Street Car Filled With Men Narrowly Escapes Being Blown Up.

### Militia Will Keep Streets Clear at Any Cost and May Have to Shoot.

Hamilton, Nov. 26 .- The feature of the street railway strike the police feared from the start is beginning to develop. Following the attempt early on Saturday morning to dynamite the east end car barns, small charges of dynamite have been placed on the car tracks at different points. They explode with a deafening report, but so far little damage has been done. ### An International Question

Chicago, Nov. 26.—The United States Government has been asked to furnish protection for a labor leader engaged in con-

ducting a strike in another country. The appeal came yesterday from Frederick Fay, who is leading the street car strike in Hamilton, Ont. After the serious riotlast Saturday night in Hamilton, in which many persons were injured, the Canadian authorities, it is said, ordered Fay to leave the country at once. Fay declined to go, and instead sent a telegram to Chicago, asking for aid.

The message was received by President William D. Mahon, head of the Street Car Men's Union in the United States, who immediately sent the following reply: "Demand protection of the United States consul at Hamil-

ton, and stay where you are." Mr. Mahon last night said efforts would be made today to have the matter taken up at Washington, and an international question made of the situation, which is without parallel, so far as know. It is said Fay will be instructed to insist on his rights as a citizen of the United States. The chief of police of Hamilton and Sheriff Middleton, it is said, both have served notice on the strike leader that 24 hours will be given him to slip over the border. If the order is met with refusal, the authorities threaten

to throw Fay into jail. Mr. Mahon himself will leave tonight for Hamilton, and it is said will thus place himself practically in the same position as Fay, since he is the head of the street car men's organization. Before he leaves Chicago, Mahon will confer with Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, respecting the international rights of a leader of labor.
