## LIQUOR-LAW OF COUNCIL LEAVES MIRAIVITUILI GLOUCESTER

Enquiry Being Held At Bathurst by Commissioner

Jones.

Numerous Witnesses Testify to the Workings of the License Act.

BATHURST, N. D. Dec. 28,-The in est gation into the working of the license act went on all day today before Hon. Mr. Commissioner Jones, and some (wenty was nesses gave testimeny. It was made clear that wholesale places had been run as retail saloons, and then appeared to be some evidences that this was with the linowiedge of the members of the license commission of

He had noticed card-playing for gain, and other violations of the act, but was of the opinion that the act was well enforced to admit that the fact of the above

Nine Clergymen Make Serious Allegations Against Bathurst Officials.

SEARCHING INQUIRY

Solicitor General Jones as Royal, Commissioner Opened Court Last Week.

Bathurst, N. B., Dec .-- The in vestigation into the charge brought again t the liquor license com missioners and inspector for the county of Gloucester by the follow ing clergymen of the county, namely, Rev. William Varrily, Rev. Eloi Martin, Rev, James Wheeler, Rev. J. Hugh Hooper, Rev. Richard Opie, and Rev. John Carter, Rev. J. Theop. Allard, Rev. W. E. Sormany, Rev. S. J. Doucet, six of whom are Roman Catholic priests, one an English church clergyman, and the remaining two Presbyterian and Methodist minis ters, was begun at the court house here this morning before Hon. Wendall P. Jones, solicitor-general, royal commissioner, to deal with the matter.

Court opened at 10 o'clock, and was adjourned till 2 o'clock on the application of Mr. Mott. who esired to consult with his clients. The petitioners, several of whom

were in court, were represented by George Gilbert and N. A. Landry, and the defence by W. A. Mott, of Campbellton, and John J. Harrington.

The hearing is taking place in the court house and much interest is being manifested, judging by the attendance and also the conversation on the subject about town.

The charges are of quite a serious character, the substance of which is that the act is being op nly violated with the full knowledge of the commissioners and the inspector, that the inspector is not a fit person to occupy the position, it being specifically alleged that persons licensed to sell at wholesale were selling by retail; that gambling is allowed on the premises; that the inspector will not prosecute on information unless a deposit is made by the
