Liquor License Law.

A public meeting was held in the Temperance Hall on Thursday evening last, chiefly for discussing the draft of a Bill to alter and amend the Liquor License Act of this Island, which Bill was prepared by the Committee of the Temperance Alliance, and is intended we understand, to be presented to the Legislature in a few days, together with a petition praying for its enactment.

The National Temperance League has increased its agents, multiplied its deputations, increased its auxiliaries, and in a review of the last year, gives a most encouraging view of the state of the cause throughout the Kingdom.

The United Kingdom Alliance has, as usual, been characterized by a vigorous agitation of general principle, and of the particular measure which is supported by its special advocacy.

The British Temperance League, the oldest of temperance organizations, presents this year a most encouraging report of its labors and its usefulness.

In Ireland, since the visit of Mr. Gough, there has been a most cheering revival of the temperance cause, and in Wales, also, there has been carried on a marvellous work, chiefly among the industrial classes; and principally through the instrumentality of an unprejudiced man.

Temperance in Great Britain.

The progress of Temperance reform in Great Britain ought to stimulate the friends of Total Abstinence here to increased exertions to promote their principles.

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1. As regards the City of Charleston—That after the expiration of one year from the date of the passing of the act, the said license shall be sold at public sale.

2. That the right of these six Licenses shall be sold at public sale.

3. That each purchaser shall give Bond, with two good Sureties in the sum of £100 each, who shall jointly and severally be bound to the satisfaction of the Court, to pay the duties on which have not been paid, and that they will account on each of the end of the year for all liquor bought and sold by him.

4. That each purchaser shall also take and subscribe on each of the conditions of the Act before obtaining his license.

5. That no person shall be licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors unless he can be proved to be a native-born subject of Great Britain, or to have been born in any of the Colonies, and to be a member of one of the Churches of the Kingdom.

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Therefore, if the society authority goes wrong, it shall be null and void, and the members shall be bound to obey the laws of the land.
