Papal Supremacy.
In the church of the Holy Name, Manchester, England, which was thronged to its utmost limits on a recent Sunday, the Rector, Rev. Edward Vaughan, S. J., replied to Dr. Moore, the Protestant bishop of Manchester, who in his recent charge to his clergy and church wardens made an attack on the Catholic church. For one hour and twenty minutes the eminent preacher held his audience riveted by a masterly discourse, which we regret, owing to extraordinary pressure on our space, we cannot give in full. Taking as his text, "All things have their seasons—a time to keep silence and a time to speak" (3rd chap. Eccles.). He said it took a priest all his time to look after his own, without saying forth aggressively to attack others; but when a high official of the state—a bishop of the state church in the province of Canterbury. And surely if the natural result of the revival of learning was the so-called reformation, how can we explain that this tide of revival did not sweep away the Papal supremacy and bring about the reformation, say, in Italy, Austria, France, or Spain? Or, how comes it that the great English and Scotch divines, such as Hooker and blessed Thomas Moore, with others too numerous to mention, did not bow to this great tidal wave that set in, and, like their weaker brethren, subscribe to the oath of supremacy? I cannot doubt but that the bishop of Manchester will admit that Sir Thomas Moore was a man of intelligence and knowledge; and yet, with nothing to gain in this world and his head to lose, he felt compelled in conscience to say, "Though I would not deny to the pope the succession, yet, in that oath that he there offered me, I could not swear without the jeopardizing of my soul to eternal damnation." This cost him his head.

What the preacher asked is the question that lays before us. On the one hand we have the bishop of Lincoln and High church party claiming community with the old religion of England, and on the other the Catholic church party, doing the Catholic church party the honors of its high celebrations, in the glory of its vestments, in the intricacy of its ritual, and in the simplicity of its pious practices, in the rigor of its fasts, and in the frequency of its confessions. Quite Asiatic in its attitude, the Catholic party upon us. On the other hand we have the bishop of Manchester in the Low church party, claiming no less than the high church party, and the religion established by John Calvin, and for this very reason "rejecting many of the practices, at present in full swing among his High church party, as unscriptural and superstitious, obscuring the truth of the gospel, scandalizing men of knowledge and intelligence, and degrading the vast multitude of the ignorant and worldly-minded, and such as such, superstitions in the place of spiritual religion. As Catholics, my brethren, the scene we gaze upon today forces upon our minds the words spoken by our Divine Master: "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Sooner or later, like the tower described for us in the Old Testament, it must be demolished, or if you will, disestablished and dissolved.

What is there keeping it together at the present moment? Agreement upon the supremacy of the Roman Pontiff, viz., that it is a thing of medieval growth. "Only that and nothing more." So long as this remains among the most potent stones—and it is giving here and there signs of crumbling away—the established church may continue to stand; but even to-day the country is beginning to calculate how many years it yet has to live. The Protestant bishop of Manchester in determining the relations of Protestantism to Catholicism, declares: "We are not separated from that church by minor quarrels about orders and forms of service. The true grounds of our separation from the Catholic Church, however, are of a deeper and more essential character. We have rejected the Papal supremacy as a usurpation founded originally upon mistakes and forgeries. We have rejected many Roman doctrines, especially the doctrine of infallibility, and the whole Roman system of sacerdotalism, as unscriptural, superstitious, etc." And he adds, "these are facts, and it can do nothing but harm to conceal them." This wholesale condemnation, like the Pennsylvania flood, seems to sweep away nearly all before it, including one section of his own church, and, in fact, to clear the ground of everything ecclesiastical, but the Bible and the pulpit.

Dr. Morehouse, as Protestant bishop of Manchester, at his consecration took an oath of homage to the head of his church—the pope, "the supreme head on earth under Christ of the church of England." It ran thus: "I, doctor of divinity, now elected, confirmed and consecrated bishop of Manchester, do hereby declare that your majesty is the only supreme governor of this, your realm, in spiritual and temporal matters, as well as temporal, and that no foreign prelate or potentate has any jurisdiction in this realm." 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Harbor Grace Cathedral.
The following account of the destruction of the magnificent Cathedral at Harbor Grace, on the 2nd day of the month, is of interest to all who are interested in the progress of the Harbor Grace Standard of the 4th issue. Harbor Grace was the first of the new series of buildings of the New Cathedral. His Lordship has, we learn, received from one member of his congregation the handsome contribution of \$400, and has an offer from another person, whose name we are not now at liberty to mention, of the very magnificent donation of \$2000. Smaller sums with the above give hope that the rebuilding will commence at an early date.

The noble edifice that was destroyed was finished about three years ago, and its artistic details completed—such as marble altars, stained glass windows, carpets, and a magnificent set of stations of the Cross erected by the Bishop no later than last spring.

The Cathedral was entirely free of debt but had not one dollar in insurance on it. The Harbor Grace Cathedral was, as we said above, begun about thirty years ago. It had gained a worldwide reputation for especially its style, beauty and finish; its magnificent dome would have done credit to a far larger, far more pretentious edifice. It was greatly admired by all who saw it. Very unfortunately there is no insurance whatever either building or church furniture, and the loss consequently is a very heavy one. The damage inflicted on the town itself is very great; it has in its beautiful Cathedral been despoiled of its chief adornment.

Much sincere sympathy is felt for Bishop McDonald and his people. Bishop McDonald and the Catholic people of Harbor Grace wish to convey their heartfelt thanks to the citizens of the town of all denominations, who so zealously assisted in endeavoring to arrest the progress of the flames. They also desire to give public expression of their gratitude to the kind sympathizers whose names are mentioned above, and as well to the unknown donors of such generous contributions.

OTAWA advices of the 18th inst. inform us that the Honorable Samuel Prowse has been called to the Senate of Canada.

TRADE RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES.

The United States senate committee on commercial relations with Canada, was in session in Boston last week.

The coal dealers want free trade in coal, as they say it would give them a larger Canadian market.

The first witness was Hon. E. A. Morse, member of Congress. He declared himself in favor of Commercial Union, as will be seen from the following:

The first question that presents itself is: Does it pay both countries to retain an army of revenue officers on each side of a line of demarcation?

Jonathan A. Lane, President of the Boston Merchants' Association, gave the following evidence:

The thought Commercial Union offers the only practical solution of our commercial relations with Canada, under such conditions there would be a free trade between the two countries.

These are but a few short extracts from the great mass of evidence taken; but even from this as well as from the other evidence given it will be seen that a considerable change of opinion has taken place among some of our neighbors regarding trade relations with us.

What has done more than anything else, perhaps, to create false notions among the people of the United States relative to our relations on commercial relations with them has been the dishonest play of Commercial Union, which certain agitators and politicians have been harping on for the last year or two.

RETURN OF HIS LORDSHIP THE BISHOP.

The Lordship Bishop McIntyre, who had been absent in Europe for upwards of two months and a half, returned home, in good health, on Saturday night last.

His Lordship, on Saturday night last, on Sunday at High Mass, he occupied his throne in the Cathedral, and after Mass addressed the congregation, giving them a brief but most interesting account of his travels, and his reception in private audience by the Pope.

They crossed over to Dublin, Ireland, and from there went to visit friends in the Counties of Westford, Waterford and Kilkenny.

It is announced that the object of the Dominion Office is to send a party of printers to visit the printing press in this country.

A few days ago Judge Falconbridge, before whom the Hamilton election was tried, declared the election void, on account of bribery and corruption.

The Edinburgh Scotsman, referring to the trial of the Hamilton election, says: "It would be a good thing if colonial travel and experience were made a condition of taking office in the Imperial Government."

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EDITORIAL NOTES.

A PROCLAMATION has been issued from Ottawa, bringing into force in the Maritime Provinces the "spoils trials act" of last session.

The net debt of Canada decreased over \$400,000 during August. The revenue and expenditure statements show a surplus of over two million dollars for the first two months of the present fiscal year.

The expansion of business of the Canadian Pacific Railway has been so great that Mr. Van Horne has had to obtain assistance in the presidency.

The municipal authorities of Liverpool, England, have voted an appropriation of £20,000 for the purpose of the construction of docks for the storage of petroleum on isolated points, thereby ensuring to a minimum the danger arising from fire and explosions.

Nothing definite, says an Ottawa despatch of the 19th, has yet been decided with regard to the date on which Parliament will open.

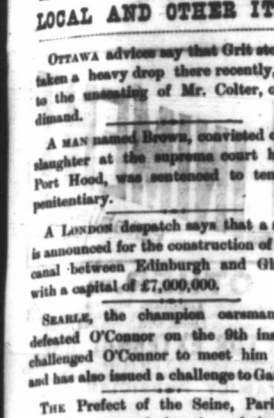
