sayings and doings of the Society, as far as our means will admit, and first we turn to Ireland, that country on many accounts so pre-eminently interesting.

IRELAND.

"In Ireland, amidst many difficulties, and in some parts, much opposition, the work of the Lord continues to advance, and the truth of God to prevail. The operations of the Mission embrace the establishment and extension of Missionary Stations, and the enlargement and increase of Missionary Schools; and although to the cursory observer the progress of truth may not be apparent, yet an examination of the present state of our Missions and Schools, as compared with that of former times, will prove that the means employed have been accompanied by the surmounting blessing of God.

There are upwards of sixty Mission Day Schools, containing more than four thousand six hundred children, above half of whom read the Scriptures."

GERMANY.

Mr. Muller is faithfully and successfully prosecuting his sacred work, amidst suffering and some opposition from the Romish Church. He reports a pleasing revival of the work of God.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.

"The prospects of the Society in this important district encourage renewed exertions. The Missionaries have to contend with many hostile influences, which in some places, for a time, seem to frustrate their endeavours; but, on the whole, they have abundant reason to thank God and take courage."

"The English department of the work in Paris is in a flourishing state. Although the gallery of the Chapel has been considerably enlarged, there is not yet sufficient accommodation for all who are anxious to attend the principal public religious service at twelve o'clock, on the Lord's day; and several persons are frequently obliged to retire, not being able to obtain admission into the Chapel, in consequence of the crowded state of the congregation. It is cause of thankfulness that the ministration of the word has been accompanied by the Divine blessing, and that many have been seriously impressed with the truths which they have heard,—several of whom have already obtained an experimental acquaintance with their saving power. A cheering measure of success has been also vouchsafed by the great Head of the Church to the French department of the work."

"The Committee have received a letter containing the afflictive intelligence that our public religious services, at Lausanne, have been put a stop to by the Civil authorities; who threatened that if their mandate for closing them were not immediately obeyed it would be carried into effect by force. The persecuted Missionaries and the people of their charge, the Committee are sure, will have the sympathy and prayers of all the Friends of the Society."

GIBRALTAR.

"This Station exhibits, in its several departments of the work, marks of improvement. The religious services are numerously attended, and an increase in the number of Church-Members, as well as of Scholars in the Mission-School, is reported; while renewed exertions are made by our indefatigable Missionary and his coadjutors of other religious bodies, to diffuse more widely evangelical truth in all the quarters to which they have access. "On review of the character and influence of our Mission here," Mr. Hull remarks, "I am more and more satisfied of the importance of the position which we hold in relation to the population of our rock, and the adjacent countries. God, I believe, has greatly honoured us as instruments for keeping alive and extending the influence of an evangelical Protestantism, and for disseminating those truths and principles which shall ultimately liberate mankind from the shackles of a shameless infidelity, and a puerile superstition. With the confidence of your fostering care, and the blessing of the Great Head of the Church, we commence the New Year with revived hopes, and trust that the indications of spiritual good with which we have been favoured, shall be more fully developed during its progress."

ASIA.

"It is satisfactory to know that the Missions in the Northern or Tamul District are in a very prosperous state; a considerable increase having taken place in the Societies, Congregations, and Schools. An arrangement has been made with the Committee of the British and Foreign Bible Society, by which the services of the Rev. Peter Percival, the Society's Missionary at Jaffna, are secured to the very important task of completing the Revision of the Holy Scriptures in the Tamul language, for the Jaffna Auxiliary Bible-Society.

In Batticaloa, "for the last five years, heathenism has been giving way before the truth, and now shows stronger marks of decay than ever. A great many temples are entirely shut up, and a number more nearly deserted; so that Priests and *Pusaries* are at a considerable discount, and either starve or turn to other employments."

The time would fail to tell of all the painfully and pleasingly interesting events reported; suffice it to say, they report progress, undiminished fidelity on the part of the Missionaries, and success as much as can be reasonably expected from their circumstances.

"The Missions in India have in view the spiritual interests of the two classes of the population, viz. the European and English-speaking class, and the Native class, which use the vernacular languages. The Missionaries at Madras and Bangalore have access to a very large English-speaking population, and have had the satisfaction of seeing the most encouraging results of their labors. Taking as a specimen, the English congregation at Poonamallee, the testimony of the Missionaries is very satisfactory: they say, "At Poonamallee there are twenty-four members in our Society. During the last year public worship has been conducted there as formerly; not, however, so often as would have been the case, had we more Missionaries on the Station. Since our last Report of this Society was made, four members have been added; and some of those whom we then numbered have been removed to distant Stations, which circumstance will account for the total now presented not exceeding that of last year. We have always found it beneficial to visit this humble people: no man can view the triumphs of the grace of the Gospel, as discovered in some of them, without intense interest; nothing but that grace, no earthly wisdom or expedient, could produce the changes which are observed here. The recklessness and indifference of the soldier are happily succeeded by the teachableness and simplicity of children. Here are those who spent their early years in intemperance and profligacy, 'now clothed and in their right mind.' The close of their life is more tranquil than its dawn; having nearly finished their pilgrimage, they serenely wait for the coming of Him who 'hath called them out of darkness into marvellous light.'"

The Missionaries at Madras correspond with a band of Christian soldiers at Aden, in Arabia, who consider themselves under their pastoral care. They are doing well, and have just finished the erection of their Chapel, the dimensions of which are 52 feet by 30.

Throughout the whole of the Stations in India, very great attention is paid by the Missionaries to the subject of education. Upwards of Two Thousand Children are receiving a Christian education; of whom Nineteen Hundred and Fifty-one are boys, and One Hundred and Forty-eight are girls. The Schools for Native Girls in Madras, Negapatam, Bangalore, and Mysore, are very pleasing and useful establishments. We give Extracts from the Reports concerning them."

FRIENDLY ISLANDS.

"The state of the Missions in the principal groups—TONGATABU, HAAI, and VAVAU—has not undergone any remarkable change, since the publication of our last Report. The Missionaries in TONGATABU, while lamenting the

misconduct of some of their charge, write, that at *Nukualofa* "many of our people, however, are walking worthy of their high vocation. The same may be said of our converts at *Hihifo*, where Mr. Wilson resides, and at *Makanga*, to which place Mr. Miller was removed soon after the last District-Meeting, as a preparatory step to our obtaining permission to re-occupy the large fort of *Mua*, where Mr. Lawry resided twenty-two years ago."

During the year many heathen villages in various parts of the Island have been visited, and a number of the people have been led to cast away their idols and turn to the living and true God. Every where, the Missionaries say, "Idolatry is falling away, the prejudices of the inhabitants are yielding, and wherever we go we are made welcome, and our conversation is listened to with attention. We have commenced preaching at two new places, and others are opening to us." There are three Romish Priests in the Island, who are exerting themselves to lead away our people from the simplicity of the Gospel, and to prevent the heathen from embracing "the truth, as it is in Jesus;" but hitherto their endeavours have not been attended with much success. From *HABAI*, and *VAVAU*, the Missionaries write much in the same strain. They also are encouraged by the good conduct of many of the people, while they dwell on the difficulties common to the work in that part of the Mission-field. All concur in the conclusion that our converts generally need the most vigilant ministerial and pastoral attention; while they unite in supplication that a larger outpouring of the Spirit may be vouchsafed to the Churches and congregations placed under their care."

FEEJEE.

"In this important District, the Society's Missionaries are still subject to serious interruption in their peaceful labours, by the notes of war, and are frequently surrounded by scenes revolting to humanity. In consequence of the sanguinary contest which was going on in *Rewa*, at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Missionaries, the temporary removal of the Missionary and Mission-property to the neighbouring Island of *Vua* was deemed necessary by all but Mr. Jaggar himself; who, in a spirit and manner which deeply affected his brethren, expressed his willingness to risk his life by remaining at his Station. To this heroic proposal the Meeting could not, however, consent; as there appeared the greatest probability that the town of *Rewa* would be burned to ashes, and the inhabitants killed or scattered by the invaders. He was accordingly removed to a place of greater safety, from which he would be able to visit *Rewa* occasionally as opportunities might offer. Before the Meeting terminated, the arrival of a Romish Bishop and two Priests at *Lakemba*, threatened the Missionaries with annoyance and opposition of another kind. The King, however, was unwilling to receive them; and although the Bishop contrived to leave the two Priests at an outer Island, from whence they went to *Lakemba* under the pretence of waiting there until they could obtain a passage to a distant place, it is gratifying to learn that those emissaries of evil had not, at the date of the latest accounts, made any considerable impression in their favour upon the minds of the Natives. On the contrary, Mr. Hunt writes, "They are despised and neglected by the people; and even those who appeared friendly to their cause are not very promising adherents." With respect to the prospects of the Society in *FEEJEE*, generally, they are such as to call for especial prayer to Almighty God, that he may continue to watch over and protect the devoted and self-denying Missionaries who are there employed, and also pour out a larger measure of the influences of the Holy Spirit upon the minds and hearts of the people among whom the Gospel is already introduced. And there is also cause for holy rejoicing on account of the good which has been effected. The work in *Feejee*, as the excellent Chairman of the District correctly remarks, "makes but little show; yet its silent progress is remarkable, considering the shortness of the time the Mission has been established, and the fewness of the laborers employed in it."

SOUTHERN AFRICA.

"At Cape-Town uninterrupted peace has prevailed in our Religious Society during the year, with no opposition from without. A gradual increase of the Congregations has been apparent in both the English and Dutch departments of the work;—deep religious impressions have been made upon the minds of many;—and some have been evidently converted to God. The Members of our Church are active and persevering in their respective labours of love; and hence the Day-School, the Sunday-Schools—two for children in English, and one in Dutch for the adults, who are likewise regularly instructed three evenings in the week; and the weekly engagements with the seventy children, who are met in Bible and Preparatory classes, are kept up with spirit."

"The Great Head of the Church has been pleased to prosper the endeavors of the Missionaries at *Imparani* during the year, in promoting the gradual growth of grace and spirituality of mind in our people, and also in the increasing numbers and earnest desire of those who are emerging from the darkness and death of heathenism into the light and life of the glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ. Several persons have been admitted by baptism into the Church of Christ, all of whom bore a good testimony to the saving grace of God; three couples have been united in holy matrimony; fourteen persons have obtained peace with God, are walking in the liberty of his children, and are now admitted into Church-Membership. The School-department has not prospered as could be desired, owing to the want of a regular attendance of the children. This arises principally from their being obliged to herd cattle, &c.; for almost every Mosuto has a few cattle or sheep, and many of them both. Our Members generally, however, make it a point of conscience to attend both the Sabbath and Day School, and are making considerable progress in their knowledge of such portions of the Scriptures as have been printed."

WESTERN AFRICA.

"The Station at *St. Mary's* is in a hopeful condition. The ministerial labours of the Missionaries are attended with the Divine blessing, and the School-department under the able management of Mr. Lynn, is operating very beneficially upon the rising generation."

"THE GOLD-COAST.—The intelligence received from this highly interesting part of the Mission-field is, as usual, of a mixed character. Many are the difficulties, and formidable the obstacles, which in some places present themselves; but the success vouchsafed by the Great Head of the Church, to the labours of his servants, is so decided as to afford abundant encouragement to steady perseverance. The Rev. Thomas B. Freeman, since his return to the Coast, has been indefatigably employed in facilitating arrangements for carrying out most efficiently the Committee's plans for the furtherance of the work; and the Reports from the several Stations are generally satisfactory."

"Earnest and pressing invitations have been given to the Missionary, by the Chiefs residing in the principal towns near Kumasi, to visit those towns, and there to preach to the people. With some of those invitations Mr. Chapman complied, as time and opportunity served; but, in other instances, the Chiefs sought in vain for instruction, it being found impossible, without neglecting other most important duties, to comply with their urgent applications. To meet all these cases Kumasi must have been left without a Teacher, there being no other Missionary on the spot to supply such lack of service."

"In the public streets and markets of Kumasi, the Missionary can now preach without restraint, and there fearlessly, on the authority of the word of God, denounce those crimes to speak against which was formerly regarded as treasonable. Multitudes have often listened with intense interest, as their murderous and abominable practices have been protested against, and the ultimate consequences of such doings have been set before them. The time was when the

life of the person who should venture to speak against those practices would have been taken; it is, however, not so now. Their most fondly-cherished national and religious ceremonies may be attacked in "the name of the Lord;" and to assert that such things are condemned by the "Book of God," is at all times considered a sufficient reason not to argue in their favour."

"It is also gratifying to know that, in several instances, the influence of Gospel principles has been so far brought to bear upon the funeral "customs" of the people, as to result in saving from death many persons designed for sacrifice: in one instance, twelve persons were so preserved from a violent death; and, on other occasions, a greater or less number has been kept from the hand of the common executioner. Several interesting cases of this kind occurred during the first year. An important and firm hold has been taken upon the public mind; many privately asserting that the total abolition of their bloody funeral rites would afford them unmingled satisfaction. "We," say many of the chiefs, "are ready to give up the practice, but who shall take the lead in such a movement?" It may be confidently anticipated that if Missionary operations be carried on with vigour in the kingdom of Ashanti, in that kingdom there will soon be found cause to rejoice over the total destruction of one of the most sanguinary superstitions under which the afflicted heathens groan, and to which for centuries they have been the trembling slaves."

"The latest communication received by the Committee from Mr. Annear was dated, Badagry, October 11. Up to that period, Kosoko had not commenced his threatened assault upon the place, but it was understood that he was making preparations for the accomplishment of his design. The Mission-premises, however, had been twice broken into by evil-designing persons, and the Porto Novos had come down to renew their attacks, but were frightened away by the providential appearance of one of Her Britannic Majesty's ships of war. The Badagris had, moreover, been thrown into consternation by the arrival of a messenger, who had been sent by the King of Dahomi to rebuke them for withholding from him his accustomed tribute. In the midst of these dangers, Mrs. Annear became the mother of a fine child; but, unmoved by the threatening aspect of affairs, she nobly concurred in the resolution of her devoted husband to remain at the post of duty, when an opportunity of quitting it was presented by the arrival of an English cruiser. The officers, Mr. Annear remarks, "soon saw that it was not such an easy thing for us to leave. Here are Thirty children belonging to our School, who live upon the Mission-premises, for whom no man would comparatively care in such a case. Here are also scores of British subjects from Sierra Leone, who look up to us, and whose prospects would be of the most gloomy character should we abandon them. Here are also a few who have been brought to the saving knowledge of God by the instrumentality of our endeavours, from whom it would be hard to part. And our comfortable house and premises, and our delightful place of worship, have cost too much labour to be easily abandoned. When the proposition for leaving was first presented to me, I at once adverted in my mind to the toil endured by our worthy Superintendent (Mr. Freeman), in the establishment of this our little Zion, and then to the conflicts by which we have maintained it, and the signal providential deliverances which our Great Head has vouchsafed to us. These things, viewed in connexion with the dawning of day in the dark interior, and 'the signs of the times' in the regions beyond, at once led me to determine not to retrograde, or abandon one inch of ground. Every step won had been hardly contested; struggle had preceded victory; and now that the crisis was arriving,—that the point was to be decided, and won too,—to abandon our post was out of the question. All our anxieties, distresses, and racking cares shall soon be remunerated abundantly, and we shall find every effort to suppress the reign of the Slave-trade and slavery, and promote 'peace and good will among the people, attended with a corresponding amount of success.'"

AMERICA.

WEST INDIES.—The Committee after detailing some pleasing circumstances of success, which have resulted from Ministerial and Educational efforts, advert with painful feelings to the operation of various circumstances which have materially retarded the progress of the blessed work.

"In those Colonies, society has been placed, within the last few years, in greatly altered circumstances; and a new state of things is rapidly growing up. In Jamaica, more particularly, many of the working people are purchasing lots of land, and commencing cultivators of the soil on their own account. The population is thus becoming more extensively diffused over the face of the country. In this movement, many of the people who were attached to the several Stations of the Society in that Island have separated in various directions; and in their new localities find themselves widely distant from each other, and placed in unfavourable circumstances for attending those places of worship in which they had been accustomed to congregate together. But while this process has been going on,—a process which created the necessity for such an increase in the number of Missionaries as would enable them to follow and watch over their scattered flocks,—the pecuniary difficulties of the Society have compelled the Committee to leave without a supply important vacancies in our Missionary ranks, occasioned by sickness or death; and thus, in effect, to diminish rather than increase the total number of Missionaries in actual service. Had all those whom the Society's Missionaries were unable, from the paucity of their number, to follow, only been provided for by Evangelical Ministers of other denominations, they would not have been lost to the Church of Christ, although separated from the Missionaries who had been instrumental in first gathering them into the fold; but it is cause of deep regret that several have been very much absorbed again in the world, have entered anew into its spirit, and devoted themselves with undue ardour to its pursuits; or they remain exposed without protection."

In British North America, including the Western and Eastern Canada, Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, Newfoundland, and the Territories of the Honourable the Hudson's Bay Company, the Missions still afford commanding interest, both as providing means of grace and salvation to the resident population, and self-denying and successful efforts on behalf of the Indians, many of whom, notwithstanding their predatory habits, and licentious practices, have been brought to God, and their children to receive instruction and discipline. The Committee say:—

"It is a pleasing event in the history of our Colonial Missions, to find that Missions established for the benefit of the heathen, are promoting the religious welfare of professing Christians who have emigrated from this country to the distant Provinces of the Empire. The Committee hail this feature in the enterprise in which they are engaged with feelings of devout gratitude to the Author of all good, and fervently hope that such results may be speedily and greatly augmented. The older Members of the Indian Society at *Alderville* continue to abide in the truth, and are evidently advancing in the divine life, while some have finished their course and have entered into the "rest" which "remaineth to the people of God." A spirit of benevolence is manifesting itself throughout this Mission, the beneficial influence of which has been seen in other acts; in addition to the noble one mentioned in the last Report, relating to the Indian brethren in Council, having, under the direction of their Chief, Shawundaia (John Sunday), and with the cordial concurrence of His Excellency LORD

METCALFE, and the Head of the Indian department, agreed to appropriate One Hundred Pounds per annum from their public fund, towards the support of the Society's Manual-Labour School connected with this Station, and at which their children are boarded and educated. This proceeding on the part of the Indians is not only valuable and gratifying, as an indication of their increasing sense of the value of those spiritual blessings and social advantages, which, through the Gospel have been communicated to them, but because there is good reason to hope, that the munificent example set by the *Alderville* Indians, will be speedily imitated by others, and thus additional means be provided for their further instruction in those things which pertain to the kingdom of God. The Indian Society at *St. Clair* has been preserved in peace and unity during the year, and the Classes are in a prosperous state. An attempt, made by three Romish Priests, to seduce these simple people from the fold into which they had been gathered ended in utter defeat and disappointment, notwithstanding the perseverance and subtlety with which these "false teachers" conducted their operations. The Missionary delivered several lectures to the Indians on the awful errors of Popery, and privately, as well as publicly, exhorted the people under his care to "hold fast the form of sound words" which they had received. By the blessing of God on these endeavours the adversary was successfully resisted. Several visits have been made to the branch of the *St. Clair* Mission established on the *Sable River*: two classes have been formed which are in a good state, and there is every prospect of a still greater increase. Whilst the state of religion amongst the Indians is reported to be prosperous, the Lord has graciously revived his work amongst the surrounding Colonists, and the White Members of Society are increasing in number and piety. The Committee will only add that they have perceived, with much pleasure, from the financial returns which have been made to them from the District-Meeting, that the larger proportion of the grant, made to the District for the current year, has been appropriated towards the support of the Indian Missions, and of our operations in the White Settlement, which has an Indian Mission connected with it."

Thousands of the inhabitants attend our Ministry, and highly esteem the spiritual worship and godly discipline of Wesleyanism, and know from experience that the word of the Lord administered to them is profitable for every saving purpose. From time to time a grand unanswerable argument of a divinely authorised Ministry is afforded in the conversion of sinners, not merely from one opinion to another, but from sin to holiness—conversion which yields the precious fruits of personal and relative piety. Hundreds of children, catechised and instructed in the principles of religion, and as the subjects of earnest solicitude frequently brought before the Lord in the spirit of earnest supplication and prayer, constitute a pleasing subject of hope for future days, and in some considerable number of instances already afford much promise. Every year witnesses the demise of some, who pass to the regions of immortality, rejoicing in the full assurance of hope, and while they ascribe their salvation to God and the Lamb, they recognise as his chosen instruments the agents of this Society.

But while we thus acknowledge the hand of the Lord's bless-

sing in these important results, and rejoice in the confidence inspired ; we may not for an instant suppose that less devotion to the sacred cause will be required for the future, than was demanded for the past. The Committee intimate that to resuscitate and strengthen the wasted and enfeebled portions of the cause, and to conserve the vigorous and flourishing ones, will require the whole of their present resources, and to this they pledge themselves. But can this satisfy us ? What then ! shall the millions of Pagan worshippers continue in their besotted, demoralised condition, devoting themselves to the Devil, and their children to Moloch ? Is the crescent of Mahomet always to dispute pre-eminence with the Sun of righteousness ? Must the Jews ever remain with the veil of unbelief on their hearts ? God forbid that the christian world should thus calmly resign the world lying in wickedness to their fell destroyer. What in such case shall we do with the Saviour's injunction to preach the Gospel to every creature ? Did not this injunction bind the Church to the performance of a duty, and is not the obligation perpetuated to the end of time ? Certainly nothing less than the most strenuous exertions to disseminate the Gospel to all mankind, can answer the obligation of the Church to her Lord, who in committing to her trust the glorious gospel of the blessed God, has constituted her a debtor to the Greeks and the Barbarians, to the Jew and the Gentile. What then shall be done ? £112,056 14s. 8d. handsome as it confessedly appears, is not equal to the demand ! not answerable to the existing necessity ! not correspondent to the obligation of the Church to her Saviour and Lord ! Unquestionably the Committee as faithful men will expend as heretofore, what the liberality of the church shall commit to their trust. They will go on enlarging their sphere of usefulness, as fast as their supplies shall augment. At the same time they cannot but proportionably increase their responsibility, because every plot of ground they reclaim from the moral wilderness—every new labourer they send forth brings them under new and highly responsible engagements, into which engagements they enter, in the faith of Providence, through the instrumentality of the religious public. In behalf therefore of degraded humanity—of a world lying in the wicked one—of multitudes already redeemed from the hands of the enemy, by the agents of this Institution, and whose persevering exertions are requisite in order to confirm what has been already wrought—of the Committee

In the *Total* above specified, there is also included a highly gratifying amount of £11,674 4s. 7d., received from various *Foreign Stations*, being an increase in that item of £1897 0s. 5d. This sum, it should be remembered, is in addition to the very much larger sums which those Stations severally raised for their own local expenses, in order to diminish their claims upon the General Fund at home for the support of their Missionary Pastors.

Of this *Total*, the sum of £92,115 17s. 2d., has been raised at Home. This Home Receipt includes £4496 9s. 8d., contributed as *Juvenile Christmas Offerings*, and received *in time* to be entered in the Balance-Sheet for 1845, being an apparent increase of £1571 14s. 1d., under that head. Further sums arrived too late to be so entered, but will be carried to the next year's Account; and the whole Juvenile Effort for the year is believed to have raised nearly £3500.
