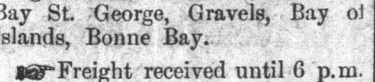

The History of Football

From a sketch in the State of South Africa, by Percy S. T. Jones, apropos of the approaching visit of the British Rugby team, one glean the history of football. Football in Great Britain owes its origin to the Romans, who played with a ball of cloth or leather stuffed with flocks, called harpastum, or with a windbag, called follis. The writer proceeds:—

"It is not possible to produce any direct evidence of the progress or popularity of the game in England prior to the year 1175. It is fairly conclusively established, however, that football goes back several centuries further than cricket. In 1175 William Fitzstephen, writing in his history of London, mentions the fact that it was the habit of the young men of the city to play at the well-known game of ball after dinner. And there can be no doubt that this game was football, but what its outstanding features were can only be a matter of guess-work. The game was confined to the lower classes; no rules existed for its control; the contests seem to have been more in the nature of general scrambles, the goals being placed at either end of a town or street; and the number of players seems to have been unlimited."

Forbidden by Law—In Vain!

Although popular it met with opposition from the authorities. Edward II. in 1314 forbade football under pain of imprisonment, owing to the "great noise in the city caused by hustling over large balls, from which many evils might arise, which God forbid." The game nevertheless progressed. In 1315 Edward III. ordered his sheriffs to suppress "such idle practices," because "the skill at shooting with arrows was almost totally laid aside for the purpose of various useless and unlawful games." But so persistent were the popular classes in this almost national pastime that Richard II. and his successors had to continue to proclaim against "tennis, football, and other games." This deter-

mined persecution had no appreciable effect, however. The people persisted in the game they loved better than the law. James III. of Scotland also found it necessary to order quarterly practices of arms when "footballe and golfe be cryed down and not to be used." Played almost exclusively by the ignorant and rough, tabooed by the upper classes, accompanied by frequent deaths and serious injuries occasioned by the excessive brutality and ruffianism displayed, football was as deservedly persecuted in those days as it is encouraged and patronised by Royalty to-day. That the game was still unlawful in the time of Elizabeth is evidenced by the fact that a Middlesex jury brought in a true bill against a number of persons who "with unknown malefactors to the number of one hundred assembled themselves unlawfully and played a certain unlawful game called footballe, by means of which unlawful game there was amongst them a great affray likely to result in homicides and serious accidents."

"A Devilish Pastime."

Stubbs, in his "Anatomy of Abuses in the Realm of England," describes football as a devilish pastime, resulting in brawling, murder, homicide, and great effusion of blood. Yet so far the game was more handball than football. The gradual refinement and regulation of the game resulted in a decrease of its popularity, so that at the beginning of the nineteenth century the game almost disappeared altogether. Then the leading public schools took up the game, each in its own particular style. In 1855 the Blackheath and Richmond Clubs were formed, and in 1883 the Football Association. In 1877 the number of players was reduced from twenty to fifteen.

Katherine Wybergh mentions in a paper on Socialism and women in the same magazine that in Great Britain the popular interest in football alone outweighs the aggregate interest in religion, science, literature and the fine arts.

The Evening Chit-Chat

The eternal length of a rainy Sunday spent with a crowd of people who were comparative strangers to each other, impels me to a few remarks on the art of general conversation.

If you want to be welcome on rainy Sundays and similar occasions when conversation is the chief amusement, let me suggest that before you start to tell any anecdote you ask yourself: "Is it intrinsically interesting? That is, if it has no connection with myself or my friends, will it still be worth telling?" And if you can't say, "yes," don't tell it.

I've often heard a bore defined as a person who talks about himself continually, but I don't think that's right. I know people who talk about themselves perpetually, but who are nevertheless very delightful companions. The point is they have had such interesting lives that what they tell about themselves is intrinsically interesting, that it would be so even if it had no personal connection.

Try also to lose the idea that a bare statement, that you or some of your friends have been to some particular place or done some special thing, is a good conversational coin.

For instance, if a bright story about newspaper life is told, there is always someone to pipe up: "I have a friend who was a newspaper man once. He wrote the political news," or, if a picture of some beautiful spot is being admired the same variety of bore volunteers the absorbing information,

"I was near there once when I was traveling for a shoe factory, but it was our busy season and I couldn't get the time to go over."

Remarks like that go well enough with people who have reason to be interested in you and your friends, and where you have or haven't been; but as a general conversation with comparative strangers—well, they're certainly counterfeit currency, which only the obligation of politeness ever makes people accept as the real thing.

Stories involving their comprehension much knowledge of any sort—of some business or sport, or locality, for instance—and told to people who do not possess that knowledge, are another variety of bad conversational coin. No one except a conversational genius can give brief explanations that really explain and many a story or incident that is perfectly good when told to the right person, becomes an unmitigated bore when loaded down with explanations and foisted off on people who haven't the ghost of an idea what it all means, but who smile and say, "Yes, yes, I understand," just to get the agony over with.

There is plenty of mutual ground on which even complete strangers, if they have the average intelligence, can meet.

There are enough personal anecdotes in most of our lives that are intrinsically interesting enough to be told even to strangers.

There is almost always some special common interest that any two or three people can find to talk about.

It people would realize these possibilities and limitations, and try to live up to them, and within them, it seems to me there would be far fewer bores in the world.

Designer of Fast Sailing Fishing Boats and Creator of a New Type of Craft.

Through the art of a Boston designer, Mr. Thomas McManus, a brand-new type of fishing schooner has been evolved, and the old lumbering, broad-beamed, blunt-nosed craft which sail daily from Boston and Gloucester, have been replaced by a clean cut model, having all the graceful lines of a yacht and capable of developing the speed of the clippers of yore. The man who has brought about this great change is of quiet and modest appearance and may be seen almost any day among the fishermen of T. Wharf, Boston. In his talks with them he gets ideas based upon their varied experiences and these he works out in his designs. Several years ago, he became convinced that progress, profit and success in the fishing industry lay in speedy craft in order to get the catch to the market in the shortest possible time. A matter of two or three hours might mean the difference between a spoiled or unprofitable cargo and one bringing a premium in the market. He then began designing fast fishing schooners and his craft have sailed in all the fishing waters of the Atlantic. His latest creation is a type of fishing boat which has proved to be the fastest ever built. The main difference between the advanced and the older type consists in doing away with the bowsprit and giving the bow a long overhang as in the knockabout type of yacht. In the latest McManus type of fishing boat, the bow is extended over the water in a long, easy and graceful curve, thus giving reserve power and easing the lines, so the vessel can be driven with less power. The "Helen B. Thomas," first of the advanced type, was built in 1902. The "Aethusa," the latest of the type, was but recently launched. She has made 13 knots under easy sail, and it is claimed that, given favorable conditions, this craft could make 15 knots an hour. Still another of his boats, the "Rose Dorotea," was the winner of the Lipton cup in 1907.—Shipping Illustrated, September 17.

It is the place to go for cheap fancy goods. "Austria" is a jumble stall. Woolens and baskets, etc., will be sold at "Canada" stall, in charge of Mrs. LeMessurier and Mrs. Gray. We must not forget to mention the gypsy tents in the corner where fortunes will be told and ones future destiny revealed on the payment of a small sum. Mrs. Bell will have charge of the "Newfoundland" stall, where veg-

tables and flowers of local growth will be exhibited for sale. All the tea tables are upstairs, and there is a special room for children's teas in charge of Mrs. Adams. There is quite a number of side shows, including an art gallery and guessing competition for children. The students of Queen's College will have charge of these. The whole affair is arranged on the plan of the Festival of Empire. All the designs of the flags, shields and legends to the work of Mr. Lowther, who has been painting the designs and mottoes all the summer. He even sacrificed his holiday to do the work. We trust that the bazaar will be a financial success.

Another Schooner Lost

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, yesterday had a message from Bonne Bay stating that the schooner Mattie Morrissey, owned by Thomas Wilton, was lost on Mad Holi, near Gregory Island, on Saturday, the 24th inst. The crew are safe; but up to last evening no particulars had been received as to how the vessel was lost. She was a 24-ton schooner, built in Shelburne, N. S., in 1894.

Bay de Verde Fishery.

There has been a notable improvement in the fishery in Bay de Verde District, all along the shore, the past two weeks on hook and line and with trawls. This is a godsend to the fishermen who did poorly the first of the season. From Western Bay to Grate's Cove the fishing is good now.

Seized the Furniture.

Yesterday afternoon a Bailiff from the Court proceeded to a house on the higher levels and started in to remove the furniture to satisfy the creditors of the owner who is in debt. Among other things taken out was a piano. The woman of the house obstructed the official for a while, and a Sergeant of police had to be called to enable the Bailiff to proceed.

SCHOONERS ARRIVE.—About 30 schooners arrived here the past 24 hours from the outports with fish and oil.

An Enjoyable Dance.

Last night in the Star of the Sea Hall a very enjoyable dance was given by the Ladies' Association of St. Patrick's. Fully 170 couples were present and the festivities did not end until 3 o'clock this morning. Prof. Power's orchestra rendered the music and during the night refreshments were served by the ladies in charge, viz., Mesdames E. J. Rodgers, M. McGettigan and J. Jackman; Misses N. Brace, L. Maher and S. Cole. Messrs. Jackman, Phelan, O'Brien and Rodgers were floor managers and a goodly sum was realized for St. Patrick's Church Fund.

From the Barrens.

Mr. E. Snow arrived here by last night's train from Upper Gullies, having secured 15 birds. Mr. Hugh Fraser also returned last night by train from Holyrood with ten birds for the day. Hons. E. R. Bowring, W. C. Job and Messrs. W. H. Greene, Hal. Hutchings and Gus. Herder are on the Cape Shore grounds and doing very well with the birds. On the Southern Shore partridge are extremely plentiful and those shooting there are doing well.

A Record Fishery.

Grand Bank will have a record fishery this year and business people of that place now here say that when everything is cleared up fully 60,000 stls. of fish will have been accounted for. All the bankers have done exceptionally well and several will run up to the 3,000 mark before the season closes. Their crews will make big wages and all on that part of the coast will be well provided for the coming winter.

Here and There.

FOUR ARRESTED.—Last night four drunks were arrested by the police. They were held at the lock-up all night.

WILL PATRONIZE THE PLAY.—His Excellency the Governor and His Grace the Archbishop will patronize the drama, "Octoroon," next Wednesday night at the T. A. Hall.

"FIRST AID" CLASS.—The new class about to receive instructions in "First Aid" will meet in the Grand Jury Room, Court House, at 8.30 this evening to make arrangements for the lecture hours.

GOOD FISHING STILL.—The fishermen of Broad Cove and Portugal Cove are still doing fair work with the fish, and when ever the weather is favourable get from a half to a qt. a day.

EXAMINED IN DRILL.—The companies of the Newfoundland Highlanders were examined in drill in the Perkins Shield Competition last night before Capt. Goodridge and Lieut. McBain. The results of the competition will be made known next week.

TOOK A WHALE EACH.—Yesterday the Port Saunders again took another whale, this time a very large fish, and towed it into Harbor Grace. The vessel has now 9 fish to her credit. Yesterday, also, the Hump captured a fine whale in Conception Bay. Fish are still plentiful there.

HAD TO WATCH HIM.—Last night a man who belongs to a craft lying in the stream went down on Baird's wharf in such a condition that the watchman was fearful that he would go overboard. The watchman sent to the lockup and a policeman looked after the inebriate.

CABLES FOR WESTWARD.—Yesterday afternoon two new cables were brought from the King's wharf in a lighter and placed on board the vessel for transmission to the West Coast. One is to be laid from Bay of Islands to Woods' Island and the other to Bonne Bay. Supt. Stott will go up in the ship to see to the proper carrying out of the work.

Cable News.

LONDON, Sept. 26.
The King has decided that the Prince of Wales shall pay no official visits abroad until he comes of age, but shall complete his naval education by an extended cruise on a warship.

LISBON, Sept. 26.
The Cortes which was opened by King Manuel on September 1st, has been adjourned. The members of the Opposition failed to appear at the opening session at which the Government's programme was outlined. It was expected that the Cortes would soon adjourn, owing to the fact that the Cabinet is not considered strong enough at the present time to push its measures through.

LONDON, Sept. 26.
The Coroner's jury to-day returned a verdict of wilful murder against Dr. H. H. Crippen, the American dentist, in connection with the finding in the Crippen residence last July of the mutilated body supposed to be that of Crippen's wife, who was known on the stage as Belle Elmore.

ROME, Sept. 26.
Reports that the Holy See has despatched official protests to the Foreign Governments against the anti-clerical speech delivered by Ernesto Nathan, the Mayor of Rome, at the celebration September 20th, of the fortieth anniversary of the fall of the Temporal Power of the Church, are denied in Vatican circles. It is understood, however, that the foreign Nuncios and Bishops have been instructed to encourage a world wide protest against the Mayor's address. Many messages protesting in a dignified way against the alleged insult to the Pope are reaching the Vatican.

HAMBURG, Sept. 26.
According to the Nachrichten, the new cruiser Von Der Tann, which was launched here March 21st, 1909, and in May last made a speed trial of 28 knots, will undertake before being added to the High Sea Naval force, a voyage around South America for the purpose of testing various innovations in construction and to give the South American nations an object lesson in the capacity of the German shipyards. Among the improvements on the new cruiser are devices for the ventilation of the boiler room.

BERLIN, Sept. 26.
The police and coal strikers had a series of pitched battles to-night at the Moabit Precinct, fifty strikers were wounded by revolver shots and sword thrusts, during police charges; twenty of them were taken to the hospitals severely injured. A very large number of police, totalling forty or more, were also wounded, some of them badly, while protecting strike-breakers. About midnight thousands of strikers stormed the fire station and the Reform Church in Russell Strasse, wrecking the windows and doors. The police were compelled to charge repeatedly and to use severe measures. They are bivouacing in the streets to-night.

Here and There.

Jno. Gibbs, a near-do-well, who has no visible place of abode, was arrested by the police while loitering about the streets at 2 o'clock this morning. He is one of the parties who has been sleeping in suburban barns and stables, and like the others not long since arrested he was a menace to the safety of houses in the country. His conduct otherwise was of a rather revolting nature and he got his just deserts when he was sent down to-day by Judge Conroy for 6 months.

Last week the Telegram exclusively announced the fact that the tin-smiths intended asking for a two dollar rise of wages, falling which they would all go out on strike. The proprietors of the different shops were all notified of this and falling the granting of their request the men have fully determined to quit work on the 3rd October. It is possible that before such an extreme step is resorted to that their request will be granted or that a satisfactory compromise will be effected.

The s.s. Tobasco left here for Halifax at 8.30 last night, taking no passengers and a small cargo.
