MOROCCAN AFFAIR

Kaiser Threatened war if Alliance was made

SENSATIONAL REPORTS

Concerning Great Britain's Proposed Military Defensive Alliance

Paris, Oct. 13.—The French government continues silent concerning the alleged revelations of Great Britain's offer of naval and military aid to France if Germany assumed a belligerent attitude over Morocco. In the meantime the newspapers add new phrases to the disclosures. The Figaro gives a detailed version even more sensational than the previous alleged disclosures of the Matin. It says that the previous report of Great Britain offering to mobilize her navy and land British troops in Germany is not correct; that the actual occurrence was as follows: Before the Moroccan crisis became acute the British government made three distinct overtures to learn if France was disposed to complete a treaty of defence. France declined to consider the question.

Later, when the Moroccan crisis became acute, M. Cambon, the French ambassador to Great Britain, reopened the question and obtained a verbal assurance from Foreign Secretary Lansdowne of Great Britain's effective concurrence in the event of a conflict. M. Cambon was thereupon able to announce to M. Delcasse (who was then Foreign Minister) that if loedris (case coming within a treaty) was desired, Great Britain would reiterate her insurance in writing.

The German ambassador in London, Count Wolff-Meternich, learned of these assurances and informed Berlin. Emperor William decided on a counter move and made Italy the medium of its execution. He informed Italy that any treaty whereby Great Britain gave France any military support relative to Morocco would constitute a casus belli. The Figaro asserts that this amounted to an indirect ultimatum, and that the Italian government communicated the situation to M. Barre, the French ambassador to Italy, who informed Paris June the 4.

Immediately thereafter M. Delcasse resigned (June 6) as a result of a violent scene in a cabinet council. During this council M. Delcasse is alleged to have said: "I have a formal assurance of Great Britain's support."

Premier Rouvier as answering; "And I have M. Barre's telegram proving that this means war if we continue our policy. I refuse to endorse what you seem to treat so lightly."

The other ministers are said to have upheld M. Bouvier, whereupon M. Delcasse resigned. The foregoing version is chiefly important in the allegation that Great Britain sought for and promised a military defensive alliance against Germany.

Mr Duncan Refuses Town's Offer of \$825

Town Council Decides to Arbitrate ---That Provincial Hospital Account Again to the Fore

The Town Council met in a special session on Monday evening, there being present Mayor Murray, Couns. Ferguson, Blackhall, Joudry, Vautour and Taylor.

The Clerk read a communication from Messrs McAllister & Mott, acknowledging receipt of resolution in the Duncan case passed at last meeting offering \$825 to Mr Duncan for land at reservoir. This offer, the letter stated had been refused by Mr Duncan. Attached to the letter was a bill for expenses incurred in former proceedings by Mr Duncan amounting to \$200, for which he claimed the town was liable. The letter was referred to special arbitration committee.

Another supreme court writ in the Duncan case was read by the clerk. This makes the third writ issued against the town.

A communication from August Dewar asking for extension of water and sewerage system on Stanley St to his dwelling was referred to Water and Sewerage Com.

A letter from Policeman Chamberlain asking for leave of absence for ten days from Oct. 25 was referred to Police & License Com.

The report of Police Magistrate Matheson showing fines collected amounting to \$132 and costs of uncollected fines \$10.32, was referred to Police & License Com.

An act, of \$1292.60 from the Provincial Hospital for care of inmates was referred to Finance Com.

Coun. Ferguson from the Poor Com. reported on the communication received from Stipendiary Magistrate Murray some time ago in regard to a bastardy case, as follows:—

Your committee waited upon Mr Dickie and demanded that he pay over to the town treasurer the amount of \$47.50 held by him, which he refused to do, saying that he intended to hold the same until Mr Murray paid over to him or to the town treasurer the amount which he (Murray) held. Now, the recommendation of your com. is that this council demand, that Mr Dickie pay over to the town treasurer the amount of \$47.50 held by him, and that the matter now pass into the hands of the Finance Com. to dispose of with authority to take legal advice if thought necessary.

Adopted. It appears that Mr Murray acted as stipendiary magistrate in the case and took steps for the collection of a sum of money, part of which he holds and the balance was handed to Mr Dickie as Commissioner for the poor. Mr Dickie claims that the full amount should be in his hands.

Coun Joudry reported on acct. of Architect Bullman for \$20.00 for preparing plans and specification of vault, recommending payment. Carried.

Bills of the Board of Health were passed as follow:—

A resolution of the Board of Health setting forth that the hospital for infectious diseases had been completed according to contract with alterations approved by B. of H. and recommending that contractors be paid, was passed.

The accounts of contractors Wm Chaytor \$580.00 and D A Stewart \$240.90 were then ordered to be paid.

A Mcg McDonald was heard before the Council in regard to extending water and sewerage systems on Stanley St. He said that several houses would be erected on said street if this were done. Mr. McDonald presented a deed of this new street, 66 ft. wide, to the town, on behalf of the McMillan estate. This street runs from Prince Wm. St to the boundary line of the Malcolm Patterson estate.

Council adjourned to meet Tuesday evening.

TUESDAY EVENING

Pursuant to adjournment the Council assembled on Tuesday evening, Mayor Murray and Couns. Taylor, Vautour, Joudry, Blackhall and Ferguson being in their places.

Coun Taylor reported in favor of extending sewer on Gerard St. to Frank McCullam's house if piping could be procured to do the work before severe frost sets in. Report adopted.

The Council next took up the arbitration proceedings and a series of resolutions were adopted to meet the necessities of the case. Mr W S Smith of Dalhousie was re-appointed as the towns arbitrator.

Meeting then adjourned.

ACROSS THE ATLANTIC.

Graphic Description of a Trip to the Old World.

(Written especially for Events by Geo. D. Bain.)

Before finishing my description of Hampton Court Palace, the favorite residence of Henry VIII, I must again refer to the beautiful grounds with which it is surrounded.

These grounds and gardens cover 44 acres and were laid out according to the wish of William III, in the Dutch style, with elevated terraces, shady walks, and a labyrinth, called the "Maze" the latter being a great source of amusement to visitors. The walls of the Maze are half a mile long although the space it covers is not quite half an acre.

On the grounds are situated two beautiful ponds in which white, yellow, crimson and pink lilies grow in great profusion.

One of the most interesting things to be seen here is the Great Vine, which was planted in 1768. Its principal branch is now 114 feet long, and its diameter at the largest part about one foot. At present it produces about 800 bunches of grapes, but has been known to yield as many as 2000 bunches in one year. The grapes are given away to hospitals and other charitable institutions.

Not far from Hampton Court is Teddington Cemetery. This is where R. D. "Blackmore, the novelist, and his wife, are buried. Their graves are covered with a bed of crimson geraniums, bordered with white pansies. A tombstone marks the place where they sleep side by side. For many years before his death Mr. Blackmore lived in Teddington, where he had an orchard and flower garden. In his orchard was to be found a very rare specimen of pear tree, the only one of its kind in England.

A place of much interest in the vicinity of Teddington is Kneller Hall. It is the Royal Military School of Music and was endowed by the celebrated painter from which it takes its name. On the beautiful grounds surrounding the Hall weekly concerts are given by the pupils of the school. On the afternoon of the writer's visit the programme consisted of music rendered by six different bands: Egyptian, Zulu, Hindoo, English, Scotch and Irish. The programme was of a very high order.

Another place of more than ordinary interest which adjoins Teddington is Twickenham. This is a kind of an irregular town the buildings being somewhat scattered but it is a place of much literary and historic interest. Alexander Pope, the poet, lived and died here and his villa is still pointed out to visitors.

which was built in the fourteenth century contains many interesting monuments, including one to Pope, who was buried in the nave.

A ruin called the Aragon Tower is all that remains of the old Manor House to which Catherine of Aragon is said to have retired after her divorce from Henry VIII.

Richmond-on-Thames—This is another place around which historical associations thickly cluster. The town is situated on the Thames about 10 miles from London and consists chiefly of one long and irregular street. Here was located the royal Manor House which was a frequent residence of different sovereigns. Richard II often resided in it, and here it was that his wife, Anne of Bohemia, died, whereupon he cursed the house and had it torn down. It was rebuilt by Henry Vand after having been occupied by Henry VII and Henry VIII, the latter gave it to Cardinal Wolsey, who in return presented Henry with Hampton Court Palace.

Kingston-on-Thames—This is a market town on the Thames, distant from London about twenty miles by the river, and twelve miles by rail. It extends for a mile and a half along the river, where fine public walks and gardens have been constructed. It is a favorite place for boating and on a fine evening one may see hundred of row boats and launches, freighted with both the fair and the other sex, skimming over the placid water. Moonlight regattas are frequently held here and on such occasions, the river and the bank, which are then beautifully illuminated, present a gay and attractive appearance.

From the time of Edwin in 901 to Edward in 978, the Anglo-Saxon Kings were crowned at Kingston. The Chapel of St. Mary, which stood until 1779, was the place in which those and subsequent coronations took place. The ancient stone, said to have been used on these occasions, was removed to the market place in 1850.

A great many London business men reside here during the summer in boat houses which are very artistically decorated on the outside with flowers. The proximity of the place to Richmond Park and Hampton Court makes it especially attractive.

THE ARBITRATION CASE

The Tribune of this week devotes considerable space to the reservoir matter, hauls the Town Council over the coals, makes some scathing remarks about Mr. McLatchy the town's solicitor, and criticizes generally in connection with the case. It says "it has every reason to believe that steps will be taken by Mr. Duncan to procure an injunction restraining the town from proceeding to arbitrate." Now we would like to know where it gets its information. It looks as if the Tribune were quite intimate with the way in which at least one side of the case would be conducted.

It also says "The taxpayers must now be very much put out at the council, after their favoring the settlement, that they should take the advice of Mr. McLatchy and now oppose it, as they are well aware that Mr. McLatchy already has been the means of saddling upon the town heavy law costs," etc.

Has the Tribune forgotten all about the vote of the taxpayers on the question when they spoke in no uncertain sound in favor of arbitration. True, the vote was a small one but we believe that it was a vote of the men who pay the burden of taxes in the town and as such cannot be overlooked. And then why should Mr. McLatchy be assailed in such a vigorous manner. When did he saddle upon the town heavy law costs? He was employed by the Council as counsel and as such gave advice as best he could and as this is the only case in which he has been employed by the town, excepting one other which was settled out of court, we fail to see how the Tribune can make good its statement.

The Tribune continues:—"The argument used by the few who favor arbitration that 'all water rights are reserved,' is erroneous, as such is not the case. The water right in the town has been given gratuitously by Mr. Duncan, and only for a seven and a half foot dam. Nothing whatever has ever been paid for this, and it is a very small piece of business for that gentleman to advise the council to take the course they are now attempting to pursue, when it is quite evident that he is the only one to profit by such a course."

Here the Tribune either misrepresents the facts or displays pitiable ignorance. We know of a certainly that the town holds a deed of every drop of water in the brook, with the privilege of diverting it to its own use in any way it sees fit. The terms of the deed are very clear and strong and we

would advise the Tribune to procure a copy of it and give it a careful perusal.

It was not our purpose to say anything about this reservoir matter, but we could not let the Tribune's article pass. Discussion is always helpful but there is nothing to be gained by such wholesale criticism.

Now we are of opinion that all right-minded persons will sanction the present Council in their efforts to safeguard the town's interest.

THAT ASYLUM ACCOUNT

For some years past the town has regularly received from the Provincial Asylum or Hospital (as it is now called) a bill for the care of inmates, who it is claimed by the management, are natives of this town. The bill has now reached the sum of nearly \$1300. The town has again and again repudiated all liability in the matter with the exception of one or two items of recent date, and yet the bill keeps coming. It has almost become a standing joke with the Council, for it is an utter impossibility for them to get through the year's business without meeting one or two of these accounts. It looks now as if a delegation will have to be sent to the next session of the legislature to have the matter straightened out. It is time a settlement were effected.

BRIDGE THE RESTIGOUCHE

The formal opening of the new Mercier bridge at Matapedia this week and the hopes expressed by the Government Ministers and others on the occasion that the main Restigouche would soon be spanned by a public highway and railway bridge should cause all our public spirited men to bestir themselves and make one grand united effort to have a bridge built at a point that would prove the greatest good to the whole country, at a point where a deep water terminus is found and where is situated the bright and growing town of Campbellton. Our Board of Trade never had such an opportunity of doing our town a great and lasting good as they have at this moment. Will they let the time go by?

What's in a name? The town of Dalhousie evidently thinks there's more in the name "Alderman" for the city fathers than in "Councillor" as we understand that is the way the Shiretown intends to name them.

MERCIER BRIDGE.

Inauguration Ceremonies on Tuesday.

AUSPICIOUS OCCASION.

Speeches Delivered By Prominent Politicians—A Banquet Held.

The formal opening of the new bridge erected over the Matapedia River only a few rods from the New Brunswick boundary at Matapedia station took place Tuesday forenoon. Those present for the occasion were Hon. John Prevost, minister of colonization of the Gouin government, Quebec; Hon. Aug. Tesser, minister of agriculture; Hon. C. H. Labille, chief commissioner of public works; Charles Marcell, M. P., and John Hall Kelly, M. P. P., besides an attendance of several hundred people from different parts of Restigouche, Bonaventure, Gaspé and Rimouski counties. There was a sprinkling of ladies. The bridge is built of stone and steel. Its length is 800 feet; its cost \$35,000. Addresses in French and English were presented to the Quebec ministers, who replied in eloquent speeches, referring extensively to agriculture, colonization and education, and they were followed by appropriate addresses delivered by Hon. C. H. Labille, Charles Marcell, M. P., and John Hall Kelly, M. P. P.

A banquet was held immediately after the speech making. The bridge is known as the Mercier bridge. Every speaker made reference to the great necessity of now building the interprovincial bridge at Matapedia to permit of the farmers reaching the Campbellton market.

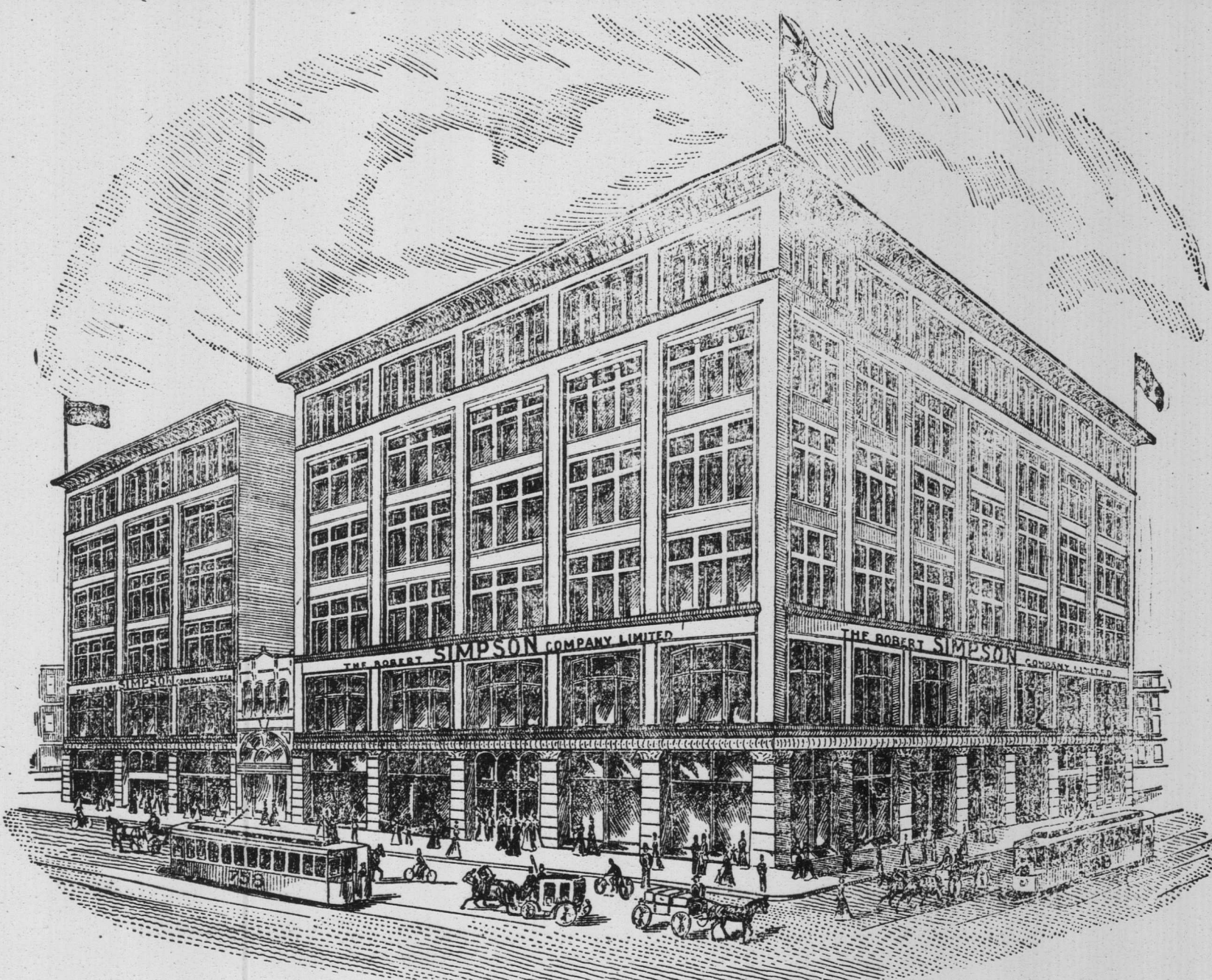

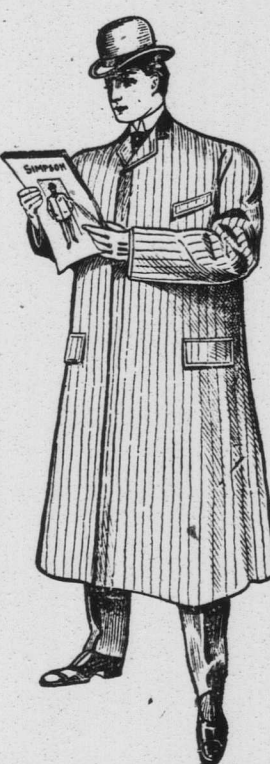

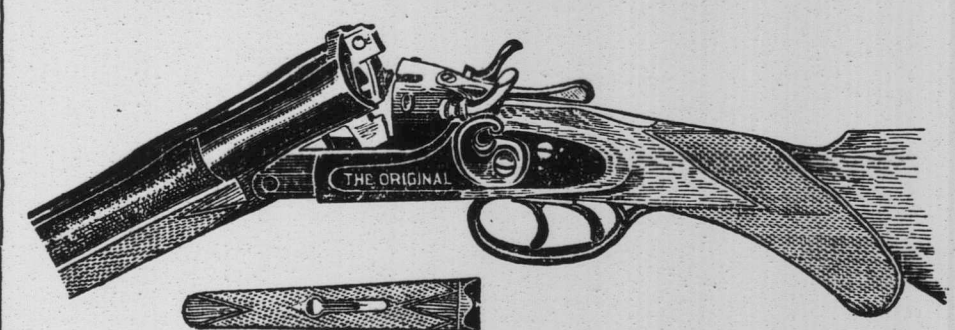

MULOCK RETIRES

Postmaster General to be Succeeded by A. B. Aylesworth

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—Sir Wm. Mulock will be appointed Chief Justice of the Exchequer division of the High Court of Ontario, carrying with it a salary of \$10,000. That is apparently the well founded belief in political circles at the capital. Sir William's retirement and Mr. Aylesworth's appointment as Postmaster-General will take effect immediately upon the return of the Governor-General from the North-West. That Mr. Aylesworth will run in North York seems to be a foregone conclusion, and it is expected that a writ for the new election will be issued at an early date. The presumption is that the Postmaster-General will, as soon as his resignation has been accepted, take formal leave of his constituents, with whom he has always been on the best of terms. In political and social circles Hon. Sir Wm. Mulock's retirement is deeply regretted and his future career will be watched with more than perfunctory interest. The following authoritative statement was given out as to the Postmaster-General's resignation:—"In the winter of 1901 Sir William Mulock was sent by the Government to Australia to represent Canada at the inauguration of the Australian Commonwealth and during a somewhat stormy passage across the Atlantic he contracted an attack of neuritis, which lasted for many months, leaving behind it a rheumatic condition, which in a man of his years is intensified by the severe strain of public life. Though the trouble thus arising is more or less dormant, he has been advised that he must seek an occupation less exacting and less trying upon the nervous system, if he is to retain his health. Accordingly he has decided to withdraw from public life and as a step to that end has placed his resignation in Sir Wilfred's hands. He leaves the Cabinet with the deepest regret, not only because of his interest in public affairs, but because of his personal attachment to Sir Wilfred and his colleagues. He has been nearly twenty-four years in Parliament, fourteen years in opposition and ten years in the Government, a pretty long portion of the working period of a man's life. But there is still much work in him, though it never again can take the form of strenuous public life. Sir Wilfred is giving him a farewell dinner on Monday evening, at which will be present all the Cabinet Ministers who are at the capital.

EIGHT LIVES TAKEN

Startling Story of Crime Told New York Police

TROUBLE BEGAN IN SICILY

Italians Followed in America and Assassinated by Mafia Society

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—That Gaetano Costa was murdered in his butcher shop in Brooklyn on Wednesday night, not because he had refused to accede to blackmailing demands for money, but as the result of a political plot inspired in Sicily eight years ago by the Mafia, executed by its agents of the Black Hand Society in this country, and to which at least seven other lives have already been sacrificed, was the remarkable revelation made to the police yesterday.

According to information given by a fellow countryman and former associate with the dead man, Costa was one of a band of a dozen or more wealthy Sicilians included among whom were his two brothers, who for daring to oppose a democratic political society closely allied to the Mafia were driven across the seas, pursued with a relentlessness that has been hindered by neither time or expense, and systematically put to death whenever an opportunity to escape detection offered.

Realizing their helplessness against their enemies, the leading members of the Costa faction, according to the police informant, came to this country and settled in various places. Some have been compelled to leave all their worldly goods behind them in the haste of flight, and went west to begin life anew. Among these were Costa's two brothers, Giuseppe and Luigi.

The Mafia, however, did not drop the matter. Three years later, according to the narrator, the body of Giuseppe Costa was found in Jackson Park, Chicago, bearing sixteen stab wounds. Around the waist was a blue sash, placed there evidently as a warning to other Italians who knew the methods of the Mafia.

About a year after that, three Italians were mysteriously murdered at Riverside, Ill., and not long after that Luigi Costa was killed at Geneva, Ill. Finally a few months after this the headless body of a man was found at Erie, Pa., also with a blue sash around the waist.

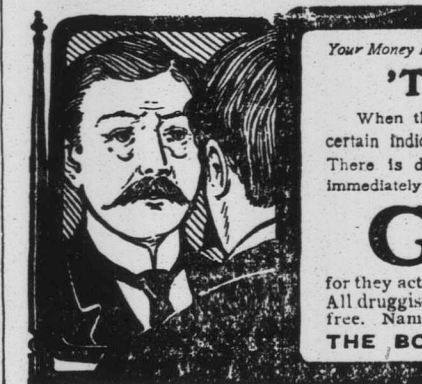
In the light of these events and the peculiar circumstances surrounding the murder of Gaetano Costa, Police Captain Evans, of Brooklyn, is convinced he fell a victim to the same vendetta.
