

Nucleus of Navy to Be Presented to the Dominion of Canada By the Mother Country

Latest Type of Destroyers Are to Form Original of the Canadian Navy

Dominion Accepts a Cruiser and Two Torpedo Destroyers From the Mother Country—Trained Personnel Assured Till Permanent Policy is Formulated.

HALLOW, March 25.—The light cruiser and the two torpedo boat destroyers which Canada is to receive as a gift from the British Government are the latest type in their particular classes.

These vessels will serve as the beginning of a fleet until such a time as a permanent naval policy is formulated for Canada. In the meantime, however, they will enable the Dominion to retain the nucleus of a trained personnel for service when a policy is developed or in case of emergency. The cruiser, acceptance of which Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of the Naval Service, announced this afternoon will be a vessel of from 4,500 to 5,000 tons displacement, having a speed of 30 knots and armed with six six-inch anti-aircraft guns and two torpedo tubes. Her crew will consist of 150 officers and men. The cruiser will be representative of a type of very recent design of medium sized armament and displacement, and proved useful during the war in scouting and reconnaissance, for escort work for use against submarines and for destruction of enemy commerce.

The cost of such a vessel in Canada is estimated as in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000.

Bank Deposits Do Not Agree With H. C. L.

Huge Savings in United States Go To Disprove, it is said, Claim That Living is Serious Problem

NEW YORK, March 26.—Wm. C. Redfield, former secretary of commerce, in an address here today, declared assertions that the high cost of living in New York is a "serious problem" is disproved by the deposits in savings banks in the state.

"Let us get rid of this talk of unmitigated suffering among our poor people," said Mr. Redfield. "For the \$2,267,395,000 in savings bank deposits in this state alone is spread over accounts totaling 3,600,000 or in other words one person in three has \$500 to \$600 put aside in the savings bank."

"It certainly adds cheer to our lot to know that the people in this state are stacking up and putting away three-quarters of a million dollars every day."

Mr. Redfield said a new class of spenders had arisen as a result of high salaries paid during the war which "had brought on a spirit of lavishness hitherto unknown."

REMARKABLE CASE BUFFALO POLICE INVESTIGATED; MAN AND WIFE HELD

It Was Charged Young Woman Had Been Kidnapped, But It Later Developed That She Had Gone Away Willingly With Two Men

BUFFALO, March 26.—Following a complaint made to the police of the Pearl Street station yesterday morning by Roy Coons of Carbondale, Pa., that his wife, Verta, nineteen years old, had disappeared while he was in a saloon at Pearl and Huron streets developments arose which culminated in the arrest of Norman Murray and William Kinney, who gave their address as the Men's hotel and the woman's husband. All are charged with inducing a woman to commit acts of prostitution.

Coons made his complaint Wednesday morning. He said he went into the place on Huron Street to purchase a package of cigarettes leaving his wife outside. When he came out he said his wife had disappeared. Questioned further Coons told the police he had arrived from Binghamton N. Y., yesterday morning and was to take a train for Cleveland, Ohio, last night.

Accompanied by Lieut. Edward Thierfeldt, and Patrolman Edward Oberstein, the husband made a trip through numerous rooming houses but could find no trace of the wife. About 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon the officers and the husband went to the Lackawanna railroad station on the theory that the wife might be waiting there to take the train for Cleveland. As the officers and Coons were going into the station they met Mrs. Coons. She was taken to the Pearl Street station and a statement she is said to have made changed the complexion of the case and led to the arrests.

In the statement she said she was waiting for her husband when two men approached her and asked her if she had not lost a sum of money. She said she had not, but declared they insisted they picked it up with she dropped it. She claims a conversation was started and the men induced her to go to a rooming house at No. 803 Main Street explaining she could make "easy money" before her husband came out.

She alleges the men took her to the room and forced her to commit immoral acts, threatening her if she did not. When she tried to leave the room she said one of the men grabbed her and again threatened her. At 1 o'clock she said someone kicked on the door and when the attention of the two men was directed toward the noise at the door, she ran out another door leading her coat in the room. She then took a street car and went to the depot.

With this information, Oberstein and O'Donnell, scoured the precinct and three hours later arrested Murray and Kinney. Mrs. Coons is said to have identified both.

Not satisfied with the woman's explanation of her actions, Lieut. Thierfeldt grilled her again last night and secured an admission, so he asserted that she had been leading a life of shame with her husband knowledge in Binghamton, and that he had brought her to this city with the same purpose in mind. Lieutenant Thierfeldt then booked the husband on the blotter and locked up the woman as a witness. She was suffering from nervous shock but was not seriously hurt.

Confusion is Likely Now With Reference To Daylight Saving

Some Railroads Will Adopt It, Some Won't—Some Folks and Some Industrial Concerns Will Use Daylight Saving, Others Will Not—Nothing Here Yet.

It is probable that St. Catharines will not adopt daylight saving as early as many cities in the United States. No announcement has yet been made and it is likely this city will fall in with what the rest of Ontario does.

Repeal of National daylight saving and its subsequent enactment by many U. S. cities threatens to throw traffic into confusion, beginning next Sunday, railroad officials over the border say.

The New York Central and New Haven railroads will adjust their suburban train movements to the new time, but clocks and timetables will remain at eastern standard time. Other railroads announced they will either retain their present time or will await development before making changes.

Through schedules will be unchanged, it was announced.

Repeal Bill Effected

New York city has adopted daylight saving effective at 2 a. m. March 28 and at that time all city clocks will be set ahead one hour. New York state has adopted the plan and a bill or its repeal was defeated. Although Connecticut has not adopted the plan Hartford has passed an ordinance for its observance is pending in the city council.

In New Jersey a bill has passed the Assembly and is pending in the Senate. In that state Camden, Plainfield and New Brunswick have adopted daylight saving and more than 3,000 municipalities have endorsed statewide adoption.

In Massachusetts a bill is pending. Clinton, Lynn, Worcester and Marlborough have adopted the plan. In Botan a bill is pending in the city council.

Bill In Rhode Island

A daylight bill is pending in Rhode Island.

In Delaware the plan has been adopted by Wilmington, and a bill has been prepared for the state legislature.

Stock Crusade Brings Arrest Tom Lawson

FOUR OTHER BROKERS SHARE SIMILAR FATE—FOUR COUNTS IN INDICTMENT

BOSTON, March 26.—The crusade of Attorney-General Aiken against promoters and brokers who have been exploiting silver stocks led to the arrest of Thomas W. Lawson, yesterday. He surrendered himself at police headquarters to answer to a warrant charging him with violating on four counts a state law regarding the filing of information regarding stock issues. Four other operators and brokers were arrested yesterday, including L. C. Van Riper, of New York, former secretary of Lawson.

Lawson and Van Riper in recent months have been active in the promotion of silver stocks while in the Lawson advertising was featured as "silvers" the greatest gamble of the age. Each announced he was developing certain individual silver mines properties as units of general holding companies.

Lawson, it will be recalled created a stir some years ago by publishing a book on "Frenzied Finance." He was very much in the limelight at that time.

Welland Woman Takes Acid and Dies From Effects

WELLAND, March 26.—Mrs. Thos. Humphries, 768 Garner Avenue, this city committed suicide yesterday afternoon by taking an ounce of carbolic acid.

On purchasing the acid in the morning she told the druggist that it was for a disinfectant. Her husband found her dead in bed when he went home in the evening. She had evidently swallowed the acid as purchased, after locking all the doors and windows. Chief Laing and Dr. Colbeck were summoned, who found that drops of the acid in the glass had crystallized.

Mrs. Humphries was born in England, and she and her husband expected to return hither soon.

The police found the adopted child wandering on the streets.

An inquest was found unnecessary as the act was clearly premeditated one.

French "Pug" Guest of Honor In New York

Champion Heavy-Weight Boxer of Europe Given Midnight Supper and Welcomed by University Students

NEW YORK, March 26.—Georges Carpentier, champion heavy-weight boxer of Europe, was the guest of honor here last night at a midnight supper given by officers of the International Sporting Club to celebrate the election of its one thousandth member.

Maj.-Gen. John F. O'Ryan, who commanded the Twenty-seventh division in France, was toastmaster. Scores of wealthy and prominent amateur sportsmen attended.

A temporary ring was built in the centre of the banquet hall in anticipation of a scheduled exhibition bout between Carpentier and Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, of Philadelphia, president of the club. This was to be the star event during the early morning hours after the guests had been entertained by several preliminary two minute round bouts between lesser lights of the boxing profession.

In the afternoon Carpentier was welcomed at New York University by 200 disabled veterans of the war who comprise the federal students Post 750, American Legion, and was made "an honorary member in spirit."

SENTENCED TO DEATH

Prisoner Objects to Giving or Listening to Lecture.

NEW YORK, March 26.—Jess Walker, nineteen years old, of Evansville, Ind., today was sentenced to die in the electric chair the week of April 25th for the murder of Samuel Wolchock on March 11, 1919. A diary found on Walker when he was arrested in Mattoon, Ill., ten months after the murder, contained a note about the crime.

When asked by the court if he had anything to say before sentence was pronounced, Walker blandly replied: "Well, I didn't fire the shot that killed Samuel Wolchock, but, at that, I didn't come up here to lecture or hear a lecture. I came to be sentenced."

After a pause of several seconds, the judge pronounced the death sentence. Walker bowed and walked firmly from the room.

Time will not soon heal the wound in the hearts of her friends, caused by her loss, and her memory will be lovingly cherished by all those whose privilege it was to know her.

MONTREAL, March 26.—Fire yesterday destroyed immense quantities of grain, shellac, and tobacco in the Molson Brewery warehouse, which was burned to the ground. The damage was estimated at \$1,000,000.

Canned Heat Has a Kick; Three Dead!

CHICAGO, March 26.—Mrs. Anna Watkins, proprietor of a rooming house made a tremendous hit with her husband and the roomers by mixing for them a home brew that had the desired kick and potency. Four of the men recovered sufficiently to talk but three died and Mrs. Watkins was ordered held to the grand jury.

At the inquest she said she mixed about two gallons of strong black tea with a gallon of water and 24 ounces of solidified alcohol, taken from small cans, and ordinarily used for cooking and heating purposes. She added a little sugar and when her husband and the boarders tackled the beverage they grew highly encouraged and drank all she mixed and gave her money to buy more solidified alcohol. She bought 36 cans and made up another batch but before that was consumed the roomers began to droop and die.

HERD CATTLE BY AIRPLANE

The Pas, Man., March 25—Manipulation of the countless thousand of caribou and oxen by use of the airplane is the scheme of W. H. P. Jarvis, of Toronto, in planning the best means of herding these animals. It is Jarvis' theory that aviators act as drovers and as the herds come down in the autumn drive them against the shores of the Hudson Bay and down along the coast and behind a strong fence built from a point above Port Nelson the tide water terminal of the Hudson Bay Railway. Once they are jammed between the sea and the fence he expects to segregate the sexes, and the does could be let through a gateway and given their freedom, while the fat bucks could be driven to the Hudson Bay Railway and there slaughtered and shipped out to the Canadian and American markets.

The scheme provides for the airdromes at Fort Churchill, Lake Athabasca and Chesterfield Inlet. This scheme relies upon the Hudson Bay Railway entirely for its success, as providing means of transporting the meat to civilization involving 5,000,000 carcasses a year.

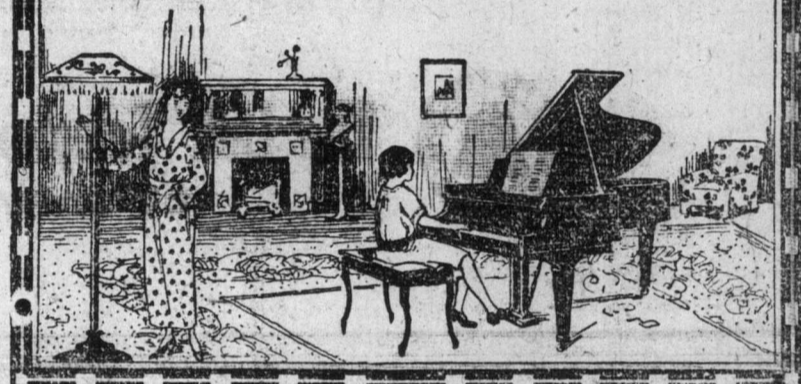

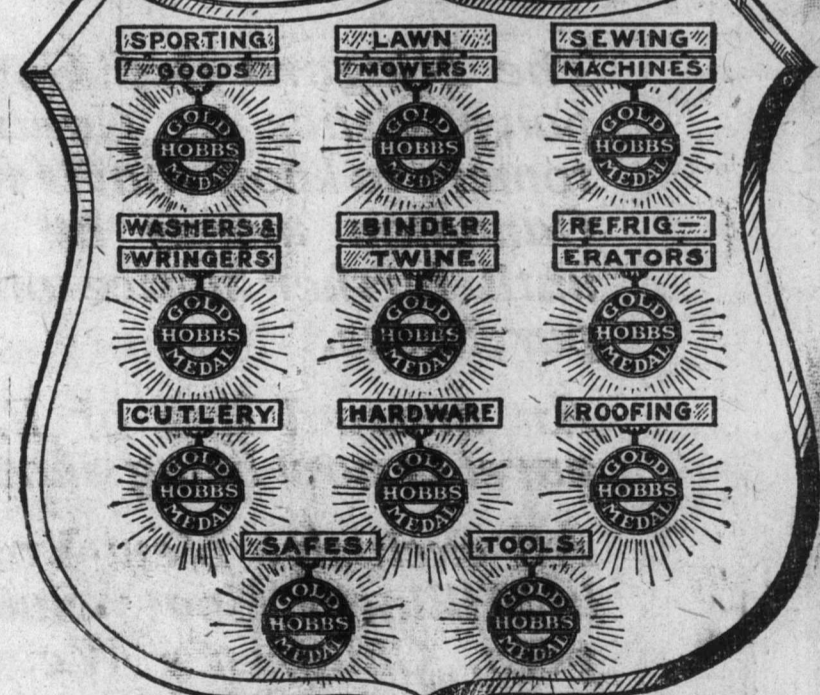

SCOW IS INGENUOUSLY REMOVED FROM RIVER

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Mar. 25—Employees of the Niagara Falls Power Company have dynamited the scow which has been lodged in the upper rapids just below Goat Island for several years. An ingenious method of getting the dynamite to the scow was used. A rope was attached to a tree on the main land below the scow. CROWN PRINCE FORCED TO BORROW TABLE AT WHICH TO EAT HIS FOOD

CHICAGO, March 25—In Serbia the nobility is working fifteen hours a day at any sort of work to be had farming, street cleaning, public kitchens, welfare and reclamation work and in Belgrade Crown Prince Alexander sits upon a borrowed chair and eats from a borrowed table. This fits in very nicely with the new order of things in Europe, but Helen Losanich is here plead for some assistance, in caring for Serbian war orphans. The nobility will get by somehow but the helpless children, are in dire need of help.

Miss Losanich says there are 300,000 half orphans, 70,000 orphans and thousands of other children whose parents are unable to provide for them. The orphanage in Chachak formerly was used for a barracks. Its heating system is ruined, and there are no window panes. Contagious diseases break out frequently and the orphanage workers are sadly hampered by lack of clothing and medical supplies.

"We need these children for the rehabilitation of Serbia, which is an agricultural country," said Miss Losanich, who is understood to be the representative of the crown prince. With assistance from America, the Serbians are establishing small orphanages in various towns, but they have an immediate and vital problem. Starving children or those suffering from disease must have attention at once which accounts for the drive now on in this country to raise a \$2,000,000 fund and upon success or failure of this prospect hangs the fate of thousands of little ones and the future of Serbia.

AUTO WITH 37 CASES CAPTURED AT WINDSOR

WINDSOR, March 25—Assigning two motor-cycle officers to the task of running down a gang of bootleggers who are supplying Detroit with a fair share of Canadian and imported liquor, Chief of Police Wills today announced that he has determined to put a stop to the activities of liquor runners. CHICAGO, March 25—Frank Pinano, jun., today was at the County Hospital with three bullet wounds in his body. Frank Pinano, sen., was held at a police station where officers said a murder charge would be placed if the 18-year old boy died.

"I shot him to save his soul," the aged man told the police. "I would rather kill him myself than have the police do it. For months I have been worried every time I heard of a 'stick up' for fear my son had been killed. I tried to get him to buckle down, but he would not do it."

Frank, jun., according to court records slipped into a near crime record when he was fourteen years old. Two years later he had become a recognized gangster, and repeatedly cognized gangster, and repeatedly was arrested. A year ago his father carried him bodily to the police, and had Frank jun., confined to a boys' home. Two months later he was released at the instance of Mrs. Pinano.

Between sobs, the aged father told the police of how for two years he had herded his family of ten other children to the Church of Our Lady of Pompeii on Sunday, but that Frank jun. always was missing—"hanging out with his gang."

Last night, Pinano sen., continued, he determined to make a final effort to reclaim his boy. Encountered with friends at a street corner, the youth sneered, and walked away to escape "being bawled out by his goody-goody old man," the father said, and he fired five times. The bullets hit Frank Jr. in the legs and the third seriously wounded him in the back.

C. N. R. WILL NOT ELECTRIFY LINE

"The rumors in connection with the electrification of the roads operated by the Canadian National Railways are unfounded, so far as the general system is concerned," said President D. B. Hanna yesterday. "We have taken over the railway known as the Toronto Eastern Railway, and also some other lines, and we have an agreement with the Hydro to sell these roads to the Hydro Commission, and when taken over by the commission they will naturally be electrified. This also concerns that line known as the old Central Ontario Railway, where passenger traffic is far in excess of the freight transportation, but

this applies to that section only, not to the Central Ontario Railways in general, some people have understood from my speech to the Canadian Club in rockville. "So far as the increase in rates is concerned, we are simply marking time awaiting the decision of the United States Interstate Commission of Railways," he said. "The Railway in that country has practically agreed that the railways are entitled to an increase, and it has been our policy so far to follow generally the United States in that matter." Mr. Hanna said he did not think that the increased motor traffic would have any effect whatever on the traffic on the railways.

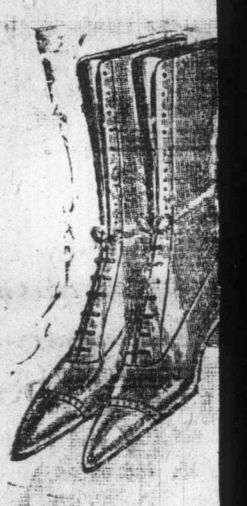

Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success, which attended those efforts by over-subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

PAINT LENGTHENS LIFE OF BUILDINGS AND MACHINES

Many an old ship has stood the racket of ocean travel for years mainly on the strength of the tar, or paint applied to her sides, but sailors do not wait for the ship's hull to become weather beaten before applying the first coat of paint. Farmers, on the other hand, seem much inclined to let their buildings reach a state of partial decay before making any special effort to safeguard them against the play of wind and water. 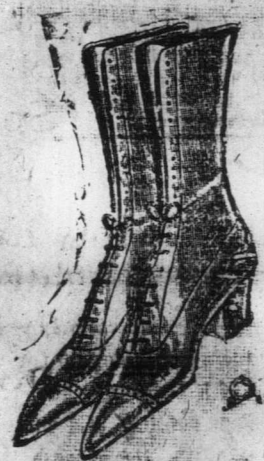

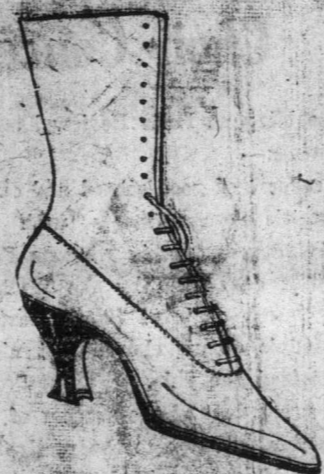

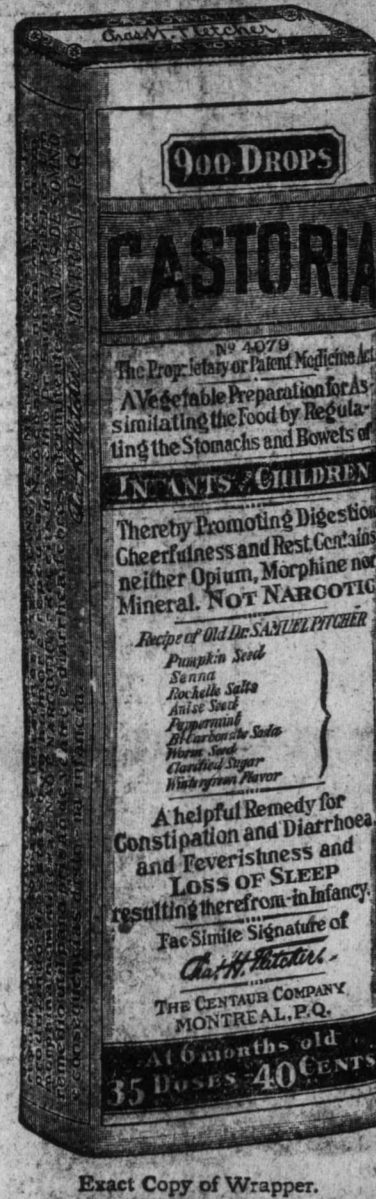

Gordon Scott, the seven-year-old Niagara Falls boy who was hit by an auto on Monday night, passed away late last night at the General Hospital, Niagara Falls, without regaining consciousness. Coroner McGarry held an inquest at the Morse undertaker rooms where the body was taken.

The Wabash railway bridge over the Portage Road in Stamford Township was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night. The fire is said to have been caused by sparks from burning grass. The bridge was a wooden structure and was valued at \$3,000.

The rate of exchange on Canadian money dropped in Niagara Falls, N.Y. yesterday from 13 per cent to 11 per cent. Two weeks ago the rate was 18 per cent. Bank officials said today that there would be fluctuations in the rate from now on, as the Falls banks had decided to follow the Toronto markets.

"The Canadian Otter," the largest vessel constructed at Welland by the British-American Shipbuilding Company, has been built in two sections, and the stern was launched yesterday successfully. The remainder, it is expected will be launched on Saturday. The vessel when completed will be 320 feet long, and will be taken to Montreal. The launching of a vessel in two sections has never before been attempted.

Maximum penalties will be asked for against the next list of persons failing to make their income tax returns, say officials of the City Assessment Department. The first group of those summoned were dealt with leniently, but others will not receive similar treatment. The maximum penalty is a fine of \$100 and \$10 for each day the return is overdue. Income tax bills numbering 47,000 have been sent out to date.

Swiff Won Over. ALBANY, March 26.—An amendment made by Senator J. Samuel Fowler to his bill to repeal the daylight saving law has won for him the vote of Senator Parton Swift of Buffalo, the single additional "aye" needed to pass the measure in the upper house, Senator Fowler so announced. The amendment made by Senator Fowler simply gives cities and villages the right to pass local ordinances providing for daylight saving, despite the repeal of the state statute.

"I have amended my bill to meet the objections of certain city Republicans," said Senator Fowler. "The amendment will assure me of the single vote I needed to round out the required twenty six."

He added quite frankly that the vote won by this move was that of Senator Parton Swift of Erie. The daylight saving repeal bill was summarily defeated today in the Assembly by a vote of 70 to 64. Seventy-six are needed to pass a bill. Assemblyman Betts the introducer, moved to reconsider the vote by which the measure was lost.

Niagara Falls Folks Enjoyed Choir Concert

The Niagara Falls Review has the following:—A concert of good sacred and classical music always meets with encouraging reception in Niagara Falls and that one given by the Welland Ave. church choir of St. Catharines in Lundy's Lane church last night emphasized the rule.
