DESTRUCTIVE GALE AT THE SOUTH

The gale experienced along the Southern coast of the United States, in the latter part of last month, was fearfully destructive to property. The following particulars of its effects at Allaha, Fla., are given in New York papers of the 23rd ult. On Saturday last we had another of those terrible tornadoes, which experience should warn us to anticipate more or less occasionally, with every autumnal equinox. E.—and by 11 o'clock fresh, but nothing more. By half-past one it had veered to the South East, and was blowing a gale and raising hard.

CANADA.

IMPORTANT FROM CANADA.—We are informed by a telegraph despatch, received last evening, that on Thursday night, the Hon. Mr. Hilsie had by resolution through the Canadian Legislature for the construction of a Railway, by the northern route, which is to connect the city of Montreal with the Province of Miramichi, and connect with the Nova Scotia boundary. Mr. Hilsie's Resolution secures the construction of the line to the Trois Pissoles, and it is asserted that the Imperial Government will construct that portion of the line between the latter place and Miramichi, which is the least thickly settled and consequently the less likely to pay. The departure of the Hon. Mr. Howe in the last steamer for England, it is said, has reference to the construction of the line through Nova Scotia. We cordially congratulate our friends at the North on the prospect thus opening of a speedy realization of their ardent hopes.—New Brunswick.

A Telegraph Despatch of the 20th ult., received at St. John, announces the important fact that the Canadian Assembly had made the necessary arrangements for extending the Trunk line of Railway from Quebec to Trois Pissoles. This will leave a gap of 200 miles—from Trois Pissoles to Miramichi, which is to be completed by the Imperial Government and the Province in building, and this complete the Grand Trunk Line of Railway from Halifax to Quebec and from thence to Hamilton.

At Quebec, Nov. 3.—The House broke out 24th September. The deaths to 31st October, 139. Last 24 hours, 3 only. Later in the week cases have suffered. Wind easterly, which is favourable. tion—called "a world's fair," we should not be behind hand. The Exhibition of Wednesday was devoted of what would have added to the pleasure and variety of the show, by the inclosure of the weather, which prevailed intended exhibitors from coming from a distance. From what we cannot but term an ill-judged economy on the part of the Society, numbers were not aware of the time of holding the Exhibition;—we allow to the aid of advertising in the different newspapers. We would suggest that a Fair for the display of the industrial productions, of every kind, should be proclaimed for 1854—thereby giving sufficient time for every class of workmen, whether in the higher or lower departments of art, to prepare. The prizes to be such as would call forth competition; and, in addition, temptation should be held out to induce the industrious to exert their energies in branches of domestic industry hitherto unattended. If the last annual exhibition have done much, one under the sanction of, and with the subsequent pecuniary aid that should be furnished by the Legislature, would do infinitely more. We do not say that a sum of money might be raised by subscriptions collected from all parts of the Island, that with the aid of a public grant, would suffice to erect a substantial building; which, when it had served the purpose of holding the fair within its walls, might be kept for the use of the public, and serve as a bazaar to which all might be free to resort, on payment of a small duty, to be expended in keeping the building in repair. We trust that those whose duty it is to ensure the resources of the Island to be developed to their utmost extent, will give their attention to this. We assert, and fearlessly, that all Prince Edward Island wants, in fair play, both within and without her soil, properly cultivated, in her mines of wealth, and in her manufactures and manhood of will, in the end, prove more efficacious in procuring for its inhabitants the necessary comforts and the wholesome luxuries of life, than those of Australia and California.

TO THE EDITOR OF HASZARD'S GAZETTE.

As there has been much dissatisfaction, and also surprise, manifested by the public at the recent decision of the Judges of Clench at the Industrial Exhibition, with regard to the prize awarded for my grey cloth, I beg to state that I have not had altogether fair play. I beg leave, through the medium of your impartial and extensively circulated paper, to give an unvarnished statement of such facts as have led to that conclusion. I called at Mr. Lydard's (he being the agent for Mr. Garnsey's establishment on the morning of the day of the exhibition, for my cloth, which had been there at least a month previous to that time. Mr. L. was out at the time, and I asked his son, whether there was any more cloth there intended for the exhibition. He showed me a piece of grey, saying it belonged to his father;—but I was not then aware that Mr. L. was to be one of the Judges; or I would not have entered my piece for competition;—though so much superior to the other, that a blind man might almost have perceived the disparity. Many persons then and there expressed to me their astonishment at the award of the Judges, among whom were several members of the Committee of the Key Agricultural Society.

On the prize being read out, no person came forward to receive the money; but Mr. Lydard laid down the cloth on the table, at the same time saying, it was his own. Thinking there might be some mistake, I called on Mr. Thomas, one of the Judges; he told me that he was in favor of giving my cloth the prize, but that there were two against him. The above is a plain statement of the facts, in which, if I have "nothing extenuated," I have not "set down ought in malice;" and to the substance of this communication, I am ready to make affidavit, if required. My cloth commanded such a preference, that I could have sold it all the spot at the highest price given for broad-velvet; had I been inclined; and it was with difficulty that I resisted the temptation of a number of applications, so as to retain a part for my own use; and that part I am willing at any time to submit in competition with Mr. Lydard's, before any competent Judges, interested in their decision.

PROPOSED ROUTE FOR THE TELEGRAPH WIRES IN P. E. ISLAND.

ISLAND.—We understand from a conversation with F. N. Gilman, Esq., that it is his intention to extend the Telegraphic communication to the following places throughout the Island, in order to embrace the principal settlements, and to afford the inhabitants generally an opportunity of sending themselves, or their friends, by a rapid communication, not only with different parts of the Island, but with the whole continent of America.

A part of the line it is intended to erect this Fall—at Carlton Head, near Cape Traverse—the remainder to be completed next Summer. The line from Charlottetown will follow the main-road direct to Tryon, Cape Traverse, and down to Carlton Head. From Carlton Head a branch will be carried along the Bedouque Road, through Charlottetown, round Hooper's corner, up to Traveller's Rest, and from thence to Green's Shore, where an Office will be kept open during the Summer season, and in the Winter at St. Eleanor's. A branch from Green's Shore to St. Eleanor's will terminate the line to the Westward.

Next Summer it is intended to lay down a sub-marine Cable from the South-side of the East Point of this Island, in Cape Race, on the coast of Newfoundland. From the East Point, the Telegraphic wires will be carried to Charlottetown. The route taken will go along the South-side of the Island to Souris—where an Office will be kept—then across the harbor of Souris from thence by Belle Bay Bay Fortune Road, Sutherland's Head of St. Peter's Bay, and along the Main Post-road, direct to Charlottetown. There will also be a branch from Souris to Georgetown, along the Cardigan Road to Finlay's and from thence into Georgetown.—Ed.

The Steamer Ellen Gibson, having in tow the Brig. Eliza, Gillis, master—which vessel was on board the sub-marine Cable laid down between Cape Traverse and Carlton Head—steamed out of this harbor, this morning, (Friday, Nov. 12), for Cape Tormentine, for the purpose of laying down the Cable. When this is accomplished, we understand, the handsome little Steamer proceeds to St. John's, Newfoundland, where she will winter.—Ed.

We have just heard, that the Ellen Gibson has met with an accident to her screw propeller, occasioned by its coming in contact with the chain of the vessel which had the wire cable on board, she was, in consequence, obliged to proceed to the opposite shore, under canvas. The schooner with the cable has returned to Charlottetown.

Very serious difficulties present themselves, whatever be the Imperial Highness may think proper to assume. The title of Louis Napoleon I. would have no prestige; the title of Napoleon II. is not compatible with the late act of abdication of Napoleon in favour of his son; and the title of Napoleon III. carries with it all the uncertainties respecting his recognition as Emperor by foreign powers, as well as the opposition of political parties at home. The most prudent course of the Prince given out, that the title of Louis Napoleon I. will be that which will be assumed.

We learn, by a telegraphic message which was despatched from Trieste on the 28th, and was published in London on the 28th, that a brigades, under Brigadier Reynolds, G. R., consisting of three regiments with artillery, left Ranquon on the 15th September, in steamers, for Prose, accompanied by General Gordon; the steamers were to return immediately for the second brigade. The British troops are to be met at Prose, in the night, and to march in masses on a height ten miles from the town. Their numbers were said to be about 7,000 with a few guns.

Each successive arrival from Australia brings more and more favorable accounts of the progress of the gold mines. The cargoes arrived on Tuesday with £71,400 in gold dust, and the Lina with a remittance estimated at £140,000. It is said, that common shares at Melbourne, were to receive the incredible sum of £120 for the run home, and that labor was in like demand.
