# OUR TAXATION SYSTEM.

The City Council's Proposed Law to Bear Heavily upon the Laboring Class.

A Man Earning \$300 and Upwards is Asked to Pay More Taxes.

Amendments Proposed—A Poll Tax of \$2 Only—All Classes of Citizens Rated on an Equitable Basis.

A well attended meeting of citizens interested in the subject of taxation was held in the education office on Saturday evening. This was the second of a series of meetings called by the city council, in preparation of the bill in amendment to the present assessment law. The bill was prepared by the council, as the outcome of a petition presented to the council by a large number of citizens; but the changes proposed by the council are not what the petitioners sought for in the main, nor do they seek to correct the existing evils pointed out by the petitioners in the present law. There was very little discussion at the meeting. There was only one opinion that the proposed law was not what the city required, and steps were taken to prevent its passage and provide for a better system.

The petitioners asked that the poll tax be lowered to the \$2 fixed by law; the law proposed by the council makes the poll tax \$3. The petitioners asked that income and real estate and personal property be rated on the same basis; the proposed law rates property at one-fifth of its value, or taxes income at times as much as other property, as under the present law.

The petitioners ask that there be no exemptions on income; the council in the proposed law exempt \$200. The city council have taken kindly to the suggestions of the petitioners to have a re-evaluation of the property of the city taken, but have adopted in the opinion of many a rather expensive system for the same. Payment of taxes by certificates was also suggested by the petitioners.

**The Systems Compared.**  
Some calculations were made by a number of gentlemen at the meeting, comparing the different systems of taxation. The amount of property assessed in the city at one-fifth of its full value is \$200,000; the income assessed amounts to \$178,485. Hence the total amount of property assessed in the city is \$378,485. The amount of taxes to be collected is \$44,000. By the proposed law of the city council, the total amount of taxes to be collected is \$44,000. This leaves \$41,200, one-eighth of which amount to be levied by an equal and uniform poll rate, given as \$3.92 per head, which added to the \$1 makes the whole amount of the poll tax \$3.92.

By calculation it will be found that the remainder of the tax of the city is to be made up at the rate of \$2.17 per \$100.

**A Man Earning \$300**  
will pay under the city council's proposed law \$11.00.

He paid last year \$8.27.

He would pay under the petitioners' law \$5.90.

**Note the difference.**  
The council's proposed law fixes the poll at \$3.92, and exempts \$200 of income. A man earning \$300 thus pays his poll tax of \$3.92 and \$5.17 rate per \$100 making his tax as given above \$11.00.

Under the present law the poll tax is \$3.27, but as \$300 is now exempt this includes his whole tax. A man earning \$300 would therefore be better off by nearly \$5 under our old law.

The petitioners law fixes the poll at \$2; has no exemption on income and puts property of all kinds upon the same basis as is done in every other part of the province. The man earning \$300 will only be asked to pay in addition to his poll \$3.92, making his total tax \$5.92 or \$2.65 lower than the present law and over \$5 lower than the proposed law of the city council.

By the petitioners law is meant, of course, the kind of law the citizens petitioned the city council to frame and which the council has adopted.

And what is true of the comparison given above on an income of \$300 is the same proportionately on every other salary exceeding that amount.

**A Man Who Earns \$400**  
pays under the proposed law of the city council \$14.25.

He paid last year, \$13.21.

He would pay under the petitioners' law, \$7.32.

A man with an income of \$500 would pay under the proposed law of the city council a tax of \$21.43.

His tax under our law, \$19.15.

Under petitioners law, his tax would be \$8.65.

A man with an income of \$600 would pay under the proposed law of the council a tax of \$26.60.

He paid last year, \$23.00.

Under petitioners law of petitioners he would pay a tax of \$9.08.

And so on in the same proportion with all higher salaries. The proposed law of the city council reduces the poll tax about \$1.30 but raises the tax of every individual in the city earning \$300 a day and upwards, except owners of real estate. The petitioners law reduces the poll tax \$3.27 and reduces the taxes of every laboring man in the city by a very considerable extent.

**A Bill in Amendment.**  
In view of the above facts it was moved by Mr. R. Tibbels, seconded by Prof. Bridges, and carried, that a committee be appointed to prepare a bill in amendment to the present assessment law of the city and to petition against the passage of the bill prepared by the city council.

A committee of twelve was appointed. A for this purpose.

Among those present at the meeting were a number of bankers and insurance men who also protested strongly against the changes proposed by the city council. It was the intention of the insurance companies to lower their rates in the city, but should the city council be successful in carrying their measure this would be rendered impossible and would have a tendency to increase the rates rather than reducing them. # PARTIZAN DUNN'S SCHEME.

Mr. King, of Queen's, Liberal, Has a Majority of 61 Votes.

But the Tory Returning Officer Declares Baird, Conservative, Elected.

Because Mr. King's \$300 Deposit was Not Made By His Agent.

A Re-count Ordered to be Made on Friday Next.

It was generally understood round town on Friday last that Mr. John R. Dunn, the Tory returning officer in Queen's, would, on Saturday, declare Mr. Baird elected to represent the party in the Parliament of Canada. He had stated on several occasions since polling day that he would certainly declare Mr. King elected, but he had never made a majority of votes, but those who knew Mr. Dunn best took this as a ground for belief that he would not do anything of the kind. Consequently the report that Mr. King would be elected, so far as Mr. Dunn was concerned, was generally believed; and on Friday evening when Mr. Gregory was sent for to represent Mr. King in the declaration proceedings few were surprised to hear that Mr. Dunn was still determined to further distinguish himself on this occasion.

The count house at Gagetown was well filled with electors when the proceedings commenced. As the ballot boxes were opened, and the officers returned, Mr. Gregory, representing Mr. Baird, would find some defect in the manner in which it was made out, if Mr. King had a majority in that district. The objections taken were overruled, and noted.

When the boxes were all opened the result found by his clerk was as follows:—

Before the declaration was made, Mr. L. A. Curry addressed the audience and asked the returning officer to reject all the votes cast for Mr. G. R. King and declare Mr. Baird elected.

The election was, he said, held under a certain act, and certain provisions were required to be complied with before a nomination paper could be legal.

He contended that Mr. King was not legally nominated.

He then went on to read from the election law, and from a stack of books containing election cases, for an hour and a half, in order to sustain his two objections to Mr. King's nomination paper.

Flights of Election at the City Hall Last Night—How Liberal Talent is Appreciated by the City Council.

That "A prophet is not without honor in his own country" was established beyond the shadow of a doubt at the city hall last night. No one individual, from far or near, ever appeared on the city hall stage who was met with such a sea of faces, or was greeted with more hearty applause and repeated cheers than was Mr. Joseph S. Gill, in his forty minutes among the pets and idol of the audience.

The audience, in point of numbers, drew "Pete's Red Dog" in the shade and was composed of a very large portion of our best citizens. The entertainment was a few minutes late in opening, but when Mr. Gill, supported by a large number of leading citizens, came upon the stage, the plaudits of the audience knew no bounds.

With a paragon of a man and majestic stride Mr. Gill made his way to the front of the stage, and as if determined not to delay the feast a moment longer opened the ball with a song, and the chairman, Ald. W. Grant, was forced to take a back seat.

When the applause subsided the song was well under way and so was the performance. After a rest of a few minutes, "Time" was called and Mr. Gill was equal to the occasion, and put on "Wellington's March" in fine style and much to the delight of the large audience.

The remainder of the programme consisted of readings from Miss Haverall and Flower and songs of praise. During the entertainment Mr. D. J. Stockford stepped upon the stage and presented the preface of a beautiful pamphlet, being the gift of the agent of the society with the long name.

The programme concluded with a solo and harmonious accompaniment, after which Mr. Rieby, of St. John, exhibited a pencil sketch of the hero of the hour, or at least of the successful entertainment. Mr. Gill walked into the ticket office and counted out \$135 being the amount of the proceeds of the entertainment. As his expense did not include a railroad or hotel fare, being only \$10 in all, Mr. Gill went to his home, we venture to say, with a happier and lighter heart than any one of his large audience.

**The Latest Attraction.**  
The salvation army have a new attraction in the shape of a colored chorus band who render jubilee songs with all the spirit and pathos of jubilee singers of the south. The dandies composing the band number thirty, all of whom are members of the army. They gave their first performance at the barracks on Saturday evening. The colored folks will hereafter be the leading stars at the Saturday night entertainments.

The salvation army do not intend that the interest in their meetings shall flag, and their ability to "draw" the masses from one town and village in civilized countries.

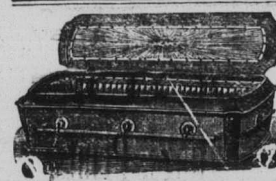
