LAD TRAVELS ON THE BLIND BAGGAGE FROM ST. JOHN

Moncton, N. B., May 28—A lad named Amos Lavigne, in hard circumstances, was brought to the city this morning on No. 10 express from St. John. According to the boy's story he is eleven years old and formerly belonged to Bathurst. His mother, he says, has been dead for some years and his father went away and left him and another brother to look after themselves. Last summer his

brother went to St. John to work in the cotton factory and took Amos with him. The lad says that last night his brother told him to go home to Chatham and he climbed on the blind baggage of No. 10 train. He was discovered by the conductor and taken inside the car and brought to Moncton. He will likely be sent to Bathurst today. He says he has an uncle there.

SMALLEST MAN IN CANADA DEAD

Lockeport, N. S., May 27—Edward Hupman, the smallest man in Canada, is dead here. Hupman was thirty-two years of age, stood two feet nine inches and weighed thirty pounds. He was frequently on exhibition at Halifax fairs.

NEW BRUNSWICK OPENS MARKET

British Financial Journal Cites Instances Where Western Enterprise Was Not Necessary for Booming Products

In the Canadian Mail, a financial journal published in London, Eng., for the guidance of British investors in Canadian enterprises, an article appears which remarks upon the development of the potato trade between New Brunswick and Cuba. The article follows:

The expansion of Canadian trade is so frequently associated with Western enterprise and industry, that it is a surprise to learn the part that New Brunswick is playing in opening up new markets for the Dominion. Largely as the result of a subsidy granted by the government last year, a regular steamship service has been established between St. John and Cuba and, in consequence, New Brunswick has practically ousted the United States from the Cuban potato market, and now has it under control. To Cuba alone New Brunswick now sends six times the quantity of potatoes exported to the whole of the British West Indies. It is said that while last year 40,000 bushels of potatoes from the United States were sold in Cuba, this year scarcely a barrel has been received there from the United States, on account of the monopoly of

GEORGE LOUNSBURY OF FREDERICTON DROWNED IN RIVER NEAR OROMOCTO

Member of House Boat Party Returning to Capital Fell Overboard While Talking to two Young Women Near the Rail—Was Clerk With W.E. Farrell

Fredericton, N. B., May 28—The St. John river claimed another victim last night, when George Lounsbury, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Lounsbury, of this city, was drowned near Oromocto. He was one of an excursion party of twenty-five young people from the city and Gibson who left here at 8 o'clock on a house boat in tow of the tug Allan Sewell.

They went to Oromocto and spent about an hour at Stocker's summer hotel. They left for home at 11 o'clock and fifteen minutes later, while passing Thatch Island, Lounsbury, who had been standing near the railing of the houseboat, lost his balance and fell overboard.

Two young women with whom he had been conversing, gave the alarm and the tug was stopped and put about. Diligent search was kept up for two hours, but no trace of him could be found. He was unable to swim and it is supposed that he sank immediately. Some of those on board think that his fall may have been due to a fainting fit.

Several of the young women on board became hysterical and it was a saddened party that reached the city at 2 o'clock this morning. Rev. J. H. McDonald was called to break the terrible news to Lounsbury's family.

The young man was aged eighteen and was employed as a salesman by W. E. Farrell. He was a bright youth and had many friends who are greatly shocked at the news of his death. The family removed to the city from Queensbury two years ago. The late G. A. Lounsbury of Newcastle was an uncle of the deceased.

The tug returned to Oromocto this morning to renew search for the body.

FORESTRY BRANCH, DEPT. OF THE INTERIOR PRESS BULLETIN

The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior has just issued its eighth bulletin, entitled "Forest Products of Canada, 1908." This gives the result of the first year's work by the Branch in the collection of statistics regarding the annual production in Canada of lumber, pulpwood, poles and other wood products. The figures have been compiled by Messrs. H. R. MacMillan and G. A. Gutches.

These statistics have been compiled from answers to circulars sent out by the Branch to manufacturers in the different wood-working industries. While it is not claimed that they are complete, yet the figures they give seem to be the most comprehensive yet published. The work was new, both to the manufacturers and to the officials of the Forestry Branch, and mistakes have no doubt occurred in it. The work is to be continued, however, and increasing familiarity with the work, both on the part of the manufacturers and on that of the Branch will doubtless bring about greater accuracy and completeness in the returns.

The total value of the production of lumber, lath, shingles, cross-ties, poles and pulpwood during the year was \$67,425,044.

The production of sawn lumber is shown by the figures to be in the neighborhood of 3,348,176,000 feet, board measure, per annum, valued at \$54,834,036. In this Ontario leads with a production of 1,294,784,000 feet, valued at \$24,398,077, Quebec being second with 690,135,000 feet of the value of \$10,838,608, and B. C. third, with 647,977,000 feet worth \$9,107,186. The other provinces rank in the following order:—N. B., 308,400,000 feet valued at \$4,081,402; N. S., 216,825,000 ft., of the value of \$2,873,730; Saskatchewan, 91,166,000 ft., valued at \$1,576,820; Manitoba, 56,447,000 ft., value, \$867,969; Alberta, 41,382,000 ft., valued at \$593,244. The total production of wood pulp is 363,079 tons, made from 482,777 cords of wood and valued at \$2,931,653.

SHINGLES

B. C. easily leads in the production of shingles, producing 724,652,000 of the value of \$1,391,306. Its nearest competitor is Quebec, which produced 406,440,000, valued at \$849,787, and then follow, in their order, Ontario with a production of 223,533,000 valued at \$461,155; N. B., 109,913,000 worth \$325,865; N. S., making 33,141,000, valued at \$69,370; Manitoba, turning out 1,125,000, worth \$3,150, and Saskatchewan, which produces 592,000, valued at \$1,363.

The total production for the Dominion was 1,499,396,000 shingles, the aggregate value of which was \$3,101,996.

LATHS

In the manufacture of laths Ontario takes first place with 263,241,000 to her credit, valued at \$612,856. Little more than half that number, viz., 138,991,000, is made by her nearest competitor, New Brunswick, the value of whose product is \$286,088. Quebec made 92,914,000 laths worth \$189,076; British Columbia 86,862,000, worth \$208,255; Nova Scotia, 62,638,000, worth \$136,893; Saskatchewan, 18,477,000, valued at \$40,173; Manitoba, 7,870,000, at a value of \$10,200 and Alberta 1,069,000, worth \$3,584.

The total number of laths manufactured was 671,662,000, of the value of \$1,497,125.

RAILWAY TIES

During the year the railways purchased 13,978,416 cross-ties for which they paid \$5,281,685. Of these the steam railways (47 in number and having a total of 25,772 miles of track) bought 13,

738,157, paying therefor \$5,189,674, and the electric roads (numbering 32 and having 818 miles of track) purchased 240,259 ties costing \$92,011. Cedar (including under this term both the eastern and the western cedars) is easily the favorite wood for ties, twice as many ties being of this species as of any other, while hemlock and tamarack in about equal numbers take next place.

POLES USED

Reports as to the poles purchased were received from 46 telegraph and telephone companies, 151 electric light, power and railway companies and 19 steam railways owning their pole lines. These represent 66,544 miles of line, supported by 2,433,245 poles. These companies bought a total of 185,807 poles, paying for these, at the point of purchase, \$284,549. Of these 185,807 poles 162,211 were of cedar, other woods used being tamarack, spruce and Douglas fir.



LABOR PARTY JOINS SOCIALISTS

Amherst, N. S. S., May 25.—As a political party the labor party for Cumberland ceased to exist yesterday and the socialist party of Canada took its place. At a convention of the Cumberland labor party held in Maccan yesterday afternoon about thirty delegates were in attendance. These were mostly from Springhill, Amherst and Chignecto Mines. A resolution was adopted formally dissolving the labor party and adopting in its stead the platform of the Socialist Party of Canada. It was further resolved to place candidates in the field to contest the next local election, and Messrs Seaman Ferris of Springhill and Adolph Landry of Moncton were nominated. Ferris was present and accepted the nomination. Mr. Landry has not yet been heard from. Wm. Watkins of Springhill was appointed secretary and treasurer for the county and the organization work will begin at once.

CIRCUIT COURT

The regular session of the Circuit Court for the County of Northumberland was opened in the court house on Wednesday morning. His Honor Mr. Justice Barry, presiding. There was a large attendance at the court.

The only criminal case on the docket was that against Frank Tardy and Simon Forbes, who were charged with breaking and entering the premises of an Indian and stealing therefrom a number of small articles. His Honor Judge Barry did not think there was sufficient evidence to warrant a grand jury to return a true bill against the prisoners. He thought that the case could have been disposed of by the magistrate. He reviewed the facts of the case, pointing out that there was really no evidence which would substantiate the guilt of the prisoners. Subsequently Hon. H. C. McLeod, solicitor general, on behalf of the prosecution expressed himself in favor of a dismissal. He concurred with his Lordship's views in the matter.

After dismissing the grand jury, His Lordship had the prisoners brought before him and gave them their liberty with some sound advice. T. W. Butler in the course of the proceedings explained that the magistrate had desired to try the case, but the prisoners refused, this course.

In the course of a few eloquent remarks at the opening of the court, Judge Barry paid a high tribute to the worth of our late sovereign and also made fitting reference to George V.

NEW COLLEGE AT CHATHAM

English Speaking Roman Catholic University May be Affiliated With U. N. B.

A new provincial college will shortly be opened at Chatham. The institution will be for English speaking Catholic students in the province. The preliminary plans for the college are well advanced and interesting developments are being awaited. The Basilian Fathers will direct the new institution. The matter is being attacked systematically and at a meeting in Chatham some time ago a board was nominated to collect funds necessary for the establishment and endowment of the college.

It is understood it is to be under the direction of the Basilian Fathers of Toronto, Ont., who at present direct the colleges of St. Michael, Toronto and Sanwich, Ont. The idea is to afford superior education to English speaking Catholics of the province of New Brunswick. The college will provide education for both boarders and day students. It is not impossible that the new institution will be affiliated with the University of New Brunswick.

The date of opening of college is not yet announced. The board of governors will include Rt. Rev. Monsignor Varley of Bathurst Village, Rev. M. A. O'Keefe of Chatham, Rev. Fr. Murdoch of Sorel, Messrs. R. A. Lawlor, W. F. Cassidy and John O'Connor of Chatham, ex-Mayor Patrick Hennessy of Newcastle and High Sheriff O'Brien of Nelson. The building at Chatham, formerly known as St. Michael's College, will be the seat of the new institution.

GRAMPIAN RAN AROUND IN ST. LAWRENCE RIVER MONCTON, May 11.—The first accident of the St. Lawrence navigation season occurred yesterday at Cap La Roche, thirty miles above Quebec, when at noon the Allan liner Grampian ran on the rocks.

The Grampian ran aground, but fortunately the tide was low, and when three hours later high tide was reached, she floated off, and resumed her voyage to Montreal under her own steam.

CASTORIA The Kind You Have Always Bought. WILL BEAT NEARLY 2,000 PEOPLE. Public Works Department Will Spend \$5000.

OTTAWA, May 11.—The Minister of public works has given orders for every public building in Canada to be immediately draped in mourning out of respect for the memory of King Edward. A treasury warrant of \$35,000 has been issued for the purpose of defraying the expense. Large amounts have been allowed for different places based upon the importance of the city and the number of public buildings they contain. EXPLOSION ON THE BATTLESHIP 'LONDON' LONDON, May 11.—Reports are current at Dover of a serious explosion of the flagship London of the British Atlantic battleship fleet in Norwegian waters. The reports cannot be confirmed here. Rear-Admiral Sir Colin Richard Keppell is in command of the fleet. The London is a twin screw battleship of 16,000 tons. Her Captain is A. G. E. N. Chaffield. The flagship was built at Portsmouth being launched in 1904 and completed in 1907. Her cost was in excess of \$5,000,000. Her complement is 757 officers and men.

BUSHVILLE WHARF
We had occasion to visit Bushville last week and found its wharf in a wretched condition. Say nothing of teams, even foot passengers are not safe. It is only an apology for a wharf at best, but at present it is not even that. We hope the parties responsible will give it immediate attention.

GOOD ROADS
A few years ago when a now high officer of the provincial government was doing platform work in Restigouche he made special mention of Chaplin Island Road, and stated, we are informed, that "if the present government" (the present opposition) remained in power another session a wheelbarrow could not be put through this road. The then government had cedar and planks purchased and delivered to bridge the Ox Brook. The planks have been used for cross drains, the cedar is rotting by the wayside and the bridge is hardly safe for foot passengers. Wagons are breaking down, sinners are gone, planks rotten, and only the special efforts of the residents contiguous, have prevented it being like the Newcastle ferry—impossible—and from the North Esk line north, if the present government pursue its good road policy toward it, with its \$200,000, additional revenue, a pack horse, let alone a wheelbarrow, cannot go safely through it. Even now it is not safe to take a loaded team over some of the hills and scarcely any of the 12 miles north of the mill-stream will admit two teams to pass.

WILL SEAT NEARLY 2,000 PEOPLE
Modern New Grand Stand at Dominion Exhibition, St. John, N. B.

In deciding upon a new and more commodious Grand Stand, the Executive Committee of the Dominion Exhibition, to be held in St. John, N. B., September 5th to 15th, have realized that outdoor attractions lose much of their effectiveness if the sight-seeing crowd is not provided with proper accommodations. This new Grand Stand will be situated almost directly opposite the old structure, which has been removed by the military authorities to make room for a new armory. It will be 208 feet long by 40 feet deep, with comfortable seats for 1,750 people. The plans call for the best of sight-seeing facilities, and the rows of seats are so carefully graded that no difficulty will be experienced by any occupant in seeing all that is going on in the fire-works, open-air entertainment and stock-exhibiting departments. There will be a 10-foot promenade in front of the Grand Stand and a covered bazaar promenade underneath in the rear, as part of the plan. The aisles will be large and amply wide, making access and egress easy. From this monster point of vantage some of the finest programs of thrilling feats, pyrotechnics, etc. will be seen.



VAST INCREASE IN PRIZES

Dominion Exhibition Awards From 50 per cent. to 125 per cent. Greater.

In a short time the prize-list for the Dominion Exhibition, to be held in St. John, September 5th to 15th, will be ready for distribution. It will be the most interesting of its kind ever printed in Eastern Canada. Not only will it explain the vast field of competition among farmers, breeders, manufacturers, dairy men, school children, household workers and others, but it will contain detailed information relative to the distribution of prize monies, which in this case will be increased from 50 to 125 per cent. over former appropriations. This generous increase is possible through the grants of the Dominion, Provincial, and Civic Governments. Cattle prizes, especially in the Shorthorn, Hereford, Ayrshire, Holstein and Jersey classes have been increased 100 per cent.; in the Clydesdale, Shire, and Percheron horse classes the increase is to be 50 per cent.; Dairy breeds of cattle will receive 125 per cent. more money than previous occasions, while sheep and swine breeders will receive much greater incentive than heretofore. Poultry fanciers will be interested in a new system of judging, and the prize list will vary with number of entries in each class. Dairy awards have been revised upwards as well, after consultation with representatives of the Provincial department. A notable feature in this section of the show will be the separation in competition of the professional dairymen and the household butter-maker, special prizes being awarded for each. In the Horticultural department the prize list has undergone a lot of changes, made with a view to improving the quality of exhibits. Naturally this has entailed the elimination of several classes of apple, not fit for competitive purposes so early in the autumn. The funds withheld on this account have been put into new classes. Potatoes will be judged in a new manner; instead of judgment being rendered in each individual variety, they will this year be classified in six types—White Round, White Long, Rose Round, Rose Long, Red and Black. The Women's Work and Household Science Department, also the Educational section, have been included in the increase of prize monies.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a portion of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate city acres extra). A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 100 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
