Three fires in November caused a loss of \$100,000 or over in each case. They were at London, where the destruction of a business block cost \$455,000; a warehouse at Regina, \$160,000, and a building at Victoria, \$100,000. Altogether there were twenty-seven fires called large, each of which occasioned a loss of \$10,000 or over, totalling \$1,222,000.

The presumed causes of fire were. The upset lamps, three incendiarism, two gasoline explosions, two careless smokers, two over-heated stoves, two defective wiring, and one each of the following—grinder ignited grass, sparks between chimney and wall, waste paper near radiator, crossed electric wires, spontaneous combustion, overturned gas stove.

The origin of a large number of fires which occurred during the month were reported as unknown.

The number of deaths from fire last month were 20, as compared with 17 for cotober and 19 for the corresponding period last year. Unfortunately, the number does not show any signs of diminishing.



DRAMATIC END TO FAMOUS CASE; TO RECEIVE SENTENCE TUESDAY NEXT

Clarence Darrow Leading Counsel for the Brothers Says the Confession Was the Only Possible Way Out---Life Term Likely for James B. McNamara.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 1.—James B. McNamara this afternoon pleaded guilty to the murder of Charles Haggerty by dynamiting.

John J. McNamara entered a plea of guilty to the charge of dynamiting the Llewellyn Iron Works.

Both men withdrew previous pleas of not guilty. Judge Bordwell came into court at 2:17 o'clock this afternoon with a rush. He advanced to the bench, slammed down a book and his notes and sat down with a frown on his face. As is his custom, he announced the case "The People of the State of California vs. J. B. McNamara, charged with murder, defendant of the court. Are you ready to proceed, gentlemen?"

Just previous to his entrance to the court-room, Judge Bordwell had called the district attorney into conference with him. Evidently the district attorney had told him what the developments were.

ENTER PLEA OF GUILTY. Lecompte Davis, counsel for the defence, arose from his chair as the judge finished his statement. He said: "After long consideration of this case, if it

pleases you honor, and after consulting with counsel in this case, we have come to the conclusion that we shall enter a plea of guilty." There was a stir in the court-room as Mr. Davis

finished his brief statement. Then the district attorney went to his seat, stepped over near the judge's bench, and asked the court for the indictment in the

DYNAMITE LADEN TAKES DEATH LEAP

Blaster's Body Hurtles From Fast Train and Explosion Blows Him to Bits.

And so with his sticks of dynamite under one arm, his electrical blast discharge and his pouch of caps under the other, he jumped.



Irving Manuscripts Offered.

Irving Manuscripts Offered.

Items which will attract the men who are completing Washington Irving collections or Americana in general are Washington Irving's manuscripts in the original. The first and probably the largest ever offered for sale is a "Journal of a tour through France, Italy and Sicily." It runs from July 1, 1804, to Jan. 23, 1805. Irving came of age in April, 1804, and owing to poor health, was sent abroad by his brothers. He described fully the people he met, and his adventures, including an attack by pirates. A later journal of Irving, which appears to be a continuation of his travels in the year 1805, is also included in the sale. These two items have never appeared in an auction sale before, and the price record established for them this time will be of considerable value as a standard.

The famous Hamilton Palace copy of Capt. John Smith's history of Virginia is an early issue of the first edition. R was printed in London in 1624. Its covers bear the royal arms of James I. with the feathers of the Prince of Wales on the front cover and the arms of the Duchess of Richmond on the back cover. It was believed by Mr. Hoe to be the dedication copy to the Duchess of Richmond. The "True Travels," by Smith, in a first edition, is also in the sale.





P. R. tracks to Dundas street, the removal of the Wellington street track to Richmond, and a loop up Quebec to Lorne avenue, and then down Adelaide street. As to the first, the loop could only be operated successfully, if the two blocks on Oxford street were removed between Colborne and William. He hought much objection would be made to that. He did not think it should be

Mr. Wright gave it as his opinion that the railway commission would not sanction a level crossing at Adelaide street. According to bylaw 313, the C. P. R. is bound to pay \$16,500 towards a bridge across any street crossing their tracks, and this might be considered in the arrangement. The city would have to pay the balance, he presumed Mr. Wright favored the removal of the Wellington street line, and a stub line up Quebec.

The engineer suggested a line up Malitand street, as an alternative to the loop. It would serve that district, would be easily operated, and in other ways would be decidedly advantageous. Mr. Wright gave it as his opinion



Famous Hunter of Big Game. In New York State, where the native wild turkey has long been extinct, and consequently there are no troublesome open-season limitations, a few thoughtful sportsmen have stocked their preserves with birds of the pure wild strain, purchased from breeders in

Pennsylvania and the south, and for this Thanksgiving will have sport of a sport that is now uncommon north of the Mason and Dixon line. But in the down south country proper, through the cotton and sugar-cane belt, and among the rugged mountain ranges which here and there defy the encroachment of cotton and cane blanters the turkeys you find are

defy the encroachment of cotton and cane planters, the turkeys you find are not of the incubator sort.

A good turkey hunter can nearly always get his game, for he has made a life's study of its habits; but good turkey hunters are not particularly plentiful in any locality, and presumably that is why the legislators of the various Southern States have extended the open season to such a length that it affords hardly a pretence of protection.

BIRTH OF THE **PHONOGRAPH** (By Rev. Thos. B. Gregory.)

It was 34 years ago—Nov. 27, 1877—that Edison announced to the world his discovery of the principle of the phono-

The first attempt at constructing a "talking machine" was made in 1779 by Kratzenstein, in response to an inquiry made and prize offered by the Imperial Academy of Science, St. Petersburg Kratzenstein showed that all the vowel sounds could be distinctly reproduced by blowing through a reed instrument.

While he was engaged in his experiments, a clever mechanician of Vienna named Kempelen proceeded in making the first "talking machine." But, in genious as these devices were, they were too complicated for general use, and, besides, were incapable of recording or taking down automatically any given sound, song or speech. Hence their usefulness was very limited.

In the year 1877, Thomas A. Edison, while experimenting with regard to reproducing a message sent out by the Moree system into a disaphragm with a stylus attached, noticed that the stylus moved with force sufficient to prick his The first attempt at constructing a

could be made to trace a record of its vibrations on a cylinder of suitable material, he was rapidly nearing the goal of the great discovery he was after.
Continuing his experiments, Edison found that if the "record." or Indented cylinder, were caused to rotate under a similar diaphragm furnished with a smooth stylus instead of a cutting one, the indentations would, in their turn, cause the diaphragm to vibrate, and thus reproduce the sound of the voice that originally set up the vibrations.
Such was the origin of the first really efficient "talking machine," the wonderful "phonograph." so named from "phone," a sound, and "graphein," to write, meaning sound-writing.
By the 27th of November, of the year 1877, Edison had run his great idea home, and on that ever memorable day he announced his marvellous discovery to the world.—New York American.

INDIANS NOT DYING OUT.

Exclusive of Alaska, the Indian population of the United States in 1910 was, in round figures, 305,0000, as compared with 245,000 in 1890 and 270,000 in 1900. Contrary to the popular notion, the Indian is increasing. His gain in numbers, moreover, is far less surprising than is his growth in industry and intelligence. The 5,470 Indians residing in New York, chiefly remnants of the old Iroquois, follow the same pursuits as their white neighbors, dress, the same, and, save in complexion, differ from the whites in no essential particular. Much more than a third of all the Indians in the United States, or 117,000, reside in Oklahoma. Most of these are members of the old Five Civilized Tribes (Cherofices, Greeks, Choctaws, Chickonaws and Seminoles), each of which, in the old indian Territory, which was part of the Dresent.
