Just before the case came to trial Badellet induced Leclair to agree to a compromise, but as he did not pay any money the lawyer thought it would be best to obtain judgment. When the case came up before Civil Justice Michael Norbor, Leclair went on the witness stand and proved the amount of his claim. He described his duties with Badollet as cook, typewriter and model. Upon this formal testimony, as no defence was interposed, judgment was granted, and it was immediately placed in the hands of a marshal for collection.
