REUBIN F. REID.

The death of R. F. Reid, esq., took place suddenly at his residence Lower Wolfville on Wednesday last aged 85 years. Mr. Reid has been a life long resident of Horton the last 18 or 20 years being spent in Wolfville he moving from the farm at Horton now occupied by Mrs. David McRae. He was a man most widely known and influential, for many years representing Ward 8 in the Municipal Council and rarely ever had to face an election. Later years he was fishery overseer for the county until falling strength compelled him to give up the work.
Mrs. Reid has been absent in the United States for several weeks going there with a daughter who is training as a nurse. He leaves besides his wife who was formerly Miss Ross, six

children.

T. EDWIN BENJAMIN.

The death of T. Edwin Benjamin took place at Wolfville on Tuesday last at the advanced age of 76 years. He was a man well known in this vicinity and leaves a widow residing here, and one brother, N. O. Benjamin of Gaspereau.

Mr. Benjamin was born at Gaspereau, son of the late Irad Benjamin. In early life he left for the United States and fought in the civil war. He took up teaching for several years and was recognized as a man of excellent business training and good education.

A LARGER BARREL.

Mr. Herbert Oyl'r is Sending Out The Following Information to His Customers:—
"Should the coming apple crop be a large one, the growers in the Valley will experience great difficulty in marketing the crop to advantage. Should the export to England be still prohibited, which seems a certainty at the present time, the only extra outlet for apples that we can expect is the United States market, and this market will take a large quantity of our apples provided our barrels are made a little larger.

At the present time, however, the United States Government will not allow our apples to be sold packed in our 96 quart barrels. Growers will be well advised to know that it will be greatly to their advantage to order barrels from their coopers this season corresponding with the United States barrel, to enable them to get their apples on the United States markets.

The size of the barrel is: Length of stave 28 1-2 inches; diameter of heads 17 1-8 inches; distance between the heads 26 inches circumference of bilge 64 inches, but side measurement; and the thickness of stave not more than four-tenths of an inch. Barrels can be made of a different form to this but must have a capacity of 7056 cubic inches to be a standard barrel, or about 100 quarts, being four quarts more than our present barrel.

Through the coming season I intend to buy no fruit that is not packed in the United States size barrel, and I shall not be handling any of our Nova Scotian barrels if at all possible, and growers will please govern themselves accordingly.

In order that the growers can get their supply of the United States size barrel made up, it will be necessary for them to put orders in immediately to the coopers, to enable the coopers to get the necessary size stock. This must be attended to immediately.

The Government at Ottawa are considering passing a law this session making it compulsory for apples to be packed in a standard barrel corresponding with the United States barrel necessary size stock.

NEW TAXES IMPOSED.

Budget Speech Delivered by Hon. Mr. McLean.

Hon. A. K. MacLean, Acting Minister of Finance, presented The Budget in the Commons on Tuesday in a speech of one hour. It was a business like address from first to last.

This our fourth war budget will bring in new forms of taxation, about \$50,000,000 and the tariff changes are but few. Some of the new taxes will be a tax on business of \$25,000 capital and over.

There will be a surtax on large incomes. The excise duty on tobaccos is greatly increased.

Ten cents a pound is put on Tea, now free duty on coffee is increased. Temperature beers customs tax is increased from 26 per cent to 40 per cent.

Sleeping car berths is increased from 10 cents flat to 10 per cent of value of ticket and parlor car seats from five to 10 cents.

There is an excise tax of one cent on 100 matches; excise of 8 cents of each pack of playing cards and customs of five cents on each lineal foot of moving picture films.

There is a special war excise tax of 10 per cent upon the selling price of automobiles, jewel-

THE DEVIL HAS RESIGNED

Satan, in Letter to German Ruler, Informs Him He has Ousted All Other Evil-doers from Pinnacle of Infamy.

Louis Syberkrop of Creston, Iowa, has acquired much fame in recent weeks as author of a satire on Kaiser Wilhelm. Requests have come to him from Tumulty, Secretary Daniels and Roosevelt, and people in every state of the Union and in Canada have asked for copies of Mr. Syberkrop's article. It is:

"The Infernal Region, June 28, 1917.

"To Wilhelm von Hohenzollern, King of Prussia, Emperor of all Germany and Envoy Extraordinary of Almighty God: My Dear Wilhelm—I can call you by that familiar name for I have always been very close to you, much closer than you could ever know.

"From the time that you were yet an undeveloped being in your mother's womb I have shaped your destiny for my own purpose.

"In the days of Rome I created a roughneck known in history as Nero; he was a vulgar character and suited my purpose at that particular time. In these modern days a classic demon and efficient supercriminal was needed, and as I know the Hohenzollern blood I picked you as my special instrument to place on earth an annex of hell.

I gave you abnormal ambition, likewise an oversupply of Egotism that you might not discover your own failings; I twisted your mind to that of a mad man with certain normal tendencies to carry you by, a most dangerous character placed in power; I gave you the power of a hypnotist and a certain magnetic force that you might sway your people. I am responsible for the deformed arm that hangs helpless on your left, for your crippled condition embitters your life and destroys all noble impulses that might otherwise cause me anxiety, but your strong sword arm is driven by your ambition and squelches all sentiment and pity; I placed in your soul a deep hatred for all things English, for of all nations on earth I hate England most—wherever England plants her flag she brings order out of chaos and the hated Cross follows the Union Jack; under her rule wild tribes became tillers of the soil and in due time practical citizens; she is the great civilization of the globe and I HATE HER! I planted in your soul a cruel hatred for your mother because SHE was English, and left my good friend Bismarck to fan the flame I had kindled. Recent history proves how well our work was done. It broke your royal mother's heart, but I gained my purpose.

The inherited disease of the Hohenzollerns killed your father, just as it will kill you, and you became the ruler of Germany and a tool of mine sooner than I expected.

"To assist you and further hasten my work I send you three evil spirits: Nietzsche, Treitschke and later Bernhard, whose teachings inflamed the youths of Germany, who in good time would be willing and loyal subjects and eager to spill their blood and pull your chestnuts, yours and mine; the spell has been perfect—you cast your ambitious eyes towards the Mediterranean, Egypt, India and the Dardanelles and you began your great railway to Bagdad, but the ambitious archduke and his more ambitious wife stood in your way. It wasthen that I sowed the seed in your heart that blossomed into the assassination of the duke and his wife, and all hell smiled when it saw how cleverly you saddled the crime on Serbia. I saw you set sail for the fjords of Norway and I knew you would prove an alibi. How cleverly done, so much like your noble grandfather, who also secured an assassin to remove King Frederick of Denmark, and later robbed that country of two provinces that gave Germany an opportunity to become a naval power. Murder is dirty work, but it takes a Hohenzollern to make away and get by.

"Your opportunity was at hand; you set the world on fire and bells of hell were ringing; your rape of Belgium caused much joy, it was the beginning, the foundation of a perfect hell on earth; the destruction of noble cathedrals and other infinite works of art were hailed with joy in the infernal regions. You made war on friends and neighbors and the teachings of your treachery toward neutral nations hastened a universal upheaval, the thing I most desired. Your undersea warfare is a master stroke, from the smallest mackerel to the great Lusitania you show no favorites; as a war lord you stand supreme, for you have no mercy; you have no consideration for the baby clinging to its mother's breasts as they both go down into the deep together, only to be torn apart and leisurely devoured by sharks down among the corals.

"I have strolled over the battlefields of Belgium and France. I have seen your hand of destruction everywhere; it's all your work, superfluous that I only; no merry children in Poland of Poland, now a wilderness fit for prowling beasts made you. I have seen the land now; they all succumbed to frost and starvation. I drifted down into Galicia where formerly Jews and Gentiles lived happily together; I found but ruins and ashes. I felt a curious pride in my pupil, for it was all above my expectation. I was in Belgium when you drove the peaceful population before you like cattle into slavery; you separated man and wife and forced them to hard labor in the trenches. I have seen the most fiendish rape committed on young women, and those who were forced into maternity were cursing the father of their offspring, and I began to doubt if my own inferno was really up to date.

"You have taken millions of dollars from innocent victims and called it indemnity; you have lived fat on the land you have lived fat on the land you usurped and sent the real owners away to starvation. You have strayed away from all legalized war methods and introduced a code of your own. You have killed and robbed the people of friendly nations and destroyed their property. MADE SUPREME SACRIFICE IN FRANCE.

Particulars of Death of Sergt. Walter A. Brown, Foreman on Advertiser Staff, who enlisted With Highland Brigade.

Particulars have now reached us of the death in action of Walter A. Brown, notice of whose death we recently mentioned.

Mr. Brown was born at Canning son of James P. and Bertha Porter Brown. He was 22 years of age last September. The family moved to Kentville about 17 years ago and as a boy Walter joined the staff of The Advertiser. He soon showed his sterling worth and before long had a full knowledge of the mechanical part of the office work and became foreman of the job printing department. He was an excellent workman a practical adv. setter and by working at odd times became a linotype operator.

He enlisted in the 219th Batt. and trained at Kentville with the Highland Brigade going overseas with it. While in training here he became the mechanical superintendent of "The Highlander" the Brigade Newspaper and made it first class in every particular. He leaves besides his father, two brothers and four sisters:— Albert in France, who enlisted first with the Pioneers, Charles, Linotype Operator at Advertiser Office, Ella, Effie, Vera and Evelyn all at home.

When he went into the trenches he renounced his rank as Sergt. and went as a private.

He was a boy of unusual ability and promise, a member of the Kentville Baptist Church and highly esteemed by all who knew him. It is deeply regretted that such a promising young life has been ended.

A memorial service for deceased will be held in the Kentville Baptist Church on Sunday May 19th.

A comrade, L. B. DeWolfe wrote the following to a lady friend, having found her card in his pocket.

April 6th, 1918.

Mrs. —

Enclosed is a piece of paper which I found on Walter's body when he was killed. There was nothing in it and he must have received your box. There is nothing I can say only that he is in a much better place than I am, but I have lost the best pal I ever had. I was standing alongside of him when he was killed, I carried him out.

The Father received the following letter dated April 7th, 1918:—

Jas. P. Brown, Esq. Kentville, N. S.

Dear Mr. Brown: During our last trip up the line your good Son 282785 Pte. Brown, Walter A., made the Supreme Sacrifice, being "Killed in Action" at about 8 A. M. 30/3/18 while on duty in the front line.

It happened during a heavy enemy bombardment of our lines, a high explosive (s. "9") making a direct hit near where he was standing, the concussion and a piece of flying shell hitting him, causing instant death.

It will be most comforting to you, to know, that your son was a true and brave soldier, in comforting words I can say to one of the best, he did his duty so nobly and cheerfully at all times and will be greatly missed by the Battalion.

I was in the trenches at the time, have been hit once, and have had two brothers "Killed in Action" one invalided home, leaving three yet in Active Service in France, so I know how it feels, and fully realize what it means to you Sir! the most comforting words I can say to you is not to be sorry but rather glad that he was delivered from this world, fighting by the authorities.

He was buried back of the lines where he fell near our Battalion Headquarters with Military Honours his personal belongings, what's left of them, will be sent to you in due course by the authorities.

Please accept my sincere sympathy and with best wishes.

WILL IT PAY TO SPRAY IN 1918.

(By G. E. Sanders, Dominion Entomological Laboratory, Annapolis Royal, N. S.)

The above question is agitating the minds of many apple growers at the present time. The prospects are that some of the sections that Nova Scotia supplied with apples in 1917, will themselves have a moderate crop for their own use in 1918. It is more than probable that the major portion of this crop will be of poor quality if the season is in any way normal for the development of apple scab.

The paramount question in many minds is the question of price in 1918. Although we do not consider that the question of price for 1918 should be the dominant factor in influencing us to or not to spray in 1918, let us examine the point for what it is worth. What do we know about the 1918 price? In 1916 people expected normal prices for potatoes when they dug the crop, before the next spring many potatoes were sold for around \$8 per barrel. In 1917 people expected high prices for potatoes and many growers sold in the field for \$4 per barrel, today any quantity of potatoes can be bought for \$1.50 per barrel and less. In July 1917 many farmers cut their hay not expecting to be able to dispose of it in 1917-1918 for the cost of gathering. In November 1917 many lots of hay sold for \$7 per ton loose. Within the past week hay has sold from the barn in the same districts for \$19 per ton. In 1914 the general talk was "Apples will bring nothing yet we got fair prices." In 1915 the talk was even worse and we got better prices. In 1916 the talk was that apples

would scarcely be worth picking and we got better prices than ever. In 1917 many expected low prices for apples during the spring and summer but when the crop outside became known and outside buyers came to the country expectations were changed, everyone looked for higher prices. With strange buyers bidding against each other in new territory, for fruit, with which they were not familiar, prices were forced too high and apples were not consumed as they should have been early in the season. As Messrs. Carey and Vroom express it the price nailed the barrel too tightly to the warehouse floor, it prevented apples from moving and apples were consumed by the masses only and not by the masses. The result was, apples moving too late or out of season the year through, a glut at the end of the season and a slump in prices which is causing untold loss to both growers and speculators. What does anyone know as to the price of apples in 1918. We know the quality of apples consumed by a given number of people fluctuates most widely and is influenced almost wholly by price so we can rest assured that if the price is low, say one half that of October 1917, apples will be used as a food and not a luxury, that they will be consumed by the masses as well as the classes and the consumption will be enormous. We expect that the quality of apples produced in many sections will be below normal. In order to keep well and sell best we must have our quality as high as possible. It has been amply demonstrated in the past that spraying and the growing of clean fruit pays even better in the years of large crops than in those of small crops for good quality apples have some chance of good prices in years

possibility, which every man must judge for himself, of our marketing part or all of our 1918 crop in our normal market, London. The most important consideration is the effect of spraying or not spraying on the crop of 1919. We know and are able to state definitely that in Nova Scotia the greatest benefit from spraying comes from increasing the crop the year following the application of the spray. If we are to get a good set of apples we must have strong fruit spurs and buds, to get them the leaves must be retained late the previous season and in order to get the leaves to stay on late, we must keep them free from fungus diseases by spraying. This is absolutely the most important consideration in spraying in Nova Scotia, and by neglecting spraying in 1918 we are, if the season is at all normal, insuring a smaller crop or a failure for 1919.

We know the demand and need for other foods than apples and all will make the greatest efforts to produce potatoes, beans, grain etc. We know that our apples if not sprayed will according to Prof. Blair's figures cost us about \$2.50 per barrel tree run on the average. Spraying costs about 20 cent per barrel, would anyone put the difference in value between tree run sprayed apples and tree run unsprayed apples as low as eight per cent? We think not. The orchards of the Annapolis Valley have been termed by Prof. M. Cumming as the big permanent asset of the valley. We know that our orchards, taking the section as a whole, are probably in better shape than any others in America on account of ours having been cared for during the past three years while other sections neglected their orchards to a greater or less extent. We expect to be paid for this care by having when peace is declared, orchards in good condition and producing good fruit. Can we afford to lose all of this advantage by neglect in 1918? We must grow all of the grains and vegetables possible but for our economic future we must also keep our big permanent asset our apple orchards from depreciating. We do not want the same kind of a crop in 1919 that Ontario had in 1917. Apple scab and neglect of spraying in 1916 spoiled the Ontario apple crop in 1917.

AMENDMENTS TO TEMPERANCE ACT

There were several amendments made by the local legislature to the Temperance Act. One of them increases the fine from \$50 and \$100 and \$200 for the first offence and imprisonment for the second offence. Another amendment gives the right of personal search without warrant where bootlegging is suspected. It will also be an offence to drink liquor publicly in a railway train.

The County vendor will be permitted to sell until March, 1919. The amendment proposed to permit druggists to sell six ounces of liquor was eliminated and another clause to permit veterinary surgeons to sell liquor was also disallowed.

HON. F. B. McCURDY MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT.

Says Registration of Canada's Man-Power Will Be Complete By End of June.

Hon. F. B. McCurdy one of the members of the Canada Registration Board, announced in the house of commons that registration of man-power throughout the Dominion is expected to be complete by the end of June.

Mr. McCurdy sketched, in some detail, the scope of the registration and the methods by which it will be carried on. The Canada registration board was representative of all interests—of labor, of manufacturers, women workers, agriculture, with the addition of the chairman of the Military Service Council.

Consequently the following official summary was issued outlining the regulations under which the registration will be taken:

"The regulations under which the registration of the man and woman power of Canada will be effected have now been approved by order-in-council. The plan of operations which they disclose is very similar to that employed for the purposes of a Dominion election. The electoral constituency will be the territorial unit. In charge

of each constituency will be a registrar, whose duty it will be to provide a sufficient number of places of registration and to appoint for each such place a deputy and one or more assistant deputy registrars.

"Upon a day that will be fixed by proclamation, every person of sixteen years of age or over will be requested to attend at one of the places of registration and there answer truthfully a number of simple questions set forth upon a card, such as his name and address, his age, his country of birth, whether he is married or single, how many children he has under sixteen years, his occupation, the kind of work for which he has been fitted by training or experience, etc. Upon completing and signing the card he would be provided with a certificate of registration, which he must always carry upon his person and produce upon demand by any peace officer, police officer, or constable.

"Provision is made for the subsequent registration, at post office, of those who, for any good and sufficient reason, such as sickness, absence from the country, etc., cannot register upon the day appointed. The same facilities will be open to those who, after registration day, attain the age of sixteen, or are discharged from active

service. From this it will be seen that it is the intention of the government not only to take a complete inventory of Canada's man and woman power, but when taken, to keep it up to date.

"Any person failing to register will expose himself to serious penalties and disabilities. He may be fined or imprisoned, or, at the discretion of the court, he may be both fined and sentenced to imprisonment. He will forfeit any right he might otherwise have had to vote at a Dominion election. He will be disentitled to receive any wages or salary, to obtain board or lodging at any hotel, restaurant, or boarding house, or to purchase a ticket for or travel upon any railroad or steamboat. Any employer knowing him to be unregistered who pays him any salary or wages, will thereby expose himself to the same penalties which the defaulter has incurred thru failure to register. Any person knowing him to be unregistered who gives or who sells him transportation, or any conductor, captain, purser or other officer who, knowing him to be unregistered, permits him to proceed on journey, will thereby render himself liable to heavy penalties.

SPRAYING.

(Experimental Farms Note). Unless many kinds of both useful, and ornamental plants are protected from injurious insects and fungous diseases by spraying, the loss in fruit and vegetable crops may be very great, and, in the case of ornamental plants which would otherwise have attractive foliage and bloom, they may be rendered very unsightly.

The spraying of fruit trees should be begun just after the buds have broken in the spring and repeated at the times recommended in the spray calendars and pamphlets which are issued by both Federal and Provincial Governments and in which is given information in regard to the treatment of the different kinds of insects and diseases most likely to cause damage.

The apple scab causes, perhaps, more loss than any other plant disease in Canada, yet this can be controlled and clean fruit obtained, by thorough spraying with either Bordeaux mixture or Lime Sulphur. Other diseases and insects can be kept well under control also by the spray which has been found best for each.

Spraying is a rather expensive operation and it should be done in an intelligent manner, otherwise it may be wasted money. For instance, if the spray to kill the codling moth, which affects the apple, is not applied within a very few days after the flowers fall, the sepals or lobes of the calyx will have closed over the opening or "calyx cup" in the end of the apple into which it is important to spray the poison. As it is in the "calyx cup" where most of the insects begin work, they are not likely to be poisoned if spraying is delayed and the apples will be wormy. A spray mixture or solution which will control one insect or disease may be of little or no use in con-

trolling another. Arsenical poisons are the best for biting insects, while soap or tobacco sprays are best for those which suck their food and which have to be killed by contact, and certain sprays intended to kill insects will not control fungous diseases.

Get the spray pamphlets and study them carefully before spraying, but spray and spray thoroughly!
