BRITAIN TO REGULATE FISHERIES: BAYS ARE TERRITORIAL WATERS BRITISH WIN TWO BIG POINTS

Longstanding Dispute Between Great Britain and the United States Settled By Decision of Arbitration Commission Today---Decision Favors United States in Five Points Out of Seven, But All Are of Minor Importance.

THE POINTS AT ISSUE.

1. Must regulations made by Great Britain, Canada or Newfoundland be subject to the consent of the United States? The American contention is that the treaty of 1818 limited British sovereignty by forming an international "servitude."

2. Have Americans, in fishing on the treaty coasts, the right to employ persons not inhabitants of the United States? Americans have been filling up skeleton crews by hiring Newfoundlanders, which is contrary to the Newfoundland laws. 3. Can Great Britain require Americans to report at the imperial

custom houses and pay lighthouse and harbor dues? 4. Can Great Britain restrict Americans in certain matters relating to shelter, repairs and supplies of wood and water?

5. What is a "bay?"-the shortest and most difficult question on the list. American fishers must keep beyond the three-mile limit, but what are their rights in a bay whose entrance is a little over six miles wide? There are geographical bays and there are legal 6. The American Government is sustained on points two, three, four, six and seven out of the total of the seven points of which the issue was framed.

BRITISH WIN BIG POINT.

Great Britain wins on points one and five. Point five has been ld by Great Britain as the most important of those submitted. The fifth point was stated in the form of this question:

"From where must be measured the three maritime miles of any of the coasts, bays, creeks or harbors referred to in Article 1 of the American-British Treaty of 1818."

United States fishermen claimed the right to take the measure gallery. from any part of the British North American shore, and therefore the liberty to fish in the middle of any Canadian bay or estuary having a radius of more than three miles. The British contention was that the limits should be measured from an imaginary line connecting the headlands.

On the other hand, the Americans win important concessions. By the decision they will be enabled to employ foreigners in their fishing, and are not liable to lighthouse dues. They are not compelled to enter their vessels at the customs houses.

The words "bays, harbors and creeks," referring to Labrador in the treaty of 1818, apply also to Newfoundland, and American Niagara power at least by Oct. 15, but vessels when fishing do not lose their right of trading.

BRITISH DIPLOMACY AT HAGUE TRIBUNAL

Not Sacrificing Canada to Curry Favor With the United States.

The Hague, Sept. 6 .- Now that the to war, one outstanding feature has been developed by the research necessary for the presentation of the facts, which should not go unnoticed, and which should be said by a Canadian.

In times past, and even not very remote, it has been said in Canada, and with a persistence designed to drive home the suggestion, that the desire on the part of England for friendly relations with the United States has led to the sacrificing of Canadian interests. This suggestion has been based upon the assertion of a weak or luke-warm diplomacy by England when dealing with questions in which Canada was vitally interested.

Mischievous Statement. Now, this statement is easily made, and it has created at times a deep impression. Nothing could be more mischievous than such a statement, all the more dangerous, because though easily made, it could not be denied without even a full knowledge of all the facts concerning any one dispute. It has taken years of research, the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars, the searching of the archives of Great Britain. Canada and Newfoundland to present the history connected with this fisheries dispute, which has gone into the third month of discussion, producing a record of some 2,000,000 words, besides printed cases, counter-cases and official documents, covering perhaps 1,000 pages, already placed before the tribunal. In the last protocol issued the president, Dr. Lammasch, said:

"You have led us through the maze of a hundred years of diplomatic correspondence, through the jungle of entanglement, through the dark forest of metaphysical problems, in which it was sometimes difficult to see our path.'

This statement shows what research has been necessary to obtain a knowledge of even one dispute.

Now, with all the facts marshalled at this great expense, a Canadian who would let the opportunity pass, and not state what the result has shown, would be neglecting an opportunity to do justice to English statesmen

Examples of British Diplomacy. I would not assume to be competent to express an opinion on any subject in the columns of your newspaper, especially in a case looked upon as the most important ever dealt with before the court which England's attorney-general described as "the world's greatest court," but, having had the responsibility of certifying to the tribunal, every word that forms the record of the oral statements, upon which the case will be decided, I feel competent to state a fact. A perusal of the records will demonstrate beyond a doubt that this great fisheries dispute should form a fair example of British diplomacy. As a Canadian I feel jutified in saying that should any statement herewere sacrificed at any time, in this case, in all the hundred years of British be a cruel misrepresentation and unfair. Time and again the tribunal have listened to documents which showed that the two great nations were on the verge of war, that war was averted only by the good sense, not weakness, of a statesman, first in one country and then in the other. Senator Root testified to this in the first hour of his great speech when he told the tribunal that during all these years each country had held to its ground, and that neither being willing to recede, there were only two solutions, war or arbitration. Common sense, he said, had prevailed, and they were here as an example, not





Necessary though the increase was, it was a most unfortunate necessity, he said. It is the growing and rapid increase in the navies of other powers which compels Britain against her will to spend each year a larger and larger proportion of national treasure in providing armaments against the risk of war. It is a most lamentable thing that the nations of the world should now be spending \$2,250,000,000 every year merely in maintaining armies and navies. The position of England in this matter has been made absolutely clear, and if other countries would agree with her to check the increase of armaments nothing would please her better than to enter into an agreement of that character.

A CABLEGRAM FROM THE KING

His Majesty, George V., Sends a Message to Eucharistic Congress.

A COURTEOUS GREETING

Great Gathering of Church Dignitaries Presents a Scene of Pomp and Splendor.

Montreal, Sept. 7.-A cablegram was received by Archbishop Bruchesi, Metropolitan of Montreal, from King George yesterday afternoon, but the newspapermen could not get any information as to its contents, before the opening of the Eucharistic Congress in St. James' Cathedral at o'clock last night.

The Congress Opens. The twenty-first Eucharistic Conference (the first ever held on this continent), presented a grand spectacle, when the bishops and archbishops, headed by Cardinal Vannu-telli, the pontifical legate, and Car-dinal Logue, beautifully robed in scarlet and gold, left the archbishop's palace and coming out to Palace street, entered the cathedral from Dorchester, and proceeded to their respective places in front of the altar railing, the cardinal and the head officers of the congress occupying the leading places. The great cathedral was packed to the

Cardinal Vannutelli, in his opening address, stated that in future these congresses would alternate between the old and new world. An important feature was the reading of a cable to the King, and his majesty's reply:

Cable to King George.

"Montreal, Sept. 5.—To His Majesty King George V., London: The Catholics of the empire, bishops, priests and laity present at the international eucharistic congress Montreal pray your majesty to accept their respectful homage of unswerving loyalty and their expression of profound gratitude for the modica-tion made in the royal declaration. With them and the other visiting members of the congress, hailing from all parts of the world, wish your majesty and the royal family continued happiness and prosperity.—Car-dinal Vincenzo Vannutelli." 
