PERSONAL AND POLITICAL.

Queen Victoria is the sole survivor of the first Privy Council which met on Sunday the 11th inst. of the Queen of England. She looks as if she never thought a falsehood.

The fortune left by Moses Taylor is thought to be between forty and fifty million dollars, yet he always gave generously to the poor.

At the late meeting of the Grand Masonic Lodge, Colonel Laurie was chosen Grand Master and Rev. Canon Townshend, Grand Chaplain.

Bishop Gilmore, of Cleveland, was denounced the Ladies' League, who were warned that he will follow Lord F. Cavendish and Mr. Burke within seven days.

Bismarck is not likely always to be a dictator to Germany. The Reichstag throws out his bills with impunity and he finds his army supply bills vigorously opposed.

J. B. Snowball, Esq., ex-M. P., has been fined for assaulting a sea captain. The dispute took place in Mr. Snowball's office over some papers of which both parties wanted possession.

The people of Ontario are beginning to appreciate the truthfulness of the late John Sandfield Macdonald's opinion of the present Grit Government.

Edward Blake is the embodiment of treachery and vindictiveness.

Charles H. Tupper, son of Sir Charles Tupper, has been returned at the head of the poll in Pictou County. This is a fine opening for the young man. Charles H. was not born when his father began to represent Cumberland.

The successor of Lord Frederick Cavendish in the House of Commons is Mr. Holder, who began life as a book-keeper in a worsted mill. He afterward became a local preacher among the Wesleyans, but was not popular, being "strongly Portiaite, often bitter, always stern." He is now a rich and prosperous woolen manufacturer.

Prof. Schreman, of Acadia College, has transferred his services to Dalhousie. Mr. Munro has established another chair in that college. He now pays the salaries of three professors, who receive \$6,500 a year. He offers a sum of \$10,000 for a scholarship.

The late Lord Frederick Cavendish is fortunate in getting such a windfall, and equally fortunate in securing so promising a young man as Prof. Schreman.

Princess Zinaida Yusopoff lately married a Russian nobleman, the son of the Imperial House of Russia, for love of whom she refused the hand of a monarch. Her father, the richest man in Russia, gave her nearly two million dollars cash, a palace in St. Petersburg, an estate worth fifty thousand a year, and a large fortune in jewels.

An amusing instance of Longfellow's amiability occurred when he was a professor at Bowdoin College. He once called up a student who was unprepared for a recitation, and the student endeavored to prompt him in a whisper, however, he was so loud as to be heard through the room. The professor did not interrupt, but when the student stopped of his own accord, recited the poem, and the professor remarks: "Your recitation reminds me of a Spanish theatre, where the prompter is more important than the actor."

The London World tells us that the magnificent lace worn at the Duke of Albany's wedding by the Princess Beatrice has a strange history. Her Royal Highness was inquiring curiously, a few years ago turning out an old cabinet in the Queen's apartments, and came on a parcel of extremely old laces. Among them was the suite in which she appeared on Thursday, on being repaired and cleaned, it proved almost priceless; connoisseurs say it is worth £30,000. It was lately presented to the Princess by her Majesty.

The Princess Dolgorouki left Russia, it is said, on account of the coldness of the Empress, who, being a virtuous woman herself, probably does not feel bound to seek companionship in the partner of her father-in-law's sins. The Princess, says rumor, is a very beautiful woman, and has had the singular taste to have the dolls of her little girls put in mourning.

In a private letter written by a retired New York merchant, the late Moses Taylor is spoken of as the boldest, most successful, most sagacious merchant of our country; an old-fashioned, upright merchant of the first class, whose character was in striking contrast with that of the tricksters in such high feather at present. He showed from the first and for more than half a century the steady courage and far-reaching enterprise which enabled him to stock the great safe which at his death is understood to have contained one item of more than 25,000 railroad bonds of \$100,000 each (\$25,000,000), not folded as you and I fold the few we have, but piled up flat, broad open, sheet upon sheet, in great stacks. It was stated in the daily papers soon after Mr. Taylor's death that his estate was worth about \$25,000,000. We understand that on the 1st of January last his own estimate of its value was nearly if not quite double that amount, and he did not "mark it up."

On Friday, Reuben Brown of Hammond K. C., was killed by lightning. Mr. Brown was a widower and leaves five children.

George C. McAllister of Milwaukee, N. B., was killed at Falls on Thursday by the bursting of a drum in his box mill.

A French fishing schooner, at the Newfoundland Banks, struck an iceberg on the 10th and went down, carrying with her the whole crew of 17 men.

A fire near Woodstock, N. B., Thursday morning, burned the house and barn of Mr. Briggs with their contents. Loss \$5,000; partially insured.

The army worm is spreading its ravages with such rapidity in Kentucky and Ohio as to seriously alarm agriculturists. In several counties the entire barley crop has been devastated.

A meeting of the Canadian residents of New York city, comprising some of the ablest business men, was held on Thursday evening for the purpose of perfecting the organization of the projected Canadian Club.

A prize fight of the most brutal description took place last week a short distance below Pittsburgh, Pa., on the 10th inst. No effort was made by the authorities to stop the fight, and one of the pugilists was most shockingly mauled.
