FAIR BOARD BRINGS EXTENSION QUESTION BEFORE COUNCIL

No Action Taken and Board's Recommendation Goes to No. 1 Committee.

RESIDENTS OPPOSE PLAN

Must Either Extend or Recede, Claim Made by Members of Board.

The city council referred the question of extending the Western Fair grounds to No. 1 committee last night, on the motion of Ald. C. G. Moorhead and G. B. Drake. The cost of extending is estimated at \$300,000. The committee will get information whether, the city's finances will permit this expenditure. Ald. Moorhead said there was no use taking a vote on the matter if there was no money to carry out the alone.

out the plan.

A delegation from the Western Fair board urged that the matter be submitted to the people. Residents of the area which the proposed extension would include protested against a vote being taken.

Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore, president of the Western Fair board, said that circumstances had forced the board that circumstances had forced the board into a situation where it must extend the fair or recede. It could not stand still. A. T. Little said that London, following the Toronto Exhibition, was in competition with the Ottawa fair, and vied with it in obtaining exhibits from Toronto. London has the offer of more exhibits than it could handle, and are result many desirable exhibits. and as a result many desirable exhibits go to Ottawa. That fair is building up at London's expense he said.

Extension or New Site.

"There are two ways to remedy this situation. Extend the present grounds or obtain a new site." he continued.

"We estimate that it would require a million and a quarter dollars and the salvage from the present grounds to obtain a new site. We have one estimate at \$940,000, but this omits walks, driveways, electric, gas, water and railway connections. We could obtain 90 acres of land for \$45,000.

"The other proposition is to obtain 17½ acres east of the present grounds at an estimated cost of \$300,000. We would provide for new buildings out of revenue." Extension or New Site.

Mr. Little claimed that the extension would not demand the immediate removal of houses in this district. The majority could remain in place for two years or more. It would be impossible to use all the ground this year. The ground south of York street would be used the first year and the remainder





"We are further of the opinion." says the report, "that the minister of militia acted with entire propriety in apologizing for the incidents which took place, by reason of a series of bungles on the part of a subordinate official."

Specific Charges.

Dealing with the specific charges referred to the commission, the report quotes the charges and gives the finding on each in turn as follows:

"I—The department of justice at Ottawa interfered with the military board at Guelph in their efforts to obtain information as to the status of the information as to the status of the information as to the status of the in-mates of the Guelph novitiate.

"There is absolutely no foundation for this charge. The minister of justice, the responsible legal head of

the Dominion Government, was charged under the statute with the duty of seeing that the administration of public affairs was in accordance with the law. It having come to his knowledge that Macaulay was acting illegally he adopted the activity proper course of warred. ed the entirely proper course of warning him of the illegality of his conduct and of communicating with the minister or the acting head of the department having charge of the matter and advising that instructions be sent to be active the conduct that the sent to be sent to be active the conduct that the sent to be sent to be active the conduct that the sent to be sent to be active the sent to be sent to Macaulay to desist until a full investi-cation could be made. "There is no foundation for this charge. When applied to by the Hon. Mr. Guthrie the minister of justice gave his opinion as to the true construction of the military service act. Later the opinion of the minister of justice as to the position of the immates of this to the position of the immates of this novitiate under the provisions of the military service act was asked for under the department of militia and defence. The question was carefully considered by the deputy minister of justice, who gave his opinion to the effect that residents of the institute who were bonafide members of the order were not liable for servee.

J. A. G. Concurred.

"This opinion was concurred in by the judge advocate general. It was followed by correspondence with the rector of the novitiate, who was asked to give, and gave, very full information as to the service of each inmate. Each case was carefully investigated, and it was found that no one claimed as a member of the order was liable for service. It may here be said that there was no foundation whatever for the charge freely made in the letters and documnts appearing in the file that the charge freely made in the letters and documnts appearing in the file that young men were being harbored by this institution so as to enable them to evade military service. At the time of admission of each member to the order his case was carefully investigated by the rector, and in no case where admission followed was there found to be any improper motive.

"5. That the press censorship instigated by a minister of the crown intensified the feeling that special protection was being given to the institugated by a minister of the crown intensified the feeling that special protection was being given to the institution at Guelph.

"There is no foundation for this charge. The press censor and the minister of justice desired that the inclident should not be given publicity. This was not with any desire of promoting the interests of the Jesuits, but entirely by reason of the fear that publication of the full details of the hersh and unjustifiable conduct of the military toward the members of this religious order might arouse in other barts of the Dominion the feeling that members of the Catholic Church were not being treated fairly under the law. With Great Propriety.

"In our opinion the minister of justice, the minister of militia, the adjutant-general and the provost marshal acted with great propriety and with no other idea than to see that the law

There is no foundation for the suggestion of any wrongdoing or impropriety in their conduct."

"First, that the Government improperly failed to make the occupants of the novitiate register for medical examination or for service under the military service act, and the Government also failed to punish those harboring defaulters in the novitiate.
"This charge is not proved and is unfounded. According to the terms of the act and the opinion of the minister of justice as expressed to Mr. Guthrie, the members of the order residing in the novitiate were excepted from the

Only One Liable.

"There is no foundation whatever for the allegation that the novitiate was a harbor for defaulters. There was only one man resident in the novitiate at the time of the mid who was liable for military service, a man named O'Leary. This man was a postulant for admission as a lay brother and had been rejected, but as he was very insistent he had been allowed to remain for a short time in the institution. It is said that he had already heen overseas and had been returned as unfit, but this was not proved. After the raid he was examined by the medical board and placed in Category "D." He appealed to the medical board of review from this decision and was placed in Category "A2." He was then accepted for active service.

WAR'S STEADYING LACKING.

The industrial unrest in the United States, which has its most recent developments in the steel and coal strikes, is quite as much a product of the war period as similar labor troubles that have come down on the older lands that were longer in the struggle. With this difference, however, that the United States, though long enough in the war to reap its evil effects, is finding out that it was in too short a time to secure the steadying effect that the war had upon countries whose very existence was at stake for a time. Nations like Britain, France and Belgium cannot have come through that experience without finding steadying influences working upon their people that were not there in as great a degree before 1914. Thus, we find in Britain and in France a spirit of give and take in the labor troubles that is absent from the more recent labor troubles in the United States. It is this that makes the strikes in the United States so much more dangerous in their character than the strikes that have taken place in Great Britain.

Britain did not view the railwaymen's strike of a few weeks ago as a deadly attack upon her existence. Instead there was an effort made to find out what it was that Labor demanded, and a further effort to go as far as possible in granting the demands. Lord Robert Cecil voiced the proper conception of the general unrest when he said recently:

The real substance of the demand of "The real substance of the demand of labor is that they shall be raised from the status of employees to the status of partners. I believe that is profoundly true and really touches the spot. It is not a question of wages or conditions, but a demand that the status of labor shall be changed in the industrial organization. As far as I personally am concerned, I accept it and welcome it, believing it to be an accurate diagnosis of the disease. I hope that in this the disease. THIRD READING OF G. T. R. BILL IS LAID OVER

This Precludes Possibility of **Prorogation Before** Next Week.

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT

That Vote Should Be Deferred Until Week-Enders Returned.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—The House did not give third reading to the Grand Trunk bill tonight, and it cannot now reach the senate before Wednesday. It developed that on Friday a tentative agreement had been made that a vote should not be taken until Tuesday in order to allow all members who were going home for the week-end to be back. At 10 o'clock tonight, after some uncertainty, it was decided to adhere to this plan, and the House adjourned. The fathure of the Grand Trunk bill to received third reading tonight makes it certain that prorogation cannot be to received third reading tolight makes it certain that prorogation cannot be reached until next week. The tabling of supplementary estimates in excess of \$62.000,000 this afternoon is another obstacle in the way of early proroga-

tion.

Several members took part in the debate on third reading and Hon. W. S. Fielding's amendment calling for the appointment of a commission to study the Grand Trunk situation before action by parliament, but few arguments were advanced.

A. B. Copp, Westmoreland, and W. F. MacLean held the floor for the greater part of the afternoon, the former criticizing and the latter vixorously supporting the Government's policy. Forty millions to carry out the recommendations of the report of the committee on soldiers' civil reestablishment is the biggest vote submitted to the House, while \$20,000.000 are provided for advances to soldiers settling on the land and for the cost of administering the soldiers' settlement act.

Sixty thousand dollars are provided for the department of labor as follows:

The sum of \$276,000 is included to reorganize the printing bureau and there is further provision of \$10,000 for sessional indemnities.

Too Extravagant.

Mr. Sinclair was told that 53 vessels have been ordered to date and thirteen have actually been delivered. The average cost a dead weight ton of all vessels contracted for was \$195.54.

Age of Democracy.

W. F. MacLean, South York, said he spoke as one who favored public ownership. This was an age of democracy and democracy demanded that the people who had paid out their money to establish railways should have control of them. Those opposed were the men of the stock markets and the railway magnates who had been making a fine thing out of private ownership and wanted that to continue. He pointed to Germany, which for a time surprised the world with her efficiency because she had state control of land and sea transportation. Mr. MacLean thought the Canadian Council of Agriculture would favor taking over the Grand Trunk, as would other bodies of farmers and laborers.

Public ownership and operation of transportation lines was necessary to win the war; it was just as necessary to during the reconstruction period. Op-ponents of this measure said that democracy was unable to operate rail-ways, but Mr. McLean declared he had ways, but Mr. Micheal declared he had sufficient faith in the people of Canada, and the men whom they had elected to represent them to believe that they could make a success of this work.
Caused Coal Strike?
Mr. MacLean expressed the conviction that the Parliament of Canada

should never again vote a dollar for privately owned railroads. The present coal strike in the United States he attributed to ownership by the railways and private individuals of the coal areas. Canada in connection with the ownership of a national railway system should so develop our waterpowers as to produce sufficient motive power to make this country independent of the United States in the future.

Montreal, he said was the last refuge in Canada of the so-called railway magnates, but the people of the province did not agree with Montreal, and desired to see the St. Lawrence waterpowers developed.
