Ottawa, June 24. - Mr. MacLean stated last night that he had arranged with the Minister of Justice to discuss his amendments to the railway act at the same time that Mr. Fitzpatrick's amendments are discussed. Mr. Mac-Lean, according to amendments, of which he has given notice, has decided to make the issue railway passenger rates. His proposal is to adopt the law of Michigan, which provides for a graded rate per mile based on pas-senger earnings. # THE MAIN ARMIES COME TO GRIPS

Shanghai Reports Great Battle Fought, in Which Russians Were Deseated.

New York, June 23. - A Shanghai dispatch from Kwan says: Probably the greatest battle yet fought on the Tung Peninsula has just taken place, the main armies of Kuropatkin and Kuroki having been engaged. The principal fighting was in the vicinity of Hai Cheng, and while details are lacking, there are reports of a severe reverse and heavy losses to the Russians.

Latest dispatches from the far east indicate that the main armies of the Japanese and Russians way of Shanghai, under date of Wednesday, it is unofficially reported that a great and decisive battle has been fought, the Russians being heavy losers, From more reliable sources it is learned that the Japanese are slowly but surely advancing upon Kuropatkin's positions. Several of these have already been vacated by the Russians, to be immediately occupied and fortified by the Japanese. It appears to be the Russian commander's policy to refuse battle for the present, contenting himself with falling back. St. Petersburg expects him to withdraw from New Chwang, which will provide the Japanese with a new base. Affairs with the outposts are frequent, but the losses are light, with the exception of one fight, in which a Russian attack was repulsed with heavy loss. 



# STIPENDS ARE NOT TO BE ADVANCED

Ministers at Anglican Mission Stations to Remain the Same as Before.

The mission fund debate which began at the Synod of Huron yesterday morning, occupied the attention of the synod at the afternoon session. It arose over a motion by Ven. Archdeacon Davis to raise the stipends of ministers a mission stations. The bishop had ac cepted the offer of the laity to give their individual services towards raising money, and the alternatives to con sider were whether they should carry the amendment to refer the matter to the executive committe or pass the in crease. The matter was debated by a large portion of the Synod, and the was close on the amendment which was lost. The motion for the firs reading of the bill was then voted upon by orders. The clergy favored it, but the laity opposed it, and the bill was defeated. This means that stipends will remain unchanged.

The chief discussion in the evening was upon a proposed change in the hymnology. Rev. Canon Davis moved for the authorization by the synod of the "Hymns, Ancient and Modern. Dr. Sippi seconded the motion on the ground that the book was the best one available. It was decided, however on the motion of Rev. W. Hinde, to memorialize the general synod to appoint at its next meeting a committe for the purpose of compiling one hymnal for use within its jurisdiction. Archdeacon Williams moved the following resolution, the object of which was to save expenses of management,

and was carried: "That a committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon the advisability of placing diocesan mission under the control of the general board of missions, so as to form one department of home or domestic missions fo all Canada. That such committee be authorized to arrange for bringing the subject before the other synods in the ecclesiastical province of Canada, and to correspond with any similar com-mittees that may be appointed by other

synods.' On motion of Archdeacon Young a canon was amended in committee of the whole and then carried in synod to read as follows: "Any person collecting for the benefit of any parish or congregation in this diocese, or for any special object outside the objects regularly authorized by the synod of the diocese or the general synod, must first obtain the permission of the clergyman of the parish or mission in which he proposed to collect. But after three months' notice to the clergyman such permission shall not be necessary in the case of an agent acting in behalf of either the general or the diocesan synod, when duly

authorized by the bishop of this dio-During the sitting of the synod yesterday the rules of order were suspended, and a short address given by Mr. W. G. Davis, representative of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, who announced that 500 laymen in the Diocese of Huron had joined the brotherhood.
